'Mr. Bill' Officially is World's Oldest League Bowler

USBC honors Bill Hargrove, 106, as his Atlanta area summer league season gets underway

DECATUR, Ga.—It was 9 a.m. and Suburban Lanes outside Atlanta was virtually empty except for owner Tom Walker, some of his staff and a group of television and newspaper reporters, camera operators and photographers. All were there waiting for the day's star to arrive.

One remarked it was like waiting for the President of the United States.

About 40 minutes later, a diminutive white-haired man walked through the side door and the place began jumping. Taking a seat in the settee area behind lanes 1 and 2, Bill Hargrove quickly became engulfed by the media as well as a gathering crowd of fans who had come to watch him bowl.

Hargrove should be used to such attention, considering he has been the nation's oldest active league bowler for a few years now. And the Clermont, Ga., resident got a taste of things to come exactly a week earlier when his old friend Walker threw him a birthday party on the day he turned 106.

But this was even more special. On this Wednesday, Hargrove officially became the world's oldest league bowler in history, breaking a record he shared with the late John Venturello of Sunrise, Fla., who stopped bowling in 1993 and died just days before turning 106 in 1994. The United States Bowling Congress honored Hargrove with a plaque presented by Greater Atlanta USBC Association Manager Joe Spain Jr.

"On behalf of the United States Bowling Congress and bowlers of all ages, we present you with this special plaque," Spain said. Friends, family and Club 55 Senior League members alike gave Hargrove an ovation as they prepared to start their 2007 summer session.

Occupied with so many well-wishers, someone usually had to remind him when it was his turn. But each time, he followed the same routine:

Grab his eight-pound ball, walk to about two feet behind the foul line, slightly rock the ball back and forth three times, take two steps and release. A case of macular degeneration developed in the past two years prevents him from seeing the pins, so teammate Hubert Davis or others tell him what's remaining and his instincts from more than eight decades of bowling take over.

"It's unbelievable that I've made it this long," Hargrove said. "I never gave it any real thought. Somebody higher is helping me. I love challenges. I will keep

going until it gets embarrassing. I'm not as accurate as I used to be. My ability is on the edge but I'm not embarrassed yet. But whatever I do, I'm the only one who can do it."

Hargrove left a 7 pin on his first shot and missed the spare. His first mark - a strike - came in the eighth frame. He finished with a 90, just below the 97 average he carried in one of his two winter leagues that ended in April. He followed with games of 104 and 84.

"All I wanted to do today is shoot my average," he said.

He also averaged 90 in a league bearing his name at Yonah Lanes in Cleveland, much closer to the 28-acre farm he shares with his daughter Sandra Carnet, her husband and two children about 90 minutes northeast of Atlanta. He's lived with them since his wife died in 1973.

Born and raised in Eatonton, a small town south of Atlanta, Hargrove moved to the Georgia capital in 1924. A trumpet player since age 10, he followed his musician brothers to the big city to pursue their dreams.

While music never became his life, playing in big bands in dance halls did help him supplement the income he received from 41 years with Gulf Oil Corp. It also helped bring him in contact with bowling.

"I never knew anything about bowling until I came to Atlanta," he said. "There was a duckpin place called Blick's Bowling Center that had 102 lanes. Someone invited us to bowl, I got hooked on it, loved it and from the beginning stayed with it. Bowling has been a big part of my life."

For more than four decades, Hargrove bowled exclusively duckpins and was president of the National Duckpin Bowling Congress in the late 1960s. But when the final duckpin facility in Atlanta closed in 1970, he switched to tenpin bowling.

"I refused to give up bowling," he said. "But I had never tried tenpin bowling before that."

He also refuses to give up on life. He didn't stop driving a car around Clermont until shortly after turning 100.

Besides riding with Davis to Atlanta for bowling each Wednesday, they make a similar trip every Sunday to attend Grace United Methodist Church where Hargrove continues to lead the congregation's ushers and greeters. The church honored him for his service May 6 by dedicating a stained glass window with his name on it.

CSTV Airdates Set For 2007 USBC Intercollegiate Team Championships

Women's title match to air on June 6, followed by men's title match on June 13

GREENDALE, Wis. — For the fourth consecutive year, CSTV will showcase the pinnacle event of the college bowling season — the 2007 United States Bowling Congress Intercollegiate Team Championships — by airing the women's and men's national championship matches in early June.

The women's national championship between perennial power Wichita State and upstart McKendree will air Wednesday, June 6, at 8 p.m. EDT. One week later, Saginaw Valley State defends its national title against Robert Morris in the men's national championship Wednesday, June 13, at 8 p.m. EDT.

The USBC Intercollegiate Team Championships is the pinnacle event of the college bowling season. The event brings together the top 16 men's and top 16 women's teams in the country to compete for national titles on national television.

CSTV's broadcast team for the championships include analyst Sean Rash, a three-time titlist on the Denny's PBA Tour and a former collegiate All-American, and play-by-play voice Mike Jakubowski.

The telecasts, emanating from Northrock Lanes in Wichita, Kan., will feature comprehensive coverage of the championship matches, including features on premier collegiate bowlers and interviews with All-

Team USA Sweeps Masters Medals to Close Men's American Zone Championships

Page's gold, Janawicz's silver and O'Sullivan's bronze cap off historic week

GUATEMALA CITY - Rhino Page of Fresno, Calif., cruised to the Masters gold medal while teammates John Janawicz of Winter Haven, Fla., took silver and David O'Sullivan of Orlando, Fla., claimed bronze Friday, capping off a historic week for Team USA at the Men's American Zone Championships.

The United States became the first country in American Zone Championships history in its current format to sweep the six gold medals in the men's or women's division.

"I don't think there is any way we could've expected this," said Page, who took Masters silver at the 2005 American Zone Championships and Masters bronze at the Men's World

Championships last year. "The rookies stepped up to a level I've never seen. We got along really well and worked really well together."

In the best-of-three gold medal match, Page defeated Janawicz, 2-0, powered behind a thrilling 258-256 victory in Game 1 that saw Janawicz force Page to deliver two strikes and nine pins in the 10th frame to win. It was the third medal of the tournament for Page, who also won team gold and all-events bronze.

Strikes were plentiful Friday at Metro Bowl for Page, who defeated Guatemala's Andres Herrera 2-0 in the semifinals in front of a partisan crowd by striking in six of the first seven frames in the first game and in the first six of the second game.

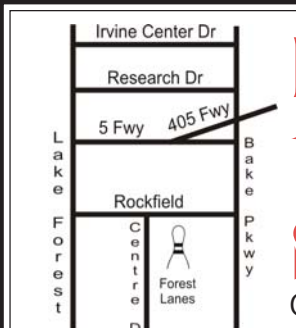
"We bowled on the patterns all week and sometimes it takes a while to get dialed in," said Page, who also claimed a dramatic 685-630 victory over Canada's Jean-Sebastian Lessard in the three games, total pins format of the quarterfinals by closing with a 279 after entering the final game trailing by 30. Celiz Rolls His First-Ever 300 at Victor Bowl

VICTORVILLE—Ramon Celiz said he felt so nervous that even his elbows were shaking as he picked up his ball to bowl the 10th frame. Still, the 58-year-old managed to stay steady enough to roll three more strikes - 12 in all - at Victor Bowl on May 24 to complete his first 300 game.

"I couldn't look at all the people around me," said Celiz, an Apple Valley resident who rolled the perfect game dur the Laughlin Seniors League. "during the 10th frame the nerves were unbelievable."

Celiz, who has been bowling since high school, came close to bowling perfection about four years ago at a lane in Torrance. He rolled nine straight strikes, he said, before missing in the 10th and finishing with a 281. "I definitely felt the pressure this time," said Celiz, who bowls to help relieve stress and keep active. But he remained cool.

"After the first ball of the 10th frame, I thought, 'This is it,'" Celiz said. His 11th strike hit the pocket and Celiz held his breath on the final roll as the ball crossed in front of the headpin. "I was thinking I might go home empty-handed again," said Celiz, who breathed a sigh of relief after the Brooklyn hit sealed the perfect game. All action around Celiz stopped before he rolled his final strike. When the final pin fell, Celiz received a loud ovation.

Victor Bowl awarded Celiz a trip to Las Vegas and \$500 to spend while there, he said.

Celiz, who bowls in two leagues, will receive a ring from the United States Bowling Congress to commemorate his achievement.

PBA EXPERIENCE LEAGUE

LAKEWOOD — The Cal Bowl PBA Experience League, 26 teams of three bowling Friday's at 7:00 p.m.

Week four of the league will change lane conditions to the Cheetah pattern. The first three weeks bowlers enjoyed (well, some of the bowlers anyway) rolling on the PBA Shark pattern. I believe the Shark is the toughest lane pattern of the five different PBA conditions. The league bowls three weeks on each pattern and will experience all five different shots (Shark, Cheetah, Viper, Chameleon and Scorpion).

After week three, the high average was Elijah Smith for the men averaging 190. Pam Pancoast holds high average for the ladies also with 190. League high series is currently held by Nicholas Goodwin rolling a 641. Pam Pancoast rolls a close second with a 639. High game standouts are Elijah Smith 275, Paul Reynolds 266, Pam Pancoast 255, Ronnie Cordero 253.

Elijah Smith and Nicholas Goodwin will both receive \$78 for rolling the highest scratch game and series on the first pattern. The league pays an additional \$78 to the bowlers who roll the highest game and series on each pattern.

Manager Gary Kowarsch expects the scores to increase during the three week Cheetah pattern. I started with the Shark, explains Gary. I wanted the bowlers to really test their skills in the opening round. Now it's time to give them a break and let them open up and have some fun. The Cheetah is one of the higher scoring patterns but you still have to make the shot. I do expect to have much higher scores during this round.

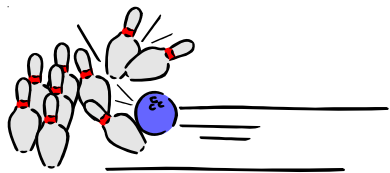

National Deaf Bowling News

**71st Annual GLDBA Results at Milwaukee April 20-22
Four Honor Scores & Detroit Team Breaks Own Team Record**

MILWAUKEE—With thanks to Mike Jasko for the results of his Great Lakes Deaf Bowling Association tournament held at AMF West Allis Lanes with Greater Milwaukee Association of the Deaf as the host. Although the entries included two teams from Southern California, there was a 45 years low of 62 entries.

As previously told in my GLDBA's Herman Cahen Masters won by Kevin Moran over Carl Malucci story, two 300 were bowled on Friday April 20 during the tournament, one by Kevin Moran and other by Ron Zuchegno, Jr. both from Rochester, NY. Jasko said, two more honor scores were bowled, making a record total of 4 for the week-end, a 299 by Mike Robinson, Columbus, OH in doubles event and a 298 by Kevin O'Donnell, New York in team event.

ALWAYS POCKET 1ST & 3RD BLASTS 3348 FOR NEW DEAF TEAM RECORD

A team from Detroit with odd team name, Always Pocket 1st & 3rd topped all teams with new all time deaf record 3348 total breaking their own Fast & Furious' old record 3334 made just two years ago. In the new record Dennis Thompson had 669, Gerald Trayner 714 (236-243-235) Ethan Sachs 653, Paul Trayner 580 and Nicholas LoGreco 732 (269-236-227) and the team scored games of 1146-1113-1089 for 3348 to win the top scratch total prize of \$650.00.

Always Pocket 1st & 3rd were aiming for the bigger prize as their 3348 plus handicap of 129 gave them 3477 total won the first place prize of \$3,500.00. In 2nd place was the Secret Weapon II team composed of bowlers from Maryland, New York and Indiana which had 3284 scratch for \$400.00 and 3305 with handicap for \$1,750.00. Extreme Bowling Supply team composed of bowlers from Arkansas, California and Illinois scored scratch 2960 for 3rd place \$200 and 3179 with handicap for \$900.00. The scratch team prizes ran down to 8 places and handicap down to 16.

Curious about the team name, Jasko explained, all 5 bowlers are right-handed, so "always pocket #1 pin and #3 pin".

MORAN-MORRIS DUO TAKES DOUBLES TITLES WITH 1404

Cahen Masters champion Kevin Moran, Rochester rolled 722 and partner James Morris, Maryland 682 for 1404 total to win the scratch doubles title for the second time. They previously won back in 2001 with 1425 and this time their 1404 was low enough to win both scratch \$260.00 and handicap \$1,400.00 prizes.

Californians Mark Fisser (691) and Carl Malucci (665) scored 1356 scratch for 2nd \$180.00 but with zero handicap they were 4th for \$300. Mike Robinson who rolled a 300 game in this event with his partner T. Henne, Columbus combined for 1363 with handicap to place 2nd for \$700.00. Thaine Maelzer, Kansas and Charles Stringer, Alabama had 1360 with handicap for 3rd place \$400.

Scratch 3rd place went to West Virginia J. Claucherty and Akron's Josh Phelps' 1282 total for \$130.00. The actual score prize ran down to 8 places while the handicap ran to 38 places.

WHITTINGTON WINS BOTH SINGLES TITLES

A newcomer from Detroit, Brian Whittington scored 738 to top

all 300 bowlers in singles event for the scratch \$130.00 prize. Then with his 54 handicap his 792 total got him the main prize of \$700.00. Ron Rood, Jr. Rochester rolled 704 scratch for 2nd prize \$100 but places 8th in handicap for \$130. Thomas Cramer, Rochester rolled 690 scratch for 3rd \$75.00 but placed 13th in handicap for \$100.

Les Roberts from Jacksonville had 725 with handicap to place 2nd for \$350.00 and Ron Arrgo, New Jersey with 712 handicap total placed 3rd for \$250. The scratch prize list for singles ran to 8 places and the handicap to 70 places.

MORRIS 2046 TAKES SCRATCH & CLAUCHERTY WINS HANDICAP 2082 ALL-EVENTS

Although there were 4 honor scores and record team score, the wood lanes at AMF West Allis were challenging to the bowlers according to low scratch all events scores.

James Morris, Maryland rolled 709 in team event, 682 in doubles and 655 in singles for 2046 all-events total to place first in scratch for \$70.00. James Claucherty from West Virginia had 1920 scratch all-events (6th place \$16.00) and with his 162 handicap he placed first with 2082 for \$300.00. Morris' 2046 was good for 2nd place \$175.00 and Richard Anderson, Cleveland took 3rd place \$125 with his 2022 handicap total.

Kevin Moran's 2020 scratch placed 2nd for \$55.00 and Carl Malucci's 1990 scratch placed 3rd for \$40 as the scratch prizes ran down to 8 places while the handicap all-events ran down to 28 places.

Next year's GLDBA tournament will be held in Columbus, Ohio in April 2008. Yes, for three years in the state of Ohio, 2008 in Columbus, 2009 in Cleveland and 2010 in Toledo.

Women's U.S. Open Women's PBA Tour Trials

RENO—The Women's U.S. Open, presented by the USBC, will be conducted at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno. The prestigious tournament, beginning August 12-18, will be taped for television on ESPN. The Women's U.S. Open will coincide with the PBA Women's Tour Trials, which will award 16 exemptions for the 2007-08 PBA Women's series to be held in conjunction with the 2007-08 Denny's PBA Tour season.

The Women's U.S. Open is the property of the Bowling Proprietors of America. However, the BPAA has licensed it to the United States Bowling Congress for three years (for \$1). Second, they will work with the USBC to have trials in various centers and states around the country. Nonetheless, the USBC will be in charge of rules and production.

To become eligible for one of the 16 exemptions, women will pay an additional \$750 entry fee into the U.S. Women's Open. The event features four days of qualifying, after which the field will be cut to the top 16 for match play, who will each be placed in one of four brackets. The four players in each bracket will appear on one of four-ESPN televised shows. The four winners of those shows will then advance to the ESPN-televised championship round.

The top 16 women who have paid the additional Women's Tour Trials fee will earn exemptions for the 2007-08 PBA Women's Series. All 16 women must become PBA members prior to the start of the Denny's PBA Tour season to be able to compete.

Those 16 women will then participate in four PBA Women's Series events, which will be held in conjunction with four Denny's PBA Tour events throughout the 2007-08 season. The championship match for all four PBA Women's Series events will be televised as part of the ESPN telecasts for the four Denny's PBA Tour events in which women's events will run concurrently.

All four events are scheduled to take place in the first half of the 2007-08 season. The winner of each event will earn \$10,000, with all 16 participants earning a minimum of \$1800 each week.

The U.S. Women's Open starts will start with a practice session on Sunday, August 12, followed by four days of qualifying on a different PBA Experience oil pattern. The players will bowl eight games a day, with the top 16 after 32 games advancing to the bracket match play.

The winner of each event will earn \$10,000 with all 16 participants earning a minimum of \$1,800 each week.

The final 16 will be divided into four brackets, with the preliminary rounds being taped for later airing in November and December on ESPN. The final four bowlers will return to the National Bowling Stadium on Sunday, October 14 for the live ESPN televised championship round.

Although this does insure the return of a ladies professional bowling tour, it is a positive step in the right direction for America's women bowlers. Additionally, it demonstrates the unity, harmony, and cooperation that currently exists between the principal forces of the game, namely: the bowling proprietors, (BPAA) the governing body (USBC), the Professional Bowler's Association, and the bowling manufacturers.

I believe the Women's U.S. Open tournament will draw a record, or near-record entry for several reasons. Practically all the bowling tournaments that have been conducted in Reno or Las Vegas, be they amateur or professional, usually attract record numbers.

Las Vegas, with its myriad of plush hotels, casinos, and entertainment, conceivably leads the nation in conventions. It DEFINITELY leads the nation in bowling tournaments, thanks to the plentitude of state-of-the-art bowling centers.

On the other hand, Reno possesses the most renown, the most

celebrated and the most distinguished bowling establishment in the world...The National Bowling Stadium; a one-of-a-kind colossus that is the envy of the bowling world. It features 80 state-of-the-art lanes with gigantic scoreboards and seating galore. It is located in the heart of the casino district and was erected principally for ABC and WIBC tournaments. It is not available for open bowling but books numerous national bowling events. The pro shop features a regular bowling lane, complete with every conceivable bowling /training vehicle. This pro shop probably stocks the largest display of bowling merchandise of any bowling establishment ANYWHERE.

The National Bowling Stadium has set record entries for both USBC men's and women's bowling tournaments. Realizing the incredible drawing power of the bowling community, the city of Reno has a long-standing contract with the USBC. In addition to this, the three major hotels/casinos surrounding the National Bowling stadium, the Eldorado, the Silver Legacy, and the Circus-Circus hotel/casinos make generous contributions to tournament promoters who hold their events in the world-famous arena.

The National Bowling Stadium is undoubtedly the most preferable and desirable environment of all bowlers, here in America, as well as the rest of the bowling world.

Consequently, I wouldn't venture to guess the number of ladies who would pay the added \$750 to qualify for the Denny's PBA Tour Trials being held in conjunction with the U.S. Open. However, one thing is sure; with 16 spots available for qualification, any woman who seeks to further her career bowling professionally will never have a better opportunity than in the 2007 Women's U.S. Open.

The question is: what path will the most successful amateur female bowler on earth, Deandra Asbaty, follow?

At any rate, it wouldn't surprise me if the 2007 Women's U.S. Open set a new record for American, as well as foreign entries.

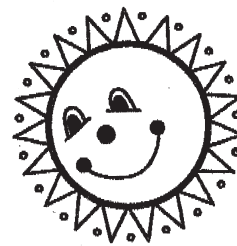

Reruns Aren't Just For TV Anymore

Some of the e-mails I receive deal with subjects I have covered in past issues which you missed and are no longer available. Therefore, here are some quick versions of some of the lesson material covered in those issues. After all, what better way to be of help than to address your needs as you yourself identify them? So here we'll do "machine gun" versions of what you consider important.

"Solid" at the Line

In one such article we discussed the importance of balance at the line. Here's a quick recap of the three important parts to this:

1), *slant* your last step inward, *leading with the heel*, so that heel ends up *in front of the other foot!* (You long sliders can use your slide to accomplish this.) That gets the foot directly under your body's center of balance. *This helps eliminate "falling off the ball"*, (that sideways loss of balance created by ball's gravity at the moment of release).

2), keeping your back foot on the floor (heel 'collapsed' outward and downward) so your back shoe sort of rides on the outer edge of it's sole. To avoid turning your body out of position during the release, don't let your back leg swing past 7 o'clock behind you (left handers, 5 o'clock).

3), keep all your weight over the *middle (arch) of the front foot!* That'll improve balance enough so that consistency (and scores) should definitely improve!

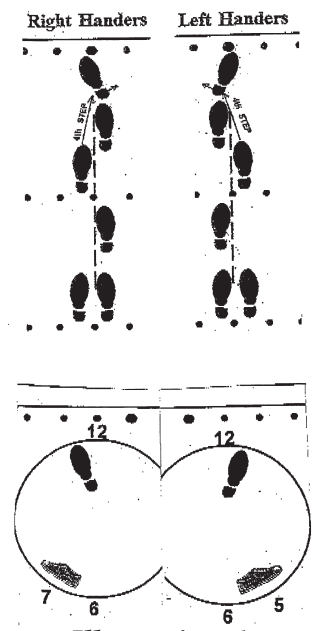

Killing the "Chicken"

Another discussion covered a technique for eliminating chicken winging. While this is simple, it may not be easy at first, so it'll take practice. Watch the pros on TV and you'll see the modern follow through, which is ended at only about shoulder height, with the arm as straight as possible...*virtually no elbow bend whatsoever!* It's much easier to keep your arm straight when eliminating that old, outmoded "reach for the sky" finish.

One reason for this change is that when you bend the elbow, the forearm wants to move inward across the body, rather than toward your intended line. Result? A pulled shot.

That leads to the second technique, referred to as a "fan". Done only at the very *finish* of the follow through, this is a small "flicking" or "snapping" twist of the wrist to the *right* (left for left handers). When done just enough to turn the thumb *very slightly outward, away from the body* (like from 12 to 1 o'clock, for example; or 12 to 11 for left handers) it is like hitch-hiking on the highway.

This tiny, easy to learn hitch hiking wrist action, when properly done, *virtually eliminates overturning (topping) the ball and, more important, makes chicken winging a thing of the past!*

Avoiding the "Late Adjustment" Disease

This is a worse plague than many bowlers realize! It's a problem that actually afflicts huge numbers of bowlers, *including some professionals*, yet is ridiculously easy to fix. That fix cures what I call the "I finally found my line halfway through the *last game*" disease. Ask yourself whose fault it is when that happens to you? Is it the lane condition? Are lanes breaking down too fast? The ball? Sticky approaches? Too much noise? What do you think? *Is there even the slightest chance you couldn't find your line because maybe you didn't adjust soon enough, far enough or often enough?* Well, the point that may be hard to swallow is this truism... *if you found your line later, you could have found it sooner!*

Think about it...can you remember even a *single time* in your bowling life when you ruined a game by adjusting too soon...or too often? Virtually never, you'll have to agree. The truth is that the vast majority of bowlers wait too long to adjust, don't adjust far enough or often enough!

O.K...if you ask yourself *why* it takes so long before you make an adjustment, your honest answer has to be, "*Because I'm so close; If I adjust wrong or too soon, I might blow the frame.*" That's it...**fear!** Once you've admitted that, you're on the road to recovery, since the answer is embarrassingly simple, and it's one of my slogans: "**YOU'LL NEVER FIND YOUR LINE SOONER BY ADJUSTING LATER!**"

Another adjustment monster is, adjusting too little at a time, for the same reason; **fear!** Fear of adjusting too far and wasting a shot. So O.K., another slogan: "**OVERADJUST AND RISK THE FRAME; UNDERADJUST AND LOSE THE GAME!**" The bottom line is: *Would you rather over adjust a bit and risk coming in a bit light, or under adjust and risk a split?* After all, as the article says, if you adjust a bit too far, at least you've found it out *now* rather than after blowing the game with splits, etc. So what if you've adjusted a bit too far. Once the lanes have started to break down, they won't stop, so over-adjusting is your best answer!

The last slogan is: "**YOU CAN'T BE SURE OF YOUR LIMIT UNTIL YOU'VE GONE PAST IT!**"

The idea is to *deliberately* adjust sooner and/or farther than you think necessary...to make a **personal policy** of overdoing it, *because it's the best way to get your answers early, rather than after you've lost!* You'll win many a game against better bowlers because of your willingness to challenge...to risk any adjustment necessary in favor of your ultimate win!

One last comment on this subject: "Adjustment" means more than just changing your line. It includes changes in speed, equipment, release position, break point changes as the lanes change, matching revs to ball speed, etc. You have to have the courage to make experimental decisions **NOW!** Not 3 or 4 frames down the road when it'll probably be too late!

Remember...Moses did not come down with an 11th commandment tablet saying, "*Thou shalt wait to adjust and then adjust only once!*"! (See illustration 2 for what that tablet correctly might have said.

The "Blind" Last Step

In the article, "Accuracy and Trust", one of several points we discussed was how accuracy can be improved by enhancing the *feel* of correct execution. Briefly closing the eyes on your last step, during the release and follow through, removes the sense of sight for that second or so. It

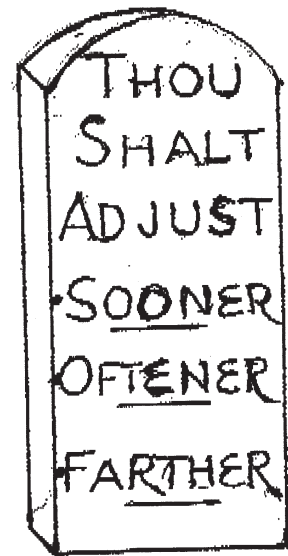

The Procedure

-Begin your normal approach, watching your mark, as usual;

-During the last step of your approach, close your eyes and complete the step (including your slide, if any);

-Complete your release, eyes still closed;

-At the *end* of the follow through, open your eyes immediately.

It will usually take a few shots to familiarize yourself with this close/open eyes tactic, but once you develop it you'll notice you'll be able to see whether you hit your mark after each shot! Stick to this, even if you miss your target at first. Let some shots go astray until you get used to it. After some practice, you'll be surprised at just how accurate you can become without seeing your target during the release! Keep your head still while eyes are closing and opening, so that you'll still be looking at your mark after they open!

Since the "motor" memory is trained and enhanced through such practice, many bowlers find that that once they're used to it, this "blind last step" technique does more than just increase overall accuracy. It also;

-Provides an unusually well developed sense of feel during normal bowling;

-An incredible ability to not only trust your line, but your form as well;

-Improvement in consistency;

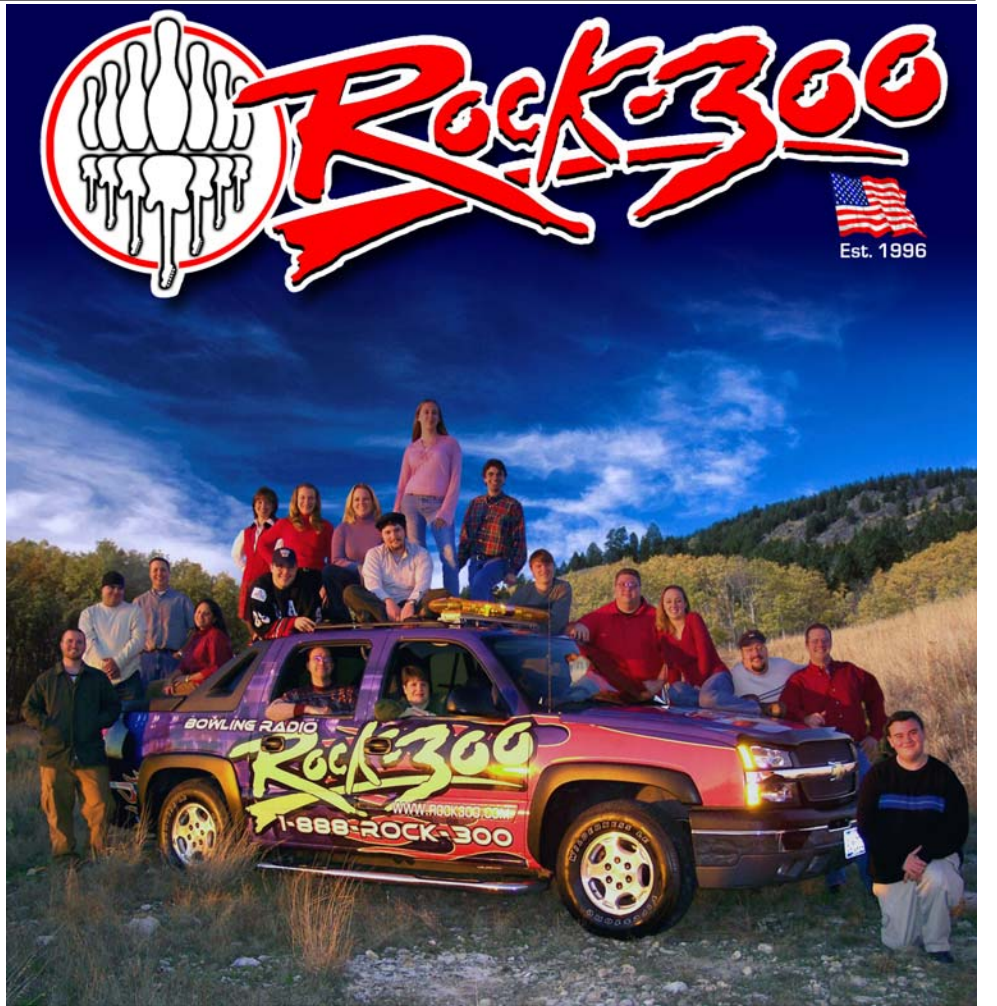
-A real sense of joy in your ability to trust yourself.

It's not at all unusual for bowlers who have developed this "Blind last step" technique to rely on it and use it during actual league or tournament play. When one of those occasional lapses occurs, they'll throw two or three blind shots. This brings them right back to that automatic execution through trust. In addition to the above advantages, it also helps you avoid over-thinking your shots. That's a big plus all by itself!

leaves you with nothing but feel. This enforces the principle of using muscle memory alone. It obviously requires reasonably correct execution, so it won't work for a beginner. But a proper pushaway toward the target, maintaining bowling shoulder alignment during the approach and a free armswing will normally be enough to make this work...and besides enhancing your motor training, it's fun!

Developing "trust" by performing your release and follow through with your eyes closed, isn't really all that hard. This is a fun game to play, by the way, because once you have developed this tactic you'll no doubt attach a lot more importance to that word "trust".

My reason for writing the original article about this was the shocking discovery that according to CATS machine statistics, the accuracy quotient of 220 and above average bowlers was no better than 3 1/2 inches at the arrows. So today's best bowlers can't put their shots closer than that to their target. During the days of the great bowlers of the '70s and '80s, no top player would've been successful without being more accurate than that.







USBC Adopts Lane Hardness Specification

GREENDALE, Wis.—The United States Bowling Congress has added a new specification relating to the hardness of a synthetic lane surface.

All new synthetic surfaces submitted to USBC for testing and approval must meet a minimum Sward Hardness reading of 35. All samples not meeting a minimum average of 45 will require additional samples. All previously approved surfaces currently in play remain certified by USBC. A Gauge R & R study, a statistical method recommended by the American Society for Quality, was used to determine the minimum limits.

The specification, recently approved by the USBC Equipment Specifications and Certification Committee, goes into effect immediately.

This is the first time USBC or its predecessor organizations have developed a specification for the hardness of a lane surface.

"The Sward hardness test is a simple yet unique test that inherently includes things like surface friction and bowling ball footprint size in its' readings," said USBC Technical Director Neil Stremmel.

The specification is a result of a new testing procedure developed by the USBC Specifications and Certifications team. USBC research engineers use a Gardner/Sward Hardness Rocker to test lane samples to determine compliance with the new specification. The instrument - a metal, wheel-shaped device that is four inches in diameter - rolls back and forth on a lane sample. The cycles are electronically determined and registered on a liquid crystal display monitor to obtain a hardness reading.

Approval of the synthetic lane hardness specification comes on the heels of USBC's June 1 implementation of a new testing method and specification for the outer materials of bowling pins. USBC research engineers use an optical instrument with a computer interface - a Fourier Transform Infrared Spectrometer - to measure and identify the chemical structure of bowling pin materials (pin cover stock, clear coat and pin base) sent annually to USBC by various bowling pin manufacturers. Only bowling pins meeting USBC specifications through this test will be approved and allowed in USBC-certified competition.

"By initiating these testing procedures and setting new specifications, USBC is leading the charge to further ensure the standardization of key equipment and playing field elements that are a major part of the sport of bowling. Further steps are in progress," Stremmel said.

High Tech Device Helps USBC Advance Pin Testing

GREENDALE, Wis.—The United States Bowling Congress has adopted a new specification on bowling pins to help ensure the standardization and integrity of one of the chief pieces of equipment used in the sport of bowling.

Beginning June 1, USBC will use a high-tech device to test the outer materials of bowling pins. USBC research engineers will use an optical instrument with a computer interface - called a Fourier Transform Infrared Spectrometer - to measure and identify the chemical structure of wood and synthetic bowling pin sample materials sent annually to USBC by various bowling pin manufacturers. For the test, a tiny sample of the material is placed under a sensor and the data is digitally displayed on the screen of a connected computer.

The three materials that are tested - the outside clear coat, pin coating and base material - must maintain at least a 98 percent correlation from the original samples for the manufacturer to retain a permit and continue making that pin for USBC competition. Only bowling pins meeting USBC specifications may be used in USBC-certified competition.

"This is a powerful, high tech tool that gives us a very precise 'fingerprint' of each bowling pin sample to make sure the same material is used each time in the construction of the pins," said Bob Roloff, a USBC research engineer and chemist. "That helps ensure that bowling pins used in all USBC competition are produced consistently, which in turn helps protect the credibility of the sport."

The adoption of the new specification and testing procedure was formally approved during a meeting of the USBC Equipment Specifications and Certification Committee April 28 in Greendale, Wis. That committee makes all final decisions on USBC specifications.

In addition to bowling pins, this infrared technology could

possibly be used to assist USBC in the testing of bowling ball cover stocks, lane surfaces, lane oils and lane cleaners.

"This is an exciting time for us as this is the first step toward adopting many future specifications in this area," said USBC Technical Director Neil Stremmel.

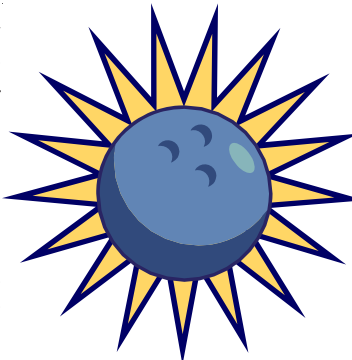
