## Parkinson's Strikes Ron Sholler He Hils Back

WINNETKA - Parkin- night's Thirsty Nite Out son's Shmarkinson's.

That's basically the defiant attitude Ron Skoller has adopted since he left his doctor's office two and a half years ago with a diagnosis of Parkinson's disease.

To be sure, it hasn't been easy in the interim, Ron relates. "Every once in a while I get depressed, but it helps to know where it's coming from," says Ron about one of the condition's symptoms.

But Ron Skoller is definitely fighting back - and it shows.

Ron still bowls twice a week at Winnetka Bowl - on Wednesday afternoon's Funtimers senior league and Thursday
leagues. He's still the anchor on both his teams. And he's still rattling pins at an impressive clip.
Perhaps most importantly, there isn't a chipper or more popular bowler around in either league. This 73-year-old Encino resident is definitely happy-go-lucky, despite bowling under a cloud of adversity.

Few people around Winnetka Bowl know of his condition, and yet, Ron brings an inspirational presence with his upbeat nature and dry humor
"The greatest joy I have is to make people laugh," Ron says. "I have a sense of humor and people reccontinued on page 3

# A Tale Of Two Careers

For Tom Baker, whose professional bowling career has spanned six decades, it has been a tale of two careers - first on the regular tour where he garnered ten titles, including one major; and then later in life when he came into his own winning 12 titles, including 4 majors, on the PBA50 Tour.

The first time that I met Baker was in Arcadia, Calif., at the PBA Tour's Ford Open Tournament at Bowling Square in Arcadia, in 1976. It was the first event on the winter schedule and Tom was a rookie. I was having breakfast with Ron Lisher and John Weber when Baker walked into the coffee shop and asked if he could join us. While I had never met the man, both Lisher and Weber knew him and invited him to join us.

You could immediately sense that he was a nice guy and very affable. Those traits would later earn him the Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award on two different occasions (1980 and 1981), as well as a spot on AMF's Staff of Champions. You might ask yourself how being a nice guy like Baker could land him a spot on AMF's advisory staff, but when you realize that he was as tough on the lanes as he was mild mannered off them, you begin to see why AMF decided to sign him at an early age.

I can remember asking "Bakes," an affectionate name given to Tom by his peers, if he was planning on moving to California in those early days on the tour. You see, most of his early successes came on the west coast. His first win came in 1980 at the Northern California Open in Fremont, Calif., followed by wins the next year at Torrance, Calif., Las Vegas, Nev., and Denver, Colorado.

It was at the Denver Open that you knew Baker was something special. He literally tore up the lanes with a performance that included record breaking totals for six games $(1,613)$, twelve games $(3,037)$, twenty-four games $(5,856)$, and a 42 game total of 10,848 pins ( 247 average). He also set a record that will never be topped when he and fellow AMF staff member Pete Weber tied in match play with a 300 to 300 score.

The next year he won at the AMF Grand Prix in Paris, France. By this time I had given up my pro bowling aspirations and happened to be working with AMF Humber Bowling Centers in nearby England. A new location in France, Bowl de Nice Acropolis, was on the drawing board and I was sent to assist with marketing efforts but missed the finals of Tom's performance at Bowling de Paris.

Baker continued his winning ways back in The States, with victories in the 1985 Budweiser Classic (Columbus, Ohio) and the 1986 Kodak Invitational (Rochester, N.Y.), not far from his home in Buffalo. He then went on a 10 year winless streak, primarily due to recurring wrist injuries.
"He eventually had surgery on a circular bone that is no longer there, shaved down after the pain became so severe," said Conor Orr in an article at NJ.com ("PBA Bowlers Face Danger of Injuries Thanks to Grueling Schedule," February 23, 2012). Baker went on to say in the article that his big toe hurts from his release, and his calf muscle aches from pushing off. "And if I'm lucky, l'll come out and do it all again tomorrow," said Tom.

When he made a comeback from wrist surgery, it was once again in California, at the AC-Delco Classic in 1996, at Cal Bowl in Lakewood. Following the win in Lakewood, he struck again the next year in Harrisburg, Pa., his ninth tour victory.

When things seemed at their lowest and Baker contemplated leaving the tour in 2004, at the age of 49 , he once again rose to the top at the PBA World Championship at Taylor Lanes in suburban Detroit. The event carried a $\$ 120,000$ first place prize and five years of exemption from the pro tour qualifiers.

When I spoke with Larry Lichstein, the PBA player services director for many years, as well as a member of the AMF Staff of Champions prior to accepting the position with the PBA, he had this to say about Baker: "Tom was unique because he probably hooked the ball as much as the big crankers of his day, but he was a couple of miles an hour slower, and with very slow footwork. He kept the pins on the deck for more mixing action."

In 2018, Baker underwent back surgery. He did something that he had done thousands of times before. He reached down to pick up his bowling ball. But this time it was different. In an article that appeared at flobowling.com ("Back Surgery Doesn't Hold Back Tom Baker," August 13, 2018), Baker stated: "I wasn't quite sure what happened, but it felt like I pulled a muscle."
"I didn't think anything of it, but it got worse. I went to the medical center, and they gave me some pills that didn't help at all. I eventually had to go to the hospital because the pain was so bad." It turned out that Baker was encouraged to undergo surgery to repair what the doctor's said was a spinal disc herniation.

I went looking for Tom Baker's PBA50 record but received the following message: "Coming Soon. The page you are looking for is currently under construction while we work to improve your experience." Will the PBA ever complete this project? Russ Mills of the PBA assures me that all of the information is there, but they are sure taking their sweet time posting information from the old website. Someday...

In the meantime, I know of at least one of Baker's victories on the senior circuit. That was once again at a California location - Jim Wangeman's Harvest Park Bowl in Brentwood, in 2014. ognize it and I think that's why I get along with people in general. I always try to say things to make people laugh and sometimes it's not taken the way I intended, but that's who I am."

Still, Parkinson's is no laughing matter. Parkinson's is a progressive disorder that affects the nervous system and parts of the body controlled by the nerves. Symptoms result from low or falling levels of dopamine levels in the brain.
"I take medication," Ron says. "Been taking it for two years. Fortunately, the doses l've been taking haven't increased.
"It's very important to know Parkinson's is not just a motor disorder. Depression and anxiety go along with Parkinson's. It's a brain problem and not just motor skills."

Ron recognized things were off a couple of years ago and that led him to pursuing a diagnosis.

There was the time he noticed his handwriting had changed - "It got very small and I didn't think much about it. But it's a common symptom of Parkinson's."

Ron also noticed that something was amiss when he was golfing with a friend, who happened to notice that "I was walking funny. I played four holes and walked off the course. That was an early indication.
"Fortunately, my condition has stayed pretty flat. I can continue bowling, with a lower average, of course," says Ron, who has not stopped golfing as well.

Ron's bout with Parkinson's overshadows the fact that he has been a genuinely top-of-the-line bowler for many years. He compiled a 200 -plus average both at AMF Woodlake Lanes in Woodland Hills and Corbin Bowl in Tarzana before moving on to Winnetka Bowl.

He also has powered two 290 games (a strike in the first frame, then 11 straight strikes) and has a stirring 774 series on his resume. "When I was able to bowl 700, I went to the line expecting to throw a strike every time. It didn't work out that way, but that's how I felt."

Gary Bricker, one of Ron's closest friends, has stood by his side for many years through their bowling exploits.
"I first met Ron in 2011 at Woodlake Bowl, which is now Bowlero," Bricker says. "We became friends/competitors over the years. When we moved over to Corbin Bowl, I got to know Ron better and with his over-190 average, he always impressed me.
"When I heard Winnetka Bowl had senior leagues, I told Ron he should join like I did. Ron is still very much a competitor today as he was back in the day.
"Keep on rockin,' Ron!"
A Los Angeles native, Ron admits that it sometimes vexes him that he can't bowl to his previous standards. "Now, it's killing me because l've always been the anchor and it bothers me when I don't perform to my expectations," says Ron, who averages in the 160s.

Still, Ron flashes his extraordinary precision from time to time and particularly in the clutch. In one Funtimers game in 2022, Ron nailed four straight strikes in the ninth and 10th frames to boost his team to a come-from-behind, nail-biting win. "I love a close game," he says. "It's exciting. Losing a close game is actually preferable to winning a game by 150 pins."

Ron's cheery attitude is partly the result of a couple of smart decisions he's made. One was buying longterm care insurance - advice from a relative - when he was a mere 50 years old.
"I've maintained the policy through the years and it's now a crutch if I need it," he says. "It's very reassuring to have it."

Also quite beneficial was Ron's choice to follow his neurologist's recommendation to join "Rock Steady Boxing," a boxing program designed and aimed at fighting Parkinson's.

tail off to get to this point," Goergen said. "Each day that I kept working out trying to gain strength in my legs and I could see it was coming.
"This is a very special win for me."
Goergen qualified in eighth place among the 48-player PBA50 RPI field. Players were invited to the RPI based on their achievements during the 2023 season.

He tallied games of 267 and 224 to sweep his first-round match against Jeff Johnson. In the Round of Eight against Dan Knowlton, who led all players during qualifying with a 240.17 average for 18 games, Goergen rallied to overcome a 1-0 deficit.

Goergen said he drew motivation from his long and grueling recovery process each game throughout match play.

In the single-game semifinals, Goergen delivered a needed strike to dispatch Rich Corwin, setting up a championship match against 58 -time regional champion Chris Warren.

Because of Warren's accomplishments on the PBA Regional Tour, PBA Commissioner Tom Clark announced the RPI trophy will bear Warren's name beginning next year.

But that's next year. This year, the trophy is all Goergen's.

The top PBA and PBA50 player, as well as the top first-year player, in each region were recognized based on their performance during the 2023 PBA Regional Tour season. Recipients of the Pat Patterson awards were selected for their outstanding contributions to the regional program and efforts to promote bowling.

The award winners were determined by a vote among regional tournament directors: Russ Mills, East; Bobby Jakel, Central; Toby Contreras, Midwest; Steve Taylor, South; Tony Lanning, Southwest; Josh Blanchard, West and Northwest.

## EAST REGION

Troy Lint, the PBA50 National Player of the Year, was also named East Region PBA50 Player of the Year as he won two of his three regional events.

"This is what all the practice you've been doing is for. It's time to shine," Dombrowski said. "The practice paid off."
