Bowls 803

FONTANA --- While I was in Las Vegas for the World Series of Bowling (WSOB) I received an email from my friend JIM STARKS. Then I received a text message, then a voice message. Jim was excited and wanted to talk. I knew something big had happened because Jim isn't very excitable. He is one of the calmest and relaxed men I know. If you need someone to light a short fuse on a stick of dynamite you need Jim Starks. If you need someone relaxed enough to handle nitroglycerin, you need Jim.

So what happened? Why was Jim so excited? When we finally connected Jim told me that CeCe Acquino had just bowled an 803 (246 -279 - 278) in the Friday Niters League at Foothill Lanes. Jim believes CeCe's 803 is the first 800 bowled by a woman at Foothill Lanes. I am not sure about Foothill Lanes but I do know that there have only been about ten 800s rolled by women in the Citrus Belt. That is ten 800s in nearly eighty years.

Now everyone knows, an 800 by one of our ladies is a "BIG DEAL." CeCe, I want you to know that your 803 is a "BIG DEAL." You have made Citrus Belt history. CON-GRATULATIONS.

The last eight hundred rolled here by a lady was an 802 by BETHANY MENDO-ZA at Victor Bowl in October

of 2013. The highest series rolled by a Citrus Belt lady is an 848 by ANITA MUR-TISHAW about ten years ago.

I spoke to CeCe on the phone and found out that she is a mother of three who loves to bowl. She is a natural athlete who has played softball for years and only recently started taking bowling seriously.

CeCe's bowling odyssey began about six years ago when sister Judy (Hernandez) talked her into going bowling for fun. They bowled together for fun for nearly two years. Aquino didn't take bowling seriously at that time because it didn't seem competitive enough. She was used to playing big league softball and competing for championships. Batting, running, sliding, catching and throwing were CeCe's forte.



NATIONAL DEAF BOWLING NEWS Russ Gothrick takes his best shot at a Dutch treat **DEADLINE FOR DEAF TEAM ENTRIES IN** by Fred Eisenhammer

Russ Gothrick has bowled a pair of perfect games and a 794 series.

WINNETKA - Bowler Russ Gothrick walked slowly to the line and announced for anyone to hear:

"I've never had a Dutchman and I've been bowling for 37 fricken' years."

Russ was bowling Monday night in the River Maniacs league at Winnetka Bowl and he was one spare and one strike away (in that order) from rolling an extremely rare Dutch 200. That's a feat in which a bowler finishes with a 200 score by alternating strikes and spares throughout the game.

Russ, a right-hander with an accurate hook, then knocked down the spare to open his 10th frame. All he needed now was a strike to add to his list of achievements that includes two certified perfect games, a 296, a 794 series and a consistent average over 200.

His final shot hooked deftly into the pocket . . . and left a solid 10 pin.

"That's a semi-Dutchman," joked Russ as he walked back to his seat.

Russ Gothrick easily is one of the most colorful bowlers in the L.A. area. He's a non-stop chatterbox who clowns around often and constantly encourages teammates and opponents alike.

He seemed a tad disappointed not to finish with his Dutch 200, but he shook off the near-miss very quickly.

"I really wanted that," he said. "It was a good ball [on the final shot]."

Still, Russ acknowledged that it's bowling's social aspects that mean the most to him.

"It's not the bowling. It's hanging around with my friends that's the most fun - the ribbing and everything," he said.

The fact that Russ was so close to bowling a Dutch 200 is an accomplishment by itself. Elizabeth Fonvergne, an elite women's bowler and an onlooker to Russ' bid for a Dutch 200, said she's racked up two Dutch 200s, but said "it's not easy."

Russ said if he had registered a Dutch 200, it would have ranked high on his list of accomplishments - but not at the top. "It's certainly not as good as a 300," said Russ, who blasted his last perfect game in May at Winnetka Bowl.

"But a lot of people never have had one. It's difficult to do. You almost have to be unlucky to do it."

Russ, who rarely bowls below 200 in any game, settled for a 199 on his semi-Dutchman.



Racing jockeys have the right to wear advertisements and logos on their uniforms.

Why not?

Few, if any sports, don't have some form of commercial advertising on their clothing, equipment, or strategically placed signage of all sorts.

I don't know if bowling was the first, but it was an early approver of the idea, going back to the 1900s and before. In the booming days of bowling during the major part of the 20th century, bowling shirts were akin to walking billboards. The earliest advertisers were beer, cigars, bowling equipment, bowling centers, banks, amusement centers, and many an industrial organization, as well as a good sprinkling of religious organizations.

But what seemed natural in bowling was viewed with scorn and deprecating smiles by too many outside of the game.

That didn't stop the bowlers and their sponsors. When there were more than 10 million league bowlers, almost all had bowling shirts and the better teams also had slacks, and often jackets to match. Most of the sponsors were local—restaurants and bars, gas stations, barber shops and beauty salons, banks, insurance agencies, all types of stores, and even politicians, but many of the top national firms also joined as sponsors. For a comparatively small sum, money for league entry fees and shirts, a sponsor could have advertising for 36 weeks and five or six bowlers and their families boosting a product or service by way of mouth.

These days bowling shirts in low average or regular house leagues are mostly gone—and in some leagues there are more bowlers wearing hats than bowling shirts.

There were a number of bowling apparel companies that gave bonus prizes for bowlers who rolled a 300 game while wearing a shirt, belt, skirt or slacks of a certain firm. The prizes ranged from \$100 to \$1,000, mostly in savings bonds. That wouldn't be a good idea in this time of high scores.

Teams went out of their way to come up with beautiful, and often garish shirt designs. Embroidery was an accepted art and could be costly so at times the writing on the back cost more than the shirts.

The International Bowling Hall of Fame and Museum has a classic collection of shirts spanning almost a centrury of male and female uniforms of all sorts.

When the PBA first started its tour it was anything goes and bowlers could wear any kind of shirt advertising any product. On TV only the bowler's name, very huge, was allowed. The PBA then went to no names on shirts and a bowler, according to his finish, was allowed to choose from a variety of colors, and those following had to choose different colors.

For a time Ernie Schlegel and Goupy Troup were the kings of surprise uniforms, from tux styled outfits to those with each leg adorned with a different color.

It all settled down and most will agree that bowlers are dressed neat and colorful these days. The big laugh is that almost every sport was critical of bowling because of bowling shirts with names and now just about every sport has adopted the same practice.

They should have known. Back in the 1890s era the top teams wore stiff starched, long sleeved shirts and ties when they competed in important matches. Anyone who went through that can't be all bad.

Where are all those millions of shirts now? Few are still being used, some rest in closets and attics, but most were sent to needy people around the world when for decades clothing drives concentrated on them.

Carol: Maybe you didn't hear me. KIDS DON'T READ THE BOWLING NEWS !!!

Steve: No, but your readers do, and they have friends. Their friends may be parents, grandparents, or social groups looking for activities that are good for young folks.

Carol: And you think they'd pass these articles on to their friends?

Steve: I think it's worth a try. If you want to grow a tree, you have to plant a seed.

Carol: Did you land on your head when you fell out of your tree?!

Note: Okay, maybe enthusiasm wasn't quite the right term.....

HELLO TO BOWLING: Part I

Hi there. So, you think that you might like to try bowling. I highly recommend against it. Why? Because it's addicting. One trip to a bowling center and you may end up hooked for life. It's worse than cocaine or texting! Throwing a ball and watching all ten pins go down will severely affect your psyche. People will cheer for you, pat you on the back and say, "Way to go!" 

The Most Overlooked Weapon in Your Arsenal

It's been a long, grinding, 12-game stepladder tournament on a very tough pattern. You're tired, both mentally and physically, but you've made it to the title match. Your opponent just opened the door in the 10th. Suddenly, you have the opportunity to close the match with three in the hole to win by a single pin. You step up on the approach and bury the first two. Now, all eyes are fixed on you. What will you do on your last shot?

In the sport of competitive bowling, many variables influence score. If you were asked, "What's the most important factor or 'weapon' in your arsenal that leads to bowling well on a consistent basis?" how would you respond? Having a thorough understanding of lane play?

Having a solid mental game? Having the right ball arsenal with the right pin placements, surface and cores? How about quality practice, exercise and diet? What about having the right soles on your shoes to match up to the approach and weather conditions (i.e. humidity)? How about consistent timing, release and targeting? To be sure, all of these components are important to quality shot making. However, when it comes to the sport of bowling, there is one overlooked and underestimated weapon in your arsenal that supercedes all others.

For 99% of all bowlers, the most, critical, yet ignored weapon are the two middle fingers. Protect these and you'll put shoes on the baby's feet. Abuse or neglect these and you go home broke, busted and disgusted. Now, before you're quick to dismiss reading the rest of this article, because you don't feel you have any problems with your fingers, think again. Consider if you've ever thrown a bad shot...ever. Well, what was the last thing that had contact with the ball just before the ball made contact with the lane? Right! Keep reading.

If you think about it, every other dynamic mentioned above is ultimately dependent upon how these two fingers behave throughout your approach and, more importantly, at that critical point of release. With each delivery, these two fingers are subjected to an enormous amount of stress, pressure, friction and swelling.

Over time, holding, swinging and delivering a 10-15 pound ball on a repetitive basis will generate various degrees of finger wear and tear from the violent frictional force and rubbing contact these fingers are naturally subjected to, given the nature of the activity. Furthermore, finger perspiration, if not properly and constantly addressed, will lead to needless finger discomforts, not to mention erratic and improper grip and delivery.

In fact, in May 2011, the Center for Injury Research and Policy conducted an extensive, 18-year medical study, examining the various injuries associated with the activity of bowling. Not surprisingly, the data and results revealed that the fingers are the most susceptible to injury (19%). Now take a look at your own battle-scarred fingers.

If your fingers could talk, what would they tell you about how they've been treated? If they've been really abused and mistreated, your ring finger might just take a bow. Just how much of a critical role do these two fingers have on your game and what are the consequences of not paying close attention to their condition?

You might think that sprayed shots and erratic scoring is the first area of your game to come unraveled from painful, tired, swollen fingers. On the contrary, a breakdown in your mental game is what precedes poor shot making. As you insert your painful fingers into the ball holes, sensitive pain receptors pulsates signals directly to your brain, automatically high-jacking your mind to immediately focus on the throbbing, stinging pain rather than on executing a quality shot.

With each violent, twisting and lifting motion of the ball off your fingertips, your fingers scream for relief. To deal with this relentless distraction while in the heat of the battle, you resort to quick fix measures, including fiddling with your grip to deal with the discomfort. Now the battle turns to just getting through the game, which seems to go on forever, as strikes become fewer and far between. Whether your discomfort is due to cuts, abrasions, blisters, torn skin, knots or arthritis, your ball release will be affected. Left untreated, this will translate and degenerate into inconsistent ball roll, rotation, rev rate, speed, entry angle to the pocket, pin action and, ultimately, score.

Finger swelling and finger perspiration are also subtle yet devious culprits that play havoc with your physical and mental game if you're not mindful. First, swollen, tired fingers are incapable of seating at the proper depth into the unforgiving ball holes or grips, as neither ball holes nor grips "expands" on command. Moreover, your fingers are too painful to jam into the holes. To get through this agony, you settle for "pinching" the finger holes to hold onto the ball throughout the approach and delivery. Needless to say, a "pinched" delivery is about as effective as rolling a beach ball down the lane. And, like other finger ailments, as you begin down that long road of poorly executed shots, your frustration mounts, as well as your command of four-letter words.

Finger perspiration also has a detrimental effect on arm swing, delivery and ball roll. As your finger pads secrete perspiration against the walls of the grips or finger holes, the battle is on to keep from losing the ball and dumping it on the lane. During your approach and delivery, you'll either consciously or unconsciously "grab" at or "squeeze" the life out of the ball. Besides giving birth to ugly knots on your joints, this grabbing and snatching at the ball tightens the muscles of the forearm and bicep, countermanding a smooth, fluid arm swing and delivery. On the other hand, if you tell yourself, "Don't squeeze the ball", your fingers betray you, as the ball immediately slips off your fingers, just in front of the foul line...usually landing with a "thud" accompanied by another fourletter word. Whether you squeeze the ball like a chicken's neck or like an egg, the consequences finger perspiration can have on your game will result in an ineffective, inconsistent ball delivery and targeting. So, Mr. Stroker-Extraordinaire, it really doesn't matter how smooth and textbook your approach looks or how much "game" you think you have. That's because everything leading up to the point of delivery is secondary and irrelevant if your fingers are not continually managed, protected and cared for, which is of primary importance.



England's Dom Barrett Repeats as Qatar Open Champion *Countryman Stuart Williams falls seven pins short in two-game title match*

DOHA, Qatar – Dom Barrett won an all-England championship match, defeating country Stuart Williams, 495-488, in the two-game title match to successfully defending his Qatar Open title at Qatar Bowling Center Thursday. Barrett earned \$40,000 and his fourth PBA Tour title.

The Qatar Open is a PBA International Tour-World Bowling Tour event.

After the two English bowlers tied at 206 at the end of the first game, Barrett rolled a 189 game to top Williams' 182 for the seven-pin margin of victory.

In the semifinal round, Williams, who earned the No. 1 qualifying position earlier in the day, eliminated Robert Morris University-Illinois collegiate star Cameron Weier of Federal Way, Washington, 434-421, while Barrett ended Sweden's Martin Larsen's bid for his first PBA Tour title, 510-469.

PBA International Tour players now travel to Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, for the 8th Kingdom International Open, Nov. 28-Dec. 2. A number of PBA members from the U.S. and around the world will then close the year by competing representing their home countries in the World Men's Bowling Championships – a non-PBA event – in Abu Dhabi, UAE.

is not an option. Sadly, for some, when the pain of bowling has exceeded the joy of the game, it becomes time to move on to other less physically demanding activities.
