Weber Wins PBA50 UnitedHealthcare Sun Bowl In The Villages For Fifth PBA50 Tour Title

Weber benefits from three missed spares by Mohr in championship match

THE VILLAGES, Fla. – Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Pete Weber of St. Ann, Mo., the 2015 PBA50 Player of the Year, began work defending that crown by winning the PBA50 UnitedHealthcare Sun Bowl In The Villages presented by Radical Tuesday at Spanish Springs Lanes.

Weber won his fifth career PBA50 Tour title by defeating two-time PBA50 Player of the Year and tournament top qualifier Ron Mohr of Las Vegas, 204-162, in the title match.

“I’ve always bowled well here,” said Weber. “I’ve made the finals here three out of the last four

years and was hoping it would just be a matter of time to get a win.”

Weber, a winner of 37 titles, including a record-tying 10 majors on the PBA Tour, was helped by three open frames by Mohr, who missed two 10 pins and a four pin. Mohr, an eight-time PBA50 Tour titlist, was trying to end a nearly four-year drought without a win, with his last coming in the 2012 Senior Decatur Open.

“I feel bad for Ron but he’s the type of guy that will bounce back no doubt about that,” Weber said. “We’ve all been there. Sometimes when you miss an easy spare, that frustra-



tion can make things worse. We were both having trouble that game—I could barely get a double.”

The win solidified a good start to the season for Weber who finished fourth

in last week’s season-opening Pasco County Florida Open.

“I’m feeling good physically and my game is in a good shape so I’m looking forward to another good

season,” Weber added.

In the semifinal, Weber beat PBA50 Tour newcomer Joel Carlson of Omaha, Neb., 268-223, to advance to the championship match.


In the opening stepladder match, Carlson beat four-time PBA50 Player of the Year and 12-time PBA50 Tour winner Tom Baker of King, N.C., 224-213, and then went on to beat 2015 PBA50 Rookie of the Year Mike Scroggins of Amarillo, Texas, 268-217, to advance to the semifinal.

PBA Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli bowled three 300 games which tied the record for most 300s in a PBA50 Tour tournament

with four other bowlers – Mohr, Bob Kelly, Joe Scarborough and Walter Ray Williams Jr.

The PBA50 Tour’s third stop of the season will be George Pappas Victory Lanes in Mooresville, N.C. for the Mooresville Ford Open presented by Columbia 300 and Miller High Life May 1-4.

BOWLING RETURNS TO HIGHLAND PARK

HIGHLAND PARK — Friday, April 29th marked the grand opening of Highland Park Bowl.

The 8-lane center has been completely renovated, yet preserved. The former Mr. T’s Bowl located at 5621 N. Figueroa Street was purchased by 1933 Group, a team of entrepreneurs that own and operate eight refined restaurants

and drinking establishments in northern Los Angeles County.

When the opportunity to purchase the former Mr. T’s Bowl presented itself, they had a vision for it, and pounced. Mr. T’s had not offered bowling since the 1980’s, and most of the pin setting equipment was inoperable.

Perfect Game Propels Dallas Strikers into Elias Cup Finals Against NYC WTT KingPins

Hall of Famers Duke, Weber lead their teams into PBA League championship match

PORTLAND, Maine – Helped by the first perfect game in Professional Bowlers Association League history, the GoBowling.com Dallas Strikers advanced to a PBA League Elias Cup showdown with the 2013 Elias Cup champion GEICO New York City WTT KingPins.

The semifinal round matches aired Sunday on ESPN, with PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber leading the KingPins to a dramatic best-of-two-game victory over the hometown-favorite Shipyard Brewing Portland Lumberjacks while Weber’s long-time opponent and fellow Hall of Famer Norm Duke inspired the Strikers in their 2-0 sweep of the Barbasol Motown Muscle at Bayside Bowl.



In the first semifinal match, the KingPins, behind Mike Fagan, John Szczerbinski, Scott Norton, Weber and anchor bowler Marshall Kent, used superior strike power in the last half of both games for a 223-190 and 237-222 sweep of the Lumberjacks.

Norton, after leaving a 4-6-7-8-10 “Greek church” in frame three of game one, stabilized the KingPins with strikes on his next three attempts while Kent,

PBA’s 2014 Rookie of the Year, delivered in the fifth and 10th frames of both games.

“It was all me; I just threw it bad,” Norton said of his initial error, “but I was able to fix the physical mistakes the next three shots. The good thing is, my team was able to pick me up, which is what it’s all about.”

Kent was the team’s choice to assume the anchor role from Weber because

his game matched up better with the conditions, and he embraced the opportunity.

“It feels good the whole team was behind the decision,” Kent said. “We work together so well we could have put any of our five guys in that position and we would have been comfortable. But I’m kinda glad it was me. I like being in that position.”

“The atmosphere is so much fun,” the former Robert Morris-Illinois collegiate star added. “It reminds me a lot of college, with all of the teams and parents, and it’s loud and crazy. I’m actually very comfortable in this atmosphere.”

In the second semifinal match, Dallas made history with its 300-237 romp in continued on page 4

The Perfect Game

Bowling Better Made Easy

As this season heads for the "EXIT" sign, many of us reflect and make the same vow we've repeated too many times, "Next year is going to be different! Next year I'll do better! Just wait until next year! I'll show 'em.....NEXT YEAR!" Hmmm.

If you are a bowler that loves this game but has an average that disappoints year after year, here's a word of advice: Quit acting like a Cubs fan waiting for better times "next year." Quit making excuses and **DO SOMETHING** to actually get better!

Where to begin? Good question. Start by stopping. Stop being so stubborn about changing how you bowl (nobody likes leaving their comfort zone, but you are disappointing yourself and your teammates). Stop thinking you're as good as you'll ever be. Stop accepting being mediocre. The Chinese have an ancient proverb: "*The journey of a thousand miles begins with the first step.*" Stop avoiding that first step!

Becoming a respectable bowler is not a thousand-mile journey and the first step is nothing more than taking stock of yourself as a bowler. That inventory contains the attributes of your game that are holding your average down. Those include the following:

1. NATURAL ABILITY. You need to understand that there are no "natural" bowlers - ZERO! It is a sport for which human beings are poorly designed. Physically, it requires only the ability to roll a ball sixty feet. Everyone has that ability, but doing so with precision requires a bit of knowledge and mental discipline; that is the deficiency in your game. Advice: Raising your average requires you to commit to learning HOW to bowl - that is your mental game. Read *The Essentials of Bowling**, Chapter 2.

2. EDUCATION. Nobody is born with a knowledge of basic bowling theory; it must be learned (don't worry, it's not rocket science). Techniques based on that theory are the most effective. Advice: Learn and practice those techniques. Improvement of your average requires it. They are described in *The Essentials of Bowling**, pages 20-21, 29, 32-33, and 45.

3. EXPERIENCE. There are two ways to improve as a bowler; bowling more often is one of them. It's a game of skill and skills must be honed (perfect practice makes perfect). But experience means more than just learning and doing the same thing over and over, it also means expanding your horizons. Advice: Practice in various centers and in unusual formats. The more variation you expose yourself to, the more confident you become. Confidence equates to a higher average.

4. LANE CONDITIONS. Oil patterns and pin reactivity do affect your scores, but don't cause your low average. That is a result of too many "open" frames. In other words, you are making too many errant shots. Every lane has a "line" that will produce higher scores; your job is to find it. Finding that line and adjusting as it changes requires consistency. Advice: The techniques described in *The Essentials of Bowling** create consistency, but you must make the effort; it won't happen by itself.

5. YOUR EQUIPMENT. Like lane conditions, your equipment has an effect on your average. A new ball may knock pins down more potently, but it will still be up to you to deliver it effectively. Advice: If you are truly committing to becoming a force to deal with on the lanes, equipment should be part of your strategy. A new ball, properly fitted, won't hurt. A new wrist support may also help. Ask the pro at your favorite center for advice in this phase of your plan. He/she can also comment on your technique.

6. PASSION. Passion may be the most important element determining your success because it dictates the effort you are willing to put into improving. Unfortunately, you can't go to the pro shop and purchase more passion for bowling, but success breeds it. That means taking action. Advice: There is a big difference between wanting to be better, and knowing how to get better. Pick up a copy of *The Essentials of Bowling** and read it. If you average 160 or less, this modest manual contains the information you need to *significantly* improve your average.

There you have it; better bowling made easy! It doesn't take extensive time, expense or exertion. Just read, practice what you read, and enjoy this game like never before. Still not convinced that you should own a copy? Consider this:

- The *Essentials of Bowling* can be read, cover to cover, in about two hours, but contains more bowling know-how than most bowlers learn in a lifetime of once-a-week league bowling.
- If you average around 150, the techniques in this book should easily add 15-20 pins to that.
- Five dollars barely covers S&H from PA to CA, making this the best bargain in bowling. Getting each additional copy for only \$1.00 each is even better. They make great gifts (especially if you have friends or teammates who need a little help as well).
- The copy(s) you receive will be signed. That's not an option from any of the on-line retailers.

game one, with Duke completing the perfect game with three strikes in the 10th frame. In game two, Duke moved himself to leadoff and turned over anchor duties to Tommy Jones. The Strikers fell behind by 37 pins after five frames on the troublesome left lane, but when they switched to the right lane to finish the game, Duke, BJ Moore, Shawn Maldonado, Bill O'Neill and Jones ran off a string of six consecutive strikes for a 215-204 victory, and the Strikers' first trip to the Elias Cup finals.

"That was mega exciting," Duke beamed later. "I can't even begin to tell you. I was so worried about getting into a big deficit early, like we did last week. It seems like the left lane wants to give you problems if you want to hook the ball, but it's actually my best lane so that's why I bowled the 10th in game one and had Tommy throw the rock in game two."

After starting the first game with eight strikes, Dallas had the game locked up, but the 300 was still in play.

"When Tommy got that strike in the ninth, he turned around and said, 'I'm so glad it's on you (to finish it)...and that's what gave me the strength,'" Duke said. "He just put it on me, like someone gets in your face and dares you, and that's what lifted me to the point I could get it done."

But the pressure was back on Jones to rescue his team in the 10th frame of game two.

"We were pretty much dead and buried through five frames," Jones said. "The left lane is okay early, but once it changes a little bit, it just seems to catch people the wrong way. (Motown's) Josh (Blanchard) got a terrible break leaving an 8 pin in the eighth frame, and Anthony (Simonsen) made a good shot in the 10th that didn't carry.

"We were fortunate to throw a couple of good shots at the end," Jones added. "I'm not sure what Norm's thinking was. We had just bowled 300 and I thought he'd leave the lineup alone, but he's the (manager), he made the choice (to move me to anchor) and we're two for two, so I think we'll keep going with something similar."

While Dallas has never finished higher than fifth place in three previous PBA League seasons, the NYC WTT KingPins won the inaugural Elias Cup in Indianapolis in 2013, with celebrity owner Billie Jean King in the audience and Tommy Jones as part of their roster. Jones, who also helped the Silver Lake Atom Splitters win the 2014 Elias Cup, will be trying to win the PBA League championship for the third time with his third different team.

The 2016 Elias Cup finals will air on Sunday, May 8, at 1 p.m. ET. The PBA League championship will be decided by a singles, alternate-ball doubles and Baker trios matches worth one point each, followed by a five-player Baker team finale worth three points. If the two teams are tied after the Baker team match, a roll-off will determine the winner.

They quickly went to work by first removing the AMF 82-30 pin spotters, resurfaced the original wood lanes, repaired the old above ground ball returns, and put in new couches in the bowler's area.

L.A.'s own Murrey International was called upon to install the automatic scoring, refurbished Brunswick A-2 pin setters and 4 lanes of bumpers for kids. One of the many unique features of this venue is that there are no masking units.

The pin setting equipment has been left completely exposed, giving it an old, industrial look. Several parts from the old AMF equipment were incorporated throughout the establishment. The old setting tables from the pin spotters have been made into chandeliers that hang above the two horseshoe bars on the concourse.

The distributors from the machines serve as displays for the liquor bottles at the bars, and 4 of the pin wheels have been mounted and motorized on the back wall behind the pin setters.

In the front, another bar has been constructed. It will be called Mr. T's room, a tribute to the rich musical history of Mr. T's Bowl. Boasted as the oldest operating bowling alley in Los Angeles (since 1927), it is truly a sight to see.

Whether you want to try out the wood lanes, enjoy some gourmet food, or have a cocktail, it will surely please. Highland Park Bowl is open Monday to Friday from 5pm-2am, and Saturday and Sunday from 10am-2am.

Whether that's because they're creative people or they just like to talk, they come through again and again with some good quotes.

Here are some of my favorites from my five years of covering the sport – all from league and recreational bowlers:

Ken Borshell, on requesting more women bowlers in his league: "Damn too-tin'. I'm not dead yet. When I get older, my eyes get younger."

Theo Sojourn, on wearing glasses for the first time while bowling: "It felt really good to see the pins 20-20. I bowled a 211 and thought, 'Holy cow, I guess I found the secret weapon.'"

Joe Curry, on bowling a sizzling 705 series with games of 213, 228 and 264: "I was very happy but would have been happier with a 300."

Doug Tucker, on his majestic bows after he rolls a strike: "It's like a football player who makes a touchdown – that's what he does. It's my celebrity thing. It shows I did something right."

Diane Marie, who returned to bowling after a 35-year absence, on what makes bowling special for her: "You get a turn even if you're lousy."

Diane Marie, again, on whether she would return to the lanes after she suffered a shoulder injury: "Of course I will. I am woman, hear me roar."

Carol Tucker, on retiring from her full-time position after teaching math for 40 years: "I felt like the luckiest person on Earth because I enjoyed my career so much and I was able to retire with enough money to buy bowling shoes, running shoes and frozen yogurt."

Geoff Gast, on leading his team to victory: "It was like I was being Shaq and Kobe and leading the way."

Bob Adams, who lost his left eye because of glaucoma, after converting the daunting 5-7 split: "I closed the good eye."

Jamie Beeler, on how he managed to finish his three games despite being afflicted with kidney stones, "I kept taking Advil after Advil after Advil."

Christy Fentress, on bowling her first 200 game: "I was holding my breath the whole game."

Anchor man **Abe Levy**, preferring not to bowl last on his team: "I'd like to bowl first so I could leave early."

Ann Egan, on some of her difficult days bowling before she won the Sweepers women's singles title: "I had been bowling for seven years before I broke a 100 average, but my friends love me so I'm very happy."

Adrienne Roseberry, on the consistency of her bowling average: "I've bowled the same for 50 years."

Siena Cawelti, on the first time she broke the 600 barrier: "I had to cry like the girl that I am."

Siena Cawelti, again, on her passion for bowling: "I live, breathe, and if I could eat a bowling ball, I would!"

Mike Hahn, on his Andy Varipapa 300 that he rolled in 2011 in which he rolled 11 straight strikes at the end of a game and three more strikes to start the next game: "In my mind I bowled a 300. It just wasn't in sequence."

Kelly Gold, on her back-to-back perfect games in 2013: "I was on another planet. It was surreal. It was like you were on your own little lane by yourself and you can't miss. And even if you do miss, it still carried. It was crazy, unbelievable."

Tim Wiese, on what it would take for him to bowl a perfect game after he crushed a personal-best 287: "A lot of luck."



Over the years Mark has done well at the ABC/USBC National Open Tournament with a best finish of twenty-second place in Doubles in Albuquerque with a score of 1,398. Not many locals can match Mark's success at the national level.



VENTURA – Since Amy Lew started bowling regularly about a year and a half ago, she’s raised her average to 170 and flirted with her first 600 series.

But Amy has a goal apart from her own individual bowling scores. She wants to fill the entire 32-lane Winnetka Bowl for her sports-tap, doubles tournament Saturday, June 4.

“I’d love to fill the whole house,” said Amy, the co-director of the tournament along with Carl Comrie. “I don’t know how many people we’ll get, but I know a lot of people are going to bowl. I expect a good turnout.”

The tournament basically is moving from Buena Lanes in Ventura where Amy says a “ton of teams” have competed monthly for the past six months.





WITH ONE WEEK TO GO IN THE 5TH ROUND, NEW LEADER—LINDER'S INSURANCE

DOWNEY—Los Altos Trophy had been in control of the 5th round in the Brunswick Invitational since it began. They started the round 20-0, but have faltered the last two weeks in their matchups with Linder's Insurance. After their most recent battle, Linder's Insurance now holds a one game lead, with only one week to go in the round. They'll face off again next Monday, bowling on the house shot pattern.

In the battle between Los Altos and Linder's on this night, it was very tight in each game and for total pins. Linder's Insurance won the first game by 16 pins. Los Altos came back in game 2, winning it by 22, giving them a six pin lead for totals. With totals being worth two points, the third game was huge in determining three crucial points. Kurt Arakaki and Kevin Valmonte came up huge for Linder's in the deciding game, shooting 215 and 232 respectively. Those scores helped win the game by 27, and totals by 21, giving them four needed wins, and the lead for the round. Valmonte led the pair for the night with his 232 game and 631 for series.

Wowo's Smokin' Hot BBQ was the only other team still in contention for the round when the night began. They needed at least four wins to remain in the hunt. Wowo's drew Ketel One Vodka as their opponent. Ketel One was out of running for the round, but still need every win they can get for a possible wild card birth, so the match was critical for both teams. Ketel One Vodka came out big in game one, winning by 75. They were led by Bobby Hornacek's 216 game. Wowo's managed to get game number two, by 26 pins, trimming Ketel One's lead for totals to 49, setting up the third game. Wowo's stayed hot early in game three, and actually led by 50 in the fifth frame. Then, Ketel One flipped the switch, and with Eddie Van Daniker stringing strikes, the momentum flipped and Wowo's dreams for the round ended with a thud. Eddie finished with 236, winning Ketel One the game and totals.

Four teams still have a mathematical shot at the final two playoff spots. The teams mentioned above are Los Altos, who can win the round or the wild card spot. Linder's, who is in the same position, with either round or wild card possible. Ketel One can win the wild card. Going into the night, Cook's Bowling Supply and DV8 were tied for second place overall, with 92 wins each. DV8 took the first game, by a mere 10 pins, behind a strong 207 from Scott Poddig. Game two was also close, and like the first game, went to DV8. This time by 19 pins. Unlike the first game, it was Dave Kovach who led the team, shooting 227. Game three was much of the same. Close game, won by DV8, for the sweep. This one was by 20 pins. Again, it was a new player leading the way, as Ashkan Tahvildaran shot 209. The five wins puts DV8 in control of their own destiny for the #2 seed heading into the final two weeks.

Gaining ground on Cook's for the third seed was Don Julio Tequila. Don Julio took four games on Monday, and now trail Cook's by only 1/2 game for third place. It's certainly going to be an exciting finish for the round winners. Don Julio got their four wins behind strong bowling from Ray Minter (213-209/592) and Bobby Campagnale (203/572).

Other matches saw Threadworks sweep all five games from Relax-Release-Repeat behind (substitute) Kevin Jones' 200-245/637. J.A.T. took four out of five from Erickson Foods. Deeronn Booker was the steady hand with three games in the 190's. Pino's Pizza swept the match against Herzog Insurance, with Leonard Ruiz shooting a great 200-222-258/680. Alhambra Coin Center took four out of five from Forest Lanes. Johnny Sikkens led Alhambra with 223-2011/622. And, finally, the Cremation Centers of CA got three wins from GJC Janitorial with Nacho Vega leading the pair (214/565).

Sidepot winners on Monday included Paul Barraco with a 206 in the first game. Second game winner, and Financial Advisors pot winner was Arnold Cheesman, shooting 228 for \$283. Second place in the Financial Advisors pot was Chris Eguilos, with 224. Third game super pot was won by Leonard Ruiz Jr. with his 258 game. The Super Pot paid \$189.

The round ends next Monday, and it's coming down to the wire. Stop by Del Rio Lanes in Downey to check out the action. Its house shot next week, so we'll see some huge scores too. The bowling starts at 8:30.
