

TAMPA, Fla.—Pete Weber and Walter Ray Williams Jr., two of the greatest players in PBA Tour history, announced their respective retirements Wednesday, following PBA Scorpion Championship best-of-five match play from the World Series of Bowling XII at AMF University Lanes.

Weber, a 37-time PBA Tour champion, owns 10 major titles, tying him with Earl Anthony for second most in the history of the PBA.

Weber, the 1980 PBA Rookie of the Year, is the only player to win the U.S. Open five times as well as the only player ever to win the Triple Crown (PBA World Championship, Tournament of Champions and U.S. Open) twice.

"It's hard to grasp that

Tour titles, eight majors

among them. He's been named the PBA Player of the Year a record seven times, the first in 1986 and the last in 2010, when he was 50 years old. Williams won at least one PBA Tour

title in 17 consecutive seasons from 1993 to 2010.

"It was nice to have a good tournament at the end," said Williams. "These young guys are very, very good. I gave it my all today, but I just happened to bowl somebody who bowled really well. Thanks, everybody, for all your support."

Williams and Weber spent four decades competing against each other on the PBA Tour and rank first and fourth, respectively, in PBA Tour titles.

In their final event, both players qualified in the top 16 to advance to match play in the PBA Scorpion Championship.

Both were eliminated, three games to two, by 2021 PBA World Champion Tom Daugherty, with Weber going out in the Round of 16 and Williams in the Round of 8.

Both Weber, 58, and Williams, 61, plan to continue competing on the PBA50 Tour and PBA Regional Tour.

TOM DAUGHERTY WINS PBA SCORPION CHAMPIONSHIP FOR SECOND WSOB XII TITLE His fourth career title is his second in the past five days

TAMPA, Fla.—Tom Daugherty won his fourth career PBA Tour title and second of the World Series of Bowling XII, defeating Kyle Troup, 266-254, in the title match of the PBA Scorpion Championship. On Saturday, Daugherty won the Guaranteed Rate PBA World Championship for his first career major title. Sunday, Daugherty and his partner BJ Moore finished second in the PBA Roth/Holman Doubles Championship.

"You can't imagine this," said Daugherty. "I thought maybe I'd win the Scorpion, or maybe win the Doubles, but to win the World Championship and the Scorpion? It's not even something I thought of."

In the eliminator format, Daugherty bowled a 244 to lead the three advancing players out of the opening match, leaving Michael Tang on the outside. In the next match, Daugherty rolled 276 while Troup posted 279, leaving Kris Prather in third place.

"The lane play was totally different from what I expected," said Daugherty, citing Tang's decision to use urecontinued on page 7

1st Career tour title in PBA

TAMPA, Fla.—Shawn Maldonado won his first career Tour title in the PBA Chameleon Championship, rolling a 250 game to defeat seven-time PBA Tour winner Jakob Butturff in the title match. Maldonado started the game with the first six strikes and never trailed in the match.

"For whatever reason coming in, I just kept feeling to myself I was going to win it," said Maldonado.

Maldonado said he was entering the title match with a lot of confidence, but admitted later he started to get nervous during the commercial break. He struck on his first shot after the commercial, but then took the 6-9-10 off the rack for a three count in the seventh frame.

"It felt like a 30-minute commercial break," said Maldonado. "I wanted to throw it slow but I didn't want to throw it too slow because I got lucky with one of the slow ones on the right lane. Then I went to the left lane and it just flew off my hand. I told myself to get it together, make some good shots, you've been doing it all day. That's what I did and I got the win."

SAM COOLEY WINS PBA

CHEETAH CHAMPIONSHIP

TAMPA, Fla.—Australia's Sam Cooley won the PBA Cheetah Championship for his first career PBA Tour title by defeating Kris Prather, 247-185. Cooley, who has been bowling on the PBA Tour since 2015, had a previous best finish of third, which he'd accomplished three times, but this was his first championship match.

Cooley, seeded eighth into best-of-five match play earlier today, defeated No. 9 seed Brad Miller and No. 2 seed Chris Via on the way to the eliminator finals. After considering a couple different strategies, Cooley settled on doing what he'd been doing all day.

"I went with what got me here through match play," Cooley said, "throwing reactive at the gutter, which is one of my strengths. I got through the first match and my reaction got better from there."

In the eliminator format, all four players bowled a single game, with Cooley posting the third-highest score, eliminating Anthony Simonsen. Cooley rolled 258 in the next game while Prather shot 236, knocking out Marshall continued on page 2

Pro Bowlers Coming To The Rescue Of... Bowling!

After news came last week about Missy Parkin and others purchasing Mira Mesa Lanes in San Diego, yet another pro bowler, Bill Reese, has stepped forward to purchase Warren Lanes in Phillipsburg, New Jersey. Could it be that the super stars of bowling will be the heroes that save the sport by acquiring closed locations?

Warren Lanes, a very successful 40 lane center that closed last March due to the COVID-19 outbreak, has never reopened. Reese, who managed the location while with Nationwide Bowling Centers for many years, realized an opportunity and announced in February that he would be taking over the lease.

Mr. Reese, who owns four other bowling centers in New Jersey and Pennsylvania, posted the following message on his Facebook page from nearby Blue Valley Lanes in Wind Gap, Pennsylvania:

Hi everyone. How about some good news for a change! Reese Bowling Centers welcomes Warren Lanes in Phillipsburg NJ to the family! We look forward to the reopening, and to seeing everyone again soon!

It's not like Bill is unfamiliar with Warren Lanes - he was the manager there while working for Nationwide Bowling Centers for a period of nine years, beginning in the 1990's. "I have so many memories from the nine years I spent there," Reese said in an interview with Lehigh Valley Live. "I am proud of what we accomplished. At the time we had 40 teams every night on the first shift and more than 500 junior bowlers."

One of the distinct pleasures that I had during my time at Nationwide Bowling Centers was working with Bill. Even though Warren Lanes was about an hour drive from the corporate office, I never hesitated whenever Reese asked for my help, particularly with youth bowlers.

When the Ronald McDonald Youth Bowling Club first became popular, Bill and I capitalized on the fact that there was a McDonald's directly across the street from Warren Lanes. Our first attempt at forming a bowling club was on Friday afternoon, and we filled the house with three or four children on every lane.

Bill then suggested that we try another McDonald's Club on Saturday at Noon, immediately following the Saturday Juniors. The result was another full house of 40 teams with 3 (Pee Wees) or 4 (Juniors) on every lane. There were so many children interested that Bill started another shift at 3:00PM to accommodate the overflow.

Soon people began asking Reese about starting a McDonald's Club on Thursdays at 4:00PM, because they were unable to make it on Friday or Saturday. The result was another 30 children on Thursday, followed by a Cub Scout group of 30 that formed a McDonald's Club on Tuesday at 4:00PM. In all, we had a total of more than 450 children involved in Ronald McDonald Youth Bowling Clubs at the height of the fast-food bowling club hysteria.

Whenever I ventured out to Warren Lanes, it seemed like Bill was embarking on yet another construction adventure. I used to call him "a frustrated carpenter," because of his endless projects to improve the bowling center. In the article from Lehigh Valley Live, mention was made of Reese's transformation of the bowling center "into a finely polished machine." The article went on to say, "High scores followed and much of that was done by Jacqui Reese," Bill's youngest of three children. Both Bill and Jacqui are professional bowlers, with many bowling accomplishments.

Jacqui's resume reads like a Who's Who in women's pro bowling, with 24 sanctioned 300 games, a top three game 858 series, and an incredibly high 240 league average for one season. Bill has had his share of 300's, including one in a PBA Regional at Warren Lanes in 1993, but he also marvels at his daughter's accomplishments. I remember watching Jacqui as a youngster, with her high backswing, timing and release so reminiscent of the top players today. It was easy for anyone to see the talent that she inherited from her father.

And now, everything has come full circle, and the beautiful bowling center that Bill created will be his in

Cooley rolled seven strikes in the championship match to defeat Prather, who won his fourth career title yesterday in the PBA Roth/Holman Doubles Championship.

2021 USBC YOUTH AMBASSADORS OF THE YEAR ANNOUNCED

The annual award recognizes one female and one male USBC Youth bowler for exemplary academic accomplishments, community involvement and contributions to the sport of bowling outside of league or tournament play.

Winners are chosen based on submitted applications, and each will receive a \$1,500 scholarship.

Gagnon, 18, is a senior at Lincoln High School, where she maintains a 3.9 GPA, challenging herself academically with a variety of accelerated and Advanced Placement classes and a focus on mathematics. She is a member of the National Math Honor Society and intends to build upon her classroom skills at Wichita State University, majoring in mathematics/statistics, with a minor in accounting.

"This is a very prestigious award, and I was super excited to be chosen, because it shows that all the work is being recognized, not only in Sioux Falls, but nationally, and that really means a lot," said Gagnon, who also will bowl collegiately for Wichita State. "Heading into college and into the next stage of my career, this definitely will be a boost for my confidence. I hope to continue to learn and potentially get my foot in the door with the IBC Youth Committee. It would be an honor to serve at the highest level."

Gagnon currently serves as a youth director on the Sioux Falls Regional USBC Board of Directors, helping implement ideas for growing and promoting youth bowling in the area.

As part of the Programs Committee, she is responsible for getting the word out about the organization's upcoming events. Her service includes being part of the Audit/ Finance, Youth and Publicity Committees.

In 2019, Gagnon put all her skills to use in the facilitation of the Next Big Thing Scholarship Tournament, an event that drew more than 50 youth bowlers from multiple states to Sioux Falls and awarded more than \$5,000 in scholarship money.

Along with rallying her fellow youth bowlers to join her on the lanes and at events, or offering tips as a mentor to youth bowlers under 12, Gagnon has been able to help the local community in many ways through the Bowling Volunteer Group. Her volunteering efforts include working with Feeding South Dakota, Rake the Town, the Sioux Falls Marathon, Project Warm Up and the Serve & Learn Student Association.

"I was honored just to be nominated for this award," Salinas said. "To find out the news, there was a lot of excitement and some validation in seeing all of the hard work starting to pay off."


Salinas also is a skilled artist and musician, often using his skills or creations to help raise money at fundraisers or charity events.

For the last few years, his artwork has been auctioned off to raise money during a variety of local and regional bowling events, including the annual Professional Bowlers Association/Professional Women's Bowling Association Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles Tournament in Houston.

"Especially with school, I've always tried to make each thing I do my top priority," Salinas said. "I also love being able to give back and use my skills, like art and music, to help others or make a difference in my community. And, I enjoy any opportunity I get to promote the sport, whether it be at school, or in general, to help let people know all the great things that can come from bowling."

Salinas has found continued success on the lanes, as well, collecting wins at a variety of local, regional and state events and finding the spotlight on the national stage with a Teen Masters victory in 2019 and a top-four finish in the U15 division at the Junior Gold Championships in 2018.

He has a high game of 300 and has multiple USBCcertified 800 series to his credit, but Salinas' impact in the bowling community also translates beyond the scoreboard. He also spends time coaching younger bowlers and serves as a league officer.

Gagnon recently helped Lincoln High School to its second girls state bowling championship, a feat she also accomplished twice as a member of the bowling team at Roosevelt High School. She also has been named the 2021 South Dakota Star of Tomorrow.

In the future, Gagnon hopes to build on all the activities and passions that helped her become a 2021 USBC Youth Ambassador of the Year.

"One of my top goals is to be on the PWBA Tour one day, and I know bowling at Wichita State will help with that," Gagnon said. "I also take incredible pride in my school-

Whether it's on the lanes or off, Salinas loves supporting the sport and his fellow bowlers. That includes throwing strikes or setting up events, so others can have a memorable tournament experience.

"I've always loved the sport and all the things about it, even if I'm at an event, and I'm not the one bowling," Salinas said. "I just love being in the environment and being involved in every way possible."

Gagnon and Salinas will be recognized in April during the virtual 2021 USBC Convention.

This year's award ceremony, which includes a variety of awards for youth and adult bowlers, will take place virtually April 28 from 6 p.m.-7:30 p.m. Eastern.

A similar presentation will be held at the same time April 27 for award winners from 2020. The 2020 Convention was canceled due to COVID-19.

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USBC HALL OF FAMER DON ELLIS SR. DIES AT AGE 92

ARLINGTON, Texas - Don Ellis Sr. of Sugar Land, Texas, a member of the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame, died Wednesday. He was 92.

Ellis, elected to the USBC Hall of Fame in 1981 in the Veterans category, was a fixture at the USBC Open Championships. He made his debut at the 1947 tournament in Los Angeles, and though he missed four events early in his career while serving in the U.S. Army, he competed every year from 1955 until 2016.

In 2015, he became the eighth bowler in the event's history to reach 65 years of participation. He also is one of 23 members of the tournament's 100,000-Pin Club.

In 66 years on the championship lanes, he knocked down 115,122 pins, and he's fifth on the career pinfall list through 2020. Ellis was able to maintain a career average at the Open Championships of 190.9.

With the 2021 tournament on the horizon, Ellis still is just one of 14 bowlers to reach 65 years of participation at the Open Championships. Late USBC Hall of Famers Bill Doehrman of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and Joe Norris of San Diego, along with the late Sylvester Thiel of Lake City, Minnesota, top the participation list with 71 years.

Ellis' lone Open Championships title came in Classic Doubles at the 1961 event with fellow USBC Hall of Famer Joseph Kristof. Ellis' bowling resume also includes a win at the 1955 Peterson Classic and a runner-up finish at the 1965 USBC Masters.

The right-handed Ellis returned to the spotlight in the 1970s through the Great and the Greatest competition. He teamed with Mark Roth to win the 1979 championship and made the TV finals again in 1980.

already possess and improve them". This book teaches you how to become a better bowler. It is all about learning a few universal principles about bowling technique and applying those principles.



A longtime bowling proprietor in the Houston area, Ellis always made sure there was time to compete, too. He won several association titles in Texas and Illinois, including three Greater Houston USBC titles, two Texas State USBC Association wins and two Illinois State USBC victories.

He was inducted into the Greater Houston USBC Hall of Fame in 1974 and Texas State USBC Hall of Fame in 1985.

Ellis passed on his passion for the sport to his family, and one of his favorite Open Championships moments was the first time he was able to bowl with his daughter Denise in her first Open Championships, while his son, Don Ellis Jr., has logged 31 years of his own on the tournament lanes.

Ellis and his wife, Jean, who died in February 2020, had four children, 15 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Information about funeral services for Don Ellis Sr. is not yet available.

Big scores and a bunch of strikes highlighted victories for the Indiana Tech women and Concordia men over the weekend at the Bowling Green State Falcon Classic in Toledo, Ohio. The single-day event featured 16 women's varsity teams and 15 men's teams. The format included four traditional games and 10 Baker games in each division, with total pinfall determining the winner.

The Indiana Tech women recorded a wire-to-wire victory at the Falcon Classic, creating some distance from the rest of the field after a 1,078 effort in Game 2 of the traditional block helped them build a 72-pin advantage heading into Baker competition. The Warriors started the Baker block with 173, before posting nine consecutive games of at least 202 or higher to roll to the win with a 6,195 total. Lawrence Tech finished second with 5,937, and Lourdes was third with 5.832.

Bowling Green State's Britni Hosterman rolled games of 210, 239, 237 and 220 to earn the top spot in the women's individual standings, finishing with a 906 total, a 226.5 average. Adrienne Polonio of Lourdes was second with 860, and she was followed in the standings by Lawrence Tech's Alexandria Smigiel (857), Indiana Tech's Kayla Bivens (846) and Taylor McBride of Lourdes (842).

In the men's division, Concordia benefitted from back-to-back games of 1,159 and 1,148 in the middle of the traditional block to surge into the lead. The Cardinals maintained their advantage during the Baker block, taking the top spot with a 6,407 total. Lawrence Tech finished second with 6,268, and Trine was third with 6,229.

Concordia's Korey Reichard started Saturday's traditional set with games of 279, 267 and 279 for an 825 series and finished the block with 229 to record a 1,054 total (263.5 average) to easily claim top honors in the men's individual standings.

Wright State's Andrew Bleakley placed second with 948, while Lawrence Tech's Michael Weber (940), Trine's Austin Robison (933) and Adrian's David Winters (922) also finished in the top five.

"When I bowled Sean and Marshall, we threw urethane," said Maldonado. "Once I felt like there was enough blend in the lane from the urethane transition, I knew I was able to miss a little bit left once I got into my reactive. As long as I carried, I was fine."

Bowling a 224 game in the opening eliminator match, Maldonado led Butturff and Zach Weidman into the next match, knocking out Jason Sterner. In the second match, Maldonado and Butturff tied at 224, advancing to the title match and leaving Weidman in third.

"I was just super happy," said Maldonado of his reaction to winning his first national title. "I was thinking about my family during the matches. I wake up every morning doing this for them. I just want to make them proud, to make Houston proud. I have a lot of people who support me and I don't want to let them down. I got it. I got the win."


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
