## PBA Hall of Famer Pete Couture Dies at Age 73

## Graduate of "school of hard knochs" reachen his peak as a PBA50 competitor in the 1990s

CHICAGO - Pete Couture of Cocoa, Fla., a 2016 inductee into the Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame, died Saturday at his Florida residence of undetermined medical issues. He was 73.
"Another Hall of Famer and friend of mine has passed away," said fellow PBA Hall of Famer Marshall Holman. "Pete was a great competitor and a good friend of mine for almost 40 years."
"Pete was one of the toughest, hardest-working players our sport has ever seen," added long-time friend Bill Spigner, a Connecticut native who grew up competing against Couture in New England.

Couture was born in Auburn, Maine, and spent many of his formative years in Windsor Locks, Conn. He was elected in the PBA50 Performance category based on his exceptional record for a minimum of 10 years as a "se-

nior" competitor. On the heels of a 24 -year career as a PBA Tour competitor, when he won five standard PBA titles, Couture began his PBA50 career in 1995 when he earned PBA50 Rookie of the Year honors.
He won the first of nine PBA50 Tour titles in Reno in 1996, and captured a pair of USBC Senior Masters titles in 1998 (when he was selected as PBA50 Player of the Year) and 2002. ORLANDO, FL - The road to the U.S. Women's Open finals is long and tedious, especially if you start back in the pack.
Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York, in 64th place after the opening round of the U.S. Women's Open, completed an epic climb Saturday with a 218 196 victory over top-seed Stefanie Johnson of McKinney, Texas, to capture her first major title.

Kuhlkin used two big games in the final round of qualifying to make the first cut, and a 299 game in the final round of match play to make the finals, televised live on CBS Sports Network.
As the fifth seed, Kuhlkin had to win three matches for the chance to bowl Johnson for the title. She then would enter the final frame with the chance to close out Johnson, and finished the climb with a strike and a 9 -count.

The emotion of knowing what she had accomplished was evident.
"This is the U.S. Women's Open, the top event of every sport," Kuhlkin said. "It's the biggest major of the year. A lot of prestigious players have worn continued on page 8

RENO - Phyl Knoll of Hawthorne, California, may be stepping away from competing at the United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships, but her final appearance this week was one to remember as she joined the tournament's exclusive 50 Year Club.

The 87-year-old righthander always has loved the sport, and she's been hooked since her friends invited her to bowl. She began her tournament career at the 1962 event in Phoenix and has made an annual appearance each year since 1971. To commemorate her 50 years on the lanes, Knoll received a plaque, chevron and necklace Wednesday at the National Bowling Stadium, and the moment was incredibly emotional.
"I had to control myself," said Knoll, who has visited 34 cities and 24 states throughout her USBC Women's Championships career. "I started to get a bit teary when I was asked to speak. I'm very humble, and they made such a big issue of it."
She was compelled to reach this milestone for personal accomplishment and to make her children

proud. She wanted to prove to them, no matter what you have on your platter, you can finish everything.

I just wanted my children to know my tenacity," Knoll said. "In spite and because of them, I was able to accomplish this. There's nobody in my life, but them.'

Knoll described the journey as similar to planning a wedding. You don't think about it every moment, but the special day sneaks up on you. As the landmark approached, it topped her "to complete" list.

As she was sneaking up on her milestone appearance, she also found some success on the champion-
-
ship lanes. Knoll took the lead in Division I Singles at the 1989 Women's Championships in Bismarck, North Dakota, with a 680 series, eventually placing second. With her 50th appearance in the books, however, Knoll has decided this will be her last year at the event. "This is my finale," Knoll said. "At my home bowling center, my pace is fine, but here, it's not."

Knoll was grateful her family was in attendance for her special moment. She wanted to show them what the tournament meant to her each and every year, as well as the one-of-a-kind venue, which includes the International Bowling Mu-
seum and Hall of Fame's satellite facility.
"I put so much time into bowling," Knoll said. "I wanted my children to be here, so they would know what we really do. And I wanted them to see the gorgeous hall of fame.

Knoll earned her own spot in the California USBC Hall of Fame in 2017 for meritorious service
"I was very humbled when they put me in the hall of fame for meritori ous service," Knoll said. "It was the icing on the cake." In her 50th appearance Knoll rolled scores of 375 in singles, 344 in team and 289 in doubles for a 1,008 all-events total

# 2018 CUSBC State Convention Recap June 9-10, 2018 - Hotel Piccadilly, Fresno, CA

The $12^{\text {th }}$ annual CUSBC State Convention took place up north in Fresno the weekend of June 9-10.
Delegates from associations all across the state attended. Here is a recap of what took place on Saturday \& Sunday.

## Saturday, June 9

FRESNO - Saturday morning was the Youth Meeting. We had a nice attendance along with a handful of the youth bowlers. Since we had youth in the room, we picked their brain in asking them questions about other sports and how their schedules are with youth bowling programs. One youth, Derek Delgado from North LA County, spoke on how he plays high school basketball, golf and volleyball. He explained how the basketball season works and on the different costs they need to spend for equipment and apparel. David Waybright, from Golden Empire USBC, spoke about his high school team and how he has similar costs that needed to be spent each season for shoes, uniforms, etc.

We discussed how the "normal" Saturday morning youth programs are not necessarily the best time for some of these youths, especially the ones playing high school sports. Andre mentioned how Lynn Matsubara started her own league that is only once a month and it's called the "Average League" because that is what you end up with-- 21 games and an average league. It's an adult youth league and Andre's son even qualified for Pepsi in that league. All you need is 4 people to make a singles league!

We also discussed short seasons and some great suggestions came out of the meeting such as family discounts for multiple kids that are joining the youth program, practice discounts and one-time league fees in the beginning.
Our other main topic for discussion was bridging the gap between youth bowling and adult bowling. That stepping stone is Collegiate Bowling. We passed out some information explaining how Collegiate bowling is setup with USBC and we are compiling a list of the active California colleges that need bowlers or are trying to start their own bowling teams. Currently, the active CA schools are UC Davis, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, CSU Fresno and San Jose State University. We will publish info on the CalUSBC.com when we get more information.

Saturday afternoon was the USBC Jamboree that started with a presentation by David Prange/USBC Western Regional Manager. David gave us a recap of what was covered at the recent USBC National Convention that was held in late April in Reno.

First we saw a video of this year's motivational speaker, Sam Glenn entitled "Igniting Progress" which was centered around our attitude. He demonstrated by painting a canvas himself which surprised everyone when it turned out to be an eagle. His main points were to combat stress with a good sense of humor. Is there any benefit to being uptight? A real leader understands they are a student every day. He then reflected on his Mom and her fight with cancer and who is now a cancer survivor because attitude is everything! He also used an example of sharing your popcorn is sharing your heart.

## LANE CERTIFICATION INFO

Next up was explaining the new requirements for Lane Certification Committees that took effect Apr. 1, 2018 on measurements and the new requirement of having three signatures on the reports (person doing inspection, proprietor and Assoc. Mgr.). This service is being done for the proprietors. Did you know, $85 \%$ of the lanes in the country are synthetic (measuring 5 panels)? Three panels are for wood lanes. All lanes will be certified because of now measuring all 5 panels. Next year they may not if the lanes don't make the corrections or fix problems. Inspection equipment can be ordered at USBC bowling store.com but it's not cheap (\$695). Also, Lane Dressing Inspection Reports are required annually.

## BOWLING BALL STUDY

Then he went into the Bowling Ball Technology Study which is the result of four years of testing. Some of the changes to ball requirements will come in 2019; others in 2020. The reason for these changes is because the volume of oil has tripled over the last decade. Bowling balls have advanced technology, but the lanes/playing field are still the same.

One of the biggest changes that affects the most bowlers is that the balance holes must be plugged by July 31, 2020 (this process can start Jan. 1, 2020). We were told these changes need to be done to protect the playing surface because things like scuffing grit on urethane balls is hard on the lanes. Also, we were told not to plug balls now or they are illegal. Another change to be aware of is bowlers can only us a dry towel during competition. We were told that if centers add more and more oil to protect the lane surface and slow down the transition. USBC wants to keep the same scoring pace with lower oil volume.

## Sunday,

The 2018 CUSBC 12th Annual Meeting took place on Sunday morning starting at 9 am. There were (55) Adult delegates, (13) Youth delegates, (3) CUSBC officers and (14) CUSBC Board members for a total of (85) eligible for voting.

Note: All State Officers and Directors have their committee reports that were presented at this meeting on the CUSBC website. Go to www.calusbc.com to view them anytime.

Two youth bowlers were recognized that received the CUSBC $\$ 1,000$ schol-arship-Matthew Carpenter from San Diego USBC and David Waybright from Bakersfield/Golden Empire USBC - and both of them were Youth Delegates at this convention

The 2017-18 CA BVL donations totaled $\$ 107,228.97$ which again put California as the top contributor nationally. The hat was passed around at this meeting and $\$ 1,055$ was collected to kick off this year's BVL drive! The 2019 State BVL Tournament will be held in Stockton. It was also mentioned that there will be some changes to the divisions. BVL is adding another division for the Men so now there will be six divisions for Men, Women and Youth.

## IBM \& HOF

Next up was Tracy Ebarb/International Bowling Museum \& Hall of Fame. Tracy is the Director of Business Development. He pitched the annual fee of $\$ 29$ for having a Sustaining Membership into the International Bowling Museum \& Hall of Fame which had (46) members in 2016; (173) members in 2017 and their goal is to get (400) in 2018. For $\$ 29$ you get a sticker and a membership card signed by Mike Aulby. They also have a brick program to honor a bowler or organization. Info can be obtained at bowlingmuseum.com

## MERGER UPDATE

125 mergers of associations completed this last season. There is approximately 250 left to complete this year. Nationally, USBC processed 60 of the 250 already this year. Tracy, CA is the only association in CA not merged.

## ARC INFO AVAILABLE TO EVERYONE

He mentioned ARC (Assoc. Resource Center) that is on bowl.com and is updated and invited all to go in and check it out and download it.

## AWARDS BANQUET

Saturday night was the Awards Banquet honoring this year's State Hall of Fame inductees - Earnest Lou Gilless for Meritorious Service and Johnnie Englehart for Superior Performance along with Johnny Humble for Manager of the Year, Chris Preble for Coach of the Year and Ken Meryman for Youth Director of the Year. Matthew Carpenter and David Waybright were also recognized as the 2018 \$1,000 Youth Scholarship Winners.

## June 10

Elections were held, and Kathy Bruegeman was elected the new CUSBC President replacing Rosie Parker who termed out. David Waybright was re-elected to another term as CUSBC 2nd VP for Youth. Both Kathy and David were elected by acclimation. An election was held for (5) incumbent CUSBC Adult Directors and (2) incumbent Youth Directors and all were re-elected. President-elect Kathy Bruegeman and Assoc. Manager Larry Peppers were elected to serve as the two National Delegates for 2019.

There was only one Bylaw Proposal (B-1) up for approval and it passed. It involved the Board of Directors/Election of Directors to have qualifications be submitted, in writing, at least 30 days prior to the opening of the Annual meeting to allow the Nominating Committee time to evaluate the qualifications of each candidate.

## Nicholai Ioredo Making a Name for Hiimself <br> by Fred Eisenhammer

FRESNO - His mother calls him "the other Loredo." That's no putdown. That's just fact.
Nickolai Loredo revels in that description of him by his mother, Vivian. In fact, Nickolai salutes his younger sister Jennifer, who has become a national sensation, capped by a title in the 2017 Junior Gold Championships.

After Jennifer won her 15 -and-under division national title, Nickolai good-naturedly made up a bowling shirt for himself that read - what else? - "The Other Loredo."
"All my bowling friends know [Jennifer] won Junior gold," says Nickolai, a 23 -year-old Fresno resident. "They used to call her 'Nick's sister.' Now they say, 'Jennifer has a brother.' I don't even exist anymore."

It's easy for Nickolai to make light of his less-prominent status - especially after he was recently named the San Joaquin Bowling Club Bowler of the Year.


Nickolai Loredo honored his sister after the latter won a Junior gold title last year.

Like his eight-years-younger sister, Nickolai is crackerjack bowler. He has a book average of 219 and averaged 228 in a summer league last year.

Nickolai treasures his SJBC honor, but "honestly, I feel my first 800 was a bigger accomplishment."

For the record, that was an 802 series that he racked up in 2016. Since then, he's tacked on four more 800 s. Nickolai also has drilled 12 perfect games.
"I still have a lot of catching up to do with my dad," says Nickolai, of Joey David Jr., who has collected 30 perfect games and 15800 s.

Nickolai, incidentally, bowls left-handed, like his sister. But this didn't come naturally.
"I'm definitely right-handed," he says adamantly.
His dad, however, saw definite lane advantages to bowling as a lefty. And he taught Nickolai that way.
"My dad's been my coach since all the way back in 2001," Nickolai says.
"I didn't even know I could bowl left-handed," he says with a laugh.
Nickolai hasn't reached his elite status by accident. He bowls a lot - a real lot. He had been bowling " 16 games a day every day."
When his bowling center raised prices, he trimmed the number of games he bowls, but that hasn't harmed his bowling excellence.

At the moment, he even sports a higher average than his sister.
"But she won Junior gold, so she's a better bowler," he said.
There was no jealousy in Nickolai's voice. He's just a proud older brother - and a op-caliber bowler as well.

and Player of the Year honors.
At the time of his retirement, he had earned \$959,900 during his PBA career. In retirement, he operated a pro shop and coaching services at Shore Lanes in Merritt Island, Fla. He liked to say he was a "graduate of the school of hard knocks."
"If it wasn't for the senior (PBA50) tour I wouldn't be here," said Couture during his PBA Hall of Fame induction speech. "The senior tour was a second chance and an opportunity to re-invent myself. "I'm kind of overwhelmed," Couture said. "It's a dream come true I think everyone who bowls for a living has a dream of getting into the hall of fame, and to have it actually happen is unbelievable.
"I went from being a so-called star to being a superstar in that one year," he said of his four-title season in 1998. "Everything came together. When I made match play, I was able to get to the show, and when I got to the show I was pretty successful. Everything went the right way for me that year."

Growing up in New England, Couture won more than 20 state and local association titles in Maine and Connecticut. He was inducted into the Central Connecticut and Connecticut State Bowling Association Halls of Fame in 1993, and the USBC Hall of Fame in 2004. In addition to his two USBC Senior Masters titles, he had five other top 10 Senior Masters finishes. Other notable USBC accomplishments included a second-place finish in the 1994 USBC Open Championships team event (with Bill Spigner, Rick and Ron Pollard, and Don Scudder - all USBC Hall of Famers). Over a span of 20 years he had a USBC Open Championships average of 203.

## Guenther

threw the historic 300 game (300-189). He then defeated Billy Hardwick, 233-214, in the semifinal, and finally topseeded Wayne Zahn, 268-194, for the title.
"To tell you the truth, I never thought about it until I hit the last strike," Guenther said after bowling the historic perfect game. "I've had nine or 10300 games in my career but that one was the only one on television. You never think you're going to get them all - you just keep adding one at a time."
Guenther's very first PBA win in the 1965 Oxnard (Calif.) Open was also memorable setting two PBA scoring records on his way to the title. He set the then eight-game pinfall record of 2,022 and 16 -game record of 3,830 which eclipsed the previous marks of 1,983 and 3,793 set by Ray Bluth in 1964.
Guenther, who was voted as PBA's 45th greatest player in 2009, was also a three-time Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award winner, earning the honor in 1966 and 1967 and then shared the award again with Dick Ritger and Dave Soutar in 1970
Also a member of the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame, Guenther was the winner of two USBC Open Championship titles, winning the 1967 and 1974 Classic Team titles.

this jacket, have stood in this spot - hall of famers. It's just an incredible feeling. Everything you work toward, you practice hard, go through the 56 games, and it's just a big relief. You are overcome with emotion."
Johnson, who bowled and worked at Boardwalk Bowl while attending the University of Central Florida, was seeking her first major title. She led after qualifying and, despite a brief hiccup in match play, grabbed the top seed.
"At this moment it's tough, but I can't hang my head over this week," Johnson said. "This is the major of our tour stops, and I battled my way to be the No. 1 seed. All you can do is put yourself in position to win.'

Johnson said it's one game where anything can happen, on either side of the equation. Kuhlkin said that's why she actually likes being a lower seed.
"I think being the fifth seed or the fourth seed is actually an advantage," Kulhkin said. "You're out here, you're bowling, you know the lanes, the adjustments ... I've been in this position before. My first title in Topeka in 2015 (PWBA Topeka Open), I ran the ladder just like I did here. I think it's beneficial."

In the semifinal match, Kuhlkin and Erin McCarthy of Omaha, Nebraska, each had open frames in two of their first three frames. Kuhlkin, however, strung together strikes in frames 4-8 to take a 213-186 victory.

Kuhlkin produced her biggest game of the day against No. 3 seed Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York. Kuhlkin struck on her first five shots and nine times overall in a 246-172 victory.

In the opening match, Kuhlkin faced Shannon O'Keefe of O'Fallon, Illinois, who was seeking her third consecutive major title. O'Keefe opened with a trio of spares while Kuhlkin struck on five of her first six shots. A missed 10pin in the seventh frame by O'Keefe allowed Kuhlkin to take a 21 -pin lead, and she went on to a 235-214 victory.

Competition at the 2018 U.S. Women's Open consisted of three days of eight-game qualifying rounds before the field was cut to the top 36 players for an eight-game cashers' round. The 32 -game pinfall totals determined the 24 bowlers for round-robin match play. The 56 -game totals, including 30 bonus pins for each win in match play, decided the five players for the stepladder finals.

USBC TIMELINE FOR BOWLING BALLS. I received information from USBC (bowl.com) for the dates for new bowling ball specifications. The Equipment and Specifications Committee started starting Aug. 2, 2018, bowling ball weighing more than 10 pounds will be allowed to have up to three ounces of static side, thumb or finger weight specification of one once for finger, thumb or side weight, and three ounces for top or bottom weight. It is a large column about oil absorption rate of bowling ball coverstock does no change. If your're interest in this article, check with bowl.com for all of the new rulings. Bowlers who do not use their thumb for delivery and decide to use higher static weight specification cannot have a thumb hole. It would be classified as a balance hole, and immediately will be required to follow the specification requiring them to mark their intended center of the palm. Bowlers now have a two-year window to work with their pro shops to ensure their equipment will meet specification on Aug. 1, 2020.

ALL -STAR TEAMS were announced, Sponsor of the Year, Executive of the Year, Hall of Fame Inductees, Bowlers of the Year, plus a lof of elbow rubbing. What a night. All that Bowling for the Gold - Stamps that it - quickly became popular. 10 centers signed up the first match.
- League rate at HOLLYWOOD STAR LANES was $\$ 3.90$ per bowler. The fee included lineage, trophies and sheet service.

- GIP LENTINE joined LARRY LICHSTEIN'S Pro Shop drillers and clinics experts. Great idea. Ad ran: "Rent-A-Mechanic. If you need a replacement, part-time, or special event mechanic. Call Mitch.
- VILLAGE LANES ten game Marathon results; top guns SCOTT KRAYE and RANDY PEDERSON.
- ROBBY ROBINSON moved to bigger quarters to produce not only his Wrist Positioners but the new Spaceport and Spacecase Ball Carriers
- What the?? COVE LANES and MITZI ANDERSON advertised a very strange tournament concept. Called the "House of Mickey Mouse". Low score win the tournament. Splits count zero. Gutters count as a strike. Was that the same as "Snake Bite"? ?
- BEL AIR LANES was sold and re-named ROCKY MOUNTAIN BOWL. That bowl was built in the wrong area at the wrong time.
- The Bowling News got their first computers. Time to teach ole typists some new tricks.
- JIM ULRICH left the Western Columbia team and opened his own shop inside DEL RIO LANES.
- EARLANTHONY retired from the PBA Tour. He owned 2 centers and loved to play golf He would draw a crowd where-ever he showed up for an exhibition. He was a 41 time PBA champion.
- Big time proprietors: LEE GREENFIELD, EMPIRE BOWL — Rudy Leewage, REGAL LANES-Nat Rosenfield, CANOGA PARK-DAN SWEENEY, LA MIRADA BOWLDavid Spiegel, EL DORADO BOWL-ALLEN SHAW, CORBIN BOWL-DON DROOKER, MISSION HILLS BOWL. All BPASC officers
- VISTA ENTERTAINMENT CENTER'S latest manager NICK MANCINI pulled another tourney "trick" out of his vault. Since VISTA had two different types of lanes, wood and plastic. So, to win, you had to bowl 3 games on the wood and 3 games on the plastic. Top prize? $\$ 2,000.00$. 88 places down the line. Will it be a hit or a miss?
- Mechanics got to wish for an early Xmas "Stripper" - - a lane stripper. Century International's new machine could do it all; easier, faster, safer, cheaper, accurate and reliable.
- BILL HARMATZ, jockey, owner of VISTA ENTERTAINMENT CENTER said he had riden in close to 30,000 races in 19 years. His center walls were covered with pictures Bill with celebrities. Bill on winning horses. The night club was rolled "The Jockey Club". The lounge was "The Turf Room". The Pro Shop was "The Tack Room". His tiny saddles, shirts, etc. adorned the walls
- Seventeen centers were applauding their bowl thru "house columns". Most were at least one-half page. Four league sessions per day was the norm. Plus Juniors and week end action. Pro Shop owners were quick to give lessons and share their knowledge.
Linds Bowling Shoes - \$59.95. They lasted forever
- Andy Varipapa turned 93. Fifty years prior he made 27 Pete Smith Bowling Shirts. He owned a pool hall and 10 alley center in Brooklyn.
- Score-Log was a personal bowling calculator. It could keep track of previous games, had strike and spare keys. It was only good for one persons score. \$29.95.
- The argument over "light weight pins versus heavy weight pins" was a hot topic. Almost as hot as which ball is better. The average weight? 3 pounds 2 ounces to 3 pounds 6 ounces. Question? "Should daytime ladies leagues get to bowl on lighter pins?" Rolling a 10 pound ball at 33 pounds of pins was a challenge for the ladies.
- When the W.I.B.C. Tournament and Convention was held in Niagara Falls- - - -the falls were FROZEN SOLID. Had to hang onto your bowling bag to keep from being blown away. Brr-rr-r!
- Here's a name for you, C. Sanders. Chuck Sanders was owner of Sanders Emblems. Pins - pins - pins. Associations, states, games, series, if you needed any kind of pins they made them. Always first class and quick response.
- The VFW Tournament for Juniors attracted 1,176 youth competitors to PALOS VERDES BOWL for 2 weekends. DEE RUDDY knew how to organize, host and accomplish whatever was the task she chose.
1983 ended like all years with tournaments, parties, food, balloons, miseltoe, champagne and noisemakers. Except for the bowling center employees who stood by and watched the fun. Ho-Hum
