WICHITA STATE WINS INAUGURAL PBA COLLEGIATE INVITATIONAL PRESENTED BY STORM

The final event of the Guaranteed Rate PBA World Series of Bowling XIII pitted the elite of men's collegiate bowling against one another. The top four ranked teams in the USBC collegiate bowling rankings were invited to showcase college bowling under the PBA brand, with Wichita State University prevailing as the first ever PBA Collegiate Invitational presented by Storm champions.

Wichita State, the defending Intercollegiate Team Championships national champions, concluded the regular season as the No. 1 team in the country. They faced off with another college bowling blue blood in Webber International University, who finished the regular season fourth in the rankings.

St. Ambrose University, who lost to Wichita State in last year's ITC finals, earned the No. 2 seed, and squared off with the Savannah College of Art and Design, based in Savannah, Georgia. The first round of the PBA Collegiate Invitational consisted of a single-game Baker match. Then, the winners competed in a Race to Two for the title. Though no national championship was on the line, players and coaches embraced the unique setting and opportunity to display their school on a national stage.

JASON BELMONTE WINS HIS FOURTH TITLE OF THE SEASON

His win in THE STORM CUP: PBA Lubbock Sports Open is the 29th of his career

Jason Belmonte won three matches in the stepladder finals of THE STORM CUP: PBA Lubbock Sports Open to claim his fourth title of the 2022 Guaranteed Rate PBA Tour season and second in three THE STORM CUP events. Belmonte defeated Jesper Svensson, Sean Lavery-Spahr and top seed EJ Tackett to claim the title at South

In the championship match, Belmonte needed two strikes in the 10th after Tackett left a solid 9 pin that gave Belmonte a chance

Plains Lanes in Lubbock, Texas.

"I don't think we will ever see a more solid 9 pin in our lives," said Belmonte of Tackett's bad break. "In these situations, it can be a coin flip. I had just a little bit more luck than he did."

Tackett finished with 245 before Belmonte struck twice, then knocked down nine more pins to win his fourth title of the season. It's the third time in Belmonte's career he's won four times in a single season. The other two times—2017 and 2019—led to two of his six PBA Player of the Year Awards.

To get to Tackett, Belmonte first had to defeat 11-time continued on page 5

CALIFORNIA BOWLER ROLLS FIRST 800 SERIES OF 2022 USBC OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

LAS VEGAS - More than a decade ago, Robby Callan of Vacaville, California, was part of one of the wildest nights in the history of the United States Bowling Congress Open Championships.

Unfortunately, the result did not favor him and his teammates, and it ended as a story of the one that got away.



Almost 13 years and 12 miles away from that April night, Callan found himself with another chance to make history on the biggest stage in bowling, and he thought the opportunity got away once again.

Instead, the 48-year-old right-hander now is the owner of the only 800 series at the 2022 USBC Open Championships, and he didn't even realize he'd done it.

Callan knew he was bowling well in his team event Sunday at the South Point Bowling Plaza, and he stepped up for his final frame of the night with the chance to realize another lifelong goal of rolling a perfect game on the championship lanes.

When his first shot went high and left the 6-10 combination, he thought he'd lost the 800, along with the first 300 of the 2022 tournament. Simply enough, he miscounted by 10 pins.

He needed to convert the spare to complete the task, and a flush fill ball gave him an 808 set on games of 252, 278 and 278.

"I really thought I was 10 less and finished with 798," said Callan, who made his 22nd Open Championships appearance. "It feels great. I don't get to compete all that much anymore, so when I have success, it really feels worth it."

In 21 previous events, Callan had a high series of 767, which came during a memorable team event in 2009.

That year, the Open Championships was held on a traditional custom installation inside Las Vegas' Cashman Center, just a short drive from South Point. It was the longest tournament in history at 154 days and featured a near-record 17,200 teams.

The Regular Team title that year ended up being decided by a heated 10th-frame battle between two teams seven lanes apart. No one could've guessed that the number set that night would hold up for more than three months or that the team that fell short would end up second in the final standings.



Callan's big series in 2009 helped his Sack Toe team to a 3,427 total, but it still left them 22 pins shy of the 3,449 winning number posted by Milwaukee's Linds Limited. Linds Limited went on to win Team All-Events that year, too.

As much as the moment and eventual results could've been disappointing for Callan and his teammates, they also were rewarding and motivating.

"I think we definitely have used that as motivation," Callan said. "For guys who don't bowl every weekend

or even bowl a lot of tournaments because, you know, life happens, that showed us years ago that we belong. Everyone wants to take advantage of opportunities, which we kind of had again tonight, but not all of us were clicking at the same time. That's what makes this tournament so hard. Everything has to click."

Callan's flurry of 29 strikes Sunday sparked another noteworthy night that included games of 1,054, 1,067 and 1,170 for a 3,291 total, which again is second in the Regular Team standings. This year, Supreme Deck of Grand Haven, Michigan, leads with 3,372, bowled just over 24 hours prior.

Callan was joined in the effort by two other members of the 2009 team, Robby Porter (658) and Tim Hill (586). The other contributors this time around were Andrew Udahl (684) and Jeffrey Wurm (555). Their team's name now is BowlTec.

As the three games unfolded Sunday, Callan was able to anticipate the moves he needed to make by watching Udahl's ball reaction. Based on what he saw in Udahl's 10th frame, he opted not to move for his own first shot, and it cost him his bid for perfection.



"I've never had 300 at the Open Championships, and I wanted it," Callan said. "I just missed a move. I was ahead of the moves the whole set, and that one got me. I didn't think I needed to move, and it turns out I did. I moved two boards left on the approach, and the fill ball was flush."

It's Like 1973 All Over Again...

Bowling Ball Controversy "Heats Up"

It's been almost 50 years since the first "soft ball" controversy began with the soaking of a plastic bowling ball in a solvent known as MEK (methyl ethyl ketone), and made famous by professional bowling star Don McCune, who was not known for hooking the ball more than three or four boards. That is, until 1973.

And now it's all happening again with a recent outburst of a professional kegler over the alleged legitimacy of urethane bowling balls. The result has been a number of rumors about the policies of the USBC and the PBA. After a bit of research on the internet I have discovered that the research of soft urethane bowling balls has been going on by USBC since 2019. Here are some highlights of the past four years of findings:

- 1. 2019 Urethane bowling balls fall below a 72D (durometer, or D) hardness, but return to original hardness within 24 hours.
- 2. 2020 (Field Test) Urethane balls become progressively softer with use over time. Of the 20 models measured, the hardness declined by 2.4D to 5.6D in balls manufactured from 2017 to 2020. The effect is not isolated to one manufacturer and can be seen across many models.
- 3. 2020 (Hardness Research Report) 96% of the urethane balls tested were less than 72D after the Field Test. Comparing the hardness of a urethane ball at the time of approval to its hardness after the Field Test shows a significant decrease in hardness over time.
- 4. 2022 USBC Statement on Purple Hammer USBC has no evidence that Purple Hammers were manufactured with hardness below the approved specifications and intentionally distributed. USBC research findings show that urethane balls get softer with use over time. This is true for virtually all urethane balls tested regardless of brand. This is not unique to Purple Hammers.
- 5. 2022 Update to National Tournament Rules in Relation to Purple Hammers Findings of USBC's investigation are inconclusive. However, because first hand accounts describe the potential for a number of Purple Hammers to be produced out of specification in 2016 and 2017 is concerning. Therefore, USBC is instituting a rule for all national tournaments that reads as follows: "Purple Hammer bowling balls manufactured during 2016 or 2017 are prohibited for use."

Although it has been difficult to find information about the banning of urethane bowling balls by the PBA online, Jeff Richgels of 11.11/10.20 has posted the following: "The PBA has banned urethane balls more than 2 calendar years old for national PBA events." Jeff also provides the following article at no charge because of the importance of the information (if you are interested, his subscription price is \$19.99 for one year):

All of this reminds me of the Columbia 300 plastic ball controversy from the 1970's. Following McCune's discovery of MEK from a friend that was a chemist, he was looking forward to the start of the 1973 season. In an article from Sports Illustrated ("Now He's Throwing a Wet One, Too"), McCune admitted in the 1973 article by Dan Levin, "The soft ball gave me a lot of confidence. That's half the battle in sports."

After two wins on the winter tour, and then another two wins on the summer stretch, McCune said, "They suspected something, so I told them I was using a soft surface ball. But that's all." McCune's traveling partner, Jim Stefanich, could have been the one that let the cat out of the bag when he asked bowling guru Bill Taylor about solvents that would soften a bowling ball.

At Fresno in June, the article continues, Tim Albin asked Taylor for advice and about a half hour later George Pappas said, "Bill, do you know what this soaking business is all about?" Before the day was out, another half dozen players had come to Taylor looking for answers. Levin continues in the article by acknowledging that the Redwood City Open at Mel's Bowl the following week was the first big soaker event. McCune won again..

And now it appears to be happening again, with all of the rumors surrounding the older urethane bowling balls. When I first ventured out on the tour in 1975, the 75D hardness rule had taken effect, and the Columbia 300 Yellow Dot was the ball of choice, unless you could find a Brunswick Crown Jewel made in the early 1960's. By this time, another concept had taken hold, with many bowlers "baking" their bowling balls prior to squad time, which caused the equipment to soften before bowling and then return to normal within a few hours.


Looking back on those years, I remember that any softer surface ball did not really help me, because I was a "frustrated stroker," which meant that there was not much speed behind my delivery. What I did discover was that prior to bowling, I often would give my ball a 5 minute shine in one of Larry Litchstein's Lustre Kleen ball machines that he transported from one stop to the next. After a 5 minute shine the ball was warm to the touch, especially considering that there was usually a line waiting to get a last minute polish from the overheated machines.

Could it be that those of us polishing our bowling balls had actually discovered another way to soften the ball without realizing it, because the combination of heat and polish prevented an overreaction? It appears that for now, the urethane controversy of 2022 will continue...

Due to work and family obligations over the years, Callan hasn't bowled as much as maybe he might've liked, but spending time at the Open Championships with friends he bowled with in junior leagues 35 years ago, continues to be an annual highlight.

The group's time on the lanes began with some excitement earlier Sunday at the nearby Bowlers Journal Championships, where Porter was able to notch the year's first perfect game.



The 300 came between games of 211 and 201 for a 712 series, and that is seventh in the Open Singles standings.

Since the format at the Bowlers Journal Championships allows competitors to use their scores for singles and doubles at the same time, Porter and Callan chose to team up. Callan rolled a 706 series, and their 1,418 total landed them third in the Open Doubles standings.

Along with the chance at some prize money, competing in the Bowlers Journal event also gave the teammates a look at the same pattern they'll be bowling on Monday night for doubles and singles at the Open Championships.

They'll return to the South Point Bowling Plaza at 9 p.m. Eastern, filled with the confidence and momentum from their team set Sunday.

Though they didn't catch Supreme Deck in the team event, the members of BowlTec will have another shot, as Supreme Deck also leads Team All-Events this year with a 9,917 total. Team All-Events includes the combined all-events scores for all five players.

Individually, Callan has a nice start to his quest to track down Supreme Deck's David Carroll, who leads Regular All-Events with a 2,080 total.

Beyond this week at South Point, Callan said he and his teammates are hoping to bowl together at the Open Championships for as long as possible, and he's considering a personal resurgence as he gets closer to being eligible for senior competition.

"I've haven't bowled as much because of work and family and everyday life stuff, but I'm getting the desire to compete again, so you might be seeing a little more of me here and there," Callan said. "All my buddies at home are telling me that as soon as I turn 50, I'd better be bowling, so I might do that."

The 2022 Open Championships will run from March 12-July 18. The Bowlers Journal Championships kicked off March 11 and will conclude July 17.

PBA Tour champion Svensson, who is the only player aside from Belmonte to win a THE STORM CUP event so far. The match was close most of the way until Svensson left and failed to convert a 5-10 late.

In the semifinal match, Belmonte got past Lavery-Spahr, who was attempting to win his first title. A slow start for both players came down to Belmonte needing to fill 29 in the 10th to shut out Lavery-Spahr, which is exactly what Belmonte did, taking a 202-201 victory.

Now with 29 PBA Tour titles, Belmonte is tied with Mike Aulby for eighth all-time, one behind Dick Weber, who won 30 times in his PBA career. Belmonte and Aulby are also the only two players ever to complete the Super Slam of all five major championships.


The win also increases Belmonte's lead in both the PBA Playoffs points race and THE STORM CUP points race, the latter of which pays a \$10,000 bonus to the player with the most points over the course of the four events. THE STORM CUP concludes with THE STORM CUP: PBA Colorado Springs Open beginning Wednesday. Only two players—Svensson and Tackett—are capable of catching Belmonte, but can only do so with a win in Colorado Springs along with a very low finish from Belmonte.

In the opening match, Wichita State's experience proved vital as they adapted to the environment. They defeated Webber International, 221-219, to advance to the finals

In the battle of the bees, SCAD-Savannah took down St. Ambrose 242-214. Both teams made a point to express their fervent personalities. SCAD-Savannah's hilarious chants, packed with inside jokes, captivated the crowd's attention. Tyrell Ingalls, the anchor bowler for SCAD-Savannah said being themselves and having fun was the key to their success.

"It really improved our comfort because you noticed out the gate, we were all making shots," Ingalls said. "You can't really do that if you're not relaxing and having fun. I think that was the key that we needed going into this."

In the Race to Two finals, Wichita State stormed out of the gates with a 290. After junior TJ Rock converted a spare in the first, the Shockers fired the back 11 strikes to take 1-0 lead. Freshman Spencer Robarge was not a part of the Shockers' title run last year, but he gained TV experience as a high schooler at the USBC Masters and the PBA Junior National Championship.

"It's been a few years since I bowled with fans," Robarge said. "But the crowd was great. We obviously had a pretty fair idea of what we're doing on the lanes and good team chemistry made it a lot easier for us to string some strikes."

The Shockers kept their foot on the gas, winning the second game and the tournament, 231-159. Senior Alec Keplinger says the win, "Shows us that we know we can do it. We already knew it ourselves, but we came out here and proved it again. So many people want to come after us even more but we're ready."

Katie Thornton, SCAD-Savannah head coach and former WIU bowler, said bowling on TV served as a great experience for her team.

"Just being able to throw a shot under the lights and knowing what it feels like. It's a completely different feeling and environment," she said. "It's great exposure for us as a young program. We haven't had the exposure that the other teams have had, so that was kind of our first chance at that as well." All four of these teams advanced to the ITC national championships next month in Addison, Illinois, where the top 16 men's and women's teams will compete for a national championship.



DOWNEY, Calif. -- Here we are at Week 5 of Round 4 in the 2021-22 Brunswick Invitational. Taking the top dogs (Forever Hope Foundation) out of the equation, it's looking like a few teams have a real shot at the round. Could a strategy to get the round be to stay away from the main event and a guaranteed matchup with arguably one of the best teams in the history of this league to date? It's Threadworks' turn thanks to total pins. Family Ties may not mind this one bit. Let's get to the lanes and find out.

Team Hu\$tle (6) vs. TDI Refrigeration (3)

TDI Refrigeration kept things close in Game 1, but it was all Team Hu\$tle all night in a 174-pin sweep. Jamie Carrington led the way for Team Hu\$tle with a 594 as Team Hu\$tle jumps up to 11 points for the round. TDI Refrigeration had two subs for the matchup on the night, and one of them, Michael Barnett, led the way for the team with a 588.

WBPI (7) vs. Professional Approach Pro Shop (7)

The blowouts continued, as Professional Approach Pro Shop swept away WBPI for five points in a 224-point series win. John Struckman had an OK start with a 177 game in Game 1 before going off for 243 and 268 for a 688 series for the night. Professional Approach Pro Shop went to 12 points with the sweep. Neema Khazaie shot a 578 to lead the way for WBPI.

Cal Bowl \$\$\$ (8) vs. Forest Lanes (7)

Three matchups, three sweeps. This time it was Forest Lanes' turn to get five points. This one was not close as Forest Lanes defeated Cal Bowl by a whopping 438 pins.
