KATTERING, OH - Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Tom Baker of King, N.C., won the PBA50 Dayton Classic presented by Roto Grip Thursday to capture his 12th career PBA50 Tour title and second of the season.

The 59-year-old Baker defeated fellow Hall of Famer and top qualifier Norm Duke of Clermont, Fla., 265-217, in the title match at Capri Lanes to join Duke as the tour's only two-time winners this season. The win also propelled Baker into a three-way tie for second on the PBA50 Tour career titles list with Gary Dickinson and Dale Eagle. John Handegard leads the list with 14 titles.

"When you bowl a great player like Norm you know you're going to have your hands full," said Baker, who also owns 10 PBA Tour titles. "I knew I was going to need a good game. I think we were all a little surprised that the lanes were playing a little straighter than we thought. "I was fortunate to start the game with four strikes and Norm struggled so I was able to build up a little bit of a cushion which put me in good mindset as the match went on."Baker's win avenged a loss to Duke in the title match of the UnitedHealthcare Sun Bowl In The Villages earlier this season which Duke won 256-228.



"I told Norm that now we're even," said Baker, who won his first title of the season in the Northern California Classic in June. "With two tournaments left this season hopefully we'll meet again to bowl for a title, you never know." In the semifinal match, Baker defeated Hall of Famer Brian Voss of Alpharetta, Ga., 213-203, to advance to the title match. In the opening stepladder match, Voss defeated two-time PBA Tour winner Jack Jurek of Lackawanna. N.Y., 216-167. Jurek and Voss were both trying for their first

PBA50 Tour title.

Heading into the final two tournaments of the season, Baker, a four-time PBA50 Player of the Year, moved into a tie with Pete Weber for second in the PBA50 Player of the Year points race, 12 points behind Duke who leads.

The PBA50 Tour travels to Hammond, Ind. Aug 4-7 for the PBA50 South Shore Open presented by DV8 to be followed by the season-ending Treasure Island Resort & Casino Open presented by Hammer in Welch, Minn., Aug. 10-13.

Once we solved all the world's problems I asked Charlie for some performance tips and strategies for scoring as a no-tapper. Here are some of his secrets. The Sky is Falling! The Sky is Falling!

Chicken Little had nothing on the bowling blogoshpere.

When Brunswick announced recently that it was selling its BRC bowling center business to BowlmorAMF for \$270 million, and has intention to sell its bowling products division by year end, the news and possible implications rippled across the industry like a meteor hitting New York. Industry blogs went viral. What's next? Is Ford buying GM? Is Cosco buying Walmart?

Bowling without Brunswick? OMG!

Few people would argue with the fact that Brunswick is bowling's #1 and most iconic brand. The company has been in business since 1845; in the bowling products business since 1890; and in the bowling center operations business since the mid 1960's. And given the recent history of AMF, most might have predicted not long ago that any such sale might be in the opposite direction.

More than a few eyebrows were raised only a few months ago when small chain operator Tom Shannon, principle owner of a few New York centers called Bowlmor, announced he was rescuing AMF from chapter 11 bankruptcy... and with the ink barely dry on that contract he is now adding the 85 Brunswick Recreation Centers (BRC) to his rapidly growing bowling empire... aggressive to say the least. If finalized, the chain will be 343 centers strong.

The news that one company is buying another is really not news at all. These types of transactions happen in every industry every day. The news in this case is the two brands involved, AMF and Brunswick. Competitors, and many would say even rivals for more than a half century; virtually nobody saw this coming until the rumors surfaced during Bowl Expo in June.

And frankly, AMF has had its share of bad publicity in recent years, with two bankruptcies and more than a few bad internet stories about centers being mismanaged; and some of that negative publicity has continued under Shannon's leadership, although most are willing to give him the benefit of the doubt with the hope that he could eventually restore AMF centers to some former glory, and with hard work, a fair profit.

Perhaps even more shocking than the sale of the BRC chain was the announcement by Brunswick CEO Dustan McCoy that the Brunswick board of directors had voted to also sell its Bowling Products Division by the end of this year. Initially, it sounded like Brunswick had decided to completely divest itself of bowling; but a letter sent out a few days after the first announcement from Brunswick Bowling Products President Brent Perrier cleared up a few questions. "In terms of closing our doors," said Perrier, "nothing could be further from the truth. Our business is strong and profitable.

Our situation is not the case of an underperforming division being sold, but rather the potential transfer of a successful and vital business that is the most recognized and respected brand in the bowling industry."

Still, and it is natural, employees and thousands of others with Brunswick affiliations are nervous. It appears that their world is about to be turned upside down. For some, it may be like moving to a new country . . . the culture and way of life is very different. Businesses, especially rival businesses, have cultures too, and sometimes they are as opposite as political parties. Bowlers are loyal to the brands they choose . . . and proprietors are loyal to the companies and sales people they are comfortable with when it comes to buying capital equipment, pins, pinsetter parts, etc. In the automotive world, there are Ford people, and there are Chevrolet people. In bowling, there are Brunswick people and AMF people.

When a major brand disappears from an industry, it has a ripple effect . . . the entire industry changes, and if Brunswick leaves bowling, the implications are far reaching not just in the USA, but globally. The products will still be there for decades, but the new culture and new business philosophy may take a while to sink in.

A few months ago, I wrote a column entitled "How Bowling Died." A few short sighted people thought it was just negative thinking and laughed it off. Others emailed and said it was the best thing they ever read, because unlike the first group, they understood that the column was a warning about what could happen to bowling if leaders in bowling don't find a way to work together. With this Brunswick announcement, I wonder if anyone is laughing now?

Any way you slice it, bowling is and has been in decline for a long time. We have lost millions of league bowlers, once healthy centers have closed, the women's pro tour shuttered its doors more than a decade ago, and the PBA Tour survives only by making major changes that have been tough on players and fans. Bowling media, ball companies, and others are hanging on by a thread.

Smart proprietors continue to make a good living, but they are working harder and are more challenged than ever before. We keep hearing that while league bowling is rapidly disappearing, open play is still healthy. Some say it is increasing, but a recent National Sports & Fitness Industry Association poll appeared in the Wall Street Journal saying that bowlers ages 18-34 have dropp from 20 million in 2009 to 15.5 million at the end of 2013.

Is this cause for alarm? It is if you are trying to attract new sponsors. Imagine you are the PBA or Strike Ten Entertainment trying to sign new sponsors in a climate where a key demographic is declining and where bowling's top brand may be leaving the industry.

Normally, this is where we offer a few suggestions for solving these challenges; but this time, we are going to need more time to think about it. Honestly, we can't see the light at the end of the tunnel right now . . . but that does not mean we will stop looking for it.

Regional Points Competition Races Heat Up Heading Toward PBA World Series

The chase for the 2014 competition points lead in seven PBA Regions is heating up with the October 12 deadline for qualifying for the PBA Regional Finals berths for PBA World Series of Bowling VI. The points leader in each region – along with the PBA Japan Region's points leader – will receive a paid entry into the World Series and will qualify for the PBA Regional Finals' match play competition. An eight-game round robin match play event on Friday, Oct. 24, at South Point Bowling Center in Las Vegas will determine the two players who will advance to the PBA Regional Finals match as part of the ESPN-televised PBA Challenge special event.

As of the final weekend in July, the PBA Regional points leaders were:

• East Region: Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, N.Y., with 94,469 points, followed by Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., with 73,266 points.

• South Region: Connor Pickford of Charlotte, N.C., with 68,830 points, followed by Lee Vanderhoef of Greenville, S.C., with 54,390 points.

• Central Region: Eugene McCune of Munster, Ind., with 108,096 points, followed by Patrick Dombrowski of Parma, Ohio, with 84,416 points.

• Midwest Region: Tom Hess of Urbandale, Iowa, with 106,353 points, followed by Brian Gunn of Chicago with 64,804 points.

• Southwest Region: Roger Petrin of Wichita, Kan., with 82,870 points, followed by Andy Patterson of Tyler, Texas, with 78,595 points.

• West Region: David Haynes of Las Vegas with 175,109 points, followed by Dave Wodka of Henderson, Nev., with 107,924 points.

• Northwest Region: David Haynes of Las Vegas with 124,590 points, followed by Josh Blanchard of Gilbert, Ariz., with 96,551 points.

• Japan Region: Yuka Tsuchiya of Kanagawa, with victories in the Cheetah and Chameleon Women's and Open tournaments, has clinched both the Japan Regional and Women's Regional points titles. She will make a decision on which event she will enter at the WSOB VI, and the runner-up in the other category also will be invited to bowl in Las Vegas.

BEN LAUGHLIN GETS A LITTLE HELP IN COMPLETING PRO-AM 300 GAME

Thousands of grassroots league bowlers – men, women, seniors and especially kids – have treasured memories of bowling in PBA Pro-Am events, where they team up with PBA stars and starsto-be. But few pro-am bowlers have ever had an experience quite like the one six-year-old Brianna Archabal had during the PBA Boise West/Northwest Open at 20th Century Lanes in Boise, Idaho, on July 25.

The daughter of former PBA Regional player Scot Archabal was bowling on the same pair of lanes with 2013 PBA Regional Finals champ Ben Laughlin of Chandler, Ariz., who started his game with 11 strikes. Laughlin then told Brianna that he gets very nervous when he's so close to bowling a 300 game, and asked her if she'd throw the last ball for him.

She did...and she struck...and the crowd went wild.

PBA REGIONAL SUMMARY: TEENAGER SIMONSEN WINS SOUTHWEST OPEN TITLE

• Seventeen year-old Anthony Simonsen from Mesquite, Texas, defeated Andy Patterson of Tyler, Texas, 226-189, to win his first PBA Southwest Region title Sunday in the fifth annual PBA Fort Sill Southwest Open, presented by Columbia 300, at Twin Oaks Bowling Center in Fort Sill, Okla.

Simonsen, who finished fourth at the PBA Grand Casino Summer Swing Open earlier this year, took an early lead with four strikes as Patterson opened twice in the first five frames and never mounted a comeback, allowing Simonsen to coast to the title and \$2,500 winner's check.

After qualifying 14th for the match play elimination rounds, Simonsen defeated Jeff Campbell from Amarillo, Texas, 2-1; Lineal Floyd of Colorado Springs, 2-1; Randy Turner of Shallowater, Texas, 2-0, and amateur Jack Zuniga of Tulsa, Okla., 278-230, to reach the title match.

• Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, N.Y. defeated Jason Stadtler of Cherry Hill, N.J., 269-200, to win the PBA Pure-It Pro Shop Eastern Open presented by DV8 at Cedar Lanes in Lebanon, Pa., Sunday, for a \$2,500 first prize and his 25th career regional title.

The Pure-It Pro Shop Eastern Open also was the first of three PBA Women's East Region events. Kristina Wendell of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., topped the four women bowlers entered by finishing fifth overall, earning \$900 while missing the stepladder finals by 57 pins. PBA Tour champion Kelly Kulick of Union, N.J. also qualified for the finals, finishing 11th and earning \$650.

• Harry Sullins of Chesterfield Twp., Mich. defeated Dean Billings of Rootstown, Ohio by 168 pins to win the PBA PROGRESSIVE/Gerdeman Insurance/Al Smith Jeep Central/Midwest Classic at Al-Mar Lanes in Bowling Green, Ohio, Sunday, claiming the \$4,000 top prize and his 27th overall PBA Regional title.

The cumulative pinfall eliminator finals format gave the other three finalists little chance since Sullins had built a 110-pin lead after the first 17 games. He finished with an 18-game total of 4,077 pins, expanding his margin over Billings in the final game. Billings closed with a 3,909 total to collect \$2,000 as runner-up. Tom Baker, King, N.C., was third and Tommy Martin of Olive Branch, Miss., finished fourth. The eliminator format used in the tournament involved trimming the field based upon total pinfall after eight, 12, 15 and 17 games.

• Amateur Abraham DeMond of Angola, Ind., defeated Dan MacLelland of Canada, 276-193 to win the PBA Farmer's State Bank/Roto Grip Central Re-Entry Open at Angola Bowl Sunday. Although he earned \$2,600 for his victory, DeMond's win is not recognized as a PBA title since he bowled as a guest. The re-entry event allowed players to attempt to qualify multiple times if they wished in order to make it into the match play elimination rounds.

• Gary Shultis of Levittown, N.Y., defeated Gary Morgan of Atlanta, Ga., 279-238, 168-212, 256-237, in the best-of-three-game title match to win his 20th PBA Regional title in the PBA50 SpareTimes Hampton South Open at SpareTimes Lanes in Hampton, Va., Sunday. Shultis also earned \$1,600.

• Dave Wodka of Henderson, Nev., posted a 7-1 match play record and a 3,698 pinfall total Sunday to win his 19th career regional title in the PBA Boise Northwest/West Open at 20th Century Lanes in Boise, Idaho. Wodka, who earned \$2,000, defeated Clay Rees of Riverton, Utah, by 86 pins for the title. In the companion PBA50 Open, John Marchette of Bozeman, Mont., went 5-1 and knocked down 2,893 total pins for 14 games to top Craig Miller of Tracy, Calif. Marchette, a non-member, doesn't receive credit for a PBA title. Miller had a 3-3 match play record and 2,872 pins.

• The August regional schedule features a "super regional," a series of Women's Regional events, special events, Challenge events for non-champions, and a full calendar of opportunities for PBA and PBA50 players.

On the Aug. 8-10 schedule is the Waccamaw Myrtle Beach South Classic (a PBA Women's Regional series points event) at Waccamaw Bowling Center in Myrtle Beach, S.C.; the Killeen Southwest Open (also a PBA Women's Regional points event) at Hallmark Lanes in Killeen, Texas, and the Bowlers Supply/Storm East Open at Colony Park Lanes North in York, Pa.

The Aug. 15-17 weekend includes the Emerald Bowl Southwest Challenge presented by Bowling Dynamix, for non-champions, in Houston, Texas; the Dave Husted Northwest Open presented by Dexter at Husted's Milwaukie Bowl in Milwaukie, Ore.; the Bethmann Russell Syracuse Eastern Open presented by Radical (a PBA Women's Regional points event) at Flamingo Bowl in Liverpool, N.Y., and the Lefeld Implement Central Classic (a PBA Women's Regional points event) at Pla-Mor Lanes in Coldwater, Ohio.

PBA ADOPTS USBC'S "NO THUMB" RULE EFFECTIVE JAN. 1, 2015

The United States Bowling Congress is the national governing body of bowling in the United States and as such, the PBA continues to adhere to USBC equipment specifications. In a move to add greater clarity and fairness to ball specifications related to bowlers not using their thumb while delivering the ball, the USBC modified the specifications on bowling ball gripping holes. This rule will take effect for USBC competition beginning Aug. 1, but, to avoid a change in the middle of the PBA season, the effective date for this rule to be implemented during PBA and World Bowling events will be Jan. 1, 2015.

Under the new rule, any thumb hole that is not used for gripping purposes during the delivery would be classified as a balance hole. Bowling balls are only permitted one balance hole. The new rule can be found in the PBA Rule Book under the "Resources" tab on pba.com (http://www.pba.com/ Content/images/members/PBARuleBook.pdf). Go to page 56, Rule 11.5.4 and see Rule 11.6 for non-compliance penalties.

LAUGHLIN — Donald J. "Don" Laughlin (born May 4, 1931) is an American gambling entrepreneur, hotelier and rancher for whom the town of Laughlin, Nevada, is named.

A native of Owatonna, Minnesota, Laughlin worked winters during his youth as a fur trapper. He took the profits and used them to purchase slot machines for installation in hunting lodges. The young businessman was making \$500 a week when his school principal gave him an ultimatum: get out of slots or get out of school. Since he was making more than three times what the principal was, he got out of school

Laughlin moved to Las Vegas, Nevada, in the late 1950s and purchased his first casino, the "101 Club." By 1964, Laughlin had sold the 101 Club. That same year, Laughlin was flying his private plane over the California/ Arizona/Nevada tri-state area near the Colorado River. Growth in the area, specifically in Bullhead City and Kingman in Arizona, and Needles in California, was spurred by the construction of nearby Davis Dam, completed in 1951. The area was also a major stop along Route 66. It was during that flight that Laughlin envisioned the potential of the area as a resort destination. Soon after, he purchased a shuttered, eight-room river front motel on 6.5 acres for \$250,000. Though the landowner had several offers, he decided to sell the property to Laughlin because of his previous casino background.

In less than two years the Riverside Resort was entertaining guests not only with gambling but with all-you-can-eat chicken dinners for 98 cents. Play at the casino was on twelve slot machines and two live gaming tables. Accommodations at the Riverside were available in only four of the motel's eight rooms; Laughlin's family occupied the remaining four.

The city of Laughlin is believed to have received its name when a U.S. Postal Service inspector asked Laughlin to give a name to the area post office in order to receive mail. Laughlin suggested the name "Riverside and Casino," but the postal inspector in turn suggested "Laughlin" because of their common Irish heritage.

In 1972, the property, now known as the Riverside Resort Hotel & Casino, underwent a major expansion with the addition of 48 new rooms. In 1975, 52 more rooms were added. Construction of a 14-story hotel/casino tower in 1983 added 253 rooms and in 1986, a second 14-floor tower added 307 more rooms and an automotive museum. With free admission to the public, the Riverside's extensive collection is an offshoot of the famous Harrah's collection. One longtime exhibit, a 1969 Chevrolet Camaro nicknamed "Big Red" and specially prepared for road racing, has been returned to service and was the cover story of the May, 2005 edition of Hot Rod Magazine. The largest expansion came in 1994 with the addition of 800 more rooms for a total of 1404 rooms. A bowling center, the only one in Laughlin, was constructed in 1999. Laughlin also helped finance the construction of a bridge over the Colorado between the northern tips of both Bullhead City and Laughlin as well as the expansion of Bullhead City's airport to enable it to accept airliners.

Laughlin spends his time shuttling in his private helicopter between his penthouse suite atop the Riverside and his cattle ranch in nearby Kingman. He also uses his helicopter in travels back to his hometown of Owatonna, Minnesota, for the Steele County Free Fair, parking it in a vacant lot behind the Owatonna Country Inn & Suites before it was replaced by a cinema's parking lot. A selfconfessed workaholic, Laughlin generally conducts the day-to-day affairs of running his businesses in the evening hours. Despite his fortune and fame, Laughlin is a very open individual towards his guests and can be seen frequenting the casino floor at night and chatting with them

skilled bowler to compete successfully. The secret is to know your ball. Knowing what a ball will do on any condition allows a bowler to compete with confidence and confidence leads to winning. The second Short secret is to use an eleven pound ball. Too many eightyish bowlers try to stay with too heavy of a ball for too long. With an eleven pound ball Charlie is able to generate some speed and avoid many of the splits his teammates and other players encounter.

Third, Charlie recommends switching from a fingertip grip to a standard grip. While your hook may be reduced your grip will be firmer and result in more accuracy. Your confidence will soar exponentially with the strength you feel with a firmer grip. Remember, confidence leads to success. Charlie's fourth tip is to have a third finger hole drilled into your ball. Three fingers are stronger than two. Three fingers will provide more strength, more accuracy, more strikes, more confidence and bigger scores.

"SCORING IS FUN."Finally, Charlie recommends all bowlers eighty years or older consider a bowling glove. One of those "gloves" that have an adjustable metal brace that allows you to lock your hand in a tilted position. The tilted position allows a bowler to lock his or her hand into a position that provides maximum tilt to a bowling ball. Tilt means more carry and better scores.

"SCORING IS FUN." Charlie is a pretty smart fellow and a darn good bowler. He developed a great game because of his mental approach. He believes the SCIENTIFIC METHOD is best. Experimentation, trial and error. Then practice, practice and more practice. Repetition, repetition and more repetition. Also, the Short method includes studying the games of scratch bowlers. He closely observes how scratch bowlers release their bowling balls and how they adjust to different lane conditions. He then tries to duplicate their techniques and lane strategies. How smart is that? Now that Charlie is a SUPER DUPER SENIOR BOWLER (80 years or older) he follows his own advise to a tee. As a result, he is scoring at a 261 no-tap pace and leads our super dupers in average. However, Charlie better watch out because JOHN HUTCHINGS is close behind at 256. By the way, last week Charlie bowled a league high 857 (300 - 279 - 278). Congratulations Charlie and thank you BOWLING NEWS for supporting CITRUS BELT super duper senior bowlers.
