"Dead Money" Upsets PBA Stars to Win **Inaugural PBA Team Challenge Title** Long-time bowling friends unite to topple decorated team of PBA veterans

LAS VEGAS - "Dead Money" is a poker term related to the money left in the pot by players who have folded. It also is the name a team of five relatively untested bowlers gave themselves before upsetting a highly-decorated team of Professional Bowlers Association stars in the inaugural PBA Team Challenge at the South Point Bowling Plaza Sunday.

The PBA Team Challenge, a first-of-its-kind five-player team competition for the sport's most talented players, was conduct as part of the multi-event South Point Bowling Plaza Fall Classic.

Dead Money featured a lineup including PWBA Tour Championship winner Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, N.Y., who stepped into the lineup to replace injured Alex Aguiar (who came up with the team name); one-time PBA Regional winners Alex Cavagnaro of Massapequa, N.Y., and Matt O'Grady of Matawan, N.J.; one-time PBA Tour winner Anthony Pepe of Elmhurst, N.Y., and 30-year-old PBA rookie Matt McNiel of Prior Lake,

Minn., who made his PBA Tour debut during the Fall Classic.

With McNiel bowling anchor, Dead Money put together a string of six strikes to take a 249-234 lead after the first game of the two-game Baker format title match and locked up a 497-452 victory by outbowling "4 Majors and 100 at 1" in the second game,

Combined, the five Dead Money players have won one PBA Tour title. The top-seeded "4 Majors and 100 at 1" own a combined 46 titles including PBA Tour major championship by Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa.; Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C.; Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, and Jason Belmonte of Australia. Tom Daugherty of Wesley Chapel, Fla., the fifth team member, is known for bowling a nationally-televised 100 game in "one" major - the continued on page 6

Danielle McEwan Wins South Point PBA West Challenge for First PBA Title

LAS VEGAS - Competing against a strong field of U.S. and international nonchampions. Danielle Mc-Ewan of Stony Point, N.Y., defeated Aaron Lorincz of Belleville, Mich., 277-236, to become the ninth woman to win a Professional Bowlers Association Regional title in the South Point PBA West Challenge at South Point Bowling Plaza Friday.

The tournament, part of the multi-event South Point Bowling Plaza PBA Fall Classic, was open to players who have never won a PBA event and drew bowlers from Colombia, Australia. Sweden, Venezuela and Canada. As a PBA West Region title winner, Mc-Ewan is now eligible to en-



ter the 2016 FireLake PBA Tournament of Champions which will be held in Shawnee, Okla., Jan. 30-Feb. 7.

"Every time you win it's pretty awesome, but against the guys? That's pretty cool," the 24-year-old former Fairleigh Dickinson All-American collegiate

In the semifinal round, Lorincz eliminated Colombia national team member Manuel Otalora, 212-178,


while McEwan defeated eight-time European Bowling Tour titlist Martin Larsen of Sweden, 207-203.

McEwan is riding a stunning hot streak which began with her victory in the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour Championship in early September, concluding the first full season of women's professional bowling since 2003. She was in the field continued on page 8

Where They Are Now: Neighborhood Hero Theo Sojourn

NORTHRIDGE — Three years ago Theo Sojourn became a neighborhood hero and drew media attention for an act of selflessness that elevated him to the status of ultimate team player.

He's since left his neighborhood to live at his old home in Rhode Island.

But who can forget the mark that he left in the San Fernando Valley and how he established himself as a role model for injured bowlers who refuse to give up the sport – even for a few months?

In just his second year of league bowling in 2012, Theo suffered a devastating snowboarding injury in which he broke two bones in his right forearm.

For most bowlers, that would put them on the disabled list for a minimum of three months.

Not Theo.

He wasn't going to give up the game that he had come to love. Two days after his accident, Theo returned to his league team as an eager-to-learn-come-what-may reincarnated left-handed bowler.

He put aside his rapidly improving 170 right-handed average and dedicated himself to becoming the best bowler he could be with his off hand. He taught himself a left-handed baby hook – a best-imitation of his zany huge-hooking right-handed shot. Theo was a firm believer that any form of a hook was important to rolling elevated scores.

Theo clearly made up his mind that it was important to be a conscientious, teamoriented bowler who would not create a hole in his team's lineup – even if he risked the embarrassment of pitifully low double-digit scores.

And double-digit scores are exactly what Theo got. At first.

Theo, then a Santa Clarita Valley resident, averaged a creditable 131 a few weeks after embarking on his left-handed approach. But two weeks later, Theo could do no better than a paltry 90.7 average (games of 92, 104, 76).

Time to quit?

Not Theo.

On Week 6 as a lefty, Theo became an instant sensation at Brunswick Matador Bowl in Northridge by unleashing a 521 series with his left hand, rolling games of 152, an over-the-top 240 and a 129. His 174-average series was more than 40 pins above his previous-best average for a series as a left-hander.

That 240 also happened to represent Theo's best game ever, exceeding his previous high as a right-hander by two pins. He blasted strikes in his first five frames and then just missed a Brooklyn strike on his next shot before opening in the seventh frame.

Theo, who left L.A. this month for the East Coast, later termed his 240 as "sick." Said Theo: "People were coming over & watching. After five strikes in a row, I threw a nine in the sixth & the pin was wiggling. Everyone said, 'Go down, go down.'" The pin never did, but Theo stood tall until the end.

When his cast finally came off, Theo returned to action as a righty and rocketed a dazzling 279 the following year.

His three-month dalliance as a lefty – and the unselfishness and high performance that went with it – allowed Theo to be honored by website examiner.com for producing the most memorable L.A. County bowling event in 2012.

For all his adulation, Theo took it in stride. A charismatic figure and former super salesman at Rydell Chevrolet in Northridge, Theo never looked back after his injury healed.

"It feels really, really good to be back right-handed. I'm throwing it in the pocket with much more consistency," Theo said after his cast came off. "I can't tell you how good that it feels.

"I was proud I didn't give up [after the injury]. I was happy with myself that I had a good attitude and definitely put my best left foot forward. But I reached my peak as a lefty and for me to get any better would have taken a lot more time."

Sojourn said his left-handed experience was "definitely humbling. No doubt about it. I broke my arm the second week of our new league and I was so bummed out. I was really looking forward to getting my average up to 180. It was a huge letdown."

Sojourn said the most difficult part about bowling left-handed was converting spares. "You have to be far more accurate with spares than with the strike ball," he said, adding that he was happy that he chose to move ahead as a left-hander.

"I had fun and it was cool," he said.

Michelle Silver Dominates Women's Division in California State Singles Championships

WINNETKA — How well did Michelle Silver bowl at the 2015 California state singles championships last week at Winnetka Bowl?

The right-hander from West Los Angeles finished first in the women's prestigious 176-and-higher division – and she placed second. For good measure, she tossed in a perfect game – her 20th.

Silver bowled two different six-game sets in the tournament. Showing her consistency, Silver averaged a blistering 240 in her second set and her first set wasn't too far off with a 237 average.

With handicap, Silver finished with scores of 1,614 and 1,597. That put her ahead of her closest com-

petitor, Jennifer Loredo, who averaged 210 and finished with a handicap-aided total of 1.572.

So Silver nailed the top two spots in the standings, though a bowler can earn money from only one finish.

The results provided by the California United States Bowling Congress are deemed unofficial for now but the winners are not expected to change during the confirmation process. Official results and the list of payouts are expected late this week on the cusbc. com website.

Silver said she was "very ecstatic" with the results, considering she believed that she had not been bowling at her best lately. It had been four years since Silver bowled her 19th perfect game, recording that feat at AMF Mar Vista Lanes.

"I had been in a bit of a slump," said the 49-year-old Silver, who won the California state Queens title in 2003 at Winnetka Bowl. "I don't know if the slump is over, but this performance gives me hope for the future. It gives me hope I can compete in scratch tournaments. I feel I still can compete.

"The last time I bowled like that was in the WWPB [Western Women Pro Bowlers] in 2006 at Camarillo Lanes."

Silver's scores on the first set were 194, 268, 238, 210, 289 and 224. Silver came back about an hour later and maintained her elite level of bowling with scores of 300, 193, 243, 213, 227 and 264.

Her title wiped away the disappointment of last year's state singles tournament in which she averaged a torrid 235.3 but still placed second to Darris Ruffner.

"I was willing to come back to the scene of the crime and try again," said Silver, adding that she planned to defend her state title next year in Tuolumne.

Interestingly, Silver had to scramble just to participate in the state singles event – after competing in a Palm Springs tournament late Saturday night.

"I didn't know that everything would line up so well," said Silver, who carries a 201 average. "I never thought I'd have a moment like this. I feel so blessed."




ABAKUMOFF'S 805 BEATS STOGRYN'S 801 IN DEAF TRAVEL AT CAL BOWL

2011 PBA Tournament of Champions.

"We all kind of grew up together bowling in Junior Gold and other tournaments, and we're good friends," McNiel said of his team's chemistry. "The big thing for us was throwing good shots and having a good time, and we had a blast."

In the first match, 900 Global Phoenix, with a lineup featuring four past or current Arizona State University collegiate bowlers plus Phoenix-based Michael Haugen Jr., a four-time PBA Tour winner, eliminated Team Brunswick in the first two-game Baker format match, 471-411. PBA rookie Jakob Butturff, a 21-year-old lefthander, threw seven strikes in eight attempts as 900 Global's anchor bowler.

Dead Money then ousted 900 Global, rallying from a 43-pin deficit after game one with a 278 game to win the match, 493-484. McNiel threw two strikes in the 10th frame to lock up Dead Money's comeback.

The round-robin match play competition leading into the stepladder finals included a Baker format 300 game by Team Brunswick's Walter Ray Williams Jr., Sean Rash, Tom Smallwood, Jason Sterner and anchor bowler Parker Bohn III, the all-time leader in 300 games bowled in PBA competition (104). Williams, Rash, Smallwood and Sterner each threw two strikes. Bohn struck in the fifth frame and completed the perfect game with the final three strikes

Gabriel Ramirez Puts On A 'Miracle' Show At California State Singles Championships

WINNETKA —Who was the most surprised person that Gabriel Ramirez won last week's prestigious 176-and-higher handicap division of the 2015 California state singles championships at Winnetka Bowl?

It had to be Gabriel Ramirez.

"I've never bowled there before," said Ramirez, a Monterey Park resident. "I didn't know the lane conditions at all. And when I warmed up, I didn't even warm up well."

It turned out that those ominous signs were no problem for Ramirez. He rolled his first perfect game en route to averaging a blistering 238.8 for his six-game set, more than 50 pins above his average. With his handicap from being a 185-average bowler, the left-handed Ramirez scored a total of 1.702.

Kent Maruyama was second with a score of 1,654 and Kirk Oliver placed third at 1,645. The results provided by the California United States Bowling Congress are deemed unofficial for now but the winners are not expected to change during the confirmation process. Official results and the list of payouts are expected late this week on the cusbc.com website.

This is how hot Ramirez was. After opening in the first frame of his first game, he rolled 11 strikes in a row. Then he blasted his perfect game, which means he rolled a whopping 23 strikes in a row.

"I've never really thrown the ball so well," Ramirez said. "I just wanted to see how I could do. I'm just an OK bowler; I'm not a great bowler. I bowl just once a week – on Friday nights – and that's it."

Ramirez registered scores of 278, 300, 174, 201, 232 and 247.

There were 202 entrants in the tournament with some

players bowling at least twice. That figure exceeded the tournament's participation in 2014 in Visalia (135 bowlers) and in 2013 in Torrance (178). The tournament had four squads at Winnetka Bowl, divided over two days.

Ramirez said he was "ecstatic" about his first 300, calling it his most exciting moment. Ramirez's previous best was a 290 that he bowled three years ago. In that game, he opened with a spare and then rolled 11 strikes.

Learning last week that he unofficially won his state division title, Ramirez said that feat now ranked as his biggest thrill. Ramirez said he had bowled an occasional tournament, "but I had never placed first in my life."

Ramirez was asked what happened in his Game 3, the only time he failed to exceed his average. "I have no idea," he said. "I went back to normal. I finally woke up. I think it was more like shock that I had just bowled a 300.

"I had been close before but I always choked. For some reason, I wasn't nervous this time."

Ramirez also was asked if he could envision rattling off 23 straight strikes again. "Hell no," he said. "I seriously doubt that. It was one of those miracle things."





California State Singles Tournament to Move North for 2016

TUOLUMNE — The California state singles championships will move to Central California in 2016, tournament director Larry Worrall said.



Ciminelli Out-Strikes Pepe to Win PBA 1949 Weekly Deadline, All About Pounding The Pine Xtra Frame South Point Las Vegas Open

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 22, 2015) - Ryan Ciminelli of Cheektowaga, N.Y., struck on 10 of 12 shots to defeat top qualifier Anthony Pepe of Elmhurst, N.Y., 269-211, in the title match of the PBA Xtra Frame South Point Las Vegas Open Thursday at South Point Bowling Plaza.

In winning the duel of New York lefthanders, Ciminelli picked up his third career title and first since the 2013 PBA Chameleon Championship. It was a big disappointment for Pepe who had led the tournament from the first round, qualifying first for the stepladder finals by 370 pins over Ciminelli.

"It's so hard to win a tournament twice, and leading by 370 pins...man, I've been there," Ciminelli said. "I know what it feels like. I thought he was a little nervous and I tried to show a little emotion, and get after him. That's just part of competition."

In the first match, Ciminelli's boyhood idol, 52-year-old PBA Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, N.J., put together a string of four strikes, but got help when Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., left the 2-10 and 4-5 splits, opening in the fifth and eighth frames to give



Bohn a comfortable cushion in his 215-200 victory. He then started the second match with seven strikes and ran away from Australia's Jason Belmonte, who left three 10 pins in the first five frames, 253-210.

Bohn's bid for his 35th career title and sole possession of fifth place on the PBA's all-time titles list (he currently is tied with Mark Roth) came to an end in the semifinal match when Ciminelli followed a missed split conversion in the first frame with a string of five strikes on his way to a 234-190.

"It's funny because when Parker bowls good, I seem to bowl bad. When Parker bowls bad, I bowl good, because of the differences in our styles," Ciminelli said. "But this week, it seemed like if you threw the ball well, you were rewarded."

Ciminelli, 29, said the win also was an important building block in her career.

"I still have a ways to go in taking what comes to you, and just dealing with it. Parker's my idol that way. He just never gets upset about anything. I still have some things to learn about being a professional bowler and one thing that happened this week was dealing with perseverance. I had two 140 games and usually when I do that, I just miss the cut. To come back from that was big for me; the old me wouldn't have been able to do that."

A sub bowled a 299 game and the team he was subbing for decided to use an "absentee" score instead! That hurts. Another oops. This one is a doozy! Chic Schutt was named King Kegler of the "League of Unfortunate Bowlers". He rolled a 300 game in a mixed foursome league. A.B.C. did not recognize such a feat. Had he been a woman, W.I.B.C. would have sanctioned the 300.

Imagine this amazing 3 game match. A 4-man team of blind guys rolled against 4 amputees. The G.I. amputees won 1131 to 739. They challenged all who wanted to bowl

The L.A.W.B.A. women bowlers rented a large bus to take 40 (8 teams) to Columbus, Ohio for the Nationals. Their round trip and bowling took 3 weeks. 40 women on a bus for 3 weeks — Yikes!

Harry Grant was the bowling manager of Sunset Bowling Center. At the Grand Opening of the Katz Brothers (Irving and Myer) Beverly Hills Recreation, visitors could get a free demonstration ride in a new Dodge or Plymouth.

Arcadia Bowling Courts opened its doors in September. East of Santa Anita Blvd., north of Huntington Drive on Morlan Drive. Art Goddard was manager there for a short time right before it closed. It was a favorite hang out for the jockeys from Santa Anita Race Track. One jockey even owned Bowling Square.

Brunswick does it again. Their B-10 electric pinsetters went on sale. 18 improvements over the B-1. "Built by men who knew Bowling Best". Open play prices were up from 15 cents to 25 cents and 30 cents.

Compton Bowl came up with the "GRUNT HUNT", a singles shoot-out with a 16-pound ham as the grand prize.

A 25-year-old thief held up the deskman at Bonnie Brae Bowl and got out the door with \$155. An alert bowler called the cops. A patrol officer arrived, saw the robber running and yelled, "STOP". When the thief didn't stop, he was shot and killed. He was carrying a toy pistol. He had a lenghty record.

Vermont Bowl was owned by Frank Del Conte. When he retired he still owned Saddle Back Lanes.

Bowling writer Bill Flesch ran a weekly advice column called "Bowl Your Cares Away". His motto was "Reach out for those high scores". Reach, being the subject of July


