

Kovalova Rolls 300 To Win 2019 Pepsi PWBA Louisville Open by Daniel Farish and Aaron Smith - USBC Communications

LOUISVILLE, Ky. – Dasha Kovalova of Ukraine became the fourth bowler in Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour history to roll a televised 300 game as she captured the win at the 2019 Pepsi PWBA Louisville Open on Saturday.

Kovalova posted 12 consecutive strikes in the championship match at Executive Strike and Spare to defeat United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Liz Johnson of Palatine, Illinois, 300-163, to win her second career PWBA Tour title.

The 24-year-old right-hander claimed \$10,000 for the win and an additional \$10,000 for the perfect game on CBS Sports Network from Go Bowling!


"Honestly, I don't remember too much – I had tunnel vision," said Kovalova, who won the 2019 USBC Queens. "I was really nervous, but once I tripped that 4 pin (on the 10th shot) I knew I had to make a move. That's what brought me back. When I'm nervous, it's good for me to go back to basics. I made a one-and-one move, made two shots and it worked."

Mark Williams Wins PBA60 Dick Weber Championship for First PBA60 Title PBA Hall of Famer outlasts Rick Minier 177-175

FORT WAYNE, Ind. – Seven-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour and three-time PBA50 Tour titlist Mark Williams defeated Rick Minier 177-175 in the title match to win the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global Friday at Pro Bowl West for his first PBA60 title.

In the final tournament of the 2019 PBA50/60 season and third event for players 60 and over, both Williams and Minier struggled in the title match with three open frames each. Minier's most costly open came in the ninth when he left a 7-10 split.

Williams, who was the top seed for the stepladder finals, was working on

to be safe but it turned out I was lucky to get it," the 61-year-old PBA Hall of Famer said. "I got the ball a little wide and it didn't hook back like I thought it would. Sometimes you need breaks to win and I guess that was the one I needed."

The low-scoring title match came as a surprise to Williams after a relatively high-scoring semifinal match in which Minier, the No. 2 seed for the finals, beat No. 5 seed Hall of Famer Brian Voss 279-228. "I think the conditions really changed and caught continued on page 5



Dasha Kovalova Kovalova rolled 19 strikes in her two wins Saturday, never missing the pocket, but her look prior to her semifinal match against Colombia's Maria José Rodriguez suggested she may be relying more on her spare shooting to advance.

A jump to the left quickly changed her path on the way to a 226-198 win against Rodriguez, and she didn't lose any momentum against Johnson, who was looking for her 25th career PWBA Tour title.

"In practice, I really didn't have great ball reaction," Kovalova said. "And I was nervous because I saw everybody else's ball reaction. After talking with Chuck (Gardner), I decided to make a really big jump and just go softer with my hand."

Kovalova's breakout season now has her joining reigning PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, as the only players with multiple wins in 2019.

"It's cool," Kovalova said. "Last season was good, but not that good. I didn't really expect it to be this good. I'm just happy things are going the way they are, and I'm excited for more."

CHESAPEAKE, Va. – Top qualifier Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, finished with four strikes to turn back a rally by AJ Chapman of Manchester, Iowa, and win the Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour's Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open Sunday at AMF Western Branch.

O'Neill, who earned his 11th career PBA Tour title and second of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, jumped into an early lead with five strikes to start the title match while Chapman left a 3-6-7-10 split and failed to convert in his third frame. Chapman, the No. 2 qualifier, rallied behind a string of four strikes to close his deficit to three you're not playing your 'A' game means a lot.

"I've worked on my game a lot this year, mainly on ball speed," he continued. "I throw it too hard when I'm doing bad, but I'm bowling a lot smarter and I think the end of the game showed that."

In the midst of arguably his best season in his 14-year career, the 37-yearold O'Neill has had third, fourth and fifth place finishes in addition to winning the PBA Hall of Fame Classic to start the year and later finishing second in the inaugural PBA Playoffs.

Greg Young Jr. of Viera, Florida, a 23-year-old rookie who had not finished higher than 30th in any previous PBA Tour appearance, eliminated 10time PBA Tour champion Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, 216-192, in the first match of the four-player stepladder finals. But Young ran into immediate trouble in the semifinal

a double heading into the 10th frame but got a scare when he left the 2-10 split after a light hit on his first shot of the frame. The resulting eight-count turned out to be enough to win the match. pins, but O'Neill struck out to end Chapman's bid for his first PBA Tour title.

"Everything this week, with the urethane equipment I was using, was about staying slow," O'Neill said. "Just to win an event when





PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: TEENAGE SON OF PBA TITLIST WINS IN PBA EAST REGION

Anthony Neuer of Lewisburg, Pa., the 17-year-old son of PBA Tour titlist Andy Neuer, rolled two clutch strikes in the 10th frame to defeat Anthony Pepe of Long Island City, N.Y., 256-247, in the championship match of the PBA Bowlers Supply/Storm Open at Colony Park Lanes North Sunday.

Neuer, an accomplished bowler with two USBC Junior Gold Titles, advanced to the semifinal round in this same event in 2018. The future McKendree University student earned \$2,500 in scholarship money as he became the second youngest amateur to win a PBA Regional event at the age of 17 years, 100 days. The youngest bowler to win a PBA Regional was Wesley Low Jr. at 15 years, 336 days, who won a PBA West Region tournament in Las Vegas in 2013.

Neuer qualified ninth and defeated Mark Scuderi Jr. of E. Rochester, N.Y., 2-0; Tommy Gollick of Oberlin, Pa., 2-0, and qualifying leader Kenneth Ryan of Farmingdale, N.J., 2-0, in best-of-three-game elimination matches before defeating Ryan Shafer, 279-187, in the semifinal match.

Pepe, a two-time Bowlers Supply Open champion, qualified third and defeated Tim Foy Jr. of Seaford, Del., 2-0, and Paul Bajorski of Islip, N.Y., 223-216, in the semifinal round to advance to the final match. Pepe earned \$1,300 as the runner-up. Bajorski and Shafer earned \$1,000 apiece as semifinal round losers.

• Seven-time PBA Tour titlist Dick Allen of Lexington, S.C., won the 31st PBA Crystal Automotive Spring Hill South Open presented by Track Sunday at Spring Hill Lanes, defeating non-PBA member Colin Champion of Spring Hill, Fla., 247-234, in the title match.

Allen, a 40-year-old PBA Tour veteran, previously won the Spring Hill tournament 15 years ago at the age of 25. In addition to winning his 25th PBA Regional title, Allen also took home the \$2,500 first prize.

While Allen waited in the wings as the No. 1 qualifier, Champion eliminated fellow non-pro Sean Riccardi of St. Petersburg, Fla., in the opening stepladder match, 254-213, and Cristian Azcona of Puerto Rico, 224-217, in the semifinal match. The Spring Hill event is the PBA South Region's longest-running tournament.

Sam Houston State's Bea Hernandez Named 2019 PBA Billy Welu Scholarship Award Winner

CHICAGO – Sam Houston State University sophomore and 2019 NCAA Women's Bowling Division I Rookie of the Year Bea Hernandez, has been named the winner of the 2019 PBA Billy Welu Scholarship Award which recognizes scholastic excellence and achievements in bowling.

A native of the Philippines, the 19-year-old international business major is entering her second year as a member of Sam Houston State's Bearkat women's bowling team. She holds a 3.9 grade point average, was named to the Dean's list in 2018 and most recently was named to the President's list in the spring of 2019.

In addition to her Rookie of the Year honor, she was named NCAA second team All-American, Southland Bowling Conference Championship Most Valuable Player and Newcomer of the Year.

"As a foreign student from a developing economy who is studying here in the U.S., the scholarship means so much to me and my family," said Hernandez. "It will definitely help me fulfill my dream of being able to finish my studies here (at Sam Houston State) and at the same time being able to continue to bowl at a high level of competition.

"I also would like to extend my gratitude to the PBA for this honor and to Sam Houston State bowling coach Brad Hagen, for making me a better person both on and off the lanes, and to my Bearkat teammates and the SHSU Athletics Department for making me feel at home."

In addition to her bowling accomplishments at Sam Houston State, Hernandez is a member of both the Philippines national adult and youth teams. She earned a doubles bronze medal in the 2017 Asian Youth Bowling Championships.

The \$1,000 scholarship award was established to annually recognize a college student who combines outstanding bowling talents with academic excellence. Welu, who passed away in 1974, was best known for his expert analysis alongside legendary ABC broad-caster and PBA Hall of Famer Chris Schenkel on the "Pro Bowlers Tour" series. Welu was a two-time PBA Tour champion and a member of the PBA Hall of Fame's inaugural induction class in 1975.



Johnson, who led the event by nearly 100 pins to earn the top seed Saturday, used the same ball throughout the first two days at Executive Strike and Spare but felt she needed to make a change on the championship pair.

Although the final game didn't go as she hoped, she was happy with her overall performance for the week.

"I was feeling like the farther I had to move in, I couldn't get the angle I wanted," said Johnson, who rolled a 300 game in the championship round of the 2001 Paula Carter Classic in Davie, Florida. "I thought the ball I started the finals with was going to give me the angle I wanted on the back part of the lane. It wasn't my best choice, but I wasn't making great shots either, so the combination of the two obviously hurt me. But, I'm incredibly proud of myself for the way I bowled this week."

Rodriguez, who was making her second consecutive championship-round appearance after a fourth-place finish at the PWBA East Hartford Open, advanced to the semifinals by defeating Germany's Birgit Pöppler, 190-181. Pöppler also had made the show in East Hartford, Connecticut, last week, finishing as the runner-up to O'Keefe.

Rodriguez kicked off Saturday's stepladder by edging Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, in a high-scoring match, 248-237. Rodriguez struck on her first delivery in the 10th frame and knocked over nine pins on her second to lock up the victory.

A total of 32 players earned spots in this week's main field. The top 24 players on the 2019 PWBA points list (through the PWBA East Hartford Open) secured automatic spots in the field, while a pre-tournament qualifier (PTQ) held Thursday at Executive Strike and Spare determined the bowlers filling the rest of the field.

Singapore's Cherie Tan was the lone player in the top 24 not to compete this week, which allowed nine bowlers to advance from the PTQ.

Defending PWBA Louisville Open champion Erin Mc-Carthy of Omaha, Nebraska, finished the week in 32nd place. The elite field bowled 16 games Friday to determine the top 12 competitors, which bowled an additional six games Saturday. Total pinfall for 22 games determined the five finalists. BowlTV.com provided livestream coverage of all rounds leading up to the stepladder finals.

The 2019 season will continue next week at the BowlerX.com PWBA Orlando Open. The event will take place Aug. 15-17 at Boardwalk Bowl in Orlando, Florida, with finals Aug. 17 at 1 p.m. on CBS Sports Network.



Four PBA50 superstars – Walter Ray Williams Jr., Parker Bohn III, Lennie Boresch Jr. and Ron Mohr – will represent the United States in the 2019 World Bowling Senior Championships Sept. 3-9 at South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas along with four equally talented 50-and-older women stars.

Nearly 260 senior bowlers representing 41 countries are expected to compete for medals in singles, doubles, four-player team, all-events and masters competitions.

Williams has just completed a three-title PBA50 Tour season in which he earned Player of the Year honors for the third time after tying the record for career PBA50 Tour titles with 14. Bohn is a 35-time PBA Tour winner and a four-time PBA50 Tour titlist. Mohr has just earned PBA60 Player of the Year honors for the fourth consecutive year. All three are PBA Hall of Famers while Boresch, a four-time PBA50 Tour winner, is a member of the USBC Hall of Fame.

On the women's side, Leanne Hulsenberg, Tish Johnson and Luci Sandelin are USBC Hall of Famers (Hulsenberg and Johnson also are members of the PWBA Hall of Fame). Sharon Powers will make her debut as a Team USA representative.

In the inaugural World Senior Championships in 2015, the U.S. swept gold medals in every event. In 2017, the team almost repeated, winning every event except women's doubles where it won silver and bronze medals.

both of us by surprise," Williams said of the title match. "The way those guys were bowling I thought it would take 220 or 230 at least to win. I would have never thought that the (title) match would have been below 200."

The stepladder finals started with Voss, trying for his second consecutive PBA60 title after winning the David Small's JAX 60 National Championship Monday, beating No. 4 seed Jerry Sikora, coming off a third-place finish in the JAX 60 National Championship, 246-226. Voss then went on to beat Emilio Mora 246-169 in the second stepladder match to advance to the semifinal.

Mora, trying for his first "senior" title, made a remarkable run to earn the No. 3 seed for the finals posting an 11-1 record in match play.

Defending champion and Fort Wayne native Ron Mohr, who was trying for his third PBA60 title, finished sixth ending his streak of six consecutive PBA50/60 tournament top-five finishes. The four-time and reigning PBA60 Player of the Year missed the stepladder final after losing his position round match to Mora 191-177.

Bowlers are not only some of the strangest and most wondrous creatures, but they also say the darndest things. Here are some of my favorite bowling quotes through the years:

Johnnie Englehart, on the memorable side trip he and Susan Moline undertook to Bullhead City, Ariz., en route to a bowling tournament in Laughlin, Nev., in 2016: "We traded lives and vows and away we went." No one knew of their plans to get married. Added Englehart: "Surprise!"

Bob Adams, who lost sight from his left eye because of glaucoma but has built a reputation as a prolific spare bowler, on converting the daunting 5-7 split: "I closed the good eye."

Adam Lew, on the United States Bowling Congress commemorative 300-game ring he received in 2017 for his first perfect game: "Some people ask me why I wear it on my wedding finger and I'll say, 'It's because I got married to the game."

Powerful bowler Tom Martino, who survived a harrowing car accident in which his auto was slammed into a free fall on the Hollywood Freeway before it stopped on the diamond lane facing oncoming traffic: "I was driving on the freeway one moment and the next moment I'm fighting for my life."

Jillian Wiseman, who sported a 110 average before claiming the title of a Corbin Bowl no-tap doubles handicap tournament in 2017 with partner Nicholas Huang: "It was shock and awe. It will never happen again."

Carol Mancini, the editor/publisher of the California Bowling News who's witnessed five weddings at bowling centers: "I've never seen one that ever lasted."

Professional Bowling Assn. Hall-of-Famer Chris Barnes, giving advice to league bowlers: "You can throw a bad shot, but don't throw a bad shot from the same place. Throw the same bad shot from a different spot on the lane."

Jerry Simmons, on using his Brunswick "Black Beauty" rubber bowling ball for more than 55 years: "I don't wash it. I don't get it de-oiled. I don't put it in a machine that polishes it. I don't wipe it down and I don't even use a cloth. It is what it is."

New York resident Tommy Pisano, then-104 years old, on why he continues to bowl: "I can't play baseball anymore."

Brian Lane Duke, on receiving his commemorative 300-game ring a trifle late because of a San Diego United States Bowling Congress mix-up: "I was presented with my 300 ring for a game I bowled at Valley Bowl [in El Cajon] on April 8, 1996. It only took 21 years, but I finally got it."

North Dakota resident Kathryn Pinke, making light of her 82 average in league play after rolling a 50 on her birthday: "As my husband, Nathan, has said on a few occasions, 'There are a lot of things you are good at, Katie, but bowling has never been one of them.""

Reporter Fred Eisenhammer, reversing himself after writing that no-tap competitions were just a gimmick and had no place in the bowling universe: "There's a reason that no-tap tournaments, especially doubles no-tap events, draw big crowds. Bowlers like them. They like the camaraderie. They also like the high scores (unless one is really off their game and I know that feeling!")

San Diego's Michele Carter, who considered herself "just a league bowler and not much else," on turning in a stunning performance in the 2016 National Golden Ladies Classic in which she won all four of her matches in the stepladder finals, including a 300-256 victory over Hall-of Famer Tish Johnson in the championship match: "It was just surreal. It felt like an out-of-body experience. I just tried to take it one shot at a time and not look out at the crowd."

Bob Edwards, a former longtime bowling general manager, remembering how his 40-year career began: "I wanted to be in the bowling industry, which my father was in. He told me, 'If you want to run a bowling business, you have to know how to do everything yourself. So, this week, you're going to be the janitor.' And he handed me a mop."

Ace bowler and bowling coach Mike Weekley: "I would like to say that anyone who has confidence in what they are doing can get a 300 whenever they want."

Top women's bowling pro Diandra Asbaty, standing up for her sport: "I've been practicing since I was 5 years old and I've been playing tournaments. I sweat. I throw a 15-pound ball. I fail and I win. I want bowling to get the respect it deserves."

Butturff, Sherman Retain Top Spots in FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points

CHICAGO – Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, and Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri retained the top two spots on the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour competition points list following the conclusion of the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open Sunday, but Chesapeake winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, and runner-up AJ Chapman of Manchester, Iowa, made big moves after the third event in the 10-event program.

Butturff and Sherman, who were tied for first place prior to Chesapeake, were separated into first and second places, respectively, based on their 12th and tied-for-17th finishes, respectively. Butturff won the Summer Tour opener in Lubbock, Texas; Sherman teamed with PWBA titlist Amanda Greene to win his first PBA Tour title in the Storm PBA-PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles in Houston.

AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, was in third place going into Chesapeake and retained his position after an 11th place finish.

O'Neill, ranked 35th after the Summer Tour's first two events, moved into fourth place, picking up 2,500 points in the Tier 2 tournament. Chapman, in 31st place prior to Chesapeake, climbed into fifth place after earning 1,500 as runner-up.

The FloBowling PBA Summer Tour points race involves incentives including bonus cash to the top five in the USBC Cup points standings, eight berths in the end-of-summer FloBowling ATX Invite and eight expenses-paid trips to China for the inaugural PBA China Tiger Cup in November. Sweden's Martin Larsen Struck by Car, Injured in Virginia Beach European PBA veteran "really fortunate that I'm alive"

CHESAPEAKE, Va. – PBA Tour veteran Martin Larsen of Sweden was seriously injured when he was struck by a car last Thursday in Virginia Beach, Virginia, prior to the start of the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open. The news was first reported by FloBowling senior editor Lucas Wiseman.

Larsen, 40, was walking with fellow bowler Fran Louw of South Africa when he was struck in the middle of an intersection while attempting to cross the street. Larsen said he was thrown 40 feet down the road as a result of the accident.

Larsen told FloBowling he was hospitalized for two nights with a broken left wrist, 59 stitches in his upper left arm, a broken rib and other various injuries. Fortunately, none of the injuries were life-threatening, but his 2019 season is over.

"I feel really fortunate looking back on it," Larsen told Wiseman. "I just can't understand how my legs are not broken, and how I don't have a real bad headache. It's really fortunate that I'm alive, and I'm not more hurt than I am."

Larsen said he and Louw drove to the tourist district along the beach to see the sights and enjoy dinner. When they returned to their rental car, they found it had been towed because it was illegally parked. The impound lot was just over a mile away, Larsen said, so they decided to walk to retrieve their vehicle. Along the way, Larsen said they reached an intersection where they waited "a long time" for a crossing signal.

"When the cars stopped, we thought it was our turn," Larsen said. "Stupid enough, we didn't pay attention to the lights. There was a car coming from the third lane. We didn't see it and they didn't see us."

Larsen said he was slowed down because he was carrying a case of bottled water on his shoulder, while Louw was in front of him, which is why Louw wasn't hit.

"It's a lifetime lesson learned," Larsen said. "You have to do what you say to the kids and wait until it's your turn to cross. Next time I'm going to be a little more careful."

Larsen, who flew home to Sweden, said he was thankful most of the injuries were to his left arm and not his bowling arm.

"My right arm is totally fine except for some bruises," Larsen said. "The left wrist is going to be in a cast for five weeks. I don't know how long it takes for the rest of the body to heal up."

Larsen, long considered one of Europe's premier players, has bowled in PBA Tour competition since 2009 with a second-place finish in the 2014 PBA Scorpion Championship his best among six top-five finishes. He was the recipient of the 2012 Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award, selected by his fellow competitors.






