129 bowlers took the lanes over the weekend to battle for the \$8,500 in scholarships awarded at the two events.

At Del Rio Lanes, in the A Division, Elias O'Hollaren defeated Christian Metoyer (\$350) 265-219 to take the title and \$500 scholarship. 3rd place Bryce Nakunz banked \$225. In the B Division,

Living The Good Life

After a bit of investigation on the internet, I was able to locate Larry Lichstein, living the good life in southern Florida, along with his three cats (all strays that he rescued at different times) and a host of birds, mostly pelicans, that invade his Fort Myers home every day for handouts.

"I'm a lucky man," Lichstein said, after a stint was placed in his heart in November of last year. Larry said that he couldn't believe the difference, just hours after the surgery. That, along with a 40 year battle with alcohol, which ended in January of 2018, have made a new man of the former great bowler from the tiny town of Windsor Locks in Connecticut.


"I can say without any trepidation, I wish I had stopped 40 years ago instead of four," said Mr. Lichstein regarding the alcohol addiction. "But the old saying, better late than never. I feel fantastic knowing that I'm healing every day." Now he spends his time with his cats (and birds) whenever he's not helping out at the Lightning Strikes Bowl, located next to the Edison Mall in Fort Myers.

When I asked Lichstein about Henry Kaven from AMF, and the amazing circumstances that prompted me to call him after the last two articles that I had written for the "Dave's Corner" column, he too was surprised by the set of conditions that culminated in the interview at the conclusion of the PBA Ebonite Open at Saratoga Lanes back in 1971.

"Henry was quite a character," said Larry. "But with me and my wife Anne he was always a friend." Lichstein said that Kaven was an investor with many properties on Long Island, including a couple of bungalows on Fire Island. "Henry invited my wife and I to stay there on more than one occasion. Those summers of '70 and '71 were wonderful."

A humorous story came up while we were chatting about Mr. Kaven and the AMF Staff of Champions. "Henry confided in me that Woody Woodruff and Al Spanjer didn't want my good friend Johnny Petraglia on the staff because of his heavy Brooklyn accent. But they wanted a left-hander on the staff."

"That's when Dick Weber stepped up and recommended me as the first lefty to be signed to the AMF Staff of Champions," said Larry. "Everything worked out because Johnny later signed with Brunswick and became even more famous with the introduction of the Johnny Petraglia LT-48 bowling ball."



#### What A Memory!

To say that Larry Lichstein's memory is unbelievable would be an understatement. Whenever I would bring up a name or event in his life, he could not only remember the circumstances, but also the date. "The first wonderful moment in my bowling career was on April 8, 1967, when as a high school student, age 17, I rolled the first 300 game in the history of the Connecticut state high school program. At that time the Bowling Proprietors of Connecticut offered a \$3,250 bond for a 300, so it was a big deal."

Later that year, and after his high school graduation, the PBA Tour came to Windsor Locks for their annual stop. Tim Jensen, reporter for patch.com, reported in an article ("Catching Up With Local Bowling Legend Larry Lichstein," December 16, 2010) that Lichstein found out there was still one spot open, and a friend who owned a local business put up the entry fee for him. Jensen stated that the amateur lefthander surprised the veteran pros by placing 11th in the qualifying rounds. "I lost the first round of match play, then won my next eleven matches and wound up leading the tournament against legends like Dick Weber, Don Carter, Dave Davis, Dave Soutar and Nelson Burton Jr.," said Lichstein in the patch.com article. "I ended up finishing second, the highest finish ever (at the time) by an amateur."

The next year Larry married his childhood sweetheart, Anne Cencak, and his first son Michael (also a professional bowler) was born a year later. That's when Lichstein decided to join the PBA Tour full-time. During that initial campaign, he made the top five finals three times, placing second in Rochester, N.Y., third in Cranston, R.I., and fourth in Portland, Oregon. His efforts awarded him with the Rookie of the Year honors in 1969. He garnered more than \$12,000 that year, which was a PBA record at the time.

The year after his 1971 victory at the PBA Ebonite Open in San Jose, Larry decided that he needed to think more about his long term future. That's when he evolved into what my friend calls "the John Madden of bowling," complete with a drill press in his converted Greyhound bus that he would drive to every PBA stop. Twenty-two years later, Lichstein gave up the post. "My wife died in my arms in January 1993, and I began to lose my desire," Larry said in the patch.com article. He married Kathleen Costas in 1995, and two years later had a second son, Larry. "He's a fantastic bowler," said Lichstein.

Mr. Lichstein looks back upon his 22 year career with fondness. "I asked PBA commissioner Joe Antenora if I could innovate," he told Jensen. "By 1980, I had a four-man crew. In 1981, we had two 18-wheel buses to accommodate all the tournaments. By the early 1990's, we were drilling 15,000 balls a year. Little by little, I became one of the most famous men in bowling, not so much for my ability, but for what I did for the players." Lichstein is now a member of seven different Halls of Fame, including the PBA in 1996, for Meritorious Service; and the USBC Hall of Fame in the Pioneer category, in 2019.

\$350 scholarship for the win with Kaili Purugganan also taking home \$150 for 4th place. The D Division rolloff featured top-seed Khai Devilla-Atilano taking on Nicholas Moore. They tied 156-156 but Nicholas Moore prevailed in the rolloff for a \$280 scholarship. Devilla-Atilano earned \$275 for second.

At Keystone Lanes, a huge field took the lanes with 84 bowlers battling for the scholarships. In the A Division, Daniel Hong beat Brent Purugganan (\$275) 237-206 then took out top-seed Elias O'Hollaren (\$475) for the title and the \$475 scholarship. Wyatt McCollum finished 4th for \$200 and Jazmyn Beck 5th for \$150. In the B Division, Joshua Yamauchi defeated Ethan Santos (\$245) 258-145 to advance to the title match against Jai Kankariya. A stubborn 10-pin left Joshua Yamauchi (\$350) 3 pins short at Jai Kankariya took the title 226-223 for the \$485 scholarship. Tyler Cole banked \$175 for 4th. C Division action saw Ezekiel DeGuzman take out Bailey Villegas (\$205) 187-158 setting up a match with top-seed Cailyn Robey. DeGuzman picked up a clutch spare in the 10th to take down Robey (\$350) 193-190 for the \$350 scholarship. Seth Le finished 4th for \$150 with Sergio Gomez rounding out the cashers in 5th for \$110. D Division action saw Carter Nguyen beat Jacob Blake (\$235) 148-122 to advance to the title match against top-seed Owen Berger. The two 2-handers battled but it was Owen Berger taking the title 150-138 for the \$410 scholarship. Carter Nguyen earned \$260 for 2nd, Desirae Cordero earned \$150 for 4th and Kian Ramos \$110 for 5th.

There are still 12 events left on the schedule with up to \$6,000 up for grabs at each event. With entry fees from \$30, these are fun, affordable events for Southern California junior bowlers to have a chance to earn SMART Scholarship funds for their future.

Bowlers entering at least three events in the series will be eligible to enter the Southern California Grand Championships in January of 2024. Over \$100,000 in scholarships will be available in the mega-event thanks to the Bowling Centers of Southern California. Hope to see you for this weekend's events Saturday, September 30th at Cal Bowl (check-in at 9:30 and bowl at 10:00) and Sunday, October 1st at Back Alley Bowling Glendale (check-in at 8:00 and bowl at 9:00).

What happened to young athletes savoring **"The Breakfast of Champions"?** 



program that ran sweepstakes automatically. It took in league files from the BLS program and asked for scores before giving you payouts and places in an organized manner. It was magical! "Doug wrote it," Eric Snow said to me. What didn't Doug know?

I remember the phones going out at Keystone Lanes at a point last year and the lines crossing and not working accurately. Panicked, I called Doug not knowing what to do. Wouldn't you know that he already knew how to fix it! Granted he probably ran into the problem a time or two, but it was so much easier than calling customer service and waiting around all day (or multiple days) for help.

We fixed it and I sat in awe of the person who truly knew how to do it all.

His story literally starts from the bottom. In the bowling industry today, one starts off as a porter, or customer service assistant. In 1988 you started as a pin chaser. He did it all: he worked customer service, in the back as a mechanic briefly, at the desk, taking up sidepots, and then eventually becoming the personal assistant to the owner of nine bowling centers.

How does one become a personal assistant? Don't talk back and always say "OK" and get the job done. Never in my near-30 years of knowing Doug did I ever hear him talk back to anybody, complain about anything or be upset at all. This was a true idol and role model.

He started at Del Rio Lanes in Downey back in '88, just after his 16th birthday. His mom got a job application for him and brought it to Doug to fill out. The rest is history.

It was the only job he ever held in his life. In fact, his work anniversary just passed. On August 2, Doug celebration 35 years as part of the Del Rio Lanes family.

As a bowler you might not have interacted with Doug at the local bowling centers, but he was updating your league sheets, executing your sweepstakes, finetuning your scoring systems and making sure that quality was always assured to you and your party whether it be in open play or league.

Employees working around Doug went to him for all human resources and payroll needs. He told it like it was. No fluff. Straight to the point.

Friends always shared stories about how "Dougie Fresh" was hilarious and always a highlight at any party. He was a force to be reckoned with every year at the annual company Christmas party – especially in the "ugly sweater" competition.

Doug was known to bowl in the Vegas Longshots league (4:30 p.m. on Sundays at Del Rio Lanes). There he and his wife Bridgette (league secretary) were among the league's family for over 15 years. Prior to that he bowled in a Friday trios league at Del Rio and in the Super Vegas league at Del Rio.

His first experience participating in a bowling league was at Clark Center in the Cerritos College league alongside his friend, Phil Hicks.

He met his wife of 23 years, Bridgette while working in the bowling industry. It brought him a great deal of what he had in his life today. One would say he owes so much (if not all) to the bowling industry.

Sports and travel were other big hobbies Doug enjoyed. He was one of the biggest fans of the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim, Los Angeles Clippers and USC Trojans football. He was always at the games and had the best season seats. If you were ever fortunate to take in a game from one of his seats, you literally felt like you were a part of the game.

In March Doug gave me his seats for a preseason game against the Los Angeles Dodgers. He was watching on TV and told me to pay attention because the ball could hit me at any given moment. Doug literally saw me on TV looking at my phone and not paying attention to the game. I was so excited about the seats and was sharing with the world. Luckily (and unluckily) no foul balls came my Dad and I's way.





Thank you for the experience, Doug. I was truly a part of that one.

Doug loved to travel to different baseball stadiums, even if it meant not watching a game in them.

His favorite stadiums were PNC Park (Pittsburgh Pirates), T-Mobile Park (Seattle Mariners) and Busch Stadium (St. Louis Cardinals), where he had a blast taking in the atmosphere of Albert Pujols' final game of his storied career.

He and Bridgette loved to disconnect from Downey and work every now and then and go on a cruise. "We loved cruises because there was no cell phone reception and it truly allowed us to disconnect from the world," Bridgette said. A favorite cruise they shared was one they took to Alaska in the middle of the ocean. Weeks ago, Doug was presented with a signed baseball bat from Angels outfielder Mike Trout by Saddleback Lanes manager Lewis van der Wyk, a colleague and dear friend of Doug's.

"His favorite thing ever was Lewis getting a Mike Trout signed bat for him," Bridgette said.

The world could not give Doug enough to compensate for everything he gave the world.

Before he left us, he shared a message to let everybody know that he loved them and wanted everybody to know.

A special place was always in his heart for his closest friends Mo, Jackie, Lia, Eduardo and Phil.

Whenever he could, he loved going to the bowling center to see all of his friends bowl. He also loved to teach his tips and tricks to others willing and wanting to learn them.

Doug was born in Downey, Calif. on August 15, 1971. He attended Gallatin Elementary School, Griffiths Middle School and then graduated from Warren High School in 1989.

Growing up, he loved anything involving computers. His sister Lianne shared a story about one of his favorite Christmas presents as a child: "a chemistry set he got for

Christmas was one of his favorite things as a kid. He setup a table in his bedroom and followed experiments in the booklet, creating smells and explosions in the households for months on end!" Lianne said.

Some childhood destinations to add to Doug's portfolio were trips to places such as Yosemite, Big Sur, Hawaii, Canada and Europe.

Services for Doug are to be announced and will be posted in a future issue of the California Bowling News.

Doug is survived by his wife Bridgette, sister Lianne Hoskins Yarvis, brother-in-law Mark Yarvis, niece and nephew Emily and Zachary Yarvis, mother, Arliss Klauser Hoskins, stepson, Jonathan Huezo, mother in law Genny, his sister in laws Cheryl, Theresa, & Tiffany The world is going to miss you, Doug. Please say hello to Mike Cammarata and all of our departed friends who were taken much too soon, just like you. Rest easy, and everybody loves you back and can not wait to see you again and have another laugh, story, and party with you.


