Portland Lumberjacks Dominate L.A. X to Win PBA League Elias Cup

Wes Malott throws 20 strikes in anchor role to earn Mark Roth Most Valuable Player Award

PORTLAND, Maine – The Portland Lumberjacks overwhelmed L.A. X in four consecutive games Wednesday night at Bayside Bowl to win its first PBA League Elias Cup in the event's seven-year history.

Led by anchor bowler and Mark Roth PBA League Most Valuable Player Wes Malott, the hometown favorites trailed only once – in the first two frames of the second game – in dominating the PBA's team competition. Malott's supporting cast included PBA League newcomer Kris Prather, who won the inaugural PBA Playoffs at Bayside Bowl in early June; two-hander Kyle Troup, left-hander Ryan Ciminelli and Canadian Mitch Hupé.



"That was awesome," Malott, a 42-year-old 10-time PBA Tour titlist and former PBA Player of the Year, said. He threw 20 strikes in 22 meaning-

ful attempts to pace all 40 bowlers in the PBA League competition.

"Wow, 20 strikes? I knew I threw a few," he said. "For whatever reason

in the past, I felt so much pressure because I wanted to give Portland a championship," Malott continued. "I haven't been able to practice a lot lately, but I

felt good this week and my ball just did what it needed to do. And I had five guys behind me, so it gave me all the confidence in the world."

The PBA League's championship was decided by two "race to 2 points" Baker team matches. The Baker format requires each of the teams' players to bowl two frames to complete each game. Ties in games or matches were broken by a one-ball sudden death roll-off.

"That was fun. That's what it's all about," said Lumberjacks manager Tim Mack, who earlier this year was inducted into the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame. "I felt comfortable with the guys. We had a really good practice session beforehand, but do you ever think you're going to sweep a team with the kind of firepower L.A. X had? No way. We made

Brian LeClair Wins PBA50 South Shore Open For Second Consecutive PBA50 Tour Title

HAMMOND, Ind. – Brian LeClair joined Walter Ray Williams Jr. as the only multiple winners on the PBA50 Tour this season by capturing the PBA50 South Shore Open presented by Ebonite title Thursday at Olympia Lanes for his second consecutive title of the season.

LeClair, also the top seed for the stepladder finals for the second consecutive week, defeated fellow New Yorker Sammy Ventura of Syracuse in the title match 214-203 for his fifth career PBA50 Tour title. LeClair also won last week's PBA50 River City Extreme Open as top seed.

"I'm in a place now where I have confidence that I'm making all the right decisions," said the 54-year-old LeClair. "When you have that confidence and don't have to second guess yourself, you can really build some mo-

mentum."

The title match was a good example of how the 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year had to make the right adjustments on each lane of the championship pair.

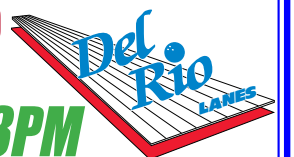

The Joy of Bowling – Something to Treasure

WINNETKA – A couple of weeks ago, Carol Tucker was bowling in the “Guys and Dolls” league at Winnetka Bowl and she was on fire!

Well, that’s not exactly accurate.

It actually was Carol’s game that was on fire – she wasn’t.

Carol, who averages in the 140s, scorched a 200 in her third game to finish with a splashy 509 series.

“I’ve been bowling with you for 10 years and I’ve never seen you bowl so well,” exulted Joe Curry, an ace bowler.

Carol’s smile was bigger than big as she floated around the bowling center afterwards.

That’s the joy of bowling; it’s that special kind of high that players derive from the game after turning in a triumphant performance. For many, enjoying that kind of effort triggers a carryover effect of elation that is felt far beyond the time one leaves the bowling center.

For Carol, her blockbuster game was a memorable moment even though she crushed a career-best 247 nine years earlier.

“The word that comes to mind is ‘fun,’ ” said Carol about her 200. “I just feel so happy and it’s almost a feeling of euphoria.”

It’s one of those powerful blessings that bowling delivers.

Not surprisingly, Carol graciously passed on the credit for her stellar performance to others – starting with Rusty Bryant, Winnetka Bowl’s pro-shop director who provided Carol with some lessons a couple of weeks earlier.

Hoping to break out of her 140-average rut, Carol said she had “been whining and whining for years and whining had done no good,” so she turned to Bryant.

And almost immediately, the results poured in.

“When I bowled a 200, the first person I wanted to tell was Rusty,” said Carol, who added a hook on his advice. “I just think he’s the best coach ever, the best coach ever.”

Carol also singled out elite bowler Bill Plummer, who advised her to try a lighter ball. And she credited Curry for pushing her to go back to Bryant for more lessons – and not stop at one.

“All this happened – which I call ‘a delightful journey’ – is because of some help from my friends. It made the 200 very special,” Carol said.

The joy of bowling is multiplied when one can share it – and that’s what Carol did. Those winning moments frequently bond bowlers with others and make for lasting relationships and take-your-breath-away memories.

That it happened to Carol Tucker is no surprise. She has been a fixture in the “Guys and Dolls” League for years and has brightened up the action with her pleasantness and enthusiasm.

Said Guys and Dolls supervisor Sami Rice about Carol: “She’s a trip. I love her.”

Could Vacationing In Mexico Be In Our Future?

When I wrote last year about Mexico and the United States coming together after a 25 year separation, I did not realize that the article would become prophetic in the reciprocal agreement forged between the two countries. As Mexico continues to provide support to our border concerns, as well as to their own southern border, one has to ask if vacationing in Mexico might be in our future?

I have so many fond memories of Mexico while working for AMF in the 1970's and 1980's. One of my favorite spots (in addition to Mexico City, covered in the aforementioned article) was the city of Guadalajara, known as "the land of tequila and mariachi." Now while I'm not a connoisseur of tequila, or even wine, I have been known to enjoy a fair amount of coffee, and Mexican Coffee is some of the finest I've enjoyed outside of my local Starbucks.

If I had to characterize Mexican Coffee, I would define it as a fine breakfast blend, mild but with a fair amount of acidity for a quick morning jolt. Some of the best cups of Mexican Coffee that I enjoyed during my visits to Mexico were at AMF's very own Bol Guadalajara, located in the heart of the city with all the charm associated with this historical metropolis.

There was a lot of history and tradition that was associated with Bol Guadalajara, which unfortunately was permanently closed by AMF in 2014. It was the site for the very first International Masters Tournament in the Americas, now known as the QubicaAMF Bowling World Cup, set to stage the 55th annual event in Palembang, Indonesia, in 2019.

Opening day of the Guadalajara event in 1968, according to the "AMF In Action" publication, included a parade, led by a mariachi band and twenty horse drawn carriages bearing tournament officials and competitors from a host of foreign countries. I reached out to Steve Mackie, lifelong friend and former AMF employee that once headed up the World Cup event, for some more information about the 1968 event.

Steve, who now owns and operates Tenpins & More in Albuquerque with his lovely wife and professional bowling icon Dana, was not familiar with the Guadalajara event. He had participated in the 1967 event in Paris, and the 1969 event in Tokyo, but failed to qualify for the Guadalajara event from his former Australia homeland.

Then Steve proceeded to tell me that during the 1990's he was placed in charge of the AMF Mexico operations while living in Texas. Many of Steve's memories of Bol Guadalajara were the same as mine, but he noted one additional fact - the payroll! Steve said that his immediate reaction when he saw the center for the first time were all of the employees and over staffing. Rudy Perez Sanchez, the Manager of the center, told Steve not to worry, because each employee was making the equivalent of about 30 cents per hour!

We reminisced further about the organic garden in the front of the bowling center that provided for some truly enjoyable salads to go with the fabulous coffee. The lane conditions were also a cut above the competition. During an exhibition to promote the new Gold Angle Bowling Ball, I was fortunate to record the second of my seven 299 games on international soil.

Mackie replied, "Ah yes, sorry about that mate." You see, it was in Australia while competing for AMF in the Australian Grand Prix that my string of 300's was broken at 18, and I then proceeded to rattle off nine consecutive 299 games, never to bowl 300 again. Bob Cook, the famous Australian bowling writer, called me the "ultimate streak player," in a feature that he wrote years later for Pin Action Magazine.

There are still 12 bowling centers in metropolitan Guadalajara, and while Bol Guadalajara and Bol 2000 have closed, the original Tapatio Bowling remains, along with two new Tapatio locations: Matrix and La Calma. Another beautiful location, Bowlerama Bugambilias, has opened and rivals Bol Polanco in Mexico City, with unique multiple levels of recreation fun overlooking the Bugambilias suburb.

It's truly amazing how the United States and Mexico are coming together once again with a reciprocal agreement to benefit both countries. Our hope is that it will continue and we can once again enjoy the mild chocolate notes of Mexican Coffee while relaxing on the rooftop cafe at the beautiful new Bowlerama Bugambilias. Arriba!

first PBA50 Tour title, got off to an early lead in the title match leading by seven pins in the fifth frame but the momentum shifted when LeClair struck in the seventh, eighth and ninth frames and Ventura left a 2-10 split in the ninth frame which he failed to convert ending his bid for the win.

“Making the right adjustments was really crucial in the title match,” said LeClair, who went undefeated in match play (11-0) earlier in the day which helped vault him to the top seed for the finals “I was throwing two totally different shots, playing the left lane throwing the ball faster and more direct to the pocket and the right lane having to throw the ball slower and hook it more. It can be a disaster if you don’t have the confidence to play two totally different shots on each lane and expect to win.”

Williams, who didn’t bowl in Hammond because he was competing in PBA League competition in Portland, Maine, started the season with wins in the first three tournaments.


Ventura, trying for his first PBA50 Tour win, notched his second runner-up finish of the season, also finishing second in the Johnny Petraglia BVL Open.

Ventura, the No. 4 seed started the stepladder with a 227-198 win over No. 5 seed five-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, New York, who was also trying for his first PBA50 Tour win.

Ventura then defeated PBA Hall of Famer and 10-time PBA50 Tour winner Ron Mohr of Las Vegas, 223-177, in the second match to advance to the semifinal match against three-time PBA50 Tour titlist Harry Sullins of Chesterfield Twp., Michigan. In a high-scoring match, Ventura started with the first eight strikes which was enough to hold off Sullins to win 268-245.

Mohr survived a long road to the finals advancing through the cashers’ round and two match play rounds to make it to the championship round. Sullins was trying to end an eight-year title drought with his last win coming in the 2011 Senior Lake County Open at Olympia Lanes.

TEXAS BOWLING PROPRIETOR REACHES 1,400-MILE MARK IN FIVE-MONTH HIKE TO RAISE FUNDS FOR BVL AND VETERANS

FAIRFAX, Va. – Kilroy is in the home stretch. Texas bowling proprietor David “Kilroy” Kellerman, who earlier this spring embarked on a more than five-month hike through the Appalachian Trail to raise funds for BVL (Bowlers To Veterans Link), is closing in on the end of his remarkable fundraising efforts for veterans.

Nearly four months after starting his 2,190-hike through 14 states to raise awareness and funds to support BVL and veterans programs, Kellerman has completed two-thirds of his solo trek, with less than 800 miles left in his journey. The bowling industry rallied for Kellerman at last month’s Bowl Expo in Las Vegas, helping him to surpass his original goal of \$50,000. His target now is \$75,000 before he finishes the hike in mid-September.

BVL Board Chair John LaSpina, whose Maple Family Centers pledged \$2 per mile for Kilroy’s journey, is encouraging others to help Kellerman reach his goal and also get donations in before the end of BVL’s fiscal calendar on July 31. “David’s perseverance and determination to complete this journey for all veterans are tremendously inspiring,” said LaSpina. “Everyone at BVL and throughout the bowling industry is so grateful for his commitment to veterans, and we want to welcome him home by helping him reach his new goal of \$75,000.”

The toughest part of the hike to date may have been the exceedingly rocky terrain of eastern Pennsylvania, where he was joined by BVL Executive Director Mary Harrar for an 11.5-mile day hike. Harrar was inspired by her time with Kellerman and moved by the support for his efforts from his fellow proprietors at Bowl Expo. “It was an incredible experience to hike with David and get a little insight to what he faces on a daily basis and how motivated he is by the support from the bowling community,” said Harrar. “He is determined to complete this hike because of how it will help BVL to continue to support programs that make a difference in the lives of veterans.”

After starting at Springer Mountain in Georgia on April 3, Kellerman hit the 1,300-mile mark in early July as he left Pennsylvania, and has crossed through New Jersey and New York in recent days. The trail ends at Mount Katahdin in Maine. Only one in four thru-hikers actually complete the journey each year, and less than 700 people accomplished the feat in 2018. The full Appalachian Trail passes through six National Parks, eight National Forests, and two wildlife refuges.

Donations to support Kilroy’s Appalachian Trail Hike for Veterans can be made at BVL.org. Follow the final weeks of the hike on Kilroy’s Facebook page.

Founded in 1942, BVL is bowling’s oldest and own charity and is consistently acknowledged for efficient and effective programming delivered with extremely low overhead. Kellerman, who co-owns Mel’s Lone Star Lanes in Georgetown, Texas, is self-funding the trip to ensure the maximum benefit of his fundraising efforts for veterans programs.

1991 – PART 1

Wait til you read about some crazy tournament ideas that were supposed to entice shooters to take a shot. Dollar signs spoke louder than words.

- Check this one. The **Showboat** offered a “change your life” offer. They just finished “40 New cars in 40 Days,” and the next event was “Win \$1,000 a month til the year 2000!” That’s 10 years!
 - Bowlers in the Southeast District donated truck loads of food, clothing and toys for the L.A. Children’s Hospital Xmas drive.
 - Harry Grant’s Classic was a success until the last day. Someone protested the results to the A.B.C. The top 15 were affected, so no checks were paid out for 3 months.
 - 26 centers in So. California were still having squads of “Gold Stamp” fun.
 - Those 40 cars given away at the **Showboat** were Saturns.
 - Robby’s All Stars was THE greatest ladies league in So. Cal. They knew their game and worked at it. On the lanes every week: Paula Vidad, Virginia Norton, Sharon Aronson, Therese Abair, Alisha Caballero, Janine Ditch, Michelle Garcia, Stacy Rider, Christy Asher, Dina Braasch, and many more. (Sorry if I missed YOUR name, you didn’t bowl good the first of January 1991.)
 - New balls were being advertised. How about Boss, Leverage, Potar, Axis, Gem Tek, Kaboose, Kranker King? Most were stinkers made in somebody’s back yard. (That’s a rumor.)
 - WANTED: Scorekeepers for the AC-Delco PBA Classic at **Gable House**. Delco was a big supporter of the stop at **Gable House**.
 - The So.Calif. Bowling Writers held a yearly awards banquet. This would be the 29th in 1991. Awards included Hall of Fame, Ray Hanley, Roy Bade Sponsor Award, Connie Marchione Award, plus a couple that rotated. Every center bought a table! M.C’s included everyone from Johnny Carson to Earl Anthony. All Hall of Famers were introduced, short speeches made, and proprietors were recognized. When the Pacific Bowler went out of business, writers grew older and the Corporations no longer wished to be involved, the tradition died. A sad day!
 - P.J. Carroll, a VERY big sponsor for VERY big leagues had a boat at Marina Del Rey. Chris Schenkel and Bo Burton used it to advertise the So.Calif. bay area P.B.A. event at **Gable House**.
 - Interesting competitions: “House Bowlers Only Tourny”, “Trash One”, “Senior Singles”, “Sweetheart Doubles”, “Rock N Bowl”, “Donkee Tour”, “Moonlight Bowling for Dollars”, “Senior Doubles”, “Youth PBA Style Singles”, “Beginner Bumpers”, “5,8,10,15, and 20 Gamers”, etc. The Best event for “non-competition” was the Pro-Ams. Meet Celebs and win a prize. Good stuff.
 - Glenn Allison came in second in the “**Ridgecrest**” Western Seniors event. Guess how much he won!! \$900. What else?!!
 - Active West opened \$6 Million dollar **Riverside Lanes** It was the first built by Active West. Before, they bought existing older centers and did re-models.
 - FACT: The ABC was formed in 1885, the WIBC in 1916, the ABC voted to open their membership to women. The battle for membership dues began!
 - Questions proposed by a few readers: Why not put Pete Rose in the Hall of Fame? Why not declare Allison’s 900 number one? Are bowlers really athletes? Why doesn’t Chris Schenkel learn the bowling game? Could Gaylord Perry have been a champion without his spit ball?
 - Pictured on page 8, January 14, 1991. Eva Mason, LAWBA Secretary, presenting Tish Johnson with a 300 ring, an 800 ring, an 800 series diamond medal, one 298 ring, and a high average medal. Tish was and IS a great bowler!
 - Billy Myers Jr. won the Super Bowl High Roller at the **Showboat**. Only 17 years old, he fitted and drilled his own winning Rhino. The \$50,000 High Roller was the biggest event in Vegas.
 - The Bowling Proprietors held a general membership meeting at the Santa Anita Race-track! \$30 each included lunch, race program, private betting windows, RESTROOMS, and a race named for the BPASC. (The meeting lasted an hour.)
 - Sonny Dew and Jim Padgett both popped 300’s at **Cal Bowl** on the same night. Fast forward to 2019, they still bowl league at **Cal Bowl**.
 - By actual count 72 centers advertised weekly in the Bowling News. 31 had house columns. 22 had tournament ads. Etc. CENTERS CARED ABOUT THEIR BOWLERS! THEY ORGANIZED LEAGUES, TOURNAMENTS AND EVENTS. BOWLING LOVERS KEPT THE GAME ALIVE AND REWARDING.
 - Paula Vidad and Mark Hammel opened a Pro Shop inside **Friendly Hills Bowl**.
 - Let’s not forget...”Valentines Day Moonlite Madness Mixed Doubles” at **Colima Lanes**, under the colored lights on February 14. Too early for April Fools Day!
 - First timer...**San Hi Lanes** put in an ad! After 30 years! Didn’t they have any empty lanes that needed filling?
 - Tony Zombo zinged a zany 300 at **Grananda Lanes** in February.
 - City of Bellflower banned smoking in public sports arenas. **Clark Center** was the first to comply (and complain.)
 - 3 biggies at **Chaparral Lanes** reported. 300/802 for John Davis, 300’s for Dane Wilk and John Smook, Paul Barraco 299. The best in the San Gabriel Valley were lured to **Chaparral** by Art Goddard and partners.
 - Sheryl Poole pounded out a 300 at **Eastland Lanes**. (As I mentioned before, I loved to bowl against her, but could never beat her.
- Wish #1, do a “Where are they now?” column. But too many have left the game, or left the earth.*
Wish #2, would be to have a bowling Hall of Fame and Museum in So. California.
Wish #3, that corporations loved bowlers and bowling as much as the dollar.
Wish #4, that a league bowler could cash a 20 dollar bill after 7pm in their center.
Wish #5, that more “old timers” would call me on Mondays to talk about “the good days”.

some key ball changes, made some key moves and, man, did my guys bowl good.”

Regarding Malott’s performance, Mack said, “It might have been the greatest performance by an anchor bowler I’ve ever seen. I call him ‘The Franchise’ for a reason.”

Portland, behind a string of four strikes in the middle of any otherwise error-free game, won the first point with a 228-206 decision over L.A. The Lumberjacks quickly surrendered their advantage with two splits and open frames to start game two, but rebounded behind five consecutive strikes and L.A. X’s inability to throw back-to-back strikes to win the game, 214-188, and sweep the first “race to 2 points” match.

The Lumberjacks carried their momentum into the second match, putting together two strings of four strikes – including three in the 10th frame by Malott – to win their third point, 221-197, and completed the four-point rout of L.A. X with a 247-208 win in game four, starting the decisive final game with five strikes while L.A. couldn’t overcome a barrage of single-pin spares.


