Doane Cole Wins Columbia 300 Traditions Bowling Classic – Southern California Defeats Sponsor To Capture \$2,500 Prize

FOUNTAIN VALLEY, CA – Doane Cole of Chatsworth, CA captured the title at the Columbia 300 Traditions Bowling Classic held at Fountain Bowl in Fountain Valley CA, July 29-30, 2006.

Cole defeated his sponsor, Charles Willison of Woodland Hills, CA, Steve Smith of San Diego, and Steve Gurrieri of Rowland Heights, CA in the tournament championship match to claim a \$2,500 first prize. Cole fired a 205 to best Willison (196), Smith (193), and Gurrieri (147).

The tournament paid out more than \$5,000 in prize money demonstrating the Columbia 300 commitment to competitive tournament bowling.

The Columbia 300 Traditions Bowling Classic moves on to San Antonio for its fourth tournament, to be conducted at Oak Hills Lanes August 26-27, 2006. The Columbia 300 TBC circuit then heads for a September 9-10 tour stop at St. Clair Bowl in suburban St. Louis.

Bowlers Journal Selects 68th All American Teams

It is the best of times . . . it is the worst of times.

With apologies to Charles Dickens, those "novel" words are an apt description of the circumstances America's best male and female bowlers are experiencing today.

The men's Professional Bowlers Tour is exciting, dynamic and evolving toward greatness... the women's Tour, where the best female bowlers in the world are supposed to display their talent, is M.I.A.

So, when the time came for the Bowlers Journal International editorial staff to choose its 2005-06 All-American Teams, the men's choices were relatively easy. The women's picks involved a few "X-factors" not normally considered in the process, but BJI is committed to keeping women in the spotlight, Tour or no Tour.

The men's BJI squad is captained by a young man who had a dominant year. Tommy Jones, Mauldin, S.C., took home four PBA titles in the 2005-06 Tour season and topped the money list with \$301,700. The four players joining Jones on the first team were Norm Duke, Clermont, Fla.; Patrick Allen, Tarrytown, N.Y.; Mike Scroggins, Amarillo, Texas; and Walter Ray Williams Jr., Ocala, Fla.

Duke had eight television appearances last season, but it wasn't until his seventh that he captured his lone title and the 23rd of his career. Allen, captain of the 2004-05 BJ All-American Team, slipped a little, but still had a terrific year with two titles. Scroggins won once and earned more than \$200,000 for the first time in his career, easily his best year on Tour. And Walter Ray? All he did was tie the immortal Earl Anthony's 41 titles with his "normal" superlative performance, a record 15th appearance on the team. Anthony still has a leg up in that all of his 12 appearances were consecutive.

The men's second team is led by Chris Barnes, Flower Mound, Texas, who missed five weeks with an injury but finished strong to win the Tournament of Champions. He then defended his \$200,000 payday in the Motel 6 Roll to Riches, but

TENPIN SLANTS

LAS VEGAS—This story, like many others, begins in Las Vegas. It was during the week of the recent Bowling Writers Assn. of America Convention and the Bowling Proprietors Assn. of America’s International Bowl Expo 2006.

Both annual events were held at the Hilton Hotel, with the Bowl Expo exhibits on display at the nearby Las Vegas Convention Center.

The many thousands of visitors to Bowl Expo included a surprise visitor, Jack Cook. I hadn’t seen him since he was the Director of Bowling Operations at the old Showboat Hotel/Casino/Bowling Center.

Cook was responsible for making the 106-lane center into the most famous tenpin facility in the world. Although a modest man, Cook will tell you, “It took a long time but I had the best crew ever assembled.”

It was Cook, however, who deserved the credit for making the ‘Boat so popular. Foreign visitors would make the Showboat a must-see on their travel agenda.

That happened because Cook saw to it that the Showboat hosted some of the most memorable tournaments on the Professional Bowlers Assn. Tour. The ‘Boat staged PBA events for more than 30 years, or longer than any other tour sponsor.

When the Showboat fell on hard times, the property was sold and became The Castaways. It was an unfortunate name change, for business continued to dwindle. At the time, it was rumored that the Bowling department was the only one making a profit. So, like an old Hollywood dowager, the one-famous tourist site faded into oblivion.

Last January, The Castaways was imploded. The land where

the Showboat used to stand so proudly is now a vacant lot.

For the next few years, Jack Cook went from job to job. That is, until his luck changed for the better and things began to look up.

This past December, Cook married a sweet Texas lass named Kaye. Then he was offered a job by John McCoy, the owner of the burgeoning NABI (National Amateur Bowlers Inc.) tournament club, which is headquartered in Kansas City.

And it wasn’t just any old job. Cook’s title was vice president in charge of marketing and sales. It was an ideal position for Cook, an excellent executive and a man of many ideas.

Cook and McCoy were at Bowl Expo, not only to see the hundreds of exhibits, but also to finalize details of the NABI National Championship Tournament, scheduled to be held July 14-21 at the Orleans Bowling Center. The annual NABI pinfest was to begin exactly two weeks after Bowl Expo concluded.

Looking for a good bowling writer to help publicize the NABI Tournament, Cook put in a call to Hall of Fame writer Dick Evans of Florida, who was attending the BWAA Convention. Evans, arguably the most prolific pin scribe in the country, was hired. And I was hired to help him as a gofer...like go for some coffee, black.

“NABI Week” consisted of 10 different tournaments. Nine events offered from \$2,000 to \$5,000 to the winner. The climactic event was the NABI National Championship, in which the first-place prize was \$40,000.

Remember, these were all amateurs, about 1,200 of them who belonged to NABI regional clubs throughout the U.S.

This veteran ink-stained wretch has been covering bowling for 55 years, yet I had never before experienced anything like NABI Week. It was a blast, literally.

What impressed me most was the feeling of a family outing during NABI Week. Also, the great sportsmanship displayed by all the participants, even when they were bowling each other for a coveted NABI title.

Read what Dick Evans, in one of his many stories, wrote about the NABI bowlers:

“They (the bowlers) are not the super high-average bowlers who are rolling those astronomical scores that are upsetting the bowling purist. They are the guys and gals who get excited by a two-bagger, converting a tough spare shot or breaking 200.

“No one averages above 205 and sandbaggers are not invited. Matter of fact, it’s as tough for a sandbagger to get into the NABI Tournament as it is for a card counter to sit down at a single-deck blackjack table at The Orleans and get into a game.

“Both are among the endangered species.”

While the 1,200 NABI bowlers represented a cross section of America, they all had one thing in common—they were there to have fun first and then to win a NABI title.

I wrote a story about how Nathaniel (Nate) Whitfield Sr., 64, a retired attorney from Durham, N.C., won the “NABI Orleans Casino Classic” and received \$4,000.

In the same tournament, 84-years-young Frank Jacobs, also of Durham, tied for third place and got \$1,000. Jacobs was the sentimental favorite and spectators cheered loudly whenever Jacobs got up to bowl.

I also wrote how Joyce Anderson, rolling a 39-year-old Columbia White Dot 12-pound plastic bowling ball, captured the “Sazio’s Ladies Classic,” worth \$2,000. (Sazio’s is the fine Italian restaurant at The Orleans and was the tournament sponsor.)

But the big NABI Week winner was Mamie Parker, a 62-year-old nurse who won the NABI National Championship. Parker, another member of the strong Durham NABI tournament club, pocketed the \$40,000 check.

“I’m going to take it (the prize check) and put it in a money market account, or something,” she said. “I am planning on retiring after next year and the money will come in handy,” Evans wrote.

You can bet that Mamie Parker also will use some of her winnings to finance her trip to NABI Week 2007. She and all the other NABI bowlers will be returning to The Orleans, as it will be the second year of a three-year contract between the two entities.

that event does not count toward PBA points or All-American consideration. Rounding out the second team are Jason Couch, Clermont, Fla.; Wes Malott, Austin, Texas; Ryan Shafer, Elmira, N.Y., and Pete Weber, St. Ann, Mo. All but Shafer won a title in 2005-06.

The women’s squad has no captain for 2005-06, and no second team. No disrespect intended, simply a reflection of the relatively few significant events available to them in the June 15, 2005-to-June 14, 2006 period. Even their biggest event, the USBC Queens, fell outside the time frame for the selection process. The 2005 Queens, won by Tennelle Milligan, was before June 15, ‘05, and the 2006 event was staged after June 14, 2006. Shannon Pluhowsky, this year’s winner, will be considered for next year’s team; Milligan made last year’s.

Nonetheless, there were several outstanding performances by American women, most notably Kelly Kulick’s history-making performance in the 2006 PBA Tour Trails. The Union, N.J.’s sixth-place finish made national news and became the PBA’s biggest story of the year, and for that incredible feat, and several more good regional performances, she is part of the women’s team this year. Her upcoming season as an exempt PBA player has the potential to be the biggest bowling story in decades.

Joining Kulick on the elite female fivesome are fellow pros Leanne Barrette, Elk Grove, Calif. and Liz Johnson, Cheektowaga, N.Y., and amateurs Lynda Barnes, Flower Mound, Texas, and Diandra Asbaty, Chicago. Barrette made the team by virtue of her outstanding performance in the 2005 WIBC Tournament, in which she turned in a record-setting 774 to win singles and a huge 2231, another record, for the all-events crown.

Johnson, like Kulick, made her mark against the best male bowlers in the world — in PBA events. Riding the momentum from her second-place television finish in a national PBA Tour event a few weeks prior, she became the first woman ever to win a PBA regional crown.

On the amateur side, two American women turned in outstanding performances on the world stage. Team USA stars Diandra Asbaty and Lynda Barnes continued to roll over their international competition. Asbaty’s performances for the year and years past was rewarded with the ultimate honor — a spot in the World Bowling Writers’ Hall of Fame — not bad for a 25-year-old. She proved her prowess again by winning the 2006 U.S. Amateur title.

In 2005, Barnes won the U.S. Amateur to earn her eight appearance on Team USA. She then won the QubicaAMF World Cup, and finished fourth in the 2006 U.S. Amateur, earning a spot on Team USA through 2007, which will give her an unmatched 10 years on the team.

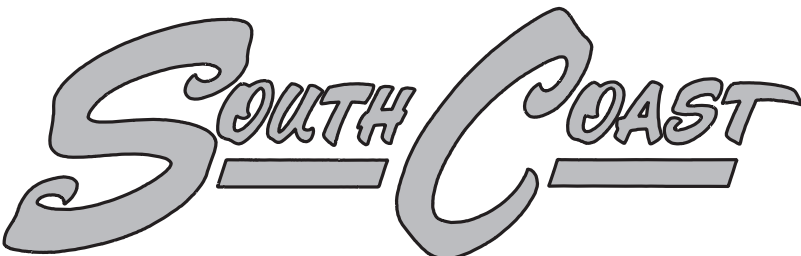

Rita Wahl Wins First ABTA Title at CAL

Sam Sanicolas Hits Match Game, Newman Bags Match Series

LAKEWOOD—Rita Wahl finally put it all together. The Super Lady let her bowling speak loudly as she did it up good as she won her first ABTA title. She finally downed the top Seed a hot shooting J.T. Jackson in the title game, to thrill a nice crowd at popular and accommodating CAL Bowl.

Rita's stellar performance in the three squad early event at CAL saw her top a nice field of 192 bowlers (3 squads only) in the Special Event. The shot was good, producing great cut scores of +95 (men) and +51 for the women. We returned 44 bowlers to the Semifinals. Also added to the Semis were the Super Seniors Ely Cruz, Sam Sanicolas, Anita Smith and Roberta Nakunz.

Leading the Semis was J.T. Jackson who had a nice +189 to be top seed, sit out and bowl for the title. He was followed by Bret Rose at +165, who would receive a first round bye in the single elims and enter in round two. It took a +68 to make the Sweet 16 finals which included three women.

The bowlers took to the lanes. In the first round single elims and losing were Randy Antazo, Rey Cruz, Ken Seiple Jr, Phil Diaz, Ronnie Cordero, James Abilar, and Ernie Juarez.

They got checks of \$100 in 10-16th places.

In round two, being eliminated were Bret Rose, Jo Ann Courtney, Jose Borromeo, and Roland "Pacquo" Suase. They cashed in 6-9th places and \$110.00 each.

Round three had Sam Sanicolas down Irene Kang 207-190. Rita Wahl got to Oliver Esmejarda in a tight one 229-228. Irene and Oliver were 4th and 5th with great bowling at Cal, with Rita and Sam to meet for the right to bowl Jackson for the title.

Harvey Knows, Knows A Lot About Bowling

HUNTINGTON PARK — Harvey Hemmingsen celebrated his 99th birthday at Gage Bowl probably rolling a 144 average he carried when he started competing in the Northrup Mixed with his wife. Everybody bowled then, especially if you worked in the aircraft industry; centers in Gardena, El Segundo, Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Harbor City, Redondo Beach and and Torrance.

After WWII he moved to the peaceful Southeast to bowl at Lynwood Academy, South Gate, Maywood, Compton, Downey, Norwalk, Pico-Rivera. He didn't bowl in all 40 centers. Some of his friends would say he bowled all over, not in leagues so much as tournaments, ABC sanctioned events, State, City (SEDBA) and a couple of Nationals.

Harvey was around when the American Bowling Congress chartered the Southeast District Bowling Association in 1935 with headquarters in Huntington Park. He knew, and bowled with the early leaders, J.d. "Joe" Anderson, the Roselles Pete, Ray and Miles; James Pontius, Vern Silkenson, Dewey Ossea, Harold Bishop, Abe Fraier, Stan Schreier, Don and Howard Koehn, Ray and Doug Sveta, Gordy Stanchfield, Ben Decker and Oscar Brown.

Later years, he got mixed up with the Gage Bowl Tex Barker crowd going to senior state events and the new SLACBA tournaments. His Missile Bowl/ Northrup quintet placed 20th and they shared \$30.

Harvey wasn't a big money player. Whenever there was a friendly pot game at Lynwood Academy he was first to get in. Standfield would be his partner, if Lynwood was dead, they drove down Long Beach Blvd. to Mel Peterson's South Gate Bowl, nothing there over to Lou Delaney's Trianon Bowl or Koehn's Beacon Bowl. If it was Thursday, they knew H.P. Rec's Glasshouse people's hot shots would have a game going. Yes, Dusty Rhoads, John Law, Marv Ashley, Art Walsh, Steve Reece, yah, they'd play for a buck-a-game.

Doug Sveta's Gage Bowl came about when Hank Catalano created his 14 Automated Sports Center in the late 1950s when the automated pinsetters took the place of pin boys. Automated is gone. Gage Bowl is still open 24 hours.

Harvey probably remembers when ABC dues were 65 cents a year, open bowling was 20 cents a game, league play, three games 65 cents plus a nickel for the foul-line judge, another nickel for the secretary and the house did the league sheets for free.

He probably remembers 1933 when prohibition came to an end. Utah became the 36th state to ratify the 21st amendment repealing the 18th allowing 3.4 beer to flow and the word "Beer-Frame" became popular.

At first almost every league had a local brewery sponsor, Eastside, Acme, Golden Creme, 102, Regal, Padre, Lucky Lager. Bowlers had a feast, five-cents a glass, free snacks, then gradually the price increased, laws were passed limiting alcoholic freebies. Oh, woe is us the boom/gloom.

Harvey learned fast why L.A.. County's Southeast District had so many centers. It was the heavy industry center, steel, aluminum, rubber, auto assembly, so on and their employees liked to bowl. And Huntington Park/ Walnut Park became their bedroom.

Up until the 50s the Southland wasn't real friendly, lots of discrimination, even sports were for Caucasians only.

Brunswick-Balke-Collender Co. came to L.A. By 1927 they had more than 35 tenpin centers and they sold some fancy centers fit for the women. Yes, women had a place, Lynwood Academy, eight soft maple lanes (easy scoring), were financed by the Lynwood Savings Bank in 1928. Ed Snowbrick was the chairman and his wife Ruth was socially active and encouraged women to bowl.

Women got to bowl afternoons for 15 cents a game. Women from H.P. Rec., Mildred Hopping, Edna Fountain, Emily Dalton, Phlin Bohlin, Juanita Rich, Fran Smith, Eva Mason, Vi Wyckoff, Phyllis Knoll, Edna Cobb and a few more worked hard for recognition. Yes, they were discriminated against.

Harvey, and his friends, did a lot of volunteering, donating, helping the kids and women get to love tenpins. I know Harvey enough that he would say, I didn't do anything, I just love to bowl — well, it kept him alive and happy.

Editor's Note: Thanks Frank for a glimpse into the past. How did you remember all those names? Past issues of the Bowling News? Folks, Frank was there. Been reporting bowling stories and stats since 1935.

John Jowdy Sez:

The National Sporting Goods Association conducts an annual study of participation in all sports. The latest study revealed that 45.5 million Americans, ages 7 and over, bowled in 2005...the highest total in 22 years.

Conversely, USBC (United States Bowling Congress) figures reveal the fact that organized bowling is gradually declining. Yet, weekend tournaments like the ABT and NABI tournaments, geared to attract lower average bowlers, continue to offer enticing prizes and seem to be holding their own.

Interestingly, the PBA membership has grown to record numbers. However, megabucks tournaments, particularly the High Roller and the Mini Eliminator, are now competing against one another and are exhausting and draining the pool of “action” players. After all, there are a limited number of bowlers who can afford to compete in ALL megabucks activities.

Several decades ago, the High Roller offered a guaranteed first place prize of \$100,000 but, due to increased competition, prize money has fallen off. Currently, promoters of these big events advertise first place checks of \$50,000. They ADVERTISE “guaranteed” \$50,000 first place check but this is not to say they always pay the “guaranteed” monies. Consider the Mini Eliminator, which this year altered its prize list AFTER all entrants arrived in Las Vegas. This, despite the fact that at least 60 bowlers came from foreign countries.

In contrast, the granddaddy of all “amateur” contests, the National Amateur Bowlers, Inc (NABI) quietly goes about its business with limited fanfare, pay fully guaranteed prizes, and continue to draw over 1500 bowlers to its annual NABI national tournament in Las Vegas.

Perhaps there is good reasoning for this. Operators of the High Roller and Mini Eliminator tournaments are profit driven promotions... and rightfully so. They spend great sums of money promoting their events and make no secret of seeking handsome profits. This is their means of livelihood.

On the other hand, John McCoy, owner and operator of NABI has made most of his money in the plastics business. But his first love has always been the bowling business. He and his four brothers owned a bowling center in Kansas City and, together with bowling promoter Lloyd Harless; they ran a local tournament group called the “Tournament Bowlers Association”. This tournament was solely for low average bowlers. In 1982, John and brother Jim McCoy decided to go national and formed National Amateur Bowlers Inc. (NABI). They started out with 48 clubs across the country and added Dave and Judy Soutar as part of the team.

McCoy says, “People are hungry for competition on the ground level. That’s why we use handicaps. At the grass roots, they bowl in different centers most weekends so they learn how to adjust. We try to bowl on normal conditions and stay away from house conditions for the most part.”

The competitive environment as well as bowling instruction under varying conditions creates an environment that average bowlers can thrive on—NABI has bowlers from every walk of life; men, women, the young and the old. All are welcome.

NABI held its first national tournament at the most popular bowling center in the world, the Showboat Lanes, in Las Vegas. NABI grew to 68,000 members in 1990 and moved national finals to the Orleans Hotel and Casino in 1995.

NABI is John McCoy’s baby. He has sold a great portion of his plastics business and advertises on the internet. He has plunged headlong into the betterment of NABI. Membership is presently 36,000. McCoy has hired Jack Cook, former manager of the Showboat Lanes as his driving force to increase awareness of the NABI tournaments and increase membership. To date, Cook is well on his way to achieving his and McCoy’s desired goals.

The NABI national tournament has something for everyone. For example, during this year’s tournament at the Orleans, they featured additional events such as Two squads of “Beat the Ebonite Pros”, with squads following in “Challenge” and Kickoff” divisions. In a nutshell, in addition to the competition, continuous bowling challenges kept the participants as active as they desired. Most of all, everyone was having the time of their lives.

First place checks in various divisions ranged from \$2000 to \$40,000. The National champion won \$40,000, the runner-up collected \$20,000, unbelievable sums for amateur prizes.

NABI staff runs a very tight ship and that shapes up to meaningful scoring and fair play. They have the power to re-rate a player in the middle of the tournament and have twice won cases where their authority was challenged in courts. Consequently, sandbaggers avoid NABI tournaments. The averages range from 137 to 205 with a whole lot of bowlers in between the high and low. Many members have bowled in every NABI national tournament. It’s like a reunion for a lot of bowlers.

While this is strictly an amateur event, strict rules are enforced. Balls are checked in the paddock. Each bowler is allowed to list eight balls on his/her card and they must ALL be checked in. There are strict dress codes and NABI has very few problems in this area because the bowlers realize it is an adult recreation and dress accordingly.

John McCoy is still an avid bowler whose competitive drive has not deserted him. However, his first love is NABI. He has visions of bringing it back to its glory days of 65,000 members. While this seems to be a tall order, this is not entirely out of the realm of possibility.

Average bowlers are hungry for competition and NABI is the venue that will provide that opportunity to compete for enticing prize funds as well. Under the direction of Jack Cook, it may happen sooner than anyone can imagine.

Up Your Average

Instruction to Help Raise Your Scores

The Modern Follow Through An Important Improvement To Increase Accuracy and Consistency

For most of bowling’s history, bowlers were taught to follow through in certain ways...ways which no longer work too well in modern conditions and with modern equipment. Therefore, a more modern version has been developed, which works far better today. This month we’ll discuss both the old and the new. Actually, the old style follow throughs have gone through two or three versions during past years. One or the other of these, many bowlers still use today, with varying degrees of success (or failure) in modern conditions.

IN THIS CORNER...THE ‘TOUCH YOUR EAR’ FOLLOW THROUGH.

This ‘reach for the sky’ or ‘shake hands with God’ type follow through is an old, pretty universally accepted technique, still used by many. It is often taught for the purpose of eliminating short stroking...the early, chicken winging elbow bend which can drastically weaken ball power at the pins. It seems acceptable to many as long as the arm can be kept straight almost to the top. A big problem, however is that few bowlers can actually avoid bending the elbow before it gets to shoulder level...and when it bends, the forearm follows the turning hand across the body. Presto! Chicken wing.

In an effort to avoid this, bowlers are sometimes taught to touch the ear with the upper arm when doing the high follow through. This ear touching tactic actually bends the entire arm inward, causing the forearm and hand to cut across over the top of the head, creating the same type of weak rev action as the chicken wing. Try this once or twice, and notice where your wrist and hand end up when you touch your ear. See what I mean?

Those bowlers who are capable of avoiding the short stroke (which includes some professionals) often solve the problem by delaying the elbow bend until *after* the arm has passed shoulder level, then hitting themselves in the back, behind the shoulder, with the hand. This helps avoid chicken winging some of the time. The trouble is, often the hand hits the back behind the neck instead of behind the shoulder. Try this for yourself also and you’ll notice the chicken wing is still there, except it’s higher up. So what? It’s still a chicken wing, and it still weakens the shot.

IN THE OPPOSITE CORNER...THE SHOULDER HIGH, BREAK POINT TARGETED FOLLOW THROUGH.

In this type of follow through the concept of the pendulum swing is utilized to the very finish of the armswing. What happens in this technique is that after the release, the arm is allowed to run out of momentum and come to a stop. To make this easier to visualize, imagine the arm of a grandfather clock swinging downward...then, at the bottom of the swing, suddenly losing its pendulum. Once the pendulum has dropped off, imagine about how far the arm would travel before running out of momentum and coming to a stop. Well, that’s approximately how far a bowler’s arm should go in finishing its follow through motion...approximately shoulder high. Notice, I said *approximately*; a bit higher or a bit lower makes little difference.

When executing this follow through two other important things become easier to accomplish. 1), with a shoulder high follow through it is far easier to keep the elbow from bending at all, thus finishing with the arm straight all the way to the end. With a straight arm finish a chicken wing is obviously much more easily avoided. 2), this technique also makes it easier to keep the arm/hand following through *in line with the bowling shoulder, which is critical*. Remember, a pendulum swings back and forth, not sideways.

Some bowlers find this a bit difficult at first, partially because even a slight overturning of the hand during the release often causes the arm to follow in that direction...across the body. I’ve found this relatively easy to correct with many bowlers by having them imagine they have an eye in the front of the bowling shoulder and seeing the hand with that eye at the finish of the follow through. Following through toward the break point is another trick which often works. Years ago I noticed that at the end of such a follow through my hand appeared to be approximately aligned with the pins two lanes to my right (left for left handers). Sure enough, that finish position found my hand directly aligned with the bowling shoulder, as desired. *Pulling the follow through can be completely avoided with this tactic!*

Once pressed into the muscle memory, most bowlers are surprised at how well this works. It helps improve accuracy, consistency and most of all, ball power at the pins. This is because when done properly, this technique helps develop a highly desirable *inside/out* swing. Those of you who play golf are aware of just how important an inside/out swing is in that sport. Well, it’s just as important in bowling, and here’s how it works:

THE INSIDE/OUT SWING

In golf the inside/out swing is important because it eliminates the dreaded, ball weakening slice by straightening out the shot and even creating a more desirable draw, or slight hook. It is done by keeping the hands and clubhead close to the body during the downswing, then swinging in a slight outward direction during the beginning of the follow through. This is an oversimplification, but it’ll serve our purpose here.

In bowling, such a swing also finds the arm close to the body at the bottom of the downswing, with the ball usually no more than an inch or so from the ankle of the finishing foot. That closeness is referred to as being *inside*, which means that at that point the ball is closer to the body than the bowling shoulder.

Next, if the proper follow through procedure is followed, the arm must swing very slightly *away* from the body after the release (during the follow through) in order to get to its finish position in front of the shoulder. So...at the bottom of the swing the arm/hand are considered as being *inside*, while the alignment with the bowling shoulder has created that slight *outside* position at the finish.

This is why bowlers who allow the arm to move even slightly away from the body during the downswing, then inward, across the body during the follow through, often have pin action problems. Weak 10s, 5-7 or 8-10 splits (weak 7s, 7-9 or 5-10 splits for left handers) are often the result on what my have appeared to be perfect pocket hits.

So...While it may very well take some practice (video taping can help, by the way) this type of follow through should pay off handsomely once developed.

THE BOTTOM LINE

In my opinion, the two items discussed here have never received enough attention from either bowlers or coaches. I often wonder why, in light of the often dramatic scoring improvements shown by players who master these techniques. As important as armswing, release, ball choice, etc., etc. admittedly are, poor position at the line and poor follow through can and often do mess up otherwise good shots. Try these techniques...you’ll like them!

Darby defeated Heston 195 to 159 with handicap and moved onto face 3rd seed Glenn, Glenn denied Darby’s try for 4th title by defeating her 207 -180 with handicap and moved up to face 2nd seed Cronlund. Glenn won again by ousting Cronlund 216-171 with handicap to get in the championship final against Hoffman.

Hoffman became a first time Senior World Champion by beating Glenn 179+35 for 214 to 147+24 for 171. Glenn placed as runner-up for 2nd time as she was in 2003.

WILLINGHAM BEATS KELLER FOR WORLD DEAF WOMEN CHAMPIONSHIP

NDWBA’S flagship event World Deaf Women’s Championship drew an all time low 13 entries. In it’s first 13 years starting in 1981, it drew 100 or more entries 10 times with a high of 214 in 1989 at Las Vegas. Since 1994 the entries started dropping and in the last 4 years, sadly the numbers were 19, 21, 17 and 22. The event used to draw women bowlers from Canada, Sweden, France and Australia.

The three day tournament began with all 13 bowlers bowl two days qualifying round of 6 games with handicap for the top 8 bowlers stepladder shootout match plays. At the end of 12 games the eventual winner Texan Gayle Willingham got the position of first seed in the one game stepladder match play. Her teammates on the winning Texas Team Stacey Pate and Tina Wimberley were seeded 2nd and 3rd respectively. At the bottom of 1st round shootout stepladder were 6th seed Texan Jerilyn Keller, a three time member of Deaf Team USA, 7th seed Tina Gomez and 8th seed Julie Warren. Keller, a 192 ave. with 4 handicap won with 203+4/207 and advanced to 2nd round. Warren had 160+44/204 for 7th place and Gomez 169+30/199 to place 8th.

In 2nd round Keller faced 4th seed Ali Gredinger, AR and 5th seed Barbara Loniewski and beat them with her 234+4/238 to Loniewski’s 186+43/229 (5th place) and Gredinger’s 139+32/171 (6th place). Keller moved into semi-finals shootout against Pate and Wimberley and won with her 200+4/204 to advance to Championship finals against waiting Willingham. Pate had 144+46/190 for 3ed and Wimberley 142+39/181 for 4th place.

In the all Texan championship final, Keller could not get strikes to catch up with Willingham and lost 158+4/162. Willingham just scored 162+32/194 to win her first World Championship. Keller placed 2nd for the 2nd as she was the runner up in 1995.

Defending champion L. LuAnn Burkhalter, YX failed to qualify by 31 pins and finished in 10th place.

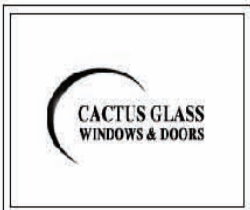


