Looking For One Thing And Finding Another

While looking for information about a bowling lane that was constructed in a Scotland castle around the turn of the last century (1900's), I came across a most interesting bowling guide published by the Spalding Company in 1910.

A.G. Spalding and his brothers maintained their own network of locations around the United States (and the world) for the expressed purpose of distributing Spalding's complete line of athletic goods, including bowling equipment and clothing.

There were two locations in New York City, and one in Chicago. Many north-eastern cities claimed a franchise (Boston, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Syracuse, and Baltimore), but my guess is that the most popular location had to be at 254 Woodward Avenue in Detroit, Michigan.

There were only a handful of locations west of the Mississippi, including Kansas City, Denver, San Francisco, and Seattle. Los Angeles County, with a population of approximately 300,000 in 1910, was still considered to be an agricultural economy, topping most midwestern states in output. Dallas (92,000) and Phoenix (11,000) had not yet experienced the exponential growth caused by retired people looking to escape the harsh winters in the northern states.

As I continued looking through the official bowling guide from 1910, provided by the Spalding Athletic Library, I discovered a wealth of information on instruction, how to compute the score, official rules, how to make spares, and other interesting topics like the games of cocked hat, quintet, duckpins, and others.

Suddenly it dawned upon me that the invention of the automatic pinsetter had actually stifled many of these games, except in the case of duckpins and candlepins, where a similar machine had been implemented to handle the different shaped balls and pins. The most prominent of these alternate games that did not survive was known as cocked hat.

In the game of cocked hat, only the head pin, 7-pin and 10-pin were used. A small ball, such as those used in duckpins (not to exceed 5 1/2 inches), was to be rolled down the lane at pins measuring 17 inches in height. If the bowler was to knock down all 3 pins on the first roll, it was marked as a "cocked hat" and counted as three, rather than ten.

Unlike the regular game of ten pins, "poodles" (or balls rolled in the gutter) were fair balls and any pins they knocked over were counted. A perfect score in cocked hat was 90, so there must have been a system of bonus pins for strikes and spares.

Another game that's mentioned is quintet. This game is still around today (mostly in Canada) and known as 5-pin. Once again, the head pin, 7-pin and 10-pin are used, with two other pins placed equidistant from the 1 and 7 pins, and 1 and 10 pins. Balls used in this game are the same size as duckpins.

Unlike tenpins, candlepins and duckpins, the game of five-pin provides for different scoring values of the pins, depending on their location in the "V" formation. The center pin is worth five points if knocked down, those on either side, 3 points, and the outermost pins, two points... giving a possible total of 15 in each frame. All of the possible spare and bonus shots are a bit confusing, but suffice it to say, a perfect score is 450. (Believe it or not, the Canadian 5-pin Bowling Association sanctions from 15 to 30 perfect games annually).

Then There Were Two

There were actually two major bowling organizations in the 1900's — the American Bowling Congress (ABC), and the upstart National Bowling Association (NBA), which was based in the New York City area. The Spalding guide for bowling comments: "For years in almost sole possession of the field, the ABC now has a rival in the National Bowling Association which, while only in its third year, is a healthy youngster and already controls almost as great a territory and quite as many individual bowlers."

"The NBA is progressing so rapidly, in fact, that its third annual convention and tournament, to be held late in the season in Madison Square Garden, New York, promises to be the greatest gathering of pin knights ever known. An entry of 600 five-men teams with a corresponding list of competitors in the two-man and individual matches, is practically assured. The ABC at Pittsburgh will not reach such figures as these — they could not be accommodated — but the meet should be equally as successful as that held in Cincinnati in 1908."





"Within a few years after its organization, the political control of the Congress passed from the eastern bowlers to the west and has remained there ever since. Numerous reforms in the playing rules which the easterners found imperative did not so strike the west, and the result was a breach which has never been fully healed."

Over the years I have reported on the NBA and the three perfect series of 900 that were recorded in the organization prior to World War II. The numbers used to be included under "Statistics and Oddities" in the ABC annual, but no longer appear among the statistics.

There's A Case To Be Made For Women

Another interesting section in the Spalding guide for bowling is entitled, Good Sport For Women. Here are some excerpts: "It is really astonishing how many women have taken to bowling. Women's bowling clubs and tournaments have sprung up everywhere like mushrooms. The eastern and western organizations boast of some excellent women bowlers, but until they come together in competition, it is difficult to say which part of the country is dominant."


"For a woman, bowling offers many attractions. As a means of passing the long winter evenings, the game is both healthful and enjoyable. No exercise is more invigorating: it brings to the eye a sparkle, and a glow to the cheek, which many women envy. In addition to the benefits derived from the muscular exertion, at no time severe, there is also the healthful excitement of the contest and the sociability which the game promotes."

"As in every other game, practice makes perfect, but here it may be said that to become fairly proficient does not need a great deal of playing time. It is not necessary to be exceptionally skilled in order to enjoy oneself. I do not know of any woman, who having learned the game, has willingly given it up for any other sport or amusement."

Another section in this category that I found most interesting was proper bowling attire for women: "It is not necessary that a woman have a bowling costume. A short walking skirt, shirt to the waist, and low heeled shoes, make an excellent combination. Every garment should fit loosely, and allow freedom of action to all the muscles, and to the back and shoulders in particular."

It's interesting how some of the comments from 1910 could have been written today. Our mind, will and especially our emotions, are the same today as they were more than a hundred years ago. Some things never change...

thereafter." Knox's bowling plans have been in the works for a year-and-a-half and he's already being asked who will roll the ceremonial first ball. Knox is still debating the answer.

The restaurant has been in its present location for 17 years and Knox said this was its third expansion. "We have a varied menu and I think we do a very nice job," he said. "We're kind of a hybrid – a sports lounge with family dining." Four roomy pool tables also grace the restaurant so the eatery definitely has a sports-lounge feel to it.

The four lanes will certainly be distinctive. It will be a string-pin operation in which regular bowling pins with long cords are attached to the top and tethered to pinsetters. The lanes will run 52 feet long, unlike the regulation 60 feet.

"I made the lanes as long as I could," Knox said. "I desperately wanted league play but unfortunately, there wasn't the space. That said, I think it's still going to be beautiful. I think people will be impressed."

distributed to a national panel of USBC Hall of Fame members, USBC Board members and veteran bowling writers.

Named to the women's national ballot is Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills. California.

Selected for the men's national ballot are Bryan Goebel of Shawnee, Kansas; Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, South Carolina; Wes Malott of Fort Wayne, Indiana; Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois; and Mike Scroggins of Amarillo, Texas.

Kuhn, a right-hander, is a two-time champion at the USBC Women's Championships.

Both of her titles came at the 1991 event in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where she set records (since broken) in both Classic Singles (773) and All-Events (2,036). Her all-events total marked the first time a woman had broken the 2,000-pin mark.

Kuhn is a three-time member of Team USA (1998, 1999 and 2000) where she was part of gold medal teams at the 1999 Pan American Games and the 2000 FIQ World Tenpin Team Cup. She was the U.S. National Amateur champion in 1998.

In addition to her two Women's Championships wins, Kuhn owns four more top-10 finishes at the Women's Championships. She was the Bowling Digest Magazine Amateur Woman Bowler of the Year in 1999 and has been inducted into the Maryland State USBC Association Hall of Fame, the Greater Baltimore USBC Hall of Fame and the National Junior College Athletic Association Hall of Fame, all for Superior Performance.

Woessner owns three titles at the USBC Women's Championships, with her most recent coming in this year's event. The right-hander also is the 2022 USBC Senior Queens champion.

At the 2010 Women's Championships in El Paso, Texas, Woessner posted a record all-events total of 2,330, which gave her titles in both Scratch All-Events and Diamond All-Events. The record still stands today.

This year in Las Vegas, Woessner won the Diamond Team event as a member of Sterner Strong 2. Woessner contributed 679 to the winning team total of 2,705. Included in that 679 was a 300 game, making her one of five bowlers at the tournament to record both a 300 game and 800 series (816 in doubles in 2010) on the championship lanes.

Woessner's win at the 2022 Senior Queens in Las Vegas came in her event debut. Woessner went undefeated in bracket match play and earned the top seed for the stepladder finals where she defeated USBC Hall of Famer Lucy Sandelin, 238-223, for the title.

In addition to her Women's Championships and Senior Queens victories, Woessner has five other top-10 finishes at the Women's Championships, a pair of top-10 finishes in the USBC Queens and a fourth-place finish at this year's USBC Senior Queens.

Waliczek earned induction in his first year on the ballot on the strength of four Eagles won at the USBC Open Championships.

Eagle No. 1 for Waliczek, a right-hander, came in 2015 as part of Team NABR in El Paso, Texas. The group captured the title in Regular Team with a 3,368 total. Waliczek's contribution was 659.

Waliczek's second and third wins at the Open Championships came in 2017 in Las Vegas as Team NABR won titles in both Regular Team (3,266 with Waliczek contributing 655) and Team All-Events (9,957 with Waliczek adding 2,051).

His fourth Eagle came at the 2022 event in Las Vegas as Waliczek captured the Regular All-Events title with 2,241. His performance on the way to that Eagle was incredibly consistent as Waliczek posted 745 in team, 750 in doubles and 746 in singles (a 249 average for his nine games).

Waliczek ranks sixth on the Open Championships lifetime average list (min. 20 years) with a 217.6 average. On the 10-year short-term average list, he ranks fourth at 224.3. In addition to his four Eagles, continued on page 7

he owns eight other top-10 finishes at the event. He's a former National Collegiate Bowling Coaches Association (NCBCA) Bowler of the Year (1998-1999 season) and member of the Intercollegiate Team Championships winning team at Saginaw Valley State (1996-1997 season).

Buckley, who died in 2021 at the age of 77, earned induction in the Veterans category after previously being considered in Superior Performance.

The right-hander who bowled out of Columbus, Ohio, won seven titles on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour in a 10-year span from 1971-1981 and captured a pair of Eagles at the Open Championships.

His first PBA Tour win came in North Carolina in the 1971 Winston-Salem Open and was bookended by a win in New York in the 1981 Buffalo Open. Buckley was a consistent threat in the 70s, collecting six of his seven titles in that decade.

Buckley's two Eagles at the Open Championships also came in the 70s as he was part of the winning team in the Classic Team division in back-to-back years – 1975 and 1976. Buckley's Munsingwear #2 teams were victorious with 2,980 in 1975 and 3,281 in 1976. Buckley's contribution to the cause was 661 in 1975 and 641 the following year.

He had one top-10 finish at the USBC Masters (sixth in 1991) and a pair of top-10 finishes at the USBC Senior Masters (tied for ninth in 2001 and second in 2004). Buckley also had four other top-10 finishes at the Open Championships, including second-place finishes in 1974 in Classic Team and Classic All-Events where he shot 2,103.

Buckley was a two-time first team USBC All-American (1975 and 1976), a first team Bowlers Journal All-American (1975-1976 season) and has been inducted into the Central Ohio USBC Hall of Fame (1977), the Ohio State USBC Hall of Fame (1988) and the PBA Hall of Fame (1992).

Baker has spent more than three decades serving the bowling industry in a variety of local, state, national and international roles from youth bowling to the adult ranks.

She has been a director, secretary, treasurer, delegate, vice president and president at every level, culminating with a one-year term as the president of USBC (the first woman to hold the office), following a year as president-elect.

Baker has served on dozens of committees, often as the chairperson, at each level and was a key participant in the creation of the USBC in 2005 through the merger of the ABC, WIBC, YABA and USA Bowling. She also has contributed to the evolution of the SMART program.

She has been a member of the volunteer tournament staff at the USBC Junior Gold Championships for more than a decade and has assisted at the World Bowling Women's Championships and World Bowling Youth Championships as well as her annual state and local events.

Baker also offers much of her time to bowling's charities. She has worked closely with the Bowlers To Veterans Link and was the BVL Ambassador of the Year in 2019.

Her decades as a leader, volunteer, philanthropist and mentor already have earned her spots in the Clinton (III.) WBA Hall of Fame (1991), Illinois WBA Hall of Fame (2005) and Champaign (III.) Area Hall of Fame (2012) – all for meritorious service.

Through 2023, there are 452 members of the USBC Hall of Fame – 230 in Superior Performance, 126 in Meritorious Service, 54 in Veterans, 22 in Pioneer and 20 in Outstanding USBC Performance.

The USBC Hall of Fame was created in 2005 by merging the former American Bowling Congress and Women's International Bowling Congress Halls of Fame. Visit BOWL.com/HallofFame for more information on the USBC Hall of Fame.

with a top 4 stepladder roll-off. Dual patterns were used, with 48' Shark on each left lane and 35' Cheetah on each right lane.

Before the tournament started, the season awards for Player of the Year and Junior Player of the Year were handed out.

Bobby Campagnale was the runaway POY for this season, winning nine tournaments which was four more wins than the next bowler. He also led the points race by a considerable margin, over 1500 points ahead of Kevin Valmonte in second.

To put it into perspective, it took 1500 to make the top 16 for the Invitational.

Junior POY honors went to Elias O'Hollaren, who won three tournaments this year, 2 more than the next junior bowler. He was also the highest finishing junior on the points list, finishing 11th overall for the season. Great bowling all season long Bobby and Elias!!!

The battle for the top seed came down to the last frame. Needing two strikes in the 10th frame to secure the #1 seed, Kyler Orosco flushed the first ball but went light and left the 2-10 split to lose the position round match 218-207, giving Buddy Lucas the #1 seed.

Junior bowler Avery Domaguin was undefeated through her first six games and was the tournament leader at that point, but a 206 and 183 finish (both losses) dropper out of the top 4. Bobby Campagnale took advantage by shooting 268 in game 8 to jump into 3rd for the rolloffs.
