It's Still Not Bowling Across America

The Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) came up with a different headline for the full 2025 PBA Tour Schedule, but it's still not bowling across America, as I highlighted in a column last year about this time: "Professional Bowlers To Go Bowling Across America?"

In that article I made reference to the tour schedule from 50 years ago that included just about every region of the USA. Here is an excerpt from that column: "In 1975, I can remember the tour stops being so familiar that most of the players had the schedule memorized, and that made hotel and other arrangements predictable, and easy to organize."

There should be no arguments from the PBA members in regards to the new schedule for 2025, as twelve of the 21 events (57%) are being held in just 6 states in the midwest United States: Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Michigan, Wisconsin and Ohio. My guess is that most of the PBA road warrior members have traded in their motor homes for Extended Stay America Perks Reward Cards!

The schedule begins this year with a stop in Middletown, Delaware, followed by four stops in the midwest: Indianapolis (the U.S. Open), two stops at Bowlero Vernon Hills in Illinois, and the Pete Weber Missouri Classic in Springfield, Missouri.

From there, the PBA members that have traded in their motorhomes will be looking for discounted flights to Reno, Nevada, where the members will enjoy a total of 6 events in 19 days: the Nevada Classic at Coconut Bowl in Reno, as well as five events at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno: the World Series of Bowling XVI, and Animal Patterns 1 thru 4 Championships. I wonder what happened to the colorful animal names, such as Cheetah and Scorpion?


After the extended stay (no pun intended) in Reno, the members return to the midwest for the USBC Masters in Allen Park, Mich., the PBA All-Star Weekend in Waukesha, Wis., the PBA Players Championship in Jackson, Mich., the PBA Tournament of Champions in Fairlawn, Ohio, and then a string of three tournaments at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park: the PBA Elite League Battle of the Brands, the PBA Playoffs (April 27-29) and the PBA Championships (May 23-24).

Rounding out the 2025 schedule will be the PBA Tour Finals in Bethlehem, Pa., the PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles in Houston, Tex., and the Storm Lucky Larsen Masters in Helsingborg, Sweden. It's nice to see the PBA got at least one event in Texas... but what about other bowling hotbeds like Arizona, California, Florida and New York/New Jersey?

Looking back to 1975, I can still remember the tour stops that have been forever branded in my subconscious mind. As I referenced in last year's column: "The first stop was usually in Arcadia, Calif., followed by Alameda, Calif., and then on to the Showboat in Las Vegas, followed by the Denver Open at Colorado Bowl. Next up was the U.S. Open in Grand Prairie, Texas, followed by the King Louie Open in Overland Park, Kansas, and then the Buckeye Open in North Olmsted, Ohio."

As much as we all detested the travel in those days, you can see by the 1975 schedule that it was definitely designed with the motorhome clan in mind. Last year's column continued by outlining mini-tours in the northeast (Maryland, New York and Connecticut), followed by another mini-tour to the southeast (North Carolina, Florida and New Orleans).

"The stops (in 1975) were not always consistent, but would then usually return to the midwest for an event at Dick Weber Lanes in Florissant, Mo., followed by Milwaukee, Wis., Toledo, Ohio, and finally the Firestone Tournament of Champions in Akron, Ohio. That's 16 tournaments, covering just about every part of the country."

Once again, I'm sure that the PBA membership is not complaining about the new schedule, which is also a benefit for the Fox television crews. The costs saved by utilizing the same venue for multiple events has to be substantial, as originally espoused by Frank Esposito, a pro bowling pioneer and innovative leader with the PBA telecasts from day one.

Add to all of the above the fact that gate receipts at the local bowling centers are probably not what they were 50 years ago, in the grand scheme of things. The significant increase in prizes provided by Bowlero and the PBA make all of the above changes very acceptable.

Our belief, however, is that the annual schedules from the past will one day influence upcoming PBA calendars, because so much of the country (Arizona,

California, Florida, New York, New Jersey and the Pacific Northwest) is being left out of the thrill of a live event.

cluding the Tony Reyes Community Service and Steve Nagy Sportsmanship awards, will be announced during the week of Dec. 9.

ALEC KEPLINGER

Keplinger, 23, is the latest decorated Wichita State product to join the PBA Tour. It took the one-handed righty a few events to adjust to the professional ranks, but he came on strong in the PBA World Series of Bowling (WSOB) XV.

He parlayed a clutch qualifying finish to make match play, then won two matches - including a Round of 8 victory over Purches - to reach his first career championship round in the PBA Cheetah Championship. His fourth-place finish in that event was the highest of any rookie this season.

Keplinger closed his season on a strong note, finishing 12th in the Storm PBA/ PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles and 22nd in the PBA/ PBA50/PWBA Jonesboro Trios.

NATE PURCHES

Though in his first year on the PBA Tour, Purches is no stranger to success on the PBA circuit. The inaugural PBA Junior Boys National Championship runnerup competed in the PBA Midwest Region last year, earning Rookie and Player of the Year honors.

This year on the PBA Tour, the two-handed Purches led all qualifying rookies in points, earnings and average.

Purches, who turned 21 this season, also got off to a slow start before staking his ROY claim with a spectacular WSOB. He made three of four cuts to match play, earning a season-high finish of seventh in the PBA Cheetah Championship and a season-high major finish of 12th in the PBA World Championship.

Before falling to Keplinger in the Round of 8, Purches completed an 0-2 comeback against Jason Belmonte in the PBA Cheetah Championship.

MARSHALL KENT

Titles (2): PBA Illinois Classic, PBA Tournament of Champions

Other notes: 2nd place in PBA Cheetah Championship (to Deo Benard); 2nd place in PBA Tour Finals (to Anthony Simonsen)

A career-best season secured Marshall Kent his fourth career Player of the Year nomination and first since 2018.

Kent finished second on tour with 22,048 points and third with \$210,158 in earnings. He averaged 223.90 across 329 games, tallying five top-five finishes, seven top-10 finishes and 11 cashes in his 16 title events.

Kent's finest moment came in the PBA Tournament of Champions triumph, where he climbed the stepladder finals to earn his first career major title.

DAVID "BOOG" KROL

Titles (2): PBA Delaware Classic, PBA Playoffs

Other notes: Started season without priority-entry status

Two titles propelled Krol to what can only be described as a life-changing season. The 28-year-old began the season without priority-entry status, needing to earn a spot in the main field each week through the pre-tournament qualifier.

Despite this hurdle, Krol put himself in contention to make the PBA Playoffs after back-to-back top-15 finishes in the season-opening majors. After winning the PBA Delaware Classic, Krol escaped the PTQs once and for all.

By season's end, Krol ranked ninth in points (11,955), earned \$128,200 and averaged 218.09 for his 313 games.

BILL O'NEILL

Title (1): PBA Players Championship pres. by Snickers

Other notes: 2nd place in PBA Pete Weber Missouri Classic (to Anthony Simonsen); 2nd place in PBA Roth/Holman Doubles Championship (with Jason Belmonte; lost to Andrew Anderson and Kris Prather)

Perhaps no player started 2024 on a stronger note than O'Neill. He not only won the season-opening major, then finished fifth, 10th, second, 33rd and third over the next five events. He couldn't quite snag a second title, finishing runnerup twice, but compiled seven top-five finishes and eight top-10 finishes.

O'Neill averaged 224.50 in 341 games en route to finishing fourth in points (20,790) and fifth in earnings (\$198,540).

MATT RUSSO

Title (1): PBA Scorpion Championship

Other notes: 2nd place in PBA World Championship (to EJ Tackett)

Russo, the 2021 PBA Rookie of the Year, earned his first career Player of the Year nomination after finishing seventh in points (15,405) and earnings (\$145,882).

In the World Series of Bowling (WSOB) XV with scores higher than mountaintops, no one ascended higher than Russo. He led the 61-game PBA World Championship by more than 250 pins, later finishing runner-up to Tackett, and notched a second career title in the PBA Scorpion Championship.

ANTHONY SIMONSEN

Titles (3): PBA Pete Weber Missouri Classic, PBA Tour Finals, Storm PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles

Other notes: 2nd place in U.S. Open (to Kyle Troup); 2nd place in PBA Tournament of Champions (to Marshall Kent)

The 27-year-old compiled another banner season in 2024, leading the tour with three titles and seven top-three finishes. Simonsen also led two of the five major championships, though he fell in both title matches.

Simonsen ranked third on tour in points (22,030), second in earnings (\$235,850) and third in average (225.33 for 375 games).

JESPER SVENSSON

Title (1): Storm Lucky Larsen Masters

Other notes: 2nd place in PBA Playoffs (to Boog Krol); 1st place in Go Bowling PBA Elite League Strike Derby (non-title event)

For a while, it looked like Svensson's elite execution would result in little more than a handful of top-10 finishes and a whole lot of 7-pin conversions on Lanetalk. But the two-handed lefty started to knock on the door in the WSOB, earning three top-five finishes in Allen Park.

Svensson broke the door down in the season finale. A momentous, redemptive victory in the Swede's home country secured his fourth career Player of the Year nomination.

EJ TACKETT

Titles (2): PBA Shark Championship, PBA World Championship

Other notes: 229.37 average ranks 2nd all-time; 2nd place in Just Bare PBA Indiana Classic (to Kyle Troup); Made five consecutive championship rounds from the U.S. Open to PBA Delaware Classic

The reigning Player of the Year put himself in contention for back-to-back honors after a spectacular 2024 campaign. Tackett led the tour with 29,920 points, \$265,792 in earnings and a near-record 229.37 average in 440 games.

Tackett also approached PBA history when he advanced to five (and almost six) consecutive championship rounds from the U.S. Open through the PBA Delaware Classic. During the WSOB, Tackett won all six televised matches, including climbing an all-lefty stepladder, to win the PBA Shark and World Championships. **KYLE TROUP**

Titles (2): U.S. Open pres. by Go Bowling, Just Bare PBA Indiana Classic Other notes: 1st place in PBA All-Star Skills Showdown with Team Storm (nontitle event); 1st place in PBA Legacy Cup with Walter Ray Williams Jr. and Cortez Schenck (non-title event)

The first player to secure his status on the ballot, Troup won two of the season's first five events. The 2021 PBA Player of the Year prevailed in a historically loaded U.S. Open finals, defeating Tackett, Belmonte and Simonsen to win his first career green jacket.

Troup ranked sixth in points (18,353) and fourth in earnings (\$199,615). He averaged 221.79 for his 310 games, cashing in 13 of 18 title events.

Voting is now open to PBA members here. The 2024 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year award winner will be announced during the week of Dec. 9.
