Rash Makes Mad Dash to Colombia, Wins PABCON Singles Gold in Record Style

After qualifying for two PBA Fall Swing television finals over the weekend in Allen Park, Mich., Sean Rash was forced to make a mad dash to arrive in Cali, Colombia, late Monday where he joined his Team USA teammates for the opening event of the Pan American Bowling Championships.

It proved to be a "golden" trip for Rash.

It began on Sunday morning at Thunderbowl Lanes where the PBA, at the request of Team USA, provided a practice session on the PABCON lane condition for the players who were going to miss the official PABCON practice session. Most of the U.S. players then left for Colombia, but Rash still had TV finals to take care of.


After his final TV appearance Sunday, Rash rushed to the Detroit airport and flew to Houston. From Houston he flew to Panama. From Panama he flew to Cali. After arriving in Colombia on Monday, he had an hour-long drive directly to the bowling center in Cali, arriving just in time to bowl his PABCON singles event.

Rash started his six-game singles event with a 289, closed with another 289, and in between compiled a PABCON-record 1,482 pins to win the gold medal by seven pins over teammate and fellow PBA competitor John Szczerbinski. Colombia's Manuel Otalora (also a PBA member) won bronze with 1,466 pins.

Szczerbinski, Marshall Kent and Ronnie Russell were among the PBA members who competed in the PBA Fall Swing before heading to Colombia. On Tuesday, Szczerbinski and amateur partner AJ Chapman combined for 2,786 pins to win the men's doubles gold medal by 20 pins over teammates Kent and Russell.

Canada's Francois Lavoie, a leading contender for PBA Rookie of the Year honors after qualifying for two PBA Fall Swing telecasts on CBS Sports Network, and teammate Mitch Hupe won the doubles bronze medal for Canada with 2,755 pins, and on Wednesday, Lavoie, Hupe and Zach Wilkins won the trios gold medal with 4,255 pins, 335 pins ahead of the Team USA trio of Russell, Chapman and Kent.

The PABCON Championships continue into the weekend with five-player team, allevents and Masters events yet to be contested. Women's competition in the same events will be held next week.

PBA Fall Swing Begins September 21st with Wolf Open Finals at 6 p.m. CBS Sports Network

DETROIT — Nationally-televised coverage of the 2016 PBA Fall Swing begins Wednesday, Sept. 21 at 6 p.m. on the CBS Sports Network with the PBA Wolf Open finals from historic Thunderbowl Lanes in suburban Detroit.

Making his PBA television debut Canadian native Francois Lavoie, a 24-year-old rookie who starred with the Wichita State University bowling program, earned the top berth for the finals and will wait in the wings as four PBA Tour champions make their bids to bowl against him in the championship match.

The finals, which will be conducted on the 32-foot PBA Wolf lane condition, will open with No. 4 qualifier one-time PBA Tour winner Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Fla., bowling against No. 5 qualifier 19-year-old Texas two-hander Anthony Simonsen, a two-time Tour winner.

The Fall Swing will again implement lane oil with a blue dye so that fans and players can better see how the oil is applied to the lane as well as how the ball travels down the lane, and how lane play affects the oil as the finals continue.

A leading contender in the 2016 PBA Player of the Year race, Simonsen won the USBC Masters at age 19 in February to become the youngest ever to win a PBA major title after winning his first PBA Tour title with partner Connor Pickford in the Mark Roth/ Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship to kick off the 2016 season. Daugherty will be trying to win his first win since capturing the Bowlers Journal Scorpion Championship title in 2012.

The winner of the opening match will meet 18-time PBA Tour champion Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas. The 2007-08 Player of the Year is seeking his first title on U.S. soil since winning the 2013 PBA Viper Open in Las Vegas. Barnes' most recent titles were won in Qatar (2014) and Japan (2015).

The winner of the second match will take on three-time reigning PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte in the semifinal match. Belmonte will be trying for his 13th PBA Tour title and first since winning the USBC Masters in 2015. He qualified for his eighth career PBA Summer/Fall Swing television final, one shy of Bill O'Neill's record, in the fourth annual multi-event program. The semifinal winner will then meet Lavoie, whose previous best finish this season was third in the Downums Waste Services PBA Jonesboro Xtra Frame Open. Fall Swing telecasts on CBSSN continue with the Bear Open on Sept. 28; Badger Open on Oct. 5, Detroit Open on Oct. 12 and the King of the Swing special event on Oct. 19. All shows air at 6 p.m. PT.



Svensson, Simonsen Are Contenders to Dethrone Belmonte as PBA Player of the Year

DETROIT — As the PBA Fall Swing unfolds inside Detroit's historic Thunderbowl Lanes, PBA fans are getting a close-up view of how the multi-event tournament program will impact the 2016 PBA Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year races as the PBA Tour enters its home

When the Fall Swing got underway on Monday at Thunderbowl Lanes in suburban Detroit, Australia's Jason Belmonte renewed his bid to win a fourth consecutive PBA Player of the Year award – a feat never before accomplished in PBA competition. But he was on the outside looking in as a pair of young two-handed players, influenced by his innovative technique – appeared ready to de-throne him.

To put the POY race into perspective, the PBA Fall Swing involves four PBA Tour title events. The winners will be revealed as the CBS Sports Network telecasts air Sept. 21, 28, Oct. 5, 12 and 19. The Fall King of the Swing special event that will conclude the series on Oct. 19 is not a PBA Tour title event.

In addition to the Fall Swing, there are three Xtra Frame PBA Tour events remaining on the 2016 calendar along with the PBA Team Challenge and the U.S. Open.

Closing out the year will be the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VIII in Reno, Nov. 27-Dec. 11, which will include the PBA World Championship plus the Cheetah, Chameleon, Scorpion and Shark Championships.

Heading into Detroit, Sweden's 21-year-old Jesper Svensson was not only the Tour's only three-time winner in 2016 (including the FireLake PBA Tournament of Champions), but led the PBA in earnings (\$111,93) and average (228.09 for 117 games). He was followed in earnings by 19-year-old Texan Anthony Simonsen, the only other multiple winner in 2016 (including the USBC Masters), with \$99,150.

Belmonte has not yet won a title in 2016. He ranks second in average, scoring at a 226.16 pace, but came into Detroit 20th in earnings, a key stat among POY voters. Simonsen was 13th in average (220.98).

Prior to the Fall Swing, seven other players had won PBA Tour titles and there was plenty of room to shake up both the earnings and average standings, not to mention taking a shot at the PBA Player of the Year title.

With three months of activity remaining in 2016, the Player of the Year race promises to be intense all the way to the end.

Also of interest if the 2016 Rookie of the Year race which is being dominated – for the first time in PBA history - by a pair of Canadians. Graham Fach of Guelph, Ontario, established himself as an early favorite when he won the Barbasol PBA Players Championship in February in the second PBA Tour event he ever entered.

While Fach limited his activity since then, Quebec City native Francois Lavoie, a former collegiate All-American at Wichita State University, has yet to win a PBA Tour title, but he has become a regular contender including qualifying No. 1 for the PBA Wolf Open finals, No. 4 for the Badger Open finals and he was in the hunt for Detroit Open finals.

PBA Champions to Share CBS Sports Network TV Booth

During each telecast of the PBA Fall Swing, PBA Tour champions will provide their insights about the various animal pattern events that compose the Fall Swing, along with other reflections about their experiences in PBA Tour competition, as guest analysts along with CBS Sports Network lead announcer Dave Ryan and veteran color analyst Randy Pedersen.

The players who will join the telecasts – not necessarily in the order of appearances – are 18-time PBA Tour titlist Chris Barnes, 2012 PBA World Champion Dom Barrett of England; three-time reigning PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia, nine-time PBA Fall/Summer Swing TV finalist Bill O'Neill and 2008 PBA Rookie of the Year Rhino Page.

FOURTH ANNUAL PBA FALL/ SUMMER SWING TIDBITS

The PBA Fall Swing began in Milwaukee in 2013 as the PBA Summer Swing, and through its four-year history, already has compiled a portfolio of interesting tidbits:

- The "Swing" has had three hosts in four years: AMF Bowlero in suburban West Allis, Wis., in 2013 (where a different entry system was used, allowing players to enter individual events); FireLake Bowling Center in Shawnee, Okla., in 2014 and '15, and Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., in 2016.
- ◆ Like its big brother, the World Series of Bowling, the "Swing" has been based on three distinct animal pattern lane conditions serving as independent tournaments while also serving as qualifying stages leading to the main event, similar in concept to bicycle racing's Tour de France which includes sprint, mountain climbing and flat-land stages leading to the podium at the end. Since its beginning, the "Swing" has challenged bowlers to perform well on the Wolf (short 32-foot), Bear (flat 40-foot) and Badger (long 52-foot) patterns in order to advance to the Milwaukee/Oklahoma/Detroit Open finals.
- The Fall/Summer Swing has consistently rewarded players with one of the highest cashing ratios in the sport. Example: the Fall Swing in Detroit paid just over \$200,000 in prize money (including \$125,000 in added money) for a cashing ratio of 2.7:1. The added prize money and better-than-average cashing ratio was very similar to the previous two Summer Swings in Shawnee, each of which also included roughly \$125,000 in added prize money.
- Detroit's Fall Swing introduced Dennis McCamery Jr. as "PBA Emcee," a role he also serves with the NBA's Orlando Magic. A lifelong PBA fan, McCamery helped entertain the standing room-only crowds with a variety of free giveaways and other interactive fan experiences.
- With five nationally-televised events in each of the four "Swing" events, players have had opportunities to make a grand total of 20 CBS Sports Network appearances. Forty different players have appeared in at least one "Swing" telecast, but the overall leader in CBS Sports Network TV finals is Australia's Jason Belmonte with 11 shows, two more than Bill O'Neill. Tommy Jones is third with six.
- Since its inception, the PBA Fall/Summer Swing has aired exclusively on CBS Sports Network. The 2016 PBA Fall Swing series will air on five consecutive Wednesdays at 9 p.m. ET beginning on Sept. 21 with the Wolf Open finals, Sept. 28 with the Bear Open finals, Oct. 4 with the Badger Open finals, Oct. 12 with the Detroit Open finals and Oct. 19 with the King of the Swing, featuring the previous four title-winners plus the leading points winner from the Fall Swing who didn't win a title. In the event a player wins more than one title event, the next-highest player in points will earn a King of the Swing berth.
- A significant bonus for Fall Swing players was 10 invitations to participate in the lucrative 2017 DHC PBA Japan Invitational next January. The 10 invitees along with the highest woman qualifier based on total money won in Detroit will be announced after the King of the Swing telecast on Oct. 19.

Susan Cortez: The Silent Assassin

WINNETKA – It wasn't even close.

Susan Cortez and partner Joanne Petiya won by a landslide in a Sport-Tap Doubles tournament last month at Winnetka Bowl

Cortez and Petiya finished with a handicap score of 1,579 – more than 100 points ahead of the second-place team.

The top finishers were: 1st place Cortez/Petiya \$480; 2nd place Tim/Brenna Tripp (1,469) \$320; 3rd place Jerome Tellio/Hymie Glass (1,448) \$260; 4th place John Forrester/Vernon Schmidt (1,441) \$120; 5th place Jewell Williams/Gaynell Jackson (1,403) \$60.

Cortez bowled a 697 scratch (865 handicap) series and had a nearly perfect high game of 280. Her book average is 160. Petiya bowled a 510 scratch (714 handicap) series and had a high game of 213. Her book average is 145. This is not the first time this duo has cashed in a tournament together. In the July Sport-Tap doubles tournament, the team finished a respectable third place, taking home \$200.

The August event marks the fifth out of six Sport-Tap doubles tournaments that Cortez has cashed and her third time finishing in first place (previous wins with different partners Adam Lew and Krissy Ellis). Susan the sweet, soft-spoken, most humble bowler in the alley, stands to be everyone's fiercest competition. She IS the "Silent Assassin."

Having progressed leaps and bounds from when she started bowling 18 months ago, Cortez is a force to be reckoned with. Booking a 122 average in 2015, Cortez currently holds the High Female average in both her Tuesday (173 in League of Our Own, Winnetka Bowl) and Thursday leagues (178 in Thirsty Night Out, Winnetka Bowl).

Her six- or seven-step approach is far from what you'd expect to see from a traditional bowler but Cortez's timing and release are rarely off. Having improved her average 56-plus pins in one year's time, the numbers don't lie.

Cortez says she's having a blast learning all about bowling. "I've been very lucky and am grateful to be surrounded by talented bowlers. I can only hope to keep improving and have fun along the way."

Since the August Sport-Tap event, Cortez has continued to shine. She finished second in the Women's 600 club tournament held at Harley's Bowl in Simi Valley, cashed hundreds of dollars in all three of her Winnetka and Pickwick league sweepers events and most recently tied for

Not only is Cortez highly skilled and incredibly consistent, she is also lucky. She had back-to-back chances at winning a \$1,300+ strike pot draw a few weeks ago at Pickwick, which marks Cortez's highest payout to date. The next round is on Susan!

I asked Cortez to be my partner next time but Petiya already had dibs on her! The Sport-Tap doubles tournament at Winnetka Bowl will hold its next event in October. The date has not been announced. TUSBC Mythbusters

MYTH #40: Scores from one league can be used for postponements of another league.

BUSTED: Scores cannot cross over leagues. The scores being bowled during league play are bowled for that particular league and cannot be used for another league.

MYTH #41: The team winning the most segments in a split season league is the league champion.

PLAUSIBLE: A league may adopt a rule that declares a team that wins all segments the league champion. However, if there is additional money set aside for the teams in the playoff, the league must hold a playoff.

MYTH #42: If there is a tie for first place after position round a tenth frame is bowled to determine the winner.

BUSTED: If the position round is at the end of a segment in a split season league or the end of the season, a roll-off must be held. The roll-off consists of the same number of games using the same point system used within the league unless the league rules state otherwise. If the teams are tied after the roll-off, then an additional tenth frame is bowled until the tie is broken.

MYTH #43: Extra bowlers on the roster are substitutes.

BUSTED: A roster is comprised of regular members of a team. Extra bowlers on a roster are additional regular players. Substitutes, even assigned substitutes should not be listed on the roster.

MYTH #44: Lanes must be dressed before the league bowls.

BUSTED: USBC rules do not require lanes be dressed prior to standard league play. This is something the league should address when negotiating the contract for the season.

MYTH #45: A bowler must bowl before their absentee score can be used.

BUSTED: The league absentee score is used for a rostered bowler who is absent. If the bowler does not have an entering average in accordance with the league rules, the absentee score is 120 (Rule 105-e). A league may adopt a rule stating the vacancy score is used until a bowler bowls.

MYTH #46: No foul is committed if the buzzer or light did not go off.

BUSTED: A foul occurs when a part of the player's body encroaches on or goes beyond the foul line and touches any part of the lane, equipment or building during or after a delivery. If the bowler does not release the ball, no foul is committed. The players clothing and shoes are considered part of the body.

MYTH #47: I should not vote if I do not like any of the prize lists.

BUSTED: You do not have to accept any of the options, but not voting is not the answer. Your options are "YES or NO" for each of the prize lists presented. You should vote NO if you do not like the options presented.

Unfortunately, most prize lists presented do not give a YES or NO option. Be sure to write NO on all prize lists submitted, showing that you do not approve any of the options.

If you do not vote, the number of votes cast is decreased making it easier for one of the options to obtain a majority vote and be approved.

For Example: The Prize Committee presents two top heavy lists for consideration by the league board of directors. There are 18 teams and four officers in the league. If everyone votes one of the options must receive 12 YES votes. If only 11 board members vote, one of the options must receive 6 YES votes.

MYTH #48: A playoff and a roll-off are the same thing.

Busted: A roll-off is conducted to break ties. A playoff is used to determine the league champion. For example if there is a tie for the third segment, the tie would be broken by a roll-off. After the third segment winner is determined a playoff could be held by all the segment winners to determine the league champion.

MYTH #49: A league can adopt a rule not to add roll-off, playoff and sweeper/fun night averages into final average records.

Busted: Rule 113 requires these games be included in averages, when the American game of tenpins is bowled. There is no option for a league to adopt a rule that these games are not counted in final averages.

MYTH #50: A vacancy score counts toward a legal lineup.

sted: Neither a vacancy score or an absentee score can be used to meet the legal lineup requirement. Rule 105 states that a vacancy score or absentee score may only be used when a legal lineup is present. Therefore, actual bowlers must be present to meet the league legal lineup requirement.

A league cannot adopt a rule allowing a vacancy score or an absentee score to count toward a legal lineup.

New Website Completed! www.CaliforniaBowlingNews.com MYTH #51: The president's verification of the league account is the league audit.

Busted: The president verification of the league account is a monthly duty of the president to determine the funds deposited and the funds collected each month balance. The league finances must be audited at least once per season, per Rule 102c. This process is in place to provide checks and balances to protect league funds.

The audit committee checks league records no earlier than one month prior to the league payout to verify league income, expenditures and balances. Audit Instructions and an Audit Worksheet can be found in League Resources section of the Rules page on BOWL.com.

MYTH #52: All finger and thumb holes must be used when delivering the ball.

Busted: Gripping holes are not required to be used during delivery. A bowler who does not use the gripping holes must be able to demonstrate, with the same hand, that each gripping hole can be used simultaneously for gripping purposes. A thumb hole that is not used becomes a balance hole.

MYTH #53: A bowler using the two-handed approach cannot use a one-handed delivery.

Busted: A bowler using a two-handed approach is actually delivering the ball with one hand. Therefore a bowler is not required to use only the two-handed approach. One hand may be used, provided it is the same hand used when executing a two-handed approach.

MYTH #54: League officers, including league managers, youth league supervisors and officials must have USBC membership.

Confirmed: Rule 102a-3 requires all league officers to have current USBC membership.

MYTH #55: A USBC Youth member can waive cash prizes and bowl as a member of a four person team in adult leagues.

adult leagues.

Busted: A USBC Youth member can never bowl on a team of two or more players that pays cash or

bonds as prizes.

MYTH #56: If I paid membership in one league, I do not have to fill out a card for another league.

Busted: Not only must a card be completed for each league you bowl in, you should show your payment

receipt or membership card to the league secretary as proof of payment.

At 50, Michelle Silver Just Picking Up Steam

VALENCIA – Michelle Silver doesn't feel like a senior bowler. And she certainly doesn't look like one.

Nevertheless, the 50-year-old Silver added yet another laurel by claiming a women's senior title in the seventh annual California State United States Bowling Congress singles championships last month at Valencia Lanes.

Silver took first in the women's 50-54 senior singles handicap division by scorching a 237 average over six games. With handicap, Silver scored 1,532 to finish six pins ahead of Lynn Ellis of Inglewood.

Silver, who turned 50 in April, arrived at the bowling center with 10 bowling balls in her car, but became comfortable with just one of them and went on to roll two 260-and-higher games.

As for competing in the senior division now that she's 50, Silver said: "I think when you hit the magic number of 50, you think of it as old. I don't know if I feel 50. I hope 50 is the new 40."

That victory, in essence, could serve as a tune-up for Silver's defending her title in the prestigious California State singles championships. This year the tournament will be held Oct. 15-16 at Black Oak Lanes in Tuolumne, Calif. It's about a five-and-a-half-hour drive from L.A. She will be driving with husband Jim Harvey, an ace bowler who also will be competing in the tournament. The two celebrated their first anniversary this month.


Silver put on a show at the 2015 California State singles championships, which was held at Winnetka Bowl. The right-hander from West Los Angeles took first in the women's 176-and-higher division – and she also posted the division's second-highest score. She averaged a blistering 240 in her championship six-game set.

For good measure, Silver crushed her 20th perfect game during the tournament.

"Winnetka [Bowl] is my little Disneyland," said Silver, who won the California State Queens title in 2003 at Winnetka Bowl. "When I go to Winnetka, I have confidence – and with the love I have for the bowling center, it propelled me to the pinnacle moment of hitting No. 20."

Even though she hasn't added to her list of perfect games since her 20th, Silver appears at the top of her game. And it doesn't matter if she's 50 – or not.

Said Silver: "When you're young, you think [50] is really old. When you make it [to 50], then you think it's not that old."
