- The 2018 PBA50 Tour started the season in the East, then ventured to the West, and now heads down the homestretch in the Midwest beginning with the PBA50 River City Extreme Open presented by Ebonite at River City Extreme July 17-20 in Monticello, Minn.

With five PBA50 events remaining on the 2018 schedule, 2017 PBA Rookie of the Year and Suncoast Senior U.S. Open winner Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix leads the PBA50

MONTICELLO, Minn. Player of the Year points race with a commanding 2,400 point lead over PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Fla., in second. FREMONT, CA -- The word spread quickly the first part of June that another California bowling center was in line of being scooped up by a land developer so that the land the center was located on could be used for housing units. The City Council was filled with bowlers that packed the room full and the Council heard from (30) bowlers and friends from the community that asked to keep Cloverleaf Family Bowl open. Many in attendance were drawn to tears.

PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: Bob Caruso Wins Cecil Raymond Memorial Title

Bob Caruso of Dayton, N.J. defeated Steve Pavlinko of Sewell, N.J., 246-218, to win the PBA50 Cecil Raymond Memorial presented by Ebonite at Brunswick Zone Deptford on Sunday.

Caruso, who qualified second, held a comfortable lead throughout the title match on his way to his fourth career PBA Regional title and his second in Deptford. He also won the 2014 Mil-Ray Foods Open. Pavlinko is the co-sponsor of the event and operates the pro shop inside the center. Caruso won \$2,000 while Pavlinko earned \$1,000 for his runner-up finish.

The tournament, which began in 2004, was renamed in 2014 to honor its sponsor, Cecil Raymond, who passed away in January 2014. Raymond was the 2013 recipient of the East Region's Pat Patterson Award for outstanding contributions to the region.

In the semifinal round, Caruso edged Tommy Brodowski of New Hyde Park, N.Y., 174-173, when Brodowski opened in the 10th frame while Pavlinko defeated three-time East Region PBA50 Player of the Year Sam Maccarone of Williamstown, N.J., 227-207. Brodowski and Maccarone each earned \$750 as semifinal round losers.

USBC EXTENDS SENIOR MASTERS, Super Senior Classic Through 2021 at SAM's Town

LAS VEGAS – The United States Bowling Congress has extended its agreement with Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas to host the Senior Masters and Super Senior Classic through 2021. Sam's Town has hosted both events since 2016.

In 2019, the Super Senior Classic for players 60 and older will begin on May 29 with the Senior Masters set for June 2-9. The Super Senior Classic has grown from 28 competitors in 2013 to 184 bowlers in 2018.

The 2020 Senior Masters is set for May 31-June 7, while the 2021 event will take place June 6-13. The 2020 Super Senior Classic is scheduled for May 27-31 and the 2021 tournament will be June 2-6.

Center, so on the way back to Sebastopol, in Northern California, our caravan of cars stopped on the majestic Golden Gate Bridge at about 3AM.

Everyone was wondering what was going on. Apparently, Mr. Anon was so disgusted with his performance on the one board shot, that he jumped out of the car and threw his bowling ball over the side of the bridge!

It was very foggy that evening, so I can neither deny or admit to the claim, although I never again saw that particular bowling ball in the hands of Mr. Anon.

Goodger goes on to comment about bowling balls being heaved off of buildings, and while this is a practice you would not want to make common in your neighborhood, it did serve David Letterman quite well over the years.

Letterman's use of Dick Weber bowling outside of the Ed Sullivan Theater in Manhattan on a lane provided by AMF was a stroke of genius for the promoters at the former Fortune 500 company. Weber rolled bowling balls at everything from television sets to eggs in an aquarium.

But when it came to throwing bowling balls off of a building, nothing could compare to "Bob Borden's Bowling Ball Demolition," in which members of David Letterman's audience destroyed a used automobile by dropping balls from a 5-story building. In another episode, Letterman had contestants drop bowling balls from the top of a building into a bathtub full of chocolate pudding. And what about kicking a bowling ball into oblivion with disdain? This brought back memories of Eagle Rock Lanes in West Orange, New Jersey, the site of one of my perfectos way back in 1984. The locals and regional professionals called it "Easy Rock," because the lanes were meticulously cared for by general manager Tony Cerrato. But in the rare event that you did not perform well at Eagle Rock, you could find redemption on the other side of the parking lot, where you can still kick your ball into oblivion at Crystal Lake. During the winter months it's fun to count the number of balls on the frozen lake and find out just how far some individuals can kick (or roll) their once trusted bowling ball!

'Finally, Finally' – Geoff Gast Blows Past 200

WINNETKA – "You just didn't go over 200. You destroyed it."

So said elite bowler Joe Curry after Geoff Gast reached his long-held goal of rolling a 200 game.

Gast, who averages 119, smoked a 211 in the final game of his three-game series last week during his weekly "Guys and Dolls" league competition at Winnetka Bowl.

Gast has been bowling in the league for eight years and has been laser-focused on bowling a 200, coming close a couple of times.

"Finally, finally!" exclaimed top bowler Greg Kolski, who has been bowling alongside Gast since the latter joined the league.

The right-handed Gast is one of the most popular and charismatic bowlers in the area. So, it was no surprise that Gast was engulfed by a mob of congratulatory bowlers after his sizzling performance.

With 99 pins of handicap, Gast's score was elevated to a stratospheric 310 – the best handicap score in the league.

The 211 seemingly came out of nowhere; Gast had scored a 104 and 114 in his previous two games. His high this season had been a 151.

Nor did it seem anything extraordinary was in the making in the early going of the third game. But after two spares and an open in the first three frames, Gast went on a breathtaking roll.

Finding his rhythm and with his unshakable determination etched on his face, Gast put together a five-bagger from frames 4 through 8.

He opened in the ninth frame, leaving him with a score of 192 when he toed the line for the 10th frame.

Needing eight pins for his 200, Gast extinguished any doubts by delivering his sixth strike of the game. He added nine pins on his next two shots. Ever gracious, Gast credited long-time teammate and anchorman Jamie Beeler for his success.

"He's taught me everything I know," said Gast, adding that teammate Robert Uzan also provided valuable tips. With his 211, Gast showed he learned his lessons well.

3. MULTIPLE PARTICIPATION: Entrants may participate multiple times per event. In order to place more than once in the prize list for position standings at least two players on the team must be different and you must change

4. ENTERING AVERAGE: Entrants must use their highest 2017-18 book average. If none, entrants will use their January 1, 2018 average with at least 15 games. If none, entrants must use highest current average of 15 games at a true line, best which must include a date to verify signed by their coach or league secretary is proof for verification. If no average verificathe time of entry. Proof of average verification must be provided with paid entry. A standing sheet, which must include a date to verify, signed by their coach or league secretary is proof for verification. If no average verification entrants must use a 225 average for all events. If current season average for at least 21 games at time of bowling exceeds last season's average by 10 or more pins, current season average must be used (Rule 319a-2). Rule 319e (15 or more pin increase in tournament average of 21 or more games in the past 12 months) must be used or bowler will be disqualified.

It is the bowlers' responsibility to verify the accuracy of his/her average, whether submitted by the bowler, team captain, or others. Failure to use the correct average shall disqualify scores if submitted average is lower than correct average, thereby resulting in a lower classification or more handicap. Prize winnings shall be based on the submitted average, if it is higher than the correct average. Corrections in averages can be made up to the completion of the first game of a series, or within 48 hours after completion of the series if the tournament manager, prior to the completion of the first game of a series, has given written consent to the bowler authorizing such extension of time to correct their average

5. RERATE/ADJUSTMENTS: Tournament director reserves the right to rerate or adjust a bowler's average upward prior to competition. If the bowler does not accept the adjustment a refund will be given. Any adjusted or rerated averages, whether accepted or refused, must be reported. Failure to do so is grounds for disqualification Any entrants, youth or adult, who have qualified for a cash and/or merchandise prize of \$600 or more in any tournament in final standings, brackets, side pots, all events, special/donated prizes in the last 12 months must report their scores, position and amount won to the Tournament Management prior to bowling for possible re-rating. Failure to comply will be cause for forfeiture of entry fees and prize winnings.

6. FORMAT: There will be two formats for this tournament. There will be a team event consisting of two Juniors and two Adults bowling a 3 game format. There will also be a doubles event consisting of one Junior and one Adult bowling a 3 game format. An optional Junior Gold event may be offered for the USBC Jr Gold members. The entry fee will depend on the division and will be collected at the tournament site prior to bowling. One in five qualifiers will receive a paid entry (not including travel or expenses) to the national tournament. Bowlers must be a current season Jr. Gold member prior to competition. Membership must be purchased prior to or at the tournament. National tournament qualifiers who are not current Jr. Gold members will be disqualified.

7. HANDICAP: Handicap will be 80% of the difference between the team's average and the top of the division (refer to front of entry form for figures).

B DRESCODE: Matching and/or professional attire is encouraged. Awards for matching teams will be given "Looking Good" pins. Male participants are asked to wear collared shirts and slacks or dress shorts. Female participants are asked to wear skirts, slacks, skorts or dress shorts and proper shirts. Skirts, shorts and skorts <u>must not</u> be more than 3" above the knee. Attire must be neat, clean and proper fitting. We <u>strongly suggest no jeans</u>, tank tops, hats, or attire advertising liquor or tobacco products, no attire with inappropriate language, or any apparel which the tournament director feels is inappropriate will be permitted. Smoking and/or consuming alcoholic beverages during competition is not permitted.

9. CONDUCT: Any conduct deemed inappropriate, foul language, obscene gestures or abuse of equipment may be cause for removal from competition, as determined by the tournament director. Any incident that reflects poorly on the Reno Jr-Adult Invitational, reported to the Tournament Management, whether at the center or otherwise, may result in denial of further participation. Entry fees will not be refunded.

10. AWARDS: All prize/award fees will be returned 100% within each event, on a ratio of at least 1 prize for each 10 entries or major fraction thereof. The USBC SMART program will administer all scholarship awards, Acct #9312.

11. <u>CHECK IN</u>: Bowlers must check in 1 hour prior to squad time. Tournament spots are on a first-come, first-served basis. Bowlers failing to check in one half hour before their scheduled squad time will lose their scheduled spot. All substitutions should be made one hour prior to squad time.

12. Additional squads may be added during the course of the tournament as deemed necessary by tournament management, but no squad shall be added after the last advertised squad time. All decisions by the Tournament Director are final unless an appeal is made in accordance with USBC rule 329. All scores are unofficial until otherwise posted. Any questions or concerns must be brought to one of the Co-Tournament Directors. Official protests must be filed, in writing, with one of the Tournament Directors, within 72 hours of the completion of the tournament.





his second career PBA50 Tour title. He also has four other top-10 finishes including two third-place finishes, one of which came in the USBC Senior Masters, in addition to a sixth and ninth-place finish.

Williams has three runner-up finishes this season, and Mohr won the PBA50 Northern California Classic for his 10th career title while also recording third, fifth and sixth-place finishes so far in 2018.

Following the River City Extreme Open, the PBA50 Tour heads to Indiana for the first of three tournaments in the Hoosier State beginning with the PBA50 South Shore Open presented by Hammer July 23-26 at Olympia Lanes in Hammond followed by the PBA50 Security Federal Savings Bank Championship presented by Track July 28-31 at Dave Small's Heritage Lanes in Kokomo, and the PBA50 Dave Small's Championship Lanes Classic presented by Roto Grip Aug. 4-7 in Anderson.

The PBA50 Tour season then heads to Wyoming, Mich., for the PBA50 Cup presented by DV8, the season's fourth and final major, Aug. 9-12 at Spectrum Lanes.

The regular season wraps up with the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by 900 Global, for players 60 and over, at Pro Bowl West in Fort Wayne, Ind., Aug. 14-16. The top 12 players in PBA50 Tour points, plus two at-large berths, will earn spots into the PBA50 Storm Invitational at Planet Fun Bowling & Entertainment Center in Shallotte, N.C., Sept. 28-30. Competition in the River Extreme Open begins with eight-game qualifying squads on Wednesday, July 18 at 10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. CT to be followed by a second round of qualifying on July 19, also at 10 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. After a five-game cashers round on July 20 at 8:30 a.m., match play rounds will be conducted at noon and 3:15 p.m. to determine the top five players for the stepladder finals scheduled for 7 p.m.

The tournament practice session is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Tuesday, July 17. Proam squads, where grassroots amateur bowlers can compete with the pros, are scheduled for 3 and 6 p.m. For pro-am entry information contact River City Extreme by calling (763) 295-3390.

- Imagine the "Wheelchair Bowling League". What an awesome sight! They doubled up quite often for various "Up and Down" tournaments to raise money for a worthy cause.
- MARK ROTH and MARSHALL HOLMAN captured the PBA Doubles at the SHOW-BOAT LANES. Talk about REVS. Who could match that pair?
- TOKAY BOWL in Lodi hosted the WWPB Miller Open.California gals topped the list. TISH JOHNSON Champ, SANDY ELLEDGE, ROBIN ROMEO, ANNIE MARIE PIKE and PAM BUCKNER (Reno). They moved down to CANOGA PARK for their next event. These gals were grabbing the headlines from the PBA.
- In 1984 the BPAA had a "long range" plan. It was "Develop New Bowlers!" How long did that plan last? When was the last time your center developd a new bowler?
- I wish there was someone around that could explain why the So. Division of the A.B.T. had a court order against them not to run tournaments. Lot of finger pointing and \$ \$ \$ checking was going on.
- SHARIE LANGFORD was crowned CWBA Queen.
- TISH JOHNSON won her 4th WWPB crown in 6 outings.
- GLENN ALLISON and NORM BELT put on a "trick shot" exhibition at CANOGA PARK BOWL before the W.W.P.B. touring pro-am.
- SAN DIEGO B.A. inducted 3 into their Hall of Fame. MANNY DI GIULIO, JIM POTEET and JOHN RUSSELL Jr.
- The National Bowling Hall of Fame and Museum opened in St. Louis, right across the street from Busch Stadium and a few blocks from the arch.
- AMF sold off its VOIT subsidiary in Buena Park. They went from 800 emloyees to 100. They manufactured inflatable balls!
- Norway had 24 bowling centers.

- Over 300 attended the San Diego Awards dinner in August. Bowlers of the Year? Billie Lee and Marv Sargent . Billie for the 3rd time.
- What happened to the "National Family Tournament"? A great competition for young bowlers and a chance at \$500 in scholarship money.


- Memory lane re-visited. JOE NORRIS was pictured with his gold medal (engraved with a German Swatstika) he won in the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin. Joe did it all. And. . . he knocked own more pins than any other competitor in the ABC.

- When the men's state tournament was awarded to Fresno, the jokes came out. JOHN-NY CARSON spouted "the only thing worse then one night in Fresno is two nights in Fresno. Out of 277 cities ranked by desire, Fresno was ranked 277th.
- ANDY vARIPAPA died at age 93 of natural causes.
- COVE LANES must have loved high scores. The Travel League came to town and went away with a bunch of strikes. DAN ROCHE 264, 268, 268/806, GLENN ALLISON 275, 267, 254. JOHN SMITH 274, 217, 269. PETE UJVARI 296. The teams were stacked with some great shooters. PAUL STAFF, JIM THURMOND, TOM UNDERWOOD, JOE TORRES, CHARLES GLEASON, WILLY BORDENAVE, and RICH LA CHANCE.
- The Roll'N DonKee Rolling Ball Carrier made its debut. It held 3 balls, shoes, and accessories. It rolled or could be carried. KEITH KENWORTHY was WAY TOO GENEROUS for his own good! The Carrier was only \$60.00.
- The A.B.C. certified 8,720 centers in 1984. A decrease of 47 over 1983. But - the number of actual lanes increased!
- Quite a number of "experts" began to believe what BILL TAYLOR had been preaching. Technology was killing the sport. Only hard work, practice and good instruction could produce a champion — good enough for Olympic competition. The fight continued!!!
- DEBBIE MOORE was the first woman to roll a 300 at CAL BOWL and only the second in the 39 year history of the Long Beach W.B.A.

- MYRLE NORTH retired after 33 years as the Secretary Treasurer of the Citrus Belt W.B.A. They had 537,708 women members.
- CHRISTMAS CLUB Leagues were the new fad. Start in January and end the first of December in time for Christmas shopping. BARBARA McLAUGHLIN took credit for starting a tradition.
- Latest week-end craze was the "Pot Shot" at DEL RIO LANES. It was a "re-named" version of the "Hot Pot" that ran at Grand Central. It grew to fill the 32 lanes with No-Tappers.
- TISH JOHNSON won her 5th W.W.P.B. crown.
- VERDUGO HILLS BOWL rounded up 60 different Cabbage Patch Dolls and ran a tournament! 1st place got first choice of a doll. Each doll had a birth certificate. They were all made in England. That fad came and went as fast as a tornado thru Kansas! Yep! Men could enter too.
- WONDERBOWL DOWNEY offered a First Place Prize you could drive away in— a 1985 Laser. Who made it ? ? ? Guess!

Carol Sez: The end of the year was filled with good cheer — and so were the bowlers. 1984 was the year to score. 1985 will be coming with names, numbers and more.


