sion, I don't want anyone to change the channel.' No one did. Whether you loved him or hated him, you had to watch
"While many equate Pete with his classic antics on the lanes, to me it's Pete's timeless gift to bowl that puts him at one with the essence of the game and is mesmerizing," Clark continued. "Having his name on the tournament means the event will be all the more special."

Weber grew up in the St. Louis suburb of Florissant, where his father, PBA Hall of Famer Dick Weber, owned a bowling center. It was on those Missouri lanes that the extraordinary legend of Pete Weber originated.

Pete said during his teenage years he bowled against (and defeated) the PBA stars of the 1970s in exhibition matches for nothing more than bragging rights and a soda. Between competing in those matches and countless tournaments across the region, Pete developed the unassailable self-belief that inspired him to join the PBA at 17 years old.

The conviction that powered Pete to 37 PBA Tour titles, seven more than his father, Dick, and fourth all-time

The ambition that helped him win 10 major championships, tied with Earl Anthony for second all-time.

The audacity that led to a record five U.S. Open crowns - and the most iconic phrase in the history of bowling.

Fifty some years later, Pete's confidence has yet to fade. Moments after hearing about the tournament named in his honor, he had a question for the commissioner:

## "Well, can I bowl?"

"To be able to win your own tournament, that's kind of exciting," Pete said. "You never know, I might have a chance to win. If I didn't feel like I could win, I probably wouldn't bowl."

The PBA Pete Weber Missouri Classic will be held at Enterprise Park Lanes in Springfield, Mo., which is about 3.5 hours southwest of Weber's hometown.

Weber said his family has known Steve Wiemer the proprietor of Enterprise Park Lanes, and his family for his entire life. Weber said having the tourna ment named after him in the Wiemer's center is another honor.
"Our history with the Weber family goes back more than 50 years," Wiemer said. "I was tickled to death about the opportunity to have Pete's name on the tournament."

Enterprise Park Lanes hosted its first-ever PBA Tour stop last season. Sam Cooley defeated Springfield native Keven Williams in the title match on BowITV. This year, the stepladder finals will be televised live Sunday, Feb. 18 at 1 p.m. ET on FS1. More information on the PBA Pete Weber Missouri Classic can be found here.

# Bowling In Scotland

As my adventure to discover the origin of a bowling lane in a Scotland castle known as Fyvie continues, l've called upon a bowling historian and a veteran union worker to help determine the answer. Together we are zeroing in on what we believe could be the solution, although at this time still not verified.

Fyvie Castle is an imposing 800 year old fortress. According to the National Trust for Scotland website, "The magnificent castle in the heart of Aberdeenshire is a sterling example of Scottish Baronial architecture. Ghosts, legends and folklore are all woven into Fyvie's history."

The castle has an indoor bowling "alley" as part of a games area. Princess Margaret, who was known for her glamour and beauty, as well as her love for nightlife and the arts, is said to have enjoyed using the lane at Fyvie in the 1990's. Other notables to frequent the castle in earlier times included William the Lion Hearted (King of Scots from 1165 to 1214), Robert the Bruce (King of Scots from 1274 to 1329) and Charles I, King of England, Scotland and Ireland from 1625 to 1649 .

When I contacted J.R. Schmidt, historian and writer of the Yesteryear column for Bowlers Journal International, he was able to locate pages from a Spalding annual catalogue that outline the construction of a bowling lane from the early 1900's. The first page outlines the dimensions of the lane, including the width and length of the lane, the approach, the gutters, the pin pit and cushions. The same measurements are all in effect today.

Pages 2-4 outline "How to Build an Alley." It's a bit hard to read so I will provide some of the more interesting details below:

- An ordinary carpenter can no more build a perfect bowling alley than a blacksmith can manipulate a typewriter. It requires skill, a perfect eye, an excellent judge of wood, and at least two years experience before a man can be rated as a first class alley builder.
- The steel and slate alleys, which were introduced in the east some time in the early 1800 's, are no longer to be seen anywhere. Both have proven a failure from the very start because they were too noisy or deprived the wooden pin of elasticity.
- There are a few alleys still in use that are constructed of cherry, birch and poplar woods, but these are becoming rare. The most popular alley now in use is the one constructed of pine and maple, either in one solid bed, firmly fastened to the foundation or floor, or in sections.
- In order to get a perfect alley bed it is necessary to secure lumber, either pine or maple, that has been thoroughly air dried. This can best be secured by the larger concerns, who are now making a specialty of this business.
- The most suitable size is material that will measure one by three inches, or one and $1 / 8$ th inches by 3 and $1 / 4$ th inches, set on edge, and should have a tongue on one side and groove on the other. Each strip should be nailed, and then either belted through the center or clamped at the bottom. The lane should never be less than forty-one and $1 / 2$ inches in width.
- The alley beds, whether sectional or solid, maple or pine and maple, should at all times be at least 72 feet in length, as the foul line is placed in the alley bed 60 feet from the center of the head pin, or 63 feet 3 inches from the pit end of the alley bed.
- The pits should be three feet 6 inches in length, five feet wide and about eleven inches deep, so that when covered with a mat at the bottom, they will be regulation. There is little chance of the ball rebounding onto the alley, but the pins can be brought back occasionally so that there is a chance to make the so-called impossible split.
- In a pine and maple lane, the pine should be interlocked or dove-tailed into the maple at the eleven foot mark, and allowed to continue downward until within about four feet from the pit end of the alley bed where maple should again be used.
- The gutters should be made to measure about $83 / 4$ inches in width and be of regulation depth.




## Bowling Lane in Fyvie Castle

The outline goes on to explain the importance of guarding against moisture or dampness of any kind. I can vouch for the fact that when this was not done, a lane could tend to warp or spread more rapidly. This scenario occurred during the late 50 's and early 60 's when so many lanes were being installed too rapidly, without even allowing for the ground to settle. Another interesting observation from my international travels was the use of eucalyptus wood in Australia, which tended to be much harder than the maple and pine installations, and also turned a much darker color with extended use.

## Let's Ask Some Union Workers

My friend Bruce Bakos, a 44 year union veteran while working for Exxon Mobil in Linden, N.J., had a couple of keen observations. We have all been fascinated by the plate that appears at the end of the lane in Scotland: Amalgamated Wood Workers International Union of America. Bruce feels that this confirms the fact that the lane had to be constructed in the USA.

Otherwise, the measurements in the Spalding guide would have been in metrics, as well as in feet and inches. Bruce's contention is that the lane was constructed here and then shipped to Scotland, either in whole, or perhaps in smaller sections, as described in bullet points number 3 and 6 above.
J.R. "Jake" Schmidt states the following: "I have been a lifetime union member, and come from a union family, but we have never seen this wood workers logo or marking." Jake is of the opinion that the construction of the lane could have been carried out in Scotland with the use of the Spalding Bowling Guide of 1903, containing the detailed instructions on "How to Build an Alley."

As I continued searching the internet for clues, I found this interesting entry regarding the Amalgamated Wood Workers International Union, or AWWIU, at thefreelibrary.com: "AWWIU (1895-1912) was the first national wood workers organization in the United States. At its peak in 1904, there were 31,230 members. Thirty percent of the membership worked in Chicago, with a sizable number employed at Brunswick, Balke and Collander Company, a world famous manufacturer of billiard tables, bowling lanes and high-class bar room fixtures."

Another entry from richlandcountyhistory.com in Mansfield, Ohio, provides the following: "AMF produced nearly everything in a bowling center, except the bowling lanes. The ball racks, seats, ball returns, desks and magic triangle machines were all manufactured at AMF's plant in Shelby, Ohio." (AMF's famous bowling pins were always manufactured in Lowville, N.Y., at a plant that remains in operation today).

Unfortunately, all of my sources at AMF, and those of Barb Spigner at Brunswick, have retired. But it would certainly appear that the lane was either constructed by Brunswick in Chicago, or assembled in Scotland utilizing the Spalding guide from 1903. Converting inches $(25.4 \mathrm{~mm})$ and feet $(30.48 \mathrm{~cm})$ would be a bit tedious, so I'm leaning toward the manufacturing of the lane in Chicago. To be continued..

Not bad for a boy's bowling team whose ages average under 15 years.

PBA REEIONAL RECAP: WAITER RAY WILLIIAMS JR. CIINCHES 65TH REGIONAL TITLE

With just one month remaining on the 2023 PBA Regional Tour, bowlers are down to their final opportunities to bring home a title this year. Six events took place over the previous two weeks and five more remain before the Regional Players Invitational in January.
Would you be surprised if I told you Walter Ray Williams Jr. earned one of these titles? Probably not. The all-time PBA titles leader on the national and regional tours took home another victory to boost his count to 65 regional and 47 PBA national titles.
Read on to find out who else took home some hardware in this edition of the Regional Recap:

## PBAGO WILSON \& SONS PEST CONTROL OPEN



Beginning with one of the few PBA60 tournaments scattered throughout the year, Frank Gallo Jr. started with the lead at Liberty Lanes in Gastonia, N.C. As the one-seed, Gallo won his first two matches against Danny Weikel and Ronald Reitzel. But on the opposite side of the bracket stood a man named Walter Ray Williams Jr., stormed through the bracket by defeating Brian Link and Darryl Bower to get to the finals.

Gallo started off on the wrong foot in the final match, splitting in the first frame. He was forced to play catch-up from there but couldn't solve some carry issues, with four straight nine-counts in frames four through seven. Meanwhile, Williams stayed clean and won 237-197 to accumulate regional title no. 65.

In a double-dose of Midwest action, the PBA and PBA50 divisions competed on the 42 -foot Mark Roth pattern at Plaza Lanes in Illinois. Kevin McCune kicked things off by shooting +246 for his eight games, enough for a 104-pin lead over second. That lead shrunk a bit after the three-game advancer round, but McCune still held on for the one-seed. Bailey Mavrick earned the two-seed, followed by Tim Gruendler and Chris Hill.

Gruendler never got comfortable in the opening match, shooting a 176 and falling to Hill's 246. Hill doubled early in the following battle, but a split in the seventh frame downed his hopes as Mavrick cruised to a 238-211 win.

The final match was a thriller as both players went back and forth with strikes. Eventually, Mavrick stepped up in the 10th and struck out for a 258 to force McCune to go strike-nine-spare to seal the deal. McCune stepped up and nailed the first shot, but his second shot never made it back hard enough to the pocket as he left the 2-4-5. Mavrick snuck by to win his second career title, 258-257.

After stuffing themselves with food on Thanksgiving, 42 contestants bowled at Crossroads Bowling Center in Beaumont, Texas, in hopes of stuffing their pockets with cash. Michael Austin started with the lead at +290 for eight games, but Chris Hibbits II took the lead after the five-game advancer round at +436 .

The top eight players moved on and Pete McCordic held the lead at +747 through seven games of match play. With just the position round remaining, Hibbits trailed by just nine pins, while Jeff Atkins also had an outside chance at +673 .

# 2024 PBA5OTOUR SCHEDUIE RILEASED 

The PBA50 World Series of Bowling II and season finale at historic AMF Riviera Lanes highlight the schedule by Nolan Hughes

The 2024 PBA50 Tour schedule, which was released today, features the world's best aged-50-andover bowlers competing in 16 title events, including five major championships, and an estimated \$1.4 million total prize fund

The PBA50 World Series of Bowling II returning to Jackson, Mich., and the PBA50 Tournament of Champions heading to the famed AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio headline the schedule, which lasts from late April to mid-August

A five-event sprint with stops in Michigan, North Carolina, and Florida kicks off the 2024 PBA50 Tour. The final event of this swing - the PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open - will help raise money for Bowlers to Veterans Link, the official charity of the PBA Tour.

In June, the PBA50 Tour heads west as the USBC Senior Masters returns to Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas. Then Troy Lint, the reigning PBA50 Player of the Year, will aim to defend his Senior U.S Open crown in Greeley, Colo. After a short break, the PBA50 Tour resumes in July for the final leg of the season and three major championships.

The Bud Moore PBA50 Players Championship will once again crown a champion in Manassas, Va. Last season, Pete Weber earned his first title in two years on the pair of lanes inside Bill Moore's home.

The second annual PBA50 WSOB heads back to JAX 60 in Jackson, Mich. Three championships named in honor of living legends - Del Ballard Jr. Amleto Monacelli and Petraglia - and the PBA50 World Championship comprise the late-July event.

Finally, the hallowed grounds of AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio will be the site of the season's final event. The longtime host of the PBA Tournament of Champions becomes a first-time host to the PBA50 TOC.

Two national events for PBA60 competitors are on the docket in 2024. The USBC Super Senior Classic runs from May 29 to June 2 at Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas, while the PBA60 Tristan's Memorial Open will be held at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl during the week of July 4.

The schedule allows for PBA50 players to compete in the 2024 PBA LBC National Championships at Bowlero Mount Prospect in Mount Prospect, III. All players can compete on weekends from June 1 through July 14, with the dates of June 29-30 and July 6 being ideal for PBA50 competitors. The entire PBA50 Tour will be livestreamed on BowITV. PBA and PBA50 Regional Tour events for the 2024 season will be announced soon.
