Mika Koivuniemi Wins 14th Career **Title in PBA Viper Championship** *Finnish native nips top qualifier Connor Pickford to end three-year U.S. television drought*

LAS VEGAS - Finnish native Mika Koivuniemi of Hartland, Michigan, defeated firsttime television finalist Connor Pickford of Charlotte, North Carolina, 224-214, to win his 14th career PBA Tour title in the PBA Viper Championship at the new South Point Bowling Plaza, ending a three-year title drought on American soil.

The Viper finals, the second of five PBA Tour title events conducted during GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI, aired Sunday on ESPN.

Koivuniemi, 47, had won four PBA International titles after winning the 2011 PBA Tournament of Champions, but he had to threw three strikes in the 10th-frame twice to end a three-year winless streak in U.S.-based competition.

"I was lucky I finished on the left lane," Koivuniemi said of his victory over Pickford. "I was lined up much better on the left lane than I was on the



right lane, but I still needed to make a good shot. I got a great break in the fifth frame, but it's about time some luck was with me. I feel like luck hasn't been on my side on TV very much lately.

"It's been three years since I've won in the U.S. so, yes, it feels excellent."

BOWLED WITH SANTA C

In the title match, Pickford

left the 2-4-6-7 split in his fourth frame and failed to convert for the only serious mistake of the match. He followed the open with three strikes, but Koivuniemi took the lead when he carried a high crossover strike in fifth, converting that break into a turkey. Pickford failed to strike in the eighth and ninth frames, giving Koivuniemi room to lock up the title with strikes on his first two shots in the 10th frame and that's what he did.

In the three-player shootout to start the Viper finals, a similar 10th frame performance got Koivuniemi into the title match. Koivuniemi started with four strikes and appeared to have the match under control, but he missed a 4-7 spare attempt in the fifth and momentarily lost his strike shot. He stayed out of trouble, leaving makeable spares until throwing three strikes in the 10th frame to lock up the match. His 221 game was too much for Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana (190) and England's Dom Barrett (126).

Barrett, the reigning PBA World Champion, ran into early trouble, leaving splits he couldn't convert in four of the first six frames, and quickly bowled himself out of contention. Two more splits resulted in the second-lowest nationally-televised game in PBA history (the record is Tom Daugherty's 100 game in the 2011 PBA Tournament of Champions).

Russell stayed close to Koivuniemi until he left the 6-7-10 split in the eighth frame. After a strike in the ninth frame, a 10 pin on his first shot in the 10th ended his title hopes





USBC Makes Their Case

On December 13 the rain stopped long enough for The United States Bowling Congress (USBC) Western Regional Manager David Prange and USBC Association Services Manager Mike Donahue to present a USBC Informational Workshop at Fireside Lanes in Citrus Heights.

About 40 attended from about seven different associations.

The agenda was as follows:

- Benefits of USBC Membership
- New youth Membership Product
- How Associations can work together for the benefit of bowling
- Youth Tournaments and eligibility Association Performance Standards
- Q & A

Prange asked how many attended the last USBC convention. Not many raised hands but he said USBC sees the need to make their conventions more interesting and they were working on changes to attract more delegates to an event in which they feel all associations should take part. USBC sees apathy here and they want to do something to ramp up interest. I am sure the economy and cost of travel, lodging, and meals are a deterrent. In years past attending national events were perceived important enough that associations raised money to help defray the cost of delegates representing their association at National.

The audience was asked to tell their story about how they got started bowling. Most had family that bowled and parents that got them involved in youth or adult leagues. In the past, all centers had promotion people who marketed their centers and programs to individuals and companies. They emphasize keeping informed via Facebook and Twitter and Bowl.com – which, if you are busy, takes a lot of time. Bowl.com is not necessarily easy to manipulate. Perhaps if you are devoted to a computer and willing to spend hours trying to find things, it's OK. Many long time devotees to bowling simply want hard copy of important things and saying, "It's a new world" doesn't satisfy - perhaps the reason for people not seeing value in committing to serving. I didn't see examples of association involvement. They say, Social Media is not just a fad and it is not "if" you use it but "how well" you use it.

Among the benefits cited are short duration events, charities, 501C3 tax exemption for associations, technology, BJ Interactive, webinars, coaching, Bowling Academy - compiling information from pros telling you how to do it. They say Membership provides many things; it is up to you to use it.

Performance Standards: This measures data and the goal is to help those who are not doing their job. Update association information, board member education, how to perform duties and maintain a 501C3 exemption. The importance of expediting membership processing to keep members happy. Many times bowlers enter tournaments and find their membership information has not been sent to USBC so they have to buy a card at the site and then get a refund when they return home. USBC says 96% passed (do those of you who got "D" s wonder?) And, if you got a "D" did anyone contact your association and give you some tips on how to improve?

Tournament Participation. USBC is concerned about the tournament participation going from some 13,000 not too many years ago to 8,000 and they are working to grow the event. Perhaps going to the same place – which they will be relegated to for some years - could be a deterrent. Again, cost of travel in economically challenged times makes a difference.

Coaching Clinics: If bowlers bowl better, they are happy but the wrinkle here is to get the local associations to give at least two clinics a year. They suggest partnering with other associations and not to worry about smaller clinics because it gives more personal attention.

A couple of videos were shown - kids bowling and the enthusiasm was infectious. Wonderful now but what about retention – a must. Another video extolling the 2013 mantra of "Together We Can" showing a variety of identifiable professionals saying, "Together We Can!" Nice mantra for the moment but....can we? Do we?

Other Comments:

- 2014 Youth Fee for USBC is \$4.00 and you can add to that what you want to provide what you want. Towels, participation awards, etc.
- Bowling is unique in that we pay weekly. Many sports pay by the year or season. There has been resistance to the USBC requiring the date of birth for a parent for youth leagues but the FTC (Federal Trade Commission) requires the information to protect the child.
- The Special Olympics supports bowling's Special Olympics Program for special needs bowlers and USBC will assist providing some of the same things as adult leagues.
- Associations can promote with signage and should use it when possible to promote events.
- The deadline for averages is now May 31.

The topic of uncertified 300 scores came up and whether a person could just order their own award from the USBC provider - the answer was absolutely not....but there are circumstances.

USBC seems to be defraying themselves of any tangible responsibilities to their associations and maintain laying off staff and such things as pushing the purchase of awards off on local and state associations is to aid their financial status. If you can't peruse websites and use social media you are considered "old hat" but it seems to me that a good many of the people who support USBC are just that - committed to USBC membership for many years, pay the fee for their youth bowlers to take part in such things as Junior Gold, support their charities - like the Komen Cancer Fund that bowlers gave a million dollars to this year and get NO recognition for. Komen is good about picking up the check though - but that's it.

All in all, the workshop was a good one bringing may things to the fore but my concern is what seems to be a total emphasis on youth and elite bowling while ignoring the cry from local associations for a reason to commit and convince others that USBC membership has value.

We were in the middle of one of those storms the first day of my bowling life and I was so excited about bowling that helping dad put tire chains on the family car was "no problem." I learned that hard work is worth it when the reward is bowling.

The storm made our trip to the Palace Bowling Alley messy and uncomfortable. Our old Ford's heater was broken and I had to hug my older brother all the way to stay warm. It was worth it though because we were going bowling. Those were simple times and a trip to go bowling then was the equivalent of a trip to Disneyland today.

As soon as dad had parked that old blue Fairlane I was out and jumping in the parking lot snow banks. I was so excited to go bowling. We were at THE PALACE. It was the prince of bowling houses. The best bowling center I ever bowled in. From the huge neon sign out front to the Kings Thrown in the men's room, the Palace had it all. It was unique, unusual and extravagant. It was owned by two eccentric bothers, John and Ed, who were rich and liked antiques. The Palace was a museum

and a bowling center. Surprise! When we entered Santa Claus was greeting everyone with a hug and a candy cane. Better yet he promised that he was going to bowl with us. Santa Claus was going to bowl. After we all got to sit on his lap, Santa was going to bowl with us. I was going to bowl with Santa. I can't describe the thrill of that day. It was the best day of my life up until then.

When I sat on Santa's lap I told him all I wanted for Christmas was a bowling ball. He was so funny, especially when he rolled a bowling ball between his legs for a strike. When leaving he reminded us to BE good and dream big.

After Santa's parting HO, HO, HO we were told to look at the number on our red pins. My number matched the one called and I won a bowling ball.

It was the best present I had ever received, my first bowling ball. On the way home my father reminded me that my brother needed a bowling ball. He was on a youth team that had an opportunity to win a trophy. His own ball could make a difference in his winning or losing. I was smart enough to know what dad was hinting at. That I give my new bowling ball to my brother. That he needed it more than me. As the tears began to well up in my eyes I knew the right thing to do. I needed to give the ball to my brother and give him a better opportunity to win. His day was now and mine would be in the future. Dad explained to me that our family was a team and that someday it would be my turn to receive their support.

When I gave my brother that bowling ball he was so happy. It made me happy to see him happy. I learned that Christmas is more about giving than receiving. That there is as much joy in giving as there is in receiving. As we get older we learn that giving is actually more joyful than receiving.

That joy of giving and seeing the happiness it evokes makes Christmas special.



"THE SECRET" TO BOWLING 900 by Frank Weiler

How do you bowl 900? What is "THE SECRET" to rolling Bowling's ultimate score? I know the Secret and will share it with you but first I must explain how I learned about it and it was used by a friend to roll a 900 series.

You heard me, my friend knows how to bowl 900 because he bowled 900.

While my source must remain anonymous and the exact locations of his exploits kept secret, I can tell you how and why he did what he did and how you can do the same.

Every bowler who has bowled 900 has a story and my source is no different. To fully understand and comprehend his Secret you must know his story from beginning to end. You must become one with him. Therefore you must read everything I write very carefully. For some, you may have to read what Is written here several times. It is important that every step be ingested, digested and processed slowly and deliberately.

It all started in Kava's back-seat. I'm not talking about his adventures with Stephanie. He had to force Bond to white flag if he was to make his point. He showed Bond that he could never be a speed racer. NASCAR racers drove at speeds over 200 MPH, twice the speed Bond could handle that night on Route 5 near Utica.

So what. Bond is scared of speed. So what that a little lady like Danica Patrick has more speedballs than Bond. SO WHAT? Just because Bond could never be a racer, a dragster or biker didn't mean he wouldn't be a success at something else. Take checkers. He was Oneida County Junior Champion twice. Take running. he won two races as a Cub Scout. Take marbles. He won a prized blue cat eye when he was twelve. That's what Kava wanted him to know, that he was unique and had unique talents. Everyone is special in their own way. That was Kava's life lesson that night. DISCOVER YOUR TALENTS AND LIVE YOUR DREAM.

After that night we all began to take inventory of ourselves so that we could set out pursuing our dreams. First, Bond found that he could bowl.

He rolled his first 200 when he was five and his first 600 when he was seven. He had a talent for striking and sparing. He also found that he had an analytical mind with a photographic memory. He could memorize any book that he read. His favorite read was War and Peace.

It was Bond's mind that led him to the CIA. It was during the 1970s that he volunteered for a project that would combine his intelligence and bowling skills. PROJECT 900 was to take him from a secret underground bowling facility somewhere in Colorado to Russia.

The CIA believed that Supreme Leader Comrade Breshnev was a closet bowler. Such bourgeoisie activities were frowned on in Russia at the time so no one knew of his clandestine bowling beneath the basement of the Kremlin. The CIA hoped that Bond could be inserted into Russia and become Breshnev's trusted coach. From that position of trust maybe he could obtain information valuable to America during the Cold War.

Before embarking for the Soviet Union Bond had to complete a rigorous training program. He had to demonstrate the ability to roll strikes like a robot. Strike after strike after strike. He had to become the first human robotic bowler. His training included hypnosis, esoteric programming and cyber kinetic physical exercises. He was placed in hypnotic states and bombarded with super suggestions. Some were close to being super fragilistic suggestions.

While in his hypnotic states he was taught to bowl using cyber kinetic movements which were known to only the highest degrees of YOGI on earth. These movements are concise but also very precise. They allowed Bond to roll a bowling ball so accurately that he could bowl 900 regularly. Now after nearly fifty years I can tell you Bond's secret, "THE SECRET"

to bowling 900. The CIA's PROJECT 900 has been declassified. The secret to bowling 900 is now in the public domain. It is public knowledge and may be shared with you without fear of condemnation or ridicule. The time has come so here I go.

condemnation or ridicule. The time has come so here I go. THE SECRET to bowling 900 begins with the mind. The mind must be cleansed of all extraneous information. It must only contain thoughts of bowling. The easiest way to do this and maybe the only way is through hypnosis.

It is a proven fact that most men have women on their mind 90% of the time and would be incapable of bowling 900 without hypnotic help. Fortunately for those without access to hypnotic practitioners there is self-hypnosis. The principles of self-hypnosis may be mastered by anyone with the desire, so long as they are not of weak mind. Scientific studies have shown that no one who has been a certified bowler for at least three years has ever been tested and found to be of weak mind. Readers, bowlers are smart, bowlers are motivated and bowlers are strong minded.

Next, to bowl 900 you must believe that you can. Unfortunately, 99.99% of all bowlers do not believe they can bowl 900. This is the main reason why only a couple of dozen bowlers have done so. Unfortunately the one-tenth of one per cent of bowlers who believe they can bowl 900 won't because their minds are cluttered. Remember your mind must cleansed of all extraneous thoughts.

Finally, your mind must be one with bowling. Your mind must have no thought, or afterthought about anything other then delivering your bowling ball to a breakpoint five feet from the pins that will result in it's entry into the pocket at a trajectory of 7 degrees. This entry angle can only be achieved 100% of the time by a focused mind and with physical moves that mimic the cyber kinetic movements that Bond was taught by the CIA.

Unfortunately, the CIA erased Bond's memory when PROJECT 900 was discontinued. He was able to tell all of the above but has been unable to tell me anything more.

There you have it. Bond's dreams and my dreams all began in Kava's back-seat. They took both of us around the world. Now it's your turn to identify your talents and live your dream. Go and BOWL 900.


