McEwan Wins 2018 PWBA **Fountain Valley Open**

FOUNTAIN VALLEY -Mother's Day is a day each vear where children honor their mothers for being great, and Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York, gave her mother an early present Saturday by winning the Professional Women's Bowling Association Fountain Valley Open.

McEwan, the No. 3 seed, ran the stepladder and defeated Bryanna Coté of Red Rock, Arizona, in the title match, 215-182, to win her fourth career PWBA Tour title. In the process, she joined last week's PWBA Sonoma County Open champion Shannon O'Keefe of O'Fallon, Illinois, as the only players to win a title in each season since the relaunch of the PWBA Tour in 2015.

The stepladder finals were streamed live on Xtra Frame, the Professional Bowlers Association's online bowling channel.

In the championship match, McEwan began with three consecutive strikes, which echoed a tone she'd set in her previous matches by getting off to strong starts. Coté struggled to find a look early in the match, but she still managed to give herself a

chance to win with strikes in the eighth and ninth frames. McEwan countered with a strike in the ninth. and she sealed the victory with a spare to start the 10th frame to collect the \$10,000 top prize.

"This means the world to me, especially on this tour," McEwan said. "This year, in particular, the talcontinued on page 4

Michael Haugen Jr. Wins PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open

Haugen defeats top finals qualifier Walter Ray Williams Jr. 277-195 for second career PBA50 Tour title

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. - Using three different balls to attack the changing lane conditions in the stepladder finals, Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix, won the PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open presented by Brunswick for his second career PBA50 Tour title.

Haugen, the 2017 PBA50 Rookie of the Year and winner of the 2017 Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open, defeated PBA Hall of Famer and stepladder finals top qualifier Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Fla., 277-195, in the title match at Farmingdale Lanes to win his first PBA50 Tour title of the season.

"It's pretty special anytime you can beat the most prolific winner in our sport because he doesn't give them away," said Haugen of his win over Williams. "To beat Walter Ray for the title in a tournament named after Johnny Petraglia. it doesn't get much better than that."

The 51-year-old Haugen used three different balls in the finals, often using a different ball on each lane in his three matches.

PBA'S "MEMORABLE MOMENTS" 12 THRU 15 COMPLETE THE LIST, 1 THRU 11 REVISITED

The four additional milestones in PBA history listed below complete the list of the PBA's "60 most memorable moments." The top 10 moments (actually 11, because of a tie for 10th place) were revealed during the PBA's 60th Anniversary celebration in Indianapolis in February, and are re-visited below along with "memorable moments" 12 through 16 which were unveiled on all of the PBA Network's outlets last week. Here are those final moments:

- 1) Don Johnson's 299 game in the championship game of the 1970 Firestone Tournament of Champions. He fell to floor after leaving a 10 pin on his final shot, rising to a standing ovation at Riviera Lanes.
- 2) Eddie Elias' meeting with PBA's 33 founding members in Syracuse, N.Y., in 1958.
- 3) Kelly Kulick becoming the first woman to win a PBA Tour title in the 2010 PBA Tournament of Champions in Las Vegas.
- 4) Pete McCordic winning a \$100,000 bonus with a nerve-wracked 300 game on ABC-TV in 1987.
- 5) Pete Weber striking in the 10th frame to claim a record fifth U.S. Open title by one pin in 2012, then uttering his famous phrase, "Who Do You Think You Are, I Am!"
- 6) Earl Anthony surpassing the \$1 million career earnings milestone for the first time in winning the 1982 PBA National Championship.
- 7) Del Ballard Jr., needing two strikes and 7 pins to win the 1991 Fair Lanes Open over Pete Weber, gets the first two but rolls a gutter ball on his last shot to lose.
- 8) Mark Roth becoming the first player to convert the 7-10 split in a 1980 televised PBA final.
- 9) Bob Learn Jr. throws 44 out of a possible 48 strikes, including a 300 game, for a record four-game TV total of 1,129 pins to win the PBA Flagship Open in an arena in his hometown of Erie, Pa., in 1996.

10 & 11

- A tie between the 2011 TOC from Red Rock in Las Vegas where Mika Koivuniemi defeated Tom Daugherty in the biggest margin of victory ever, 299-100 (lowest game ever bowled on TV) and then goes on to win the \$250,000 record first prize. It was the PBA's first live telecast on ABC-TV since 1997. And also tied for 10th, Randy Pedersen needed a strike to defeat Ernie Schlegel to win the 1995 Touring Players Championship, but his seemingly perfect shot left a stone 8 pin, prompting Schlegel to go into a wild celebration.
- 12) Jack Biondolillo bowled the first nationally televised 300 game in PBA history during the finals of the 1967 Firestone Tournament of Champions, defeating Les Schissler, 300-216, in the second match of the finals and earning a \$10,000 perfect game bonus. Biondolillo then lost to Don Johnson in the semifinal match, 228-172, and Jim Stefanich defeated Johnson, 43-36, in a two-frame roll-off for the title after they tied at 227.
- 13) In 1991, Pete Weber won his third BPAA U.S. Open title at Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis, throwing 10 consecutive strikes after a spare and ending the match with a 10 pin to defeat Mark Thayer, 289- 184. During the trophy presentation, Weber famously hoisted the trophy only to have the ceramic eagle topple to the ground and shatter.
- In 1962, ABC Sports began its "Pro Bowlers Tour" series coverage with the Empire State Open. Hall of Fame broadcaster Chris Schenkel was in the booth for the first broadcast.
- 15) In the spring of 2000, the PBA was purchased by former Microsoft executives Chris Peters, Mike Slade and Rob Glaser. PBA headquarters were later relocated to Seattle after spending the first 42 years in Akron, Ohio.

TOURNAMENT RULES (New late charge in effect; see Rule #1)

- 1. The 20th Annual Reno Junior-Adult Invitational will be held at the National Bowling Stadium, 300 N. Center St., Reno, Nevada 89501, (800) 304-2695. The tournament will be held from July 27 to July 29, 2018, and will be USBC Certified. Deadline for entries is July 10, 2018. Entries received after the deadline will be charged \$5.00 per entry. Entries will be accepted 30 minutes prior to squad time and are subject to squad and division availability. Absolutely no refunds after July 10, 2018. Tournament management reserves the right to use substitutes to fill cancellations. No faxed entries will be accepted. Entries WILL NOT be processed without FULL payment and complete information including average verifications. Tournament directors have the right to refuse any entry.
- 2. <u>ELIGIBILITY</u>: Open to all current <u>USBC</u> members. You MUST show your membership card or proof of membership when checking in. Any bowler not having a USBC Membership Card or proof of USBC Membership must purchase associate membership prior to bowling. Copies of USBC Membership Cards can be printed from bowl.com.
- 3. <u>MULTIPLE PARTICIPATION</u>: Entrants may participate multiple times per event. In order to place more than once in the prize list for position standings at least two players on the team must be different and you must change partners in the doubles event.
- 4. ENTERING AVERAGE: Entrants must use their highest 2017-18 book average. If none, entrants will use their January 1, 2018 average with at least 15 games. If none, entrants must use highest current average of 15 games at the time of entry. Proof of average verification must be provided with paid entry. A standing sheet, which must include a date to verify, signed by their coach or league secretary is proof for verification. If no average verification entrants must use a 225 average for all events. If current season average for at least 21 games at time of bowling exceeds last season's average by 10 or more pins, current season average must be used (Rule 319a-2). Rule 319e (15 or more pin increase in tournament average of 21 or more games in the past 12 months) must be used or bowler will be disqualified.
- It is the bowlers' responsibility to verify the accuracy of his/her average, whether submitted by the bowler, team captain, or others. Failure to use the correct average shall disqualify scores if submitted average is lower than correct average, thereby resulting in a lower classification or more handicap. Prize winnings shall be based on the submitted average, if it is higher than the correct average. Corrections in averages can be made up to the completion of the first game of a series, or within 48 hours after completion of the series if the tournament manager, prior to the completion of the first game of a series, has given written consent to the bowler authorizing such extension of time to correct their average.
- 5. <u>RERATE/ADJUSTMENTS:</u> Tournament director reserves the right to rerate or adjust a bowler's average upward prior to competition. If the bowler does not accept the adjustment a refund will be given. Any adjusted or rerated averages, whether accepted or refused, must be reported. Failure to do so is grounds for disqualification Any entrants, youth or adult, who have qualified for a cash and/or merchandise prize of \$600 or more in any tournament in final standings, brackets, side pots, all events, special/donated prizes in the last 12 months must report their scores, position and amount won to the Tournament Management prior to bowling for possible re-rating. Failure to comply will be cause for forfeiture of entry fees and prize winnings.
- 6. <u>FORMAT</u>: There will be two formats for this tournament. There will be a team event consisting of two Juniors and two Adults bowling a 3 game format. There will also be a doubles event consisting of one Junior and one Adult bowling a 3 game format. An optional Junior Gold event may be offered for the USBC Jr Gold members. The entry fee will depend on the division and will be collected at the tournament site prior to bowling. One in five qualifiers will receive a paid entry (not including travel or expenses) to the national tournament. Bowlers must be a current season Jr. Gold member prior to competition. Membership must be purchased prior to or at the tournament. National tournament qualifiers who are not current Jr. Gold members will be disqualified.
- 7. HANDICAP: Handicap will be 80% of the difference between the team's average and the top of the division (refer to front of entry form for figures).
- **8.** <u>DRESS CODE</u>: Matching and/or professional attire is encouraged. Awards for matching teams will be given "Looking Good" pins. Male participants are asked to wear collared shirts and slacks or dress shorts. Female participants are asked to wear skirts, slacks, skorts or dress shorts and proper shirts. Skirts, shorts and skorts <u>must not</u> be more than 3" above the knee. Attire must be neat, clean and proper fitting. We <u>strongly suggest no jeans</u>, tank tops, hats, or attire advertising liquor or tobacco products, no attire with inappropriate language, or any apparel which the tournament director feels is inappropriate will be permitted. Smoking and/or consuming alcoholic beverages during competition is not permitted.
- 9. <u>CONDUCT</u>: Any conduct deemed inappropriate, foul language, obscene gestures or abuse of equipment may be cause for removal from competition, as determined by the tournament director. Any incident that reflects poorly on the Reno Jr-Adult Invitational, reported to the Tournament Management, whether at the center or otherwise, may result in denial of further participation. Entry fees will not be refunded.
- 10. <u>AWARDS</u>: All prize/award fees will be returned 100% within each event, on a ratio of at least 1 prize for each 10 entries or major fraction thereof. The USBC SMART program will administer all scholarship awards, Acct #9312.
- 11. <u>CHECK IN</u>: Bowlers must check in 1 hour prior to squad time. Tournament spots are on a first-come, first-served basis. **Bowlers failing to check in one half hour** before their scheduled squad time will lose their scheduled spot. All substitutions should be made one hour prior to squad time.
- 12. Additional squads may be added during the course of the tournament as deemed necessary by tournament management, but no squad shall be added after the last advertised squad time. All decisions by the Tournament Director are final unless an appeal is made in accordance with USBC rule 329. All scores are unofficial until otherwise posted. Any questions or concerns must be brought to one of the Co-Tournament Directors. Official protests must be filed, in writing, with one of the Tournament Directors, within 72 hours of the completion of the tournament.



PBA World Series of Bowling X Returns to Its Roots in Detroit

FOX Sports to provide unique television coverage from historic Thunderbowl Lanes arena

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – The Professional Bowlers Association's 10th anniversary World Series of Bowling will return to its roots at historic Thunderbowl Lanes in suburban Detroit, and will include a unique television package with the PBA's new broadcast partner, FOX Sports, PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark announced today.

WSOB X, a multi-event tournament series, will be held March 11-21 as part of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour at the same site that hosted the inaugural World Series in 2009

"The PBA World Series of Bowling has evolved over the past nine years in becoming the world's premier event in professional bowling," Clark said. "The 10th edition will be the most electrifying yet, with multiple PBA titles being won live in prime time on national TV on consecutive nights. None of this growth would have been possible without the shared vision of Thunderbowl Lanes proprietor Tom Strobl and the great bowling fans of Detroit, so it's with great pleasure that the PBA will return to the place of the WSOB's birth in 2019."

WSOB X will include four championship events that were part of the original event: the Cheetah Championship (won in 2009 by Norm Duke), Chameleon Championship (won by Bill O'Neill), Scorpion Championship (won by Mike DeVaney) and the PBA World Championship (won by Tom Smallwood). The finals of those four events will be televised live by FOX Sports in prime time on consecutive nights in March. A fifth event – a special USA vs. The World team match – will be the final event of WSOB X. Details will be announced soon.

Thunderbowl Lanes' unique arena bay, originally built to showcase team bowling in an era just before the PBA's formation in 1958, will be the site of the FOX Sports telecasts, continuing a WSOB tradition that has included events at premier bowling venues including South Point in Las Vegas and the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nev.

Since its formation, the WSOB has become a magnet for both established and rising international bowling stars. Bowlers from 41 different countries have participated over the past nine years.

Because the PBA's new partnership with FOX Sports begins in 2019 and presents an opportunity to televise the entire World Series live, there is no 2018 WSOB. The PBA replaced the World Series on the 2018 schedule with the recently-announced PBA Fall Swing in Tulsa, Okla., in October. The World Series and the PBA Fall Swing will be open to PBA members only. A complete schedule of WSOB X events will be announced soon.

ent is unbelievable. The girls have come back and have gotten so much better from the first year to the second year and all the way through. Every week out here is grueling, the shots are hard and it's really taken everything I have to make it through each round. So, to come out on top, this one's a great feeling."

McEwan didn't record an open frame during her three wins. It's a fact she didn't even notice because she was intently focused on keeping her process the same throughout the stepladder finals. Her mental game has played an important role in her continued development as a player, and it's something she's focused on improving since last season.

"My main keys have been being positive and being patient," McEwan said. "My downward spirals come from when I start to panic and I'm not patient, and it affects my physical game. I saw a lot of that last year. So, this year is about being patient, being positive and trying to keep everything as even-keel as possible."

In McEwan's three previous wins, her mother, Susan Varano, had been present for each victory. With the stepladder finals being held in the host center during the 2018 season, Varano was not in attendance for this championship-round appearance.

This presented a different feeling and vibe for McEwan, who was used to looking up and seeing her mother watching on as a spectator. But, perhaps more than anything, it provided McEwan a different perspective and understanding of just how important her mother is and has been.

"My family is very important to me," McEwan said. "But, with Mother's Day in particular, this is my first win where my mom hasn't been here. It's one of those things you kind of take for granted almost. I don't mean to, but she's just always been here. And, today while bowling, it caught me a couple times and I said, 'wow, she's not here. This is really weird.' I know she was at home glued to the computer and sitting next to my grandmother probably all screaming and crying. It's all good. Happy Mother's Day, mom."

McEwan advanced to the title match after defeating No. 2 seed Rocio Restrepo of Louisville, Ohio, 247-209. Restrepo was looking for her fourth career PWBA Tour title. In the opening match, McEwan defeated local favorite **Missy Parkin** of Laguna Hills, California, 220-202.

Competition this week at the PWBA Fountain Valley Open at Fountain Bowl included two eight-game qualifying blocks on Friday to determine the 32 players for Saturday's Round of 32. An additional eight-game block Saturday morning narrowed the field to 12 players, who bowled six additional games to determine the stepladder finalists.

The 2018 PWBA Tour season continues next week with the first major of the season at the United States Bowling Congress Queens at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada. Qualifying and match-play rounds of PWBA Tour events are broadcast on Xtra Frame, which also will be the livestream home for the stepladder finals of seven standard events. Atom Splitters' anchor Barnes threw three strikes to force Matt Sanders to match the effort to force a roll-off. Sanders ran the Hitmen's string of strikes five, but on his final ball in the 10th frame, Sanders left a 9 pin and Silver Lake claimed a 216-215 decision.

With match one secured, and Philadelphia running into spare-shooting difficulties, Silver Lake easily won game three, 202-163. The Atom Splitters completed the sweep by throwing the first six strikes in game four, winning again, 246-192.

'We went undefeated, but on every shot, you do the math in your head and take it one shot at a time," Silver Lake manager Mark Baker said. "My guys really bowled well. Really well. We played the lanes a little differently than everyone else, and our shot wasn't going away. Jesper was Jesper. Dick Allen bowls great in this place. Daugherty, except for the solid 8, struck on about every ball. Putting Chris (Barnes) last relaxed (Dick) and I think that was the big difference.

"This is so much fun," Baker continued. "It's hard to explain to anyone who has never been here what the atmosphere is like. The first shot thrown (in the final round) gave me goosebumps. I don't bowl any more. It wasn't even my team, but that's how electrifying it is here."

While the entire Atom Splitters team bowled well, the decision to award the Mark Roth PBA League Most Valuable Player Award came down to Chris Barnes' threestrike, 10th frame performance in game two of the Elias Cup finals. Barnes also won the inaugural Roth MVP award in 2014, making him the first two-time winner.

"That's pretty cool, but I look at it as more of a team thing," Barnes said. "We all struck a lot. We only had a couple of close games. I struck out to win one. It was a big one to win, but if it hadn't been for a stone 8 (by Daugherty), we wouldn't have been in a position where I needed to do that.

"Our guys were really clicking for the most part. We never had more than one person in between strikes and even then, we were all lined up," he added. "(Philadelphia) just couldn't get all of its guys going at the same time, and that's always the issue here."

At the conclusion of the event, PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark announced the PBA League will return to Bayside Bowl in 2019 as part of the PBA's new television package with FOX Sports. Details will be announced later.

"I used three different balls and just rotated them in and out depending on what I felt I needed to get the reaction I wanted," said Haugen, a five-time PBA Tour winner. "It's all about knowing what's in your (bowling) bag and choosing the right ball for the right situation."

Haugen, the No. 3 qualifier for the finals, started each match he bowled with at least four strikes. He beat No. 4 qualifier Marty Berke of Allentown, Pa., who was making his first finals appearance, 224-170, in the second match and then went on to beat three-time PBA50 Tour winner and No. 2 qualifier Bob Learn Jr. of Erie, Pa., in the semifinal match, 244-194, to advance to the championship match against Williams.

"Whenever you can get off to a good start with early strings it's going to put the pressure on your opponent," Haugen added. "Fortunately, I was able to make the right decisions and didn't waste those good starts."

For Williams, who was trying for his 12th PBA50 Tour title, it was his second runner-up finish of the season after finishing second in the PBA50 Lucas/Magazine Classic to open the season. He also finished fifth in the PBA50 National Championship.

In the opening stepladder match, Berke, who turned 60 on Monday, defeated five-time PBA Tour winner Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, N.Y., 237-188, whose fifth-place finish was his first PBA50 Tour finals appearance.

The fourth tournament of the season was named after PBA legend and Vietnam War veteran Johnny Petraglia who is a 14-time PBA Tour and eight-time PBA50 Tour winner. The BVL fund provides recreational and therapeutic programs and services to military veterans.

The PBA50 Tour will take a three-week break before returning with the PBA50 Northern California Classic presented by MOTIV May 27-30 at Harvest Park Bowl in Brentwood, Calif.

STEVE SMITH-CITRUS BELT MASTERS CHAMPION The Wonder and

VICTORVILLE – Steve Smith is the 2018 Citrus Belt USBC Association (KELLY C.) Masters Champion. Steve outperformed a strong field of scratch bowlers, on a difficult oil pattern, proving himself to be one of the top bowlers in CALIFORNIA.

This season's Masters Tournament was one of the best in years. It featured one of the strongest fields in memory and was competed on probably the most difficult oil pattern used to

date. There were many exciting matches, with surprises and sudden turn arounds galore. MATCHES WON AFTER APPARENTLY BEING LOST AND MATCHES LOST AFTER SEEMINGLY BEING WON.

Most matches were close with some decided as late as the TWENTIETH FRAME!!! Each match was decided by total pin fall for two games, i.e. 20 frames. As is customary, the tournament finals was contested as a double elimination affair with the champion being the only bowler who didn't lose two matches. No competitor was undefeated this year but our champion was the only bowler who didn't lose twice. It took thirty-one matches to crown Steve Smith our champion.

DARRON PETERS was the top qualifier, averaging 231. During match play defending champion KEVIN GAGNON was the high scorer with a 240 average. Kevin had the high match play score of the finals 579 (300 - 279). Perfect 300 games were rolled by Gagnon and MARK DYER.

There were many twists and turns during match play. Unexpected open frames in the twentieth frame decided some matches. In other matches the bowler striking out would win after just a few strikes early in the game. Some matches were high scoring while others low. Through it all the bowlers demonstrated a great amount of constraint, sportsmanship and professionalism.

After winning his first four matches, including a big fifty pin win over Steve Smith, it appeared that MICHAEL DURAN had the tournament won. Coming out of the winners bracket he needed only one more win to claim the title. Mike looked unbeatable to me and he himself spoke of winning one more match and the title. On the flip side the bowler coming out of the loser's bracket (Smith) would have to defeat Mike twice. Everyone thought Duran had it in the bag.

The hand of fate can be fickle. It is said that the battle of Hastings was won when a falling acorn distracted King Edward at an inopportune time. William won that battle and became a conqueror and a king. But for a falling acorn. Fate.

We are taught that Newton discovered gravity because an apple fell from the tree he was sitting under. Fate? Destiny? Are some of us destined to win while others are destined to lose? Can we alter our fate?

Well, Michael Duran was determined to win and went on the offensive right out of the gate. He rolled one big hook ball after another. But it wasn't to be. The more Mike hooked it the more things went bad. Split after split. The harder Mike rolled his ball the more the corner pins stood. There was nothing Mike could do to stem the tide of defeat. The hand of fate seemed poised against him and no adjustment would alter the outcome. Smith defeated Duran two consecutive matches and won the title.

Taking a closer look at the circumstances surrounding those matches and the "talking heads" would probably say that it wasn't fate at all that Smith won. They would say that Smith won because he was better able to adjust to the adverse conditions confronting the bowlers that day. At the low end of the house, where the final matches were contested, the lanes were "bone dry". Duran's game is inside, channel to channel. Give Duran oil and he can beat any bowler in the world. Put him on dry and he is like Samson shaved. Samson sheared. Those "bone dry" lanes were Duran's doom. Those "bone dry" lanes were Duran's Delilah. Was it fate that the final matches were on dry lanes and cost Duran the title or were the "talking heads" right saying that Smith seized the moment and was the better bowler that day?

Something more about Steve Smith. In addition to his superior bowling talents Steve is a great person. He is a gentleman in every sense of the word. He handles adversity extremely well, no excuses, no complaints and no theatrics. He goes about his bowling business in a calm workmanlike manner while having a knack for winning. Steve Smith is a true professional.

Steve Smith is an outstanding addition to the list of previous Citrus Belt Masters Champions. That list includes such CALIFORNIA bowling greats as: BOBBY CAMPAGNALE, MIKE DE VANEY, EDDIE VAN DANIKER, MIKE RICK, DAVE WODKA and VINCE WOOD to name a few. This list includes four PBA champions, including two National PBA Champions, a "900 Bowler" and a bowler who had a streak of 123 consecutive strikes during "ACTION PLAY".

The Wonder and Magic of Bowling



There was Blake Griffin on ESPN unloading a shot at breakneck speed straight at the pocket in the Chris Paul PBA Celebrity Invitational

The pins were no match for the power of the fearsome Griffin, collapsing in trepidation at his wellplaced projectile.

The 6-foot-10 Griffin may have looked a bit awkward on his approach and release but the X on the scorecard made no differentiation between his strike and those that followed and those of Chris Paul's, a high-average bowler with polished form.

Such is the wonder of bowling.

One doesn't have to showcase the skill of Jason Belmonte or the accuracy of Walter Ray Williams Jr. to enjoy the game and put up respectable scores.

Hurl a ball at pins and who knows what will happen? Even a shot that misses the head pin can produce a domino effect that results in a strike. League bowlers experience that serendipity all the time.

It's a scene that's played out over and over throughout America – and it's what makes bowling so alluring.

For this reporter, it's extremely satisfying to watch players who aren't professional carve out their niche for a day – and be proud of it. And is usually the case, these bowlers do it without a whit of practice time.

And speaking of Blake Griffin, remember how he used to perform amazing high-wire feats with the Los Angeles Clippers? And remember when Chris Paul used to showcase his playmaking and shot-making tricks with the same Clippers.

In the past year, Griffin was traded to the Detroit Pistons and Paul was dealt to the resurgent Houston Rockets. But the two combined efforts again – this time for the Chris Paul charity event in Houston and that says something about the magic of bowling.

If there were any hint of acrimony between the two as members of the Clippers, that feeling was washed aside for the common good.

Griffin might not be a match for Paul as a bowler, but that makes no difference when one desires just to rattle the pins. Griffin can turn into Belmonte at any time with appropriate pin action.

And that goes for any regular Joe who is out to chuck a bowling ball for a couple of hours.

That's a feeling we all can share – whether we bowl like Belmonte or Walter Ray. Just give us the ball and we can hope the pins oblige if we make a decent throw. Who knows if a great performance is in the offing?

One never knows if the magic of bowling will strike and result in a memorable night.



Scores were all over as teams battled with just one week to go to determine a round winner, and two weeks to go to pile up wins for the final wildcard spot. Next week will crown the 5th ll-off team and week 8 will see who they battle in the first match of the roll-offs.

In the 'A' match, Forest Lanes took a three-game round lead into the match vs. Herzog Insurance. Herzog came out strong to take game one but dropped a nail-biter in game two and a tough 4-pin loss in game three to win one game and totals for a 3-2 result. Forest holds a two-game lead over two teams including Herzog going into the final week of round-champion play. Forest also holds a 3-game lead over Herzog for the overall wildcard spot with two weeks to go in that match. Jon Diso was again strong for Forest with a 601 set while Gary Duran paced Herzog with a 597 set.

In the 'B' match, Linder's Insurance and Tito's Handmade
