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# **COLLEGIATE STANDOUT GRAMLY WINS 2023 PWBA ROOKIE OF THE YEAR**

ARLINGTON, Texas - Some rookies are relatively unknown when they begin competing on the PWBA Tour.

That wasn't the case for Hope Gramly of Aubrey, Texas.

On the contrary, the 23-year-old right-hander was already on the radar of most PWBA bowlers and fans long before she ever threw her first shot as a professional.

That's not surprising since Gramly made two stepladder finals appearances while competing as a non-member during the 2022 PWBA Tour season and authored one of the most decorated collegiate bowling careers in recent memory.

With so much success already under her belt, big things were expected of Gramly during her rookie season, and she didn't disappoint, notching four top-10 finishes - including three stepladder finals appearances - and cashing eight times in 11 events en route to capturing 2023 PWBA Rookie of the Year honors.

The PWBA Rookie of the Year award is presented to the top rookie each season, based on points earned during the year.



### A Look Back At Larry Lichstein by Dave Williams

There aren't many professional bowlers that came out of Windsor Locks, Connecticut. The only one that I can think of is Larry Lichstein, who grew up in the shadows of the famous Bradley Bowl, home to a PBA national pro tour stop for many years (the center is still operating and now known as Spare Time Windsor Locks). His life on the tour was legendary, not so much for his bowling ability, but for his tenacious business sense that enabled him

he won the 1969 ABC Classic All-Events in Madison, Wis., with a total of 2,060 for nine games. He totaled 618 in the team event, 716 in the doubles, and 726 in singles competition. The next year in Knoxville, Tenn., he was part of the winning Merchant Enterprises team comprised of five impressive PBA future stars - Ernie Schlegel, Johnny Petraglia, Butch Gearhart, Mike McGrath and Lichstein.

Gramly wasted no time setting the bar among rookies once the 2023 PWBA Tour season kicked off in May, finishing in a tie for 14th place at the season-opening PWBA Stockton Open and following it up with a stepladder finals appearance and eventual fourth-place finish the following week at the GoBowling! Spokane Open.

She missed the cut at the 2023 USBC Queens in Las Vegas during Week 3, but she bounced back strong by reaching the stepladder finals at each of the next two tournaments - the PWBA Grand Rapids Classic and BowITV Classic - and collecting two more fourth-place finishes.

The three-time National Tenpin Coaches Association (NTCA) Division II Player of the Year's last top-10 finish of the season would come at the PWBA Waterloo Open in August, and it was a big one as it punched Gramly's ticket to the 2023 PWBA Tour Championship and officially secured her rookie-ofthe-year honors.

Carlene Beyer of Ogdensburg, Wisconsin, was second in points among rookies; Correen Acuff of Surprise, Arizona, finished third.

Gramly didn't have the award on her mind when the season began; nevertheless, winning it was an accomplishment she certainly won't take for granted.

"I'm honored to now be included on the list of great bowlers who have won rookie of the year," Gramly said. "It wasn't really a goal of mine throughout the season, but it was still an amazing feeling once it was officially announced, and Robyn (PWBA Brand Manager Robyn Graves) handed me that trophy."

Gramly got to hold her fair share of trophies while helping McKendree University to national titles at the 2022 NCAA Bowling Championship and the 2023 Intercollegiate Team Championships.

But while she will always cherish the memories of winning with her teammates, there is just something different about reaching the top as an individual competitor.

'Those national championships were a team effort, and they're something that I'll always be proud of and brag about as long as I'm able to," Gramly said. "But I'll never take credit for those myself because I had my girls there with me.

"Winning rookie of the year is finally something I can say 'It was me; I did this.' Of course, I had help from my ball reps, my parents, and many others, but they couldn't throw the ball for me. This is really my first individual award in a while that I'm very proud of, so that puts it right at the top of my list of what I've accomplished so far."

Gramly wants to accomplish a great deal more in the years to come, and she knows that she'll have to keep her foot on the gas in order to do so because bowling timidly is the quickest way to get lapped on the PWBA Tour.

"One of the things I learned at the first couple of stops is that I have to be aggressive with my moves on the lane so that I can keep up and keep my name toward the top of the standings," Gramly said. "In college, it was easy to be more conservative and wait for the lanes to come to me. On tour, you don't really have that luxury and time, so you have to go after those pins rather than waiting.'

Another valuable lesson Gramly picked up during her rookie season was that for as fierce as the competition gets on tour, the friendships are equally intense.

"I knew a lot of the ladies were good friends because they spend so much time traveling and bowling together, but I didn't really realize how deep those friendships went until we got to the Tour Championship," Gramly said. "Most of these ladies want their friends to succeed just as much as they want to be successful themselves, and that's the attitude I want my competitors to see in me even more next year; I want them to know that I want them to bowl their best even if it's against me."

Gramly was able to lean upon some close friends of her own while navigating her first professional season

She gave particular credit to her tour roommate, 2022 PWBA Rookie of the Year Olivia Farwell of Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania, and three-time PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, who in addition to being a fellow competitor was Gramly's collegiate coach at McKendree.

According to Gramly, the duo's support and that of her parents, ball reps and friends helped make sure the pressure didn't outweigh the pleasure during her first year on tour.

That pressure is likely to climb even higher next season since, as reigning rookie of the year, Gramly will have to contend with the elevated expectations that come with being one of the PWBA Tour's marquee players.

"I've wanted to be on tour since fifth grade, and there wasn't even a tour to be on back then," Gramly said. "So, to be out here competing week in and week out with these ladies is a dream come true.

"To be considered among the best and have my name mentioned as someone who can win any week of the season is a little intimidating because I still want it to be fun and not put too much pressure or big expectations on myself. It's an honor to be talked about in the same breath as these ladies, but I just have to stick to what I do and keep my head down."

Having the proper mindset will be crucial in that regard, and that's something Gramly thinks is important for any up-and-coming players who aspire to compete on the PWBA Tour.

"If I were talking to someone who wants to be on tour in the future, I would tell them that bowling is very hard and that there are going to be bad days where you have to stay patient," Gramly said. "Even if you don't win a title or do anything great in your mind, that doesn't mean it's not coming. Believe in yourself, believe in all the people who are behind you, and you'll achieve your goals eventually."

closed in 2002 and is now the site of mixed use retail and high-density housing. For the first time in PBA history, all 16 of the finalists in the tourney at Saratoga were left-handed. The very next week, as the story goes, Sam Baca was hired as the first full-time traveling lane man for the PBA.

"A lot of the guys were surprised when I quit bowling on the tour, especially since I was only 24 years old," said Lichstein in a 1986 article that appeared in the New York Times (*Life on the Lanes: Have Drill, Will Travel*, by John Cavanaugh). "Clyde Scott, the player services director for the PBA, said that he was going to retire, and he didn't know who was going to take his place."

"That's when I told Scott that I wanted the job," said Lichstein. "And that's how I happened to get it. My wife and I were in debt at the time, and we figured if things didn't work out, I could always go back on the tour as a full time bowler." Larry had one good year on the tour in 1971, but the lure of a full-time job with the PBA must have been more appealing than the constant strain of trying to make a living from week to week with no guarantee.

#### Lichstein and the AMF Staff of Champions

While thumbing through the files of Henry Kaven last week, I stumbled upon a photo of Larry Lichstein that I had never seen before. He's rolling the AMF Dick Weber All-Pro bowling ball, also known as the "Dick Weber 5-Star" at the time, and sporting a unique AMF 5-Star emblem that I have not seen before.

I looked through a list of the AMF Staff of Champions daily fees and retainers that was prepared each year by Jack Graziano, but could not find any information about Mr. Lichstein. An article that I spotted from the legendary Chuck Pezzano's "Down My Alley" column states, "Larry was very proud that his childhood idol, Dick Weber, was influential in his being the first left-hander signed to the AMF advisory staff."

Since most of Larry's early successes were with the Manhattan Rubber bowling ball, a harder surface rubber ball that worked particularly well on softer lacquer conditions, I can only assume that this photo campaign must have been from the early 1970's, before softer plastic bowling balls and harder Mira-lane surfaces took the place of rubber and lacquer.


It's interesting to note that the changeover from lacquer to Mira-lane (or similar products) began because insurance companies would no longer back the resurfacers or bowling centers because of the highly flammable process of applying lacquer to the lane. So, without insurance protocol, we might never have seen the abundance of high scores that have taken place since the last quarter of the 20th century.

#### Lichstein - The Early Years

In the early years of Larry's career, he dominated the New England Bowling Association (NEBA), where he was voted Bowler of the Year in 1968. The next year he was voted the Sporting News PBA

Rookie of the Year. An interesting column, once again by famous bowling writer Chuck Pezzano, appeared about this time touting the early successes of Lichstein.

Mr. Pezzano writes: "Larry Lichstein of Windsor Locks, Conn., was 19 when he arrived in Madison, Wis., to compete in the 1969 ABC tournament. Everett Chandler of Indianapolis was 78 when he arrived for his ABC appearance. And by brilliant performances in bowling's biggest show, these two men, 59 years apart in age, found tenpin fame."

"Lichstein won the Classic all events title, outscoring all of the nation's great bowlers as he averaged 228 for his nine games." Pezzano continued by stating that Larry never thought that the score would hold up, but it did... and it gave him the confidence to join the PBA tour. "He rolled in 16 PBA tournaments, cashed in ten and earned more than \$12,000, a record for a rookie," reported Pezzano.


"Chandler's date with destiny came when he closed out his regular singles competition with a 297

Larry now resides in Fort Myers, Fla., and as you can see from his photo, he looks about the same as he did 40 years ago. Along the way Lichstein was elected to the PBA Hall of Fame in 1996, in the Meritorious Service category, where he served as PBA director of player services for more than 22 years. He was inducted to the USBC Bowling Hall of Fame in 2019, in the Pioneer category.

### PBA REGIONAL RECAP: Dave Johnson Ends 42-year Drought on Regional Tour

For over 50 years, the PBA Regional Tour has crowned the best of the best in the sport of bowling more than 7,000 times. Some win one title; others continue their legacy and compile 10, 20, or even 50 regional titles. That shared characteristic of these competitors is their persistence to re-enter the winner's circle, no matter how many times they have already been there.

For Dave Johnson, that persistence lasted a full 42 years, a new record for time between regional titles. Out of Ashtabula, Ohio, Johnson won his first regional event in Indianapolis in 1981. During his regional title drought, Johnson picked up a national title by winning the Bud Moore Classic in 2022. Johnson has competed on the PBA50 Tour and has accumulated over \$10,000 in earnings in each of the past two seasons.

On the PBA Regional Tour, Johnson's closest call back to the podium was a second-place finish to Troy Lint last March. But now, Johnson is a champion again.

The top 12 dominated the 36-foot Bill O'Neill oil pattern, creating +189 for eight games as the score to move on. From Brentwood, Tenn., former PBA Rookie of the Year Kamron Doyle led qualifying at +333, and the next day, he picked up right where he left off. With a low game of 215, Doyle accumulated a 133-pin lead with a position round remaining to essentially seal the deal. He took home \$2,600 for his efforts in Valley Park, Mo., during his second win on the regional tour, both as a non-member.

At an always-fun baker doubles tournament, 36 over/ under age-50 teams competed at Rocky Mt. Bowling Center. Team Tom (Daugherty and Hess) led at +225 for their 12 baker games, and they eventually earned the No. 2 seed after another 12 games of match play. Zachary Tackett and Michael Ritz snagged the fourseed, Dick Allen and Dan Knowlton took the three, but the team to beat was top-seeded Nate Garcia and Walter Ray Williams Jr.

In the opening match, the 191 from Allen/Knowlton was good enough to move past Tackett/Ritz' 170. In the second match, Daugherty/Hess left the door open with a four-count on their fill, but Allen/Knowlton failed to double and lost 199-181. In another exciting final match, Daugherty/Hess stepped up needing a strike or nine-spare strike to win, but a split downed their chances after missing the conversion.

The 208-196 win marked title No. 63 for the all-time leader Walter Ray Williams Jr. and No. 3 for Nate Garcia, his second of the year.

In a close first match, James Campbell and Tom Milton got the first strike in the 10th frame to shut out Gran and Couch in an opening-match win 227-222. The second match was never close as Campbell/ Milton struggled to get anything going while the duo of Scott Greiner and James Storts threw the backseven for a 249-184 win.

Then Gary Faulkner and Walter Ray Williams Jr. stepped into the ring, and things were all tied up through seven frames of the final match. But Greiner/ Storts stepped up in the eighth frame and doubled while their opponent split. Faulkner/Williams Jr. never caught up and lost 216-184.

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
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# **37th Year! Junswick** Team 3 and Team 15 Move To 9-1 To Lead Round One
