

Barrett Wins U.S. Open with Thrilling One-Pin Victory Over Butturff

WICHITA, Kan. - England's Dom Barrett won four matches Wednesday on his way to claiming the 2018 U.S. Open, including a thrilling one-pin victory over top-seed Jakob Butturff of Chandler, Arizona, in the title match, 207-206.

The 33-year-old righthander became the third foreign-born player to win the U.S. Open, joining Finland's Mika Koivuniemi (2001) and Canada's Francois Lavoie (2016). He earned the \$30,000 top prize and coveted green jacket presented to the champion.

Wednesday's stepladder finals at Northrock Lanes were televised live on CBS Sports Network.

The title match swung back and forth as both players tried to figure out the 43-foot oil pattern. An open in the fifth frame from Barrett gave Butturff a slight advantage, as both competitors headed into the final frame working on doubles.

Butturff, finishing the match first, nearly left a 7-10 split on his first shot before the 7 pin tumbled late. He converted the spare and struck on his fill ball, forcing Barrett to strike on his first shot for a chance at the title

Barrett rolled the strike he needed to start the 10th frame, but a 4-6 split on his second shot left him needing to convert just one pin for the victory. His spare



attempt was left of target, but it was enough to push over the 6 pin to give him his seventh PBA Tour title and second major championship.

"For me, it's about slowing everything down as much as I can in those situations," said Barrett, who won the 2013 PBA World Championship. "I threw the one in the 10th really well, and I thought the 11th shot

Call Them the Comeback Kids!

WINNETKA – There they were – just two guys gracefully heaving a bowling ball and throwing strikes with the greatest of ease.

Jim Altman and Jeff Biggs were practicing at Winnetka Bowl on a recent Thursday afternoon with seemingly not a care in the world as they ran up scores well into the 200s.

Somehow, these guys seemed special with a special talent for the game.

And, indeed, they had a story.

Gone from the game for six years, the two close friends suddenly joined forces to launch a comeback. Jeff exited the game after blasting three perfect games and numerous near 300s because of an "elbow issue."

And Jim left the lanes to concentrate on performing with his myriad of bands – serving as a guitarist. Jim never bowled a perfect game ("I'm a choker," he says with a laugh) but he knocked out a 299 and averaged in the 200s.

Now they're back. At least they're bowling on a regular basis again and they've made plans – perhaps – to return to the league scene.

Jeff, now 59, bowled anchor on their past league teams, and Jim, now 65, bowled right ahead of him. "He's way better than I am," Jim says. "He's an awesome bowler."

Jeff, who teaches roller figure skating, averaged 219 one year.

The fact that Jeff and Jim are rocking the lanes again isn't really a huge surprise. Ace bowlers frequently take a leave of absence – sometimes voluntarily, sometimes not – but so often they come back.

Bowling just has that lure.

"We just started [practicing] about a month ago," Jim says. "I have a feeling we'll get in a league in a couple years if not sooner."

"It's been fun," says Jeff about joining his buddy for weekly practice sessions. "We're very competitive. We would like to do well."

Guess what? They're already doing quite well. On this particular Thursday, Jim blasted a 252, and Jeff wasn't far behind.

After a six-year respite, they don't seem to have missed a beat. Call it the magic of bowling.

after leading by 617 pins in Liverpool, New York, in 2017. He joined PBA and United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Earl Anthony as the only bowlers to earn the top seed in consecutive years at the U.S. Open since 1971. Anthony also was defeated in each title match, dropping

the final game in 1979 and 1980. "It definitely hurts, especially losing by one, but at least I can say I led this tournament two years in a row, by a lot," said Butturff, a four-time PBA Tour champion. "It's about the only thing I can take out of it, but it's definitely an amazing feeling.

"I threw a couple of bad shots but threw one good when I needed to and (left a) 10 pin. At least I forced him to show up. You know, Dom bowled phenomenal this week, too; we all did on the TV show. It's rough, but at the same time, I always think of it as another learning experience."

Barrett also delivered in the 10th frame to advance to the championship match, beating Kristopher Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, 226-222.

Prather had built an early lead, striking on six of his first seven shots but missed a 6 pin in the eighth frame to allow Barrett, who had been struggling with carry, to tighten the match.

Prather missed the opportunity to shut out Barrett in the 10th. Given the chance to fill 26 pins in the 10th to advance, Barrett rolled a double and got nine pins on his fill ball to secure his spot in the championship match.

Barrett defeated EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, 264-248, to advance to the semifinals. Barrett finished the game first and delivered a double to force Tackett to do the same, but the 12-time PBA Tour champion was unable to get the 10 pin out on his first shot.

Tackett was hoping to become the seventh player to complete the PBA's Triple Crown. He had claimed the 2016 PBA World Championship and 2017 PBA Tournament of Champions.

In the opening match of the stepladder, Barrett bested Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, 258-203. Barrett delivered 10 strikes on his way to the win, while Kent was unable to recover from opens in the third and fifth frames.

All competitors at the 2018 event bowled 24 qualifying games over three days to determine the 36 players advancing to a cashers' round. After eight additional games, the field was cut to the top 24 players for round-robin match play. The five finalists were determined by total pinfall, including bonus pins, for 56 games.

The U.S. Open is the fourth and final major championship on the 2018 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule and is conducted jointly by the United States Bowling Congress and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America.

Monacelli, Weber Offer Opinions In Different Ways At U.S. Open

The U.S. Open, the final event of the 2018 PBA Tour season, is now over and left us with a lot to digest as we head into the start of the 2019 season in January. Here are three observations from the U.S. Open:

Two different approaches to offering opinions

If there's one thing you can always count on from Pete Weber it's that he will always speak his mind and hold nothing back. He didn't disappoint at the U.S. Open last week after he withdrew and offered his candid comments.

Weber was clearly frustrated with his physical state and his annoyances with some of the rules at the U.S. Open seemed to simply push him to a breaking point and let his emotions take over.

Some may agree or disagree with Weber's comments, but he wasn't afraid to speak his mind and tell everyone how he felt. Honestly, bowling needs more of this even if it's not as robust as Weber's comments.

But let's look at how Amleto Monacelli approached his complaints about the U.S. Open. Monacelli, despite being a member of the USBC and PBA Halls of Fame, was forced to bowl the PTQ to get into the U.S. Open.

He managed to express his displeasure with the situation and spoke his mind without letting his emotions boil over. There are ways to speak your mind and be critical while doing it in a way that shouldn't result in a fine from the PBA or the USBC.

Many of the younger players on tour could learn from Monacelli's approach off the lanes.

Butturff dominates again but comes up empty

You have to feel for Jakob Butturff after he finished second at the U.S. Open for the second consecutive year.

Last year, he led the field by 617 pins and this year dominated by 552 pins yet failed to go home with the trophy, big payday and green jacket both years.

This is the tough reality of professional bowling on television. Although many events feature a lot of games leading up to the television finals, a player like Butturff's fate can be determined by just one game.

Imagine if you were competing in the Boston Marathon and you led the race by 10 minutes after 26 of the 26.2 miles only to have the organizers stop you and tell you you'll finish the last 0.2 miles against the top five runners, all starting at the same time.

All of the sudden, the marathon you entered has become a sprint and it has leveled the playing field against the rest of the top five.

This may be a harsh comparison, but it is probably how Butturff feels right now. Although there is no one to blame because this is the way bowling has been forever and most likely will continue to be, and the players know the format going in.

Having a stepladder finals creates the drama and excitement bowling needs at the end of an event. Although, sometimes it just feels wrong.



Player, rookie of the year decisions tough

Now that the season is over the voters will have some tough decisions to make when it comes to the PBA Player of the Year and PBA Rookie of the Year races.

The Player of the Year race has to be one of the most uncertain in recent memory. Had EJ Tackett or Jakob Butturff won the U.S. Open, it would have made the picture a little clearer.


With neither of them winning, we are left to drill down into the statistics from this season as the voters, made up of PBA members and selected media, will have a tough decision to make.

The same could be said about the PBA Rookie of the Year race. The only rookie to win a title this year was Annop Arromsaranon of Thailand, who won the Busan Cup against a very limited field of PBA players.

Arromsaranon only competed in three events, none of which took place on U.S. soil, and that makes things very interesting. Will the voters decide to give him top rookie honors even though he clearly did not make regular appearances on the PBA Tour?

Perhaps the voters will take a closer look at a bowler like Kamron Doyle, who did not win an event this year, but did compete in a majority of PBA stops with some success.

Ballots for the two honors are expected to be out any day now and voting will be underway soon.

Barrett's U.S. Open Win Has HOF Implications

England's Dom Barrett notched another major victory in his career at the U.S. Open last week, but the victory had implications that may last long into the future.

With his win at the U.S. Open, Barrett picked up his second career major title and has now become eligible for election into the PBA Hall of Fame based on titles. He also won the 2013 PBA World Championship.

There's a catch, however.

Barrett, 33, is not yet eligible in another category that's required to be elected into the PBA Hall of Fame. He must have 20 years of membership in the PBA, a threshold he won't pass until at least 2030.

Barrett, who first became a PBA member in 2010, has won seven career titles. And, although he would become eligible in 2030 if he continued to compete, he certainly would not be a lock for the PBA Hall of Fame based on his current credentials.

So, while it's nice to meet the minimum titles requirement, Barrett will likely still have some work to do over the next 12 or so years to boost his resume.



Players Earn Invites To PBA Clash, Japan Invitational

With the conclusion of the U.S. Open on Wednesday, we also learned the PBA bowlers who will compete in the upcoming PBA Clash and next season's DHC PBA Japan Invitational.

The PBA Clash, a special made-for-television event that will not award a PBA title, will be taped Dec. 10 at the Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales, Florida. The event will help kick off the FOX network's coverage of the PBA and will award \$25,000 to the winner.

The top eight players in combined PBA Tour and World Bowling Tour earnings were invited to the PBA Clash, which will air on FOX on Dec. 23.





tion (PBA) as one of the original 33 charter members. His best finish was 5th in 1963 at the Tennessee PBA Open. He rolled 4 sanctioned 300's and four 800's, with his highest total an 820.

However, little else could be found about Mr. Lauman. When I went to the USBC website, I was amazed that I could not find any of the Hermann Undertakers records, or Elvin Mesger, or even the Hook Grip Five, a famous team that held the individual team game record for many years. Only the top 5 scores in each category are listed, which prompted my initial concern earlier this year about the 300 game records before and after 1988 (California Bowling News, "I'm Not Sure Whether to Say I'm Sorry, Or You're Welcome," January 25, 2018, page 4).

I reached out to Matt Cannizzaro at bowl.com regarding my concerns about the history of bowling records, and he responded by stating that "records, scores and titles go into the books based on the rules, playing conditions and technology at the time. This is true not just for bowling, but for all sports, and these factors always are evolving."

What's unfortunate about Matt's comment is that it does not address the true history of bowling. While I'm impressed with Andrew Neuer's total of over 200 perfect games, it would be nice if the USBC could recognize that in the first 90+ years of sanctioned bowling, the record for 300 games by an individual was 27.

I remember as a youngster going to the local pharmacy to purchase The World Almanac and Book of Facts each year. It was one of the only places to update the records of the top players before the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) came into prominence.

As a 10 year old, Elvin Mesger and his plethora of 300 games represented to me the equivalent of Babe Ruth and his 714 home runs in baseball. And just like the Bambino, Mesger had an almost insurmountable lead of 10 perfect games over the remainder of all bowlers.

Barrett Gutsy In Winning U.S. Open

WICHITA, Kan. – Dom Barrett of England used four bowling balls, including three in the semifinal, as he climbed the ladder Wednesday to win the 2018 U.S. Open at Northrock Lanes.

In a tense championship match, Barrett delivered a clutch strike in the final frame before nervously leaving a 4-6 split and barely picking up the six pin to lock up the title, 207-206, over runaway tournament leader Jakob Butturff.

"To start the year with a win and then to finish it with one feels unbelievable," said Barrett, who won the DHC Japan Cup in January to start the PBA Tour season. "I'm not quite sure how that happened today. I'm going to take a little reflection and enjoy it over the Christmas period before we have a very big 2019."

Barrett fell behind after five frames of the title match when he left and missed the 3-6-9-10 spare. That allowed Butturff to move into the lead, a position he held until the final frame.

Finishing the match first, Butturff could have locked up the title with a strike and nine pins but instead left a 10 pin on his first shot in the 10th to give Barrett a chance.

Barrett stepped up and buried the first hit in the final frame before pulling the ball and leaving a 4-6 split on his second shot. Needing to convert one of the remaining pins, he nearly missed the six pin to the left but it held on to give him the win.

Over the course of the day Barrett made many ball changes, switching between four different balls throughout the stepladder finals.

"I'm not going to go in with a complete game plan of what I'm going to do, you have to go on instinct," Barrett said. "On TV, that's sort of what you have to do. You sort of follow your instincts, believe in yourself, trust your gut and go and execute. I felt like I did a really good job at that."

After averaging 261 in the two opening matches of the stepladder finals, Barrett made a series of gutsy ball changes in the semifinal against Kristopher Prather and it paid off with a 226-222 victory.

Barrett, who had been playing up the boards outside, changed balls and moved deeper inside to start the semifinal. The move looked questionable after Barrett left a 10 pin in the first frame and a light four pin in the second frame.

That's when Barrett went to the bag again, switched balls and stuck with it until the fifth frame, but in the sixth frame after the commercial break, Barrett switched for a third time to close out the match, moving a little more to the right.

Prather, meanwhile, started the match striking on six of his first seven shots before going Brooklyn and leaving a six pin, which he missed. That proved to be a turning point in the match as Prather looked uncomfortable getting the ball far enough right on the left lane.

Needing a strike and eight pins in the 10th to lock up the win, Prather pulled the ball through the face on his first shot and left the 3-6, giving Barrett an opportunity to steal the match.

Barrett stepped up in the final frame and delivered two strikes and nine on the fill to pick up the victory.

In a pressure-packed match to advance to the semifinal, Barrett advanced by defeating EJ Tackett, 264-248, after Tackett failed to deliver a double in the final frame.

Tackett led most of the match after Barrett opened in the second frame when he missed the 4-9 split. Barrett, however, rebounded by throwing nine consecutive strikes before leaving a six-count on the fill ball.

Tackett finished the match last and had a chance to control his own destiny. Needing a double and six pins on the fill, Tackett left a 10 pin on his first shot in the final frame. The six pin gave the 10 a tap, but it wasn't enough to knock it over, eliminating Tackett.

"I just tried to make sure I got my ball in the oil so I didn't 2-10 because I 2-10'd so many times this week," Tackett said of the 10 pin in the final frame. "It wasn't going to do it on that shot, but all the pins didn't fall and that's bowling."

In the opening match of the stepladder finals, Barrett started with strikes on five of his first six shots to build an early lead against Marshall Kent to win 258-203.

Although Kent rebounded with strikes in frames seven through nine, Barrett stepped up in the ninth and 10th frames and was perfect to close out the match.

Kent got out of the gates with a double but then opened in two of the next three frames. In the third frame, Kent left the 2-10, which he failed to convert, which was followed by the 2-4-10, which he made.

In the fifth frame, Kent missed the headpin right, leaving the 1-2-8. He hit the right side of the headpin on the spare, leaving the eight standing for another open. The deficit proved too large for Kent to overcome.

"I haven't been throwing it good all week, but I've been good finding miss room," Kent said. "I was uncomfortable and it showed. When I finally found it again, Dom shot 250 at me and what can you do about that?"

The PBA Tour will go on hiatus for the rest of the year with competition resuming right after the first of the year in Arlington, Texas, at the PBA Hall of Fame Classic, which kicks off a lengthy stretch of events for the PBA.

Each year I would continue to buy the latest World Almanac and dream of being among the leaders on the 300 game list. After fifteen years of purchases, I finally began to see my totals (and those of fellow Californian Butch Soper) begin to appear among the lifetime 300 game leaders.

A recent article in Bowlers Journal International by Bob Johnson, former editor of the California Bowling News, started out by asserting that "sports records are made to be broken, so the cliche goes, and virtually all such records are based on numbers." The synopsis of Bob's article was that bowling scores have become irrelevant.

Bowling has a tremendous example to follow via the game of baseball, by providing a yearly reference to 300's, 800's, team games and series, followed by the updated lifetime bests. This would provide a better reference for traditionalists like me, and names such as Hank Lauman, Connie Schwoegler and Elvin Mesger would not be lost in a numbers game of scoring irrelevance.



Pete graduated from Oceanside High School and received his degree from California Western University in 1962. He joined the Air Force Reserves that same year. He was hired by the U.S. Government and assigned to the Contracts Dept.in 1963.


