Reporters typically try to paint a picture with an all-too-flowery brush when trying to describe honor scores, meaning perfect games or 800 series. They tend to go overboard, but hey, it's all in fun.

Bowlers are said to have "smoked" or "blasted" or "blistered" or "crushed" or "smacked" a 300.

It's not in fashion to report that a player "rolled" or "bowled" a perfecto. Way, way too dull. After all, a perfect game is an exciting moment both for the bowler and the many onlookers.

Perhaps it's only fair to sometimes allow the perfecto bowler to provide his or her own description. After all, shouldn't the bowler be in the best position to describe how he or she did it? That bowler knows all about the pressure, the excitement, the drama of what unfolded. So on this occasion, the question was put to elite women's bowler Kelly Gold to describe her latest perfect game, which she registered during her "Valley Mixed 4" league at Corbin Bowl. "I think I destroyed it," smiled Kelly. never at a loss for words. "I had just one bad shot."

All told, Kelly has rolled nine perfect games, including two that she "destroyed" in back-to-back fashion three years ago.

19-Year-Old Simonsen Wins USBC Masters to Become Youngest to Win a Major Title

INDIANAPOLIS — Nineteen-year-old Anthony Simonsen of Princeton, Texas, won the 2016 USBC Masters on Sunday to become the youngest player to win a major title on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour.

Simonsen struck on eight of his first nine shots in the championship match at Woodland Bowl to secure a 245-207 victory against Dan MacLelland of Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. MacLelland was looking to become the first amateur since 2002 to win the USBC Masters.



The victory earned Simonsen \$50,000 and the coveted Masters trophy, while MacLelland took home \$25,000 as the run-

ner-up. Simonsen was the first top seed to win the event since 2013, when Australia's Jason Belmonte claimed the first of a record

three-consecutive Masters titles.

Simonsen, at 19 years and 39 days old, surpasses USBC and PBA Hall of

Famer Mike Aulby of nearby Carmel, Indiana, as the youngest major champion. Aulby was 19 years and 83 days old when he won the PBA National Championship in 1979 for the first of eight major titles.

"It's definitely a dream come true," said Simonsen, who won his first title earlier this year when he teamed with Connor Pickford to win the Mark Roth/Marshall Holman Doubles Championship and just missed becoming the youngest player to win a PBA Tour title. "And, continued on page 8

West Coast Senior Tour Will Be Back in the Valley

WINNETKA - The West Coast Senior Tour is returning to the San Fernando Valley.

And that's a big deal.

The WCST, now in its 24th season, hasn't made a stop in the Valley since May 2012 when now-defunct Mission Hills Bowl served as the tournament host.

Dick Sanders, the tour's owner and director, recently added Winnetka Bowl to this year's schedule of events. The tournament will take place June 11 and will start at 10 a.m.

Winnetka Bowl, formerly called Canoga Park Bowl, used to be a fixture in the WCST's lineup. It served as a WCST tournament site 10 times between the tour's debut year in 1993 and 2004.

When Winnetka Bowl stopped drawing enough competitors, the bowling house was dropped from the WCST schedule.

Interestingly, the WCST had a 13-event schedule in 1993 with three of those sites located in the Valley. They included Winnetka Bowl, Brunswick Matador Bowl in Northridge and now-defunct AMF Rocket Bowl in Chatsworth. All the WCST events that year took place at bowling centers in Southern California.

The tour, open to eligible players 60 and older, has undergone many changes since its first season. This year's schedule lists 13 tournaments with eight in the Southland, three in Las Vegas and two in Laughlin, Nev.

This year's WCST tournament at Winnetka Bowl has received a \$200 donation from the Las Vegas High-Roller tournament, which will be added to the prize money.

The tour held a tournament last week at La Habra "300" Bowl in Orange County, which was won by Kevin Gannon of Lakewood, the only lefty among the 26 entrants. It was Gannon's 46th WCST title, far and away more than any other bowler.

Gannon competed in the championship-match finals at Mission Hills Bowl in 2012. In a thrilling two-game competition, John Sowell of Vista edged Gannon by two pins to win the title – the last WCST championship to be contested in the Valley.

The WCST has attracted some of the premier bowlers in the area. They include Eric Forkel, a former Valley resident and five-time Professional Bowlers Assn. tour champion, and the late Barry Gurney, a standout on the PBA senior circuit. Forkel has won 19 WCST events and Gurney captured 18 titles.



John Sowell, a Vista resident, was the last bowler to win a West Coast Senior Tour event that was contested in the San Fernando Valley.

For three straight years (1994-96), the tour averaged more than 100 bowlers a tournament. Sanders said the tour

attracted a staggering 233 players to Ventura for one tournament in 1995.

Sanders said his tournaments were two-day affairs in those years, unlike the primarily one-day events now. The tournaments attracted bowlers from Northern and Southern California and Nevada those years. Now, the tour basically gets its players from the Southland and Nevada.

The WCST will host its next tournament Feb. 20 at Orleans Casino Lanes in Las Vegas.

"We're approaching tournament No. 400," Sanders said. "And we're \$28,000 away from \$4 million in payouts. That's a lot of money over the years."

The Orleans Lanes will host the WCST's tournament No. 397. The Winnetka Bowl event will represent tournament No. 402.

Barbasol PBA Players Championship Returns to Major Title Status

Finals of third consecutive major to air live on ESPN on Sunday. Feb. 21

COLUMBUS, Ohio — On the heels of its strongest television ratings in a decade in 2015, the Professional Bowlers Association will return one of its storied franchises to major title status next week when Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl hosts the 2016 Barbasol PBA Players Championship.

The third-and-final live telecast in PBA's "Big February" series will air live on ESPN on Sun., Feb. 21, at 10 a.m.

The PBA Players Championship, which originated in 1984 and ran continuously through 2000, was suspended while PBA's new ownership began revamping the PBA at the turn of the century. After watching PBA's viewership ratings on ESPN surge by 17 percent during the 2015 season, having quality Sunday afternoon time slots for live coverage on ESPN, and the sponsorship of Barbasol in the company's backyard, PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark decided it was time to return the popular event to the PBA Tour schedule.

The 2016 Barbasol PBA Players Championship will include a demanding 48-game qualifying and match play format, and a five-player stepladder final with a \$40,000 first prize. All of the preliminary rounds of Players Championship week will be covered live for PBA fans around the world who subscribe to PBA's exclusive Xtra Frame online videostreaming service.

The Barbasol partnership brings the PBA event close to the company's headquarters and manufacturing facilities. Perio Inc., the parent company of Barbasol LLC, is located in Dublin, a suburb of Columbus, and the company's Barbasol products are manufactured in Ashland, Ohio.

The third consecutive major championship of the 2016 season will follow the FireLake PBA Tournament of Champions, won by 20-year-old Swedish two-handed star Jesper Svensson, PBA's 2015 Rookie of the Year, in Shawnee, Okla., last Sunday. The United States Bowling Congress Masters will be decided this Sunday in Indianapolis. ESPN's USBC Masters live coverage begins at 10 a.m.

The Players Championship will get underway on Monday, Feb. 15, with practice and a celebrity pro-am at Columbus Bowl, which is co-owned by PBA Hall of Famer Wayne Webb. Eight-game qualifying rounds will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, followed by an eight-game cashers round on Thursday, and three eight-game round-robin match play rounds Thursday and Friday. Additional pro-am squads that provide an opportunity for Ohio grassroots adult, youth and senior league bowlers to bowl alongside the pros will be conducted on Saturday, leading up to Sunday's live ESPN finals.

The tournament is open exclusively to PBA members, and has served as a stepping stone toward induction into the PBA Hall of Fame for a number of players, including past winners Walter Ray Williams Jr. (1994), Pete Weber (1992), Amleto Monacelli (1989) and defending champion Parker Bohn III (2015) who are still active and among the more than 100 players already entered.

Other Hall of Fame winners who are no longer active include Mark Roth in the inaugural event (1984), Dave Husted (1985), Mark Williams (1986), Dave Ferraro (1988 and 1991), Jason Couch (1993), Ernie Schlegel (1995) and Mike Aulby (1996). Schlegel was the oldest player to win the Players Championship at 52 years, 212 days in 1995; Jason Couch was the youngest winner when he won in 1993 at age 23 years, 362 days.

PBA Players Committee Votes to Retroactively Recognize Past Winners Belmonte, Norton, Bohn

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Prior to the start of the Barbasol Professional Bowlers Association Players Championship, PBA Deputy Commissioner Kirk von Krueger announced Monday night that three past Players Championship winners - Jason Belmonte, Scott Norton and Parker Bohn III - will be awarded major title recognition retroactively for the titles they won in 2011, 2013 and 2015, respectively.

The announcement was made at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl where the 2016 Barbasol PBA Players Championship begins Tuesday.

"The PBA Players Championship is returning to major status for the first time since it was suspended as a major championship after the 2000 event," von Krueger said. "In returning the Players Championship to major status because it is a members only event, and includes all of the elements of a major, PBA's leadership asked the PBA Players Committee to review three events held under the Players Championship banner in recent years, and the committee members voted to retroactively award the winners of those events with major titles."

Australia's Jason Belmonte won the Pepsi Elite Players Championship as part of the 2011 PBA World Series of Bowling in Las Vegas, defeating Mike DeVaney, 255-238, in the title match. The decision means Belmonte has now won six majors including the 2013, '14 and '15 USBC Masters and the 2014 and '15 PBA Tournaments of Cham-

Norton, from Mission Viejo, Calif., won the Earl Anthony PBA Players Championship that was held as part of the 2013 PBA Winter Swing at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich. Norton defeated Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., 219-181, in the title match. Norton now is credited with his first major title.

Bohn, a PBA Hall of Famer from Jackson, N.J., won the 2015 PBA Players Championship at Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis, defeated hometown favorite Ronnie Russell of nearby Marion, Ind., in a two-frame sudden-death roll-off after they tied at 237. Bohn, who now has three major titles, previously won the 2001 USBC Masters and the 2012 PBA World Championship.

WINNETKA - What does a dedicated bowler do when he's not bowling?


In the case of Michael Antin, the answer is plenty.

CBS SPORTS NETWORK EXPANDS BOWLING TV PACKAGE IN 2016, HIGHLIGHTED BY U.S. OPEN AND FULL SEASON PWBA TOUR COVERAGE

PWBA Tour, Junior Gold Championships, new USA Bowling finals and Intercollegiate Championships included in new 23-event national TV package

ARLINGTON, Texas – The United States Bowling Congress has reached an agreement with CBS Sports Network to televise 23 major championship bowling events in 2016 and 2017, highlighted by the U.S. Open, as well as 13 telecasts of the Professional Women's Bowling Association (PWBA) Tour.

New to the television package in 2016 will be coverage of the USA Bowling Championships. USA Bowling is a youth-team program with regional tournaments culminating in a national championship event.

"With this package, bowling will be on national television every week from May to September," United States Bowling Congress Executive Director Chad Murphy said. "We are thrilled to showcase the excitement of competitive bowling from youth, to college to the professionals and continue building a strong future for the sport."

Nearly all events in the package including the PWBA Tour, U.S. Open and youth events are collaboratively funded with the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America (BPAA).

"With a consistent schedule and a national television audience, bowling will be top of mind in the United States throughout the year," BPAA Executive Director Frank DeSocio said. "We are excited to highlight our industry and great partners in a 23-week series that will provide tremendous benefit for all of bowling."

The package features event coverage Tuesdays in primetime for 18 weeks starting May 10 with the Intercollegiate Championships.

The PWBA Tour kicks off Thursday, May 26, with a live telecast of the USBC Queens. Finals of the regular season PWBA events will taped on location at the major event sites to be televised on Tuesdays in primetime at later dates.



First, Harvey had a shot at \$1,000 during the "Strike on Demand" contest after his name was pulled. But an "out-of-synch" Harvey left the four-pin bucket as the prize money returned to the pot.

Undaunted, Harvey regrouped from his Game 1 misfire and finished with a sparkling 759 series with games of 223, 237 and 299.

Harvey left a 10 pin on his final shot, barely failing to add to his total of more than 55 perfect games, which is even more impressive considering that he took a 10-year hiatus from the game.

Harvey got a rousing chorus of congratulations after finishing one pin short of 300.

"I didn't know there was a crowd behind me," said Harvey, smiling.

win PBA Rookie of the Year honors in 1980.

Still active on both the traditional PBA Tour and the PBA50 Tour at age 53, Weber has won 37 PBA Tour titles (fourth-best on the all-time titles list) and earned more than \$3.8 million (second only to Walter Ray Williams Jr.'s \$4.6 million) despite occasional clashes with PBA leadership, battling personal demons along the way, and never apologizing for his approach to life and PBA competition.

While capturing the essence of Weber's career through the eyes of his fiercest competitors as well as Weber's own insights, Storkel also provides "Bad Boy" viewers with a history of PBA competition during the Weber years.

"It's been an amazing experience," Storkel said of producing the film. "I knew about Pete for a while. I saw him in "League of Ordinary Gentlemen: a few years back. When we were asked to do a 30 for 30 film, I thought about bowling because 30 for 30 hadn't done a bowling segment, and I immediately thought about Pete and his father, and how their lives were all centered around bowling

"I think having the father-and-son element creates something even non-bowling fans will enjoy," Storkel added. "It's really a human story, not just a bowling story."

After reviewing the film, despite it showing some of his darker moments, Weber's reaction was, "I thought it was awesome."

PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark said, "The story of Pete Weber is one of the most compelling in sports history. It was a great decision by ESPN to feature Pete's story in its artful 30 for 30 documentary series and producer Bryan Storkel captured the story in a way that will entertain and inform those familiar with Pete's career while also introducing him to those who don't know much about him."

Prior to its debut as part of ESPN Films' 30 for 30 Shorts series, "The Bad Boy of Bowling" was shown at more than 25 film festivals across the United States, where it routinely received rave reviews and won a special jury prize at the DOC NYC festival, one of the largest and most prestigious festivals.

"The film's largest screening was at the Maryland Film where it played to hundreds of fans on opening night," Storkel added. "We could hear the crowd laughing out loud, crying... It was pretty special."

"The Bad Boy of Bowling" will be widely available to fans through ESPN's and PBA's digital platforms and social media outlets following its formal release.

"Pillars" marks Antin's fifth musical creation since his retirement as a tax attorney, three-time book author ("all tax crap," he says) and college professor. One local reviewer, Dianne Williams, says that "writer/composer Michael Antin has successfully provided a theatrical experience worthy of our time and attention."

"Pillars," which is presented by 10 professional actors from Write Act Repertory Company, tells the story of the struggles of four couples around the events surrounding the Sept. 11 tragedy. Psychologist Jake Kelly and his assistant also play prominent roles.

In fact, Jake Kelly is in all of Antin's five musicals, indicating that relationships are a recurring topic in his plays. Antin, a Los Angeles resident and Milwaukee native, remembers that his composing life was triggered back in 2008. "I was watching my grandson play soccer and I had an epiphany," Antin said. "I went home and in five hours I wrote a 70-page script."

In "Pillars," Antin has composed 15 songs, not including three reprisals. In the first couple of weeks, two shows finished with standing ovations at the 39-seat theater.

Antin has been personally watching the shows, which began Jan. 23, and he notes that "every one is different," citing unforeseen circumstances.

"The actors know they can't stop and start over if someone screws up the lines," said Antin, who's been married 56 years to Evie, another avid bowler. "They find ways to cover. There are mistakes. Things happen . . . It goes exactly to the script except when it doesn't. It's fun."

Right after the final show, Antin plans to present his 10 actors with a series of presents.

"That's how I express my appreciation and that will be my standing ovation," he said.


Antin's musical chops is no Johnny-come-lately thing. He served as student conductor for an all-Southern California high school group when it performed the song, "Carmen." And he did this when he was just in the eighth grade. Meanwhile, Antin is still prancing and dancing through his bowling games, trying to perform at the same level he did years ago.

He's averaging 140, which is impressive considering he ruptured a bicep tendon more than a decade ago and had to forego his free-wheeling style.

Still, he just bowled a 190 and has blasted a 199 this season in his Tuesday night "Guys and Dolls" league.



1955 - Looking Back

- * In 1955 there were so many bowls and so much advertising, each paper was 40 pages.
- * 300 games still deserved 'CONGRATS" ads.
- * Paramount Bowl and San Gabriel Lanes announced their grand openings. Each more DELUXE then the next. DELUXE seemed to be THE word to use to describe a "thing".
- * Weekly listings of the top 50 current averages (male and female) were popular reading. How did they gather that info?
- Whoever wrote the small news releases never ran out of catchy phrases. For instance: Walling Whacks, Klein Klouts, Shepherd Shoots, Gray Garners, Dobbie Dumps, Johnson Jolts, Lathers Plasters, Sogert Socks, Wild Whips, Rasch Romps, Duryer Digs, and Hacker Hacks. These were all found on the first three pages of 1955.
- * The Westlake Bowl ad said it all! "STRIKE" IT RICH" pot games, where everything is right up your alley!
- * SUNSET BOWL announced that when they opened in May that they would be the first in the nation with concealed ball returns. (UNDERGROUND)
- * Scorekeepers (real people) got their first H.M.K. Telmark wooden pencils for scorekeeping and they could be sharpened by an ordinary pencil sharpener. No more peeling off the paper wrapper.
- * Little known fact - The first indoor bowling alley was erected in London in 1455. That was before Columbus sailed the ocean blue.
- * The BOWLING BALL HOSPITAL was run by Bill Switzer in his pro shop.
- * Ted Favorite, sharp manager at Jewel City accepted the manager position at about to be finished West Covina Lanes. He always cared about the comfort and condition in his centers.
- * The AMF robot was everywhere and sang out about the "rhythm of the pinsetters". Imagine - - - no more clunk and clang, just the smooth up and down. Scoop up the pins, pop them in the empty cups and sit them down nice and easy. Bye Bye Pin Boys.
- * Another first in California. THE NATIONAL ORIENTAL CHAMPIONSHIPS. More later about this one for sure.
- * Harry Grant's Singles Classic had every Saturday and Sunday booked up for April and May by Bowling Centers! Eacah center brought a squad! How could that tournament NOT be a success? For years Harry's Classic was supported by squad organizers. Unheard of in the 2000's. When Harry retired and passed on, so did multiple week tournaments. Except for State and Nationals.
- * A gal named Peggy Farley won EVERYTHING for years! I personally don't remember her. Maybe we will know more later. BUT, for the past 4 years she has been on every front
- * Oh Lordy, a picture of the L.A. All Star Junior Travel winners! None other than Dick Sanders and Norm Meyers. 60 years later Sanders is still challengng bowlers. The ones that
- * May 6, 1955 PICO RIVERA BOWL in Pico opended. All 20 lanes, lounge and Coffee Shop. As I remember, the desk person was also the bartender, porter and mechanic during the day. Frank Barnese was the owner. The new Brunswick Crown Imperials were installed. Gold Crowns were a mark of excellence.
- * Arcadia Courts held an "Off Hours" Sweeper. 1st Prize Westinghouse Refrigerator; 2nd Prize - Westinghouse Washer; 3rd Prize - Westinghouse 21-inch T.V. Also clock radios, bags and watches.
- * No truer words= "The funny thing about trouble is....it always starts out being fun." May 13, 1955.
- * June 20, 1955= NORWALK BOWL OPENS ON IMPERIAL AND FIRESTONE. 24 lanes - Brunswick Crowns. Also acres of Free Parking.
- * OGDEN, UTAH - - 40 games for \$1,000.00 1st place for the men. Women roll 10 games for \$300.00. The tournament was open to the world! Now, that's thinking BIG! Plus possible endorsements for products because the winner would be King of the Bowling World. Maxie Kosaf, tournament chief once bowled 212 straight games. His advice? Practice daily
- * 20th Century Rec. paid out \$1,303.10 in their July Doubles!
- * Big sellers were team bowling shirts. You just weren't a bowler if you showed up without your official shirt. Some shops also sold blouses and slacks. Women always bowled in skirts. That rule was enforced in State, Local and National tournaments until the 80's.
- * The ball to roll in the 50's was a Manhattan. Under certain conditions it woul be the ball of choice today! There didn't seem to be more than one kind or color.
- * For the first time an article by Alice Meglemre was published. She later owned the "Kegler" and was Presidcent of the Long Beach W.B.A. for years.
- * October 1, 1955. Imperial Bowl opened, 30 AMF MACHINES with bowling around the clock. Harry Grant became the King of Tournaments at Imperial. Was the bowl there before LAX was built???

*Watch out - - - - Ebonite breezed into the ball market with their TORNADO.

- FREEWAY BOWL near Disneyland was owned by the Gottieb family. The Santa Ana freeway was a 2 laner all the way to San Diego. I recalled rumors of a shooting in the parking lot. Right or Wrong, Rev. - * 1955 was a GIANT year for A.M.F. and their Automatic Pinsetter.
- * Red Morse manager at West Pico Bowl came up with DOG-GONE GOOD WEEKLY SINGLES SWEEPER." \$3.00 entry fee for three games, with a "DOG GONE GOOD PRIZE LIST". A BIG \$100.00 FOR MEN AND \$50.00 FOR WOMEN. West Pico bragged that the highest series in the West was bowled there. 258-300-297/855 by Max Stein.
- * Come November, "Turkey Shoots" became popular. Some based on 3 strikes in a row, some based on getting a strike using a REAL FROZEN TURKEY!
- * The term "RAT CLUB" was used to describe a team which shoots exceptionally low scores for one game.
- * T.V.Host Steve Allen starred Marion Ladewig and Sylvia Were in a one game match to kick off "National Women's Bowling Week".

Teen Masters Adds \$4000 Billy Hardwick **Scholarship Award**

New Scholarship offered at 20th Annual Championships this summer

Billy Hardwick is a bowling legend, but at the end of his first year on the PBA Tour, 1962, no one would have predicted it. In that first season, he entered 17 events and failed to cash in any of them. He was discouraged, to say the least, but not defeated. While most people would have stayed home, Hardwick came back the next year, won four titles, and earned 1963 PBA Player of the Year honors. His story is one of the most remarkable turnarounds in sports history.

Hardwick retired from touring in 1977, but not from bowling. He owned a 40-lane center in Memphis, Billy Hardwick's All Star Lanes. He died in 2013, but his legacy lives on with the announcement that his family has established The Billy Hardwick Scholarships, to be awarded annually at the Teen Masters Championships.

"Billy was particularly proud of his center's programs involving youth bowlers," said Hardwick's widow, Rebecca. "So we are very excited about getting involved with the Teen Masters and we are looking forward to helping grow the event in his honor."

"Billy Hardwick is the PBA poster child for perseverance, a life skill we teach through Teen Masters competition," said Teen Masters founder, Gary Beck. "His story will serve as an inspirational lesson for all Teen Masters participants. Having the Hardwicks celebrate Billy's legacy through these college scholarships is wonderful for our event and for all youth bowlers."

Hardwick was the first bowler in history to win the prestigious PBA Triple Crown. He won 18 tour titles; he was twice named Player of the Year, and he set the PBA record for an 8-game block (2,165). That record still stands after almost 50 years.

Two \$2000 college scholarships, one for the top male and one for the top female, will be awarded based on total pinfall (not including match play bonus pins) at the Teen Masters Championships each year. To be eligible to earn the Billy Hardwick Scholarship, a bowler must satisfy the following criteria:

Must be a high school senior

Hold a cumulative GPA of 3.2 on a 4.0 scale

Submit a letter of recommendation from a coach or teacher

Submit a 300+ word essay on "How competitive bowling has taught me how to handle pressure in life" by June 1.

it's awesome to break a record. Mike Aulby was a great player. Missing the youngest to be a title-holder by two days was a little disappointing, but to come out and get the job done today, I guess I'll take that as evening itself out.'

The decision to pursue a career on the lanes was one Simonsen didn't take lightly, but he quickly was able to prove himself with two PBA regional victories on the way to PBA Southwest Region Rookie of the Year honors for the 2014 season.

Equal success at the national level has been just as quick, but Simonsen still is focused and humble.

"I made the decision at a young age to come on out, and it was about getting out here and getting experience, which really is starting to pay off," Simonsen said. "This is my first full year out on Tour, and I bowled a majority of the major events that were possible. To have success is awesome, but a title doesn't define you. You have to keep coming out and trying to perform week in and week out, and see where it takes you."

For MacLelland, this week at the Masters was a vacation away from his full-time job as a bowling center general manager and a chance to catch up with all the people he no longer gets to see since leaving the PBA Tour.

"It was great to be here and see everyone again, and I really love bowling in the Masters," MacLelland said. "This is one event I always try to bowl in, and it was a fun week. It's a little disappointing, but I'm not upset. Things just didn't go my way. Anthony bowled great all week."

On the way to the championship match, MacLelland was able to hold off 2013 Masters runner-up Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, for a 216-213 victory.

Against Malott, MacLelland started his first TV appearance since 2014 with an open frame, but strikes in the next four frames gave him a nine-pin advantage halfway through the match. He had a chance to shut out Malott with a double and eight pins in the 10th frame, but he left a 2-7 split after striking on his first

Following his first miscue of the day in the ninth frame, a 2-8-10 split, Malott needed a double and four pins in his final frame to slip past MacLelland. He struck on his first shot, but a 6-10 combination on his next offering ended his run at the 2016 event. A No. 4 seed never has won the Masters.

In his first two matches of the day, Malott struck on 20 of 24 attempts to defeat Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, 258-189, and Chris Loschetter of Avon, Ohio, 258-201.

Loschetter finished fourth and earned \$10,000, while Daugherty, who finished third at last week's FireLake PBA Tournament of Champions, earned \$8,000 for his fifth-place effort Sunday at



BURBANK — Working with the youth bowlers often has me revisiting my own days as a youth bowler. There were no such thing as bumpers, in any form. In later years, someone developed long, inflated tubes that fit into the gutters and served as bumpers.

However, that was long after my time. There were no bowling balls under 11 pounds and they all looked alike. It was essential you memorized the number printed on the ball that fit you so that the following week, you could walk the racks of balls and hope to find your treasure.

You also could not bowl a youth league unless you were 12 years old. That was a serious problem for me as I was overly anxious to become a bowler. My fantastic youth coach, Bobbi Leach, took pity on me.

I was only a few months away from turning twelve prior to the winter start. I think she knew an addict in the making. The ball weighed more than the usual one tenth of my body weight. (I was most likely 65 pounds at the time!) All of this being laid out for you, my purpose is to tell you how accustomed to rolling gutter balls I became.

I believe this was a great experience for a beginner. Especially a beginner who was determined to improve. And improve I did. The fear of throwing that ball into the gutter helped me develop one of the best back up deliveries ever.

Oddly, I am aware that this fear has pursued me to this very day. Are you afraid of throwing a gutter/channel ball?
