



AMF Valley View Lanes in Garden Grove Closes

GARDEN GROVE -The message on the AMF Valley View Lanes website tells the story:

'We're sorry to say that AMF Valley View Lanes has closed. We have deeply appreciated your patronage and support over the years.

"We've made great bowling memories together, and we would like to continue to do so by inviting you to bowl with us at AMF Cerritos Lanes!"

Thus, another bowling center has shut its doors - this time one in the Orange County city of Garden Grove, about 30 miles southeast of Los Angeles.

Valley View was part of Bowlero Corp. (formerly known as Bowlmor AMF), the largest bowling center operator in the world with more than 300 centers, most of which are in the U.S.

An AMF Cerritos Lanes manager refused to discuss details of the closure, saving he was not authorized to provide information.

Dick Sanders, the longtime owner and director of the West Coast Senior Tour, staged a few tournaments at Valley View, most recently a doubles tournament in 2011. He said he was not continued on page 10



Dallas Strikers, Philadelphia Hitmen Advance to PBA League Semifinal Round

Underdog Motown Muscle will bid for first Elias Cup berth against two-time past champions

PORTLAND, Maine The two-time defending champion Shipyard Dallas Strikers will carry their bid to become the first three-time OceanView at Falmouth PBA League Elias Cup champion into the semifinal round after a thrilling extra frame victory over the GEICO NYC WTT KingPins, but standing in the way will be a determined Sysco Philadelphia Hitmen team that has its collective eyes focused on winning its first Elias Cup.

The third and fourth best-of-two-game auarterfinal rounds matches. which are part of the 2018 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule, were contested



at Bayside Bowl and aired Sunday on ESPN.

Dallas lived up to its nickname, roaring out of the gate with a string of six strikes by Bill O'Neill, Rhino Page, Kyle Sherman, Tommy Jones and playermanager Norm Duke to build a 40-pin lead after five frames. The KingPins. fired up by PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber, rallied with a late string of four strikes, but couldn't overcome Dallas' early lead.

With a 241-224 victory in hand, Dallas looked like it was going to run away with a two-game sweep, starting game two with four strikes. But Duke left a 3-10 split in the fifth frame. which he converted, but the KingPins got on a roll while the Strikers stumbled continued on page 7

Salama, Dinenberg and Schrider Take JAT Titles at Cal Bowl

LAKEWOOD - The JAT headed to Cal Bowl for our 12th of 15 events this season. Lane conditions on the high end were tight to start but as the bowlers broke down the pattern scoring started to rise. Solomon Salama wowed the crowd with a remarkable run in the best-of-three matches putting up games of 257-267-278-258-255 for a 802 series, 1060 4-game set and a 5-game run of 1315- a 263 average as he struck to his 11th title. In the 130-164 Preps Di-

vision, it was Emily Schrider finishing strong with a 206 game to post a 543 series for the win and \$75 scholarship. Alex Alvarez was steady for 2nd at 495, Luke Mercado's 482 was



Coach Preble is the Complete Package

CLOVIS, CA – There's a lot to be said for all the accomplishments that Chris Preble has racked up over his bowling career so far, but he recently was notified about a new one—CUSBC Coach of the Year, 2018! Preble will be presented with this honor at the CUSBC 2018 State Convention, which will be taking place the weekend of June 9-10, at Hotel Picadilly in Fresno. Preble was notified by CUSBC President Rosie Parker and said, "It was quite unexpected."

To give you more of an insight in the making of this great coach of the Fresno State Bulldogs Bowling Men & Women's Teams, here is how it all began. Chris was born in Fresno, 51 years ago and lived in Fresno most of his childhood and then later moved "all the way" to Clovis. His bowling career started when he was 11 years old when a friend from school invited him to join a league. This friend must have had a lot of influence as Chris did not come from a bowling family and luckily he lived close enough to Sunnyside Bowl that he could ride his bike to go bowling. He was soon taken under the guidance of Robbie Tanaka, who was his first coach. Preble already was hooked on the game and intrigued about the movement

of the ball on the lane and said, "Understanding how to make a bowling ball hook was the first thing I loved about the game." Preble then went on to be coached by the late, great, Glenn Carlson when he was a collegiate bowler at Fresno State. Preble added, "I wouldn't be where I am today, or who I am today, without either of their influences" (Tanaka and Carlson). Glenn Carlson was the one who approached Chris to assist with the Men's program at Fresno State in 2002.





The Fresno Bulldogs had eleven players (mixed team) in the program this season. In the past, they have had as many as 20 players on the team. Their season starts up in August, and depending how the season goes, completes in March, or hopefully in April at the national championships! They typically have four practices a week. Three are 1-1/2 hours and one is for 2 hours. This year's mixed team had an average range of 166 to 201. When asked what his favorite part of coaching is, he said, "When players come to our program, typically their experience in the game is fairly limited. One thing I really enjoy is watching players overcome their perceived limitations. Whether it's by playing an area of the lane they never would have considered or, overcoming the pressure of an important moment in a match. Seeing the growth and maturation is pretty cool." Team players are allowed four years of competition and typically his players use all of their available eligibility. Preble was happy to report that "Nationally, collegiate bowling is growing!" 172 schools fielded Men's teams during this 2017-18 season and 142 schools fielded Women's teams.

Preble has had great success getting the Fresno State Bulldog Bowling Team recognized as he coached them to the 2011 Intercollegiate Team Championship Title. In 2015,

Before we learn more about his coaching career at Fresno State, here's some info on Chris the bowler and his own career. He's had (51) career 300 games and (27) 800 series to date along with (2) PBA Regional titles and was the 1993 PBA Western Region Rookie of the Year. He currently competes in scratch events up and down our State and is about to go bowl the USBC Open Nationals in Syracuse, NY. Besides that, he is open to help out his association, Central California USBC, as a volunteer coach and helped them establish a Learn-to-Bowl program along with a Youth Camp last year that was a huge success. He gives private lessons as well and I know for a fact he is more than happy to pair up with an up-and-coming youth to bowl an Adult-Jr. event like the annual Tony Reyes Memorial!

Preble recently completed his 15th year coaching the Fresno State Bulldog Team (2018 marks his 9th year as Head Coach). This year he had eleven players in the program. He has two assistant coaches—Craig Donaldson & Kiana Rowe. In addition, Kevin Kwok continues to provide assistance with fundraising for their program (Erick Buckley and Chad Uyehara have also provided invaluable assistance in past seasons). Preble added, "It definitely takes a village to build a collegiate bowling program." Fresno State is one the oldest state university to have a bowling team (Coach Carlson established the program in the 1969-70 season). The bowling program is also the oldest club on the Fresno campus as well.

they received the Club Championship (named after Glenn Carlson). Preble, himself, has been recognized as Collegiate Coach of the Year (2006-07) and made the Top 100 Coaches in the US list by Bowlers Journal International in both 2013 and 2015. Chris is married to wife, Dana, and they have two daughters, Audree (20) and Averee (16). Both of his daughters are involved with swimming so any free time he might have would be seeing them at their swimming events.

I believe collegiate bowling is the healthiest level of bowling available. Being part of a team in a mostly individually based sport is very rewarding. Tennelle Milligan & Danny Wiseman Enter USBC Hall of Fame

RENO – The United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame grew by six members on Wednesday with the induction ceremony of the 2018 class at the Grand Sierra Resort.

The 2018 USBC Hall of Fame Class includes **Tennelle Milligan** and Danny Wiseman, who were elected in the Superior Performance category, Kendra Gaines and John Janawicz for Outstanding USBC Performance, Jeri Edwards for Meritorious Service, and Tim Mack in the Pioneer category.

Wiseman, 50, of Baltimore, joined the PBA Hall of Fame in 2013 and was rated No. 42 on the list of the PBA's 50 Greatest Players in 2008. He made his television debut in his hometown, capturing the first of his 12 tour titles at the 1990 Fair Lanes Open. He won the 2004 USBC Masters and was runner-up at the 2009 Masters, and in 2013 became the first bowler selected to the Maryland State Athletic Hall of Fame.

"I am honored, humbled and so grateful," Wiseman said. "Growing up, I never dreamed I would be in a room accepting an honor like this. I didn't start bowling believing I'd be in any halls of fame. I just wanted to knock over pins."

Milligan, 41, of Mansfield, Texas, won the U.S. Women's Open and Hammer Players Championship in 2000, and earned the nickname "Major Milligan" after winning her third major, the 2005 USBC Queens. She won 27 medals, including 13 gold, as a six-time Team USA member, and has four USBC Women's Championships titles.

"Tonight, I am humbled and privileged," Milligan said. "Someone once told me that you don't have to tell everybody that you're good, they'll tell you. To those who voted me into this exclusive club, I guess you told me."

Mack, 46, of Indianapolis, won more than 70 titles on five continents and in more than 30 countries to help pave the way for bowling to become a more global sport. Before there was a World Bowling Tour, he won the Bahrain Open, Indonesian International Open and Qatar Open, events now recognized as PBA Tour titles. He bowled for Team USA at the 2003 World Bowling Men's Championships in Malaysia, winning a gold and four silver medals.

"What an honor and privilege to be among this wonderful class of inductees," Mack said. "Not only are they amazing people in bowling, but they are my friends. I'm beyond humbled and honored to be in this class."

Gaines, 44, of Orlando, Florida, owns four Women's Championships titles and in 2000 recorded the first 800 series (812) in the event's history. She won two Professional Women's Bowling Association (PWBA) Tour titles and had second-place (2003) and third-place (1998) finishes at the USBC Queens. She was a five-time member of Team USA.

"This is such a tremendous honor for me, to be inducted into this elite club," Gaines said. "My first thoughts when receiving the phone call was, 'I'm in THE USBC Hall of Fame with Dick Weber, Earl Anthony, Lisa Wagner, Betty Morris - oh my goodness!" These are people I looked up to as a little girl."

Janawicz, 45, of Winter Haven, Florida, has won three USBC Open Championships titles, and two were done in record fashion. He won the 2004 singles title with a then-record 858 series and led Lodge Lanes Too when it posted a then-record score of 3,538 in winning the 2013 team title. He is an eight-time member of Team USA.

"I never dreamed of making the USBC Hall of Fame when I was younger, but I kept working on my craft and as the accolades started to build up, I kind of knew it was possible," Janawicz said. "I knew I just had to stay the course, and tonight I cross the finish line."

Edwards, 55, of Medina, Ohio, served as Team USA head coach from 2004-2009, guiding the team to more than 90 medals, including 47 gold medals. She led the program's transition when pro players were allowed to compete in international events starting in 2008. She also served stints as Junior Team USA head coach and Team USA assistant coach.

"Once you're a part of Team USA, you always are a part of Team USA," Edwards said as she thanked the collective Team USA family. "The things that happen with the squad, and the competitions that you share, there's just nothing like team competition and really laying it out on the line with everybody."

With Wednesday's six inductees, there will be 425 members of the USBC Hall of Fame - 220 for Superior Performance, 118 for Meritorious Service, 50 Veterans, 21 Pioneers and 16 for Outstanding USBC Performance.

The USBC Hall of Fame was created in 2005 by merging the former American Bowling Congress and Women's International Bowling Congress Halls of Fame.

scoring highlights included Sam Grayson 269, Cameron Criss 255, Daniel Hong 250, Trenton Gibbs 245 and Ben Dinenberg 240. In the Top-12 Match Play, Garrett Lee secured the top-spot in the rolloffs using his 150 bonus pins from his 5-0 record to get to +217. Daniel Hong was 2nd at +161 and Ben Dinenberg used a huge 276 in position round to get to +107 and leapfrog into the third and final rolloff spot. Match-play scoring included Garrett Lee 243-235, Ben Dinenberg 245 and Daniel Hong 234. In the stepladder, the semifinal match was a one-sided affair as Ben Dinenberg advanced over Daniel Hong 218-128. Top-seeded Garrett Lee matched up with Dinenberg for a shot at the title. The match came down to the 10th frame as Dinenberg went strike-spare to force Lee to strike on his first ball to stay in the match. Lee's shot went light and the 8-count gave the title to Dinenberg. Congratulations Ben on your first title!

In the Open Division, scoring was strong at +28 was the cut for the top-8 advancers. Ryan Lee and Eric Phillips led the pack tied at +101 with some solid bowling. Louis Luna was low-to-advance at +28. Qualifying scoring highlights included Ryan Lee 276-237, Trevyr Geronimo 267, Eric Phillips 244, Kevin Banaag 244, Solomon Salama 241-237, Nick Caner 238, Marquan Rivers 236, Louis Luna 236, Tim Hill 235, Costa Gastouniotis 235, and Kyle Reed 235. In the bracket, Ryan Lee and Kyle Reed both needed three games to advance while Marquan Rivers and Solomon Salama swept into the semi-final round with Kevin Banaag on the short-end of a 267-255 elimination game. In the semis, Kyle Reed and Marquan Rivers tied the first game with Reed winning the 9th and 10th frame rolloff, then Reed taking the second game by one stick to advance to the finals. On the other side of the bracket, Ryan Lee ran into a truck as Solomon Salama took him out 278-234 and 258-217 to advance to the championship match. In the final, it was all Salama as he took advantage of Reed's tough carry game one 255-172. Then, after a lengthy lane machine delay and a switch of pairs, Salama continued on to a 213-184 win and the title. Congratulations Solomon on an incredible scoring run in the bracket and your 11th title!



late in the game, losing to New York City, 237-208, to force the first one-ball sudden-death roll-off of the 2018 competition.

The matter was settled quickly when KingPins' anchor Marshall Kent left a ringing 10 pin, and Duke, a PBA Hall of Famer and 38-time PBA Tour champion, struck.

"We had them; we started with four in a row and I made about the worst shot you can possibly make (in the fifth frame of game two)," Duke said, "and then it was a series of mistakes. But that's the thing about winning game one. You're still in it. In this format, unless you're dominant and sweep, it's going to come down to one ball and we all know it.

"Nobody wants it, really," he added. "Even if you're on the right lane. Even if you're of sound mind. You grab the ball and your legs start shaking. You saw me balk. It was partly because (the down lane camera man) scooted his chair, but it also gave me a chance to come back and regroup because my legs were noodles.

"That's pressure right there. I've been in that situation many times but I was scared out of my wits. You're kinda bowling in a state of shock. It wasn't my best shot, but I knew off my hand it was really close. I knew it was nine or better, and if I carried the 10, we win the match. And we did."

In the final quarterfinal match, Philadelphia used a steady approach with critical clutch shots to topple the hometown Lumberjacks, 224-222, in the opening game and easily won game two, 209-157, when Portland ran into all kinds of problems, throwing only two strikes along with a split and two missed spares. The Hitmen got a string of five strikes from no. five bowler Tom Smallwood, Ronnie Russell, Chris Loschetter, Dom Barrett and Matt Sanders to turn the match into a rout.

"It was nip-and-tuck for the first match but my guys bowled as well today, if not better, than they did in the seeding tournament," said Philadelphia manager Jason Couch. "We don't have a great history in this event. We've struggled from time to time, and this is the third time in four years we've drawn the home team, which makes for a tough environment. But I'm proud of the way my guys bowled today.

"Matt Sanders is our new guy," Couch said of the PBA's 2017 Rookie of the Year. "I don't know him really well, but I watched him bowl all week and he's the real deal. I have no problem putting him in the five hole, or the four hole. He's a good player.

"Tom Smallwood? He's a late bloomer, but he's been money for me," Couch added. "He seems to thrive in this environment when you wouldn't think he would. He's a quiet guy but he never has a problem taking on the responsibility."

In the first semifinal round match that will air on ESPN on Sunday, May 6, at 1 p.m. ET, the Barbasol Motown Muscle, who have never won the Elias Cup, will meet the two-time past champion Go Bowling! Silver Lake Atom Splitters. The second semifinal will involve the Dallas Strikers and the Philadelphia Hitmen, who also have never won the Elias Cup.



TERRY CHITTENDEN and Why "THE WORLD IS A BETTER PLACE BECAUSE OF BOWLING"

REDLANDS - Terry Chittenden is one of the top female bowlers in CALIFORNIA. She regularly averages 210 or thereabouts and currently is on a 213 pace at Empire Bowl. Her book averages for the last two seasons were 215 and 210.

Several weeks ago Terry rolled the second highest series of her life. Her huge 760 (278-237-245) scratch series in the Noonlighters senior league was the high score in the league at the time, for men or women. IMAGINE THAT, A WOMAN OUTSCORING THE GUYS!!!

Terry's 760 is the house record for a female senior bowler but it's not her best score. A few years ago she rolled a 762. She also has a perfect 300 game to her credit, bowled at Empire Bowl in 2012. Ms. Chittenden used her favorite, a Hammer Dark Legion, to roll her record setting score. According to Terry the Dark Legion hits harder and mixes pins better than her other balls.

It all started forty-two years ago when Terry started bowling in her parent's bowling center. Her parents, JOHN and LORRIE IACONO, owned Rim Lanes in Crestline from 1975 - 2004. Ownership gave Terry the opportunity to bowl as much as she wanted, for free. She took advantage of the opportunity and rolled hundreds of "lines" perfecting her game.

It was her parents who taught her the basics of the game and it was them who are responsible for her bowling success. As bowling proprietors her parents were very active in promoting youth bowling and ensuring she fell in love with our sport. Her parents were also very active in the community, founding the Mountain Boys and Girls Club in Crestline.

GLENN BULLOCK managed Rim Lanes for many years and taught Terry how to be a real winner. He taught her sportsmanship. He told her to always cheer for her opponent and then to bowl her best to win. That's winning the right way. That's being a real winner. Bullock's philosophy of winning the right way has stuck with Terry to this day. She depends on her own performance to win, not the misfortune of an opponent. In other words, don't wait for your opponent to stumble and lose, instead go out and win it yourself. Terry says "THANK YOU Glenn Bullock, thank you for teaching me how to win the right way in bowling and how to win the right way in life".

Terry Chittenden is a CALIFORNIA gal, an outdoors woman. Born in Glendale and raised in Crestline she loves nature. With most of her life spent in a mountain community, surrounded by lakes, streams and wildlife it should be no surprise to know that her favorite past times (beside bowling) are hiking and backpacking. Her eagle count is in the hundreds. Have you ever seen a bald eagle? How about beaver, bear, elk or deer? How about a red tailed hawk or the Milky Way galaxy? Terry has seen them all.

If you want to know the ten essential items that should be in every backpack ask Terry. If you want to know the difference between a backpack and a nap sack ask Terry. If you want to know what to do when you come face to face with a grizzly bear ask Terry.

When it comes to favorites, Terry likes chocolate and Walter Ray Williams Jr. Walter Ray has been an inspiration. He has shown her how to handle pressure and how to fight through adversity. Walter Ray is a proven winner and his example fits with the "Bullock Philosophy" for winning. How should a bowler handle pressure? How should a bowler handle prosperity? Again Terry turns to Walter Ray as her model.

Walter Ray has probably faced pressure head on more than any bowler in history. While his face many times exhibits the stress he is under, his actions are always cool, calm and collected. He is a model of propriety. That's how a bowler should handle pressure, focused and in control of his or her emotions.

While Walter Ray has won with ease on many occasions, he never irritates an opponent with antics unbecoming a real professional. He is gracious in victory as well as in defeat. He is a model of sportsmanship. He has shown how a bowler should handle prosperity, with humility.

Terry told me that Walter Ray and her share the same sign? That is the same sign of the zodiac! I believe they also share their sign with Saint Francis and Mother Teresa. I can see Terry in a league with those two but I'm not sure about Walter Ray?

Walter Ray and Terry are also about the same age. That means they are the children of America's "greatest generation". That means they learned the value of hard work, patience and persistence. Now I know why Terry exhibits these virtues and values. Characteristics I saw in my parents. There is one question Terry has for Walter Ray. Does he love chocolate? I promised her I will ask him that

question the next time I see him at a PBA event. Terry is another example of why bowlers are among the best people in the world. Long live the sport of bowl-

2018 Imperial Valley USBC Masters Championships

El Centro - It was a clean sweep through the weekend, as Danny Chin went undefeated in claiming his first Robinsons Ford Masters title at the Strikezone Bowling Center in El Centro. Chin won five consecutive two-game matches Saturday and Sunday, capped by a 449-433 victory over Gordon Belt in the Championship finale during the Imperial Valley USBC sanctioned event.

"Very good," the softspoken Calexico resident answered how he felt about winning the title. "It's my second time competing and the first time winning."

The native of Queens, New York came into the double elimination tournament as the number 5 seed after rolling a 688 threegame series during the Imperial Valley Open earlier in April.

Danny Chin

He began Saturday's

opening round with a 420-339 victory over Emilio Sandoval and followed with a sparkling 510-438 win over Jerry Vaught, the 4th seed of the field of 16. Chin finished the first day of competition with a 413-327 victory over Glenn Svare to put him in the Semi-Finals.

On Sunday, it was a battle of unbeatens as Chin faced Derek Murray, one of his teammates in the

Tuesday Mixed League. The 6th-seeded Murray had won his opening 3 matches, the first a narrow 431-429 win over David Granados. He followed with a pair of 500+ series, capped by a 504-367 round three win against 2nd seeded Nolan Coyne. Chin prevailed, however, with a 464-423 victory, securing a spot in the championship.

Belt, the 2013 Masters Champion, had a much more difficult time on his road to the title. After a 479-439 opening round victory over 2011 Masters titlest Ted Turner, the 3rd-seeded Belt was sent out of the winners bracket after a 515-403 loss to Murray, who posted the lone perfect game of the weekend. The 300 was part of a three-game series that totalled 804 for Murray, the highest of the tournament. It would be Murray's 5th perfect game of his career.

Following the loss, Belt would bounce back with 5 wins in a row. The comeback began with a 412-328 elimination of Mike Reyla followed by wins over Enrique Garcia (443-364), Svare (440-429) and Coyne (502-429) before a re-match with Murray. Belt would get eliminate Murray with a narrow 467-460 win to set up the title match.

"I thought I had a chance," Chin said of his opponent prior to the Championship. "He's a great bowler, but if I stayed within myself and threw my ball, I thought I had a chance."


Chin rolled a 238 in the first game against Belt's 224. He followed with a 211 to best Belt's 209 to earn his first ever Masters title.

"It feels really good," Chin said of going unbeaten in the tournament. "It builds my confidence up."

When asked what was the key to victory, Chin replied "staying slow, staying within my game."

It was the perfect recipe for the new Masters Champion.

- BUD HORN, operator of **PARK BOWL** in Baldwin Park was asked about his winning style of bowling. "I look at 3 boards and try to hit the middle one. Actually I pray to be within 5 boards".
- Pictured was the 6 division winners of the Grant Classic. Five of the six had moustaches. Only one also had a beard. Times were changing. Gone were team shirts, dress pants, collared shirts and a hand-shake after bowling.
- ROY HOERNKE advertised his resurfacing and lane maintenance company in Oceanside. One of the good guys (to quote BOB SMITH).
- ALICE MEGLEMRE was publishing "that other bowling paper" the California Kegler. She loved the horse races and would give a "hot tip" from time to time.
- P.J. CARROLL had a stable of pros ready for the PBA Winter Tour; MARK BAKER, BOBBY KNIPPLE, BRIAN LaMAGNA and BUTCH SOPER.
- LINDA LOVELACE bowled at GRAND CENTRAL. Don't know the name? Google it!
- CANOGA PARK BOWL gave away 2,000,000 Blue Chips a month. Estimated 494,000,000 since the program started. Most in So.Calif.
- GUPPY TROUP was \$23,000 richer after winning the P.B.A. at **WONDERBOWL-ANA-HEIM.** He came in \$14,000 in debt and really needed the win. Everyone had their hand out. He finally walked out with \$3,000,00.
- Remember the picture of DON JOHNSON laying on the approach after leaving a 10 pin? He could have shot 300, but the pin never qUivered and he didn't collect \$10,000.00. Didn't stop him from being elected into ABC Hall of Fame in 1982.
- DON JOHNSON and GLENN ALLISON both got more press by NOT winning than winning!
- WONDERBOWL-ANAHEIM hosted 509 Pro-Ams when the Pros came to town. Plus 171 Juniors, 133 Seniors and wheelchairs. A record in So. California for many years.

- SHEL HIPPO was back (from where?) Racked up some big bucks 5 week-ends in a row and disappeared again.
- League Secretary's and Presidents actually signed contracts with their centers. Good idea gone a stray.

surprised that the center closed, citing Bowlmor's merger with AMF in 2013.

"When AMF sold [Valley View] to Bowlmor, I didn't think it would be long," he said.

Valley View Lanes, which closed last month, played host to three leagues: Sam's Town No-Tap (Monday), Early Birds (Tuesday morning) and Gold Coast Special (Wednesday).

Sanders said the bowling center "used to have 40" leagues, turning instead to the "fast buck" of such partygroup attractions as cosmic bowling – a night-time experience of loud music, dark surroundings and glowing pins.

Online reviews of the 32-lane bowling center had been decidedly mixed.

Jessica of Buena Park, for instance, gave the bowling center five stars (out of five) on Jan. 29.

She praised the parking, the price for bowling, the food and the bowling alley. Among her comments: "The bowling alley was not too loud, had great noise control and was clean. A plus for sure! Great variety of balls and prepared lanes

"Return? Definitely! They give you \$3-off coupon for your next visit if you take the short survey online."

By contrast, Will of Garden Grove gave the bowling center a scathing one-star review in December.

Said Will: "Atrocious experience with bowling and arcades. Over 60 bucks for four games, two people. Then we played some video games (or tried). The basketball games ate our coins and [there is] NO indication of how much it costs to play.

"However, at the restaurant and grill, staff [was] very friendly and helpful. Pizza was quick and drink refills for kids are unlimited. But otherwise, the total experience was unacceptable. Not recommended. We will not return."
